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




The Boston Patriots were part of the American Football League which originally competed against the AFL until the leagues merged in 1970. The NFL agreed to merge with the American Football League (AFL) in 1966, and the First Super Bowl was held at the end of that season. The full merger was completed in 1970. On March 23, 1971, the team officially announced they would change the team name from the Boston Patriots to the New England Patriots.

This book captures the great moments in Patriots Football as noted—even before the Patriots were the New England Patriots. This Patriots-first book takes the reader through all of the almost-championships and the many championships and Super Bowls in the teams history. We show all of the Patriots 14 coaches great stories about the 59 seasons worth of great games (967 games) with 537 great wins. The book often stops in time and talks about a particular great player such as John Hannah, Gino Cappelletti, Bob Dee, Vito "Babe" Parilli, Steve Grogan, Bruce Armstrong, Jim Nance, Dont'e Hightower, Drew Bledsoe, Tedy Bruschi, Ty Law, Willie McGinist, Rob Gronkowski, Wes Welker, or the greatest player in football today, Tom Brady. All of these players had a lot to do with the Patriots championship games and championship victories. These stops will add substantially to your reading enjoyment.

And folks, most of all, this book thus captures the great championships and the almost championship seasons from 1960 when "Boston" entered the NFL right up until the great Patriots' 2019 Super Bowl LII victory. 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I learned how to write creatively in Grade School at St. Boniface. I even enjoyed reading some of my own stuff.

At Meyers High School (HS Diploma) and King's College (BS Data Processing), and Wilkes-University, (MBA Accounting & Finance) I learned how to research, write bibliographies and footnote every non-original thought included in my writings. I learned to hate ibid, and op. cit., and I hated assuring that I had all citations were written down in the proper sequence. I wrote 153 other books before this book and several hundred articles published by many magazines and newspapers and I only cite when an idea is not mine or when I am quoting, and again, I choose to cite in place, and the reader does not have to trace strange numbers through strange footnotes and back to bibliography elements that may not be readily accessible or available.

Yet, I would be kidding you, if in a book about the great moments in New England Patriots Football, I tried to bluff my way, so you would think that I knew everything before I began to research and write anything in this book. I spent as much time researching as writing. I might even call myself an expert of sorts now for all the facts that I have uncovered.

Without any pain on your part, you can read this book from cover to cover to enjoy the stories about the many great championships in both the Boston Patriots of the AFL and the New England Patriots of the NFL Both generations of New England Teams made their mark on the football world.

This book is not intended for historians per se, but it does teach a lot of history. It is for regular people of all levels of intelligence. It is for

people who want to have a fun read, who like smiling when Patriots Football is the topic. It is fun reading about each of New England's 523 wins. This book is for people who love New England Patriots' Football and perhaps it is also for some Patriot's detractors who want to have command of the facts before they defend a point of view.

There are lots and lots of facts in this book. This book is not for sticklers about the mundane aspects of writing that often cause creative writers to lay bricks or paint houses instead of writing. When the Patriots play a team and they win or lose, that is a historical fact, but to discover such facts, it does not require fundamental or basic research. The NFL itself as well as the Patriots, copyright their original material but not public facts. They copyright so they can say "no" if somebody else's creativity affects the league or the franchise negatively. Even the NFL does not own publicly well-known facts that are readily available about legacies such as Mike Holovak or Chuck Fairbanks or Bill Parcells or Raymond Berry, or even the more than immortal Bill Belichick and his many championship seasons.

The championships and the coaches and the great players are well known and well defined, though some may think the facts belong to the NFL. Facts are facts, period. So, what? As the author of this book, I care but it is a sports book. I use a judicious approach to assure that I am not throwing the bull when I intend to be presenting the facts.

Nonetheless, this is not a book about heavy math algorithms, or potential advances to the internal combustion engine, or space travel, or the eight elements necessary to find a cure for cancer. So, I refuse to treat this book 100% seriously. It is a sports book. If you find a fault, I will fix it. This is a book about sports and sports legends and stories about sporting events that have been recorded seven million times already someplace else. New Englanders should be pleased. Though I tried for sure to get it all right and I used the work of others to assure so, I bet I made a mistake or two. Tell me about them. Don't

Preface:

"Knowing you have a good backup long snapper allows you to sleep good at night" Quote by Bill Belichick, the greatest coach in Patriot Football history and the author of more professional football championships than anybody ever. Belichick cannot stand anybody being late, and is known for this famous quote: "Snow is no excuse for being late"

When the 2018 season began, everybody thought the Patriots were going to do well and most thought that Belichick's mastery of the game was going to clinch the Pats another Super Bowl. Bill Belichick is known for not taking days off, but he was ready to blow out some Eagles' feathers in 2018 this year as he went on his regular way to winning all the marbles again and then the big Bowl. Belichick had answered the question again and despite the ego bruising loss to the Eagles, he was ready to be on the same sidelines that he roamed and controlled for the past 18 years—and he won again in 2018..

There had been some reports about a rift between the coach, owner Robert Kraft and QB Tom Brady. All three of the parties have the best deal the cards could deliver and after a few healed wounds, the pundits say the wounds are all healed and the trio are back at making it all better for the Patriots for the 2019 season.



Whoever thought Bill Belichick could look like a crazy kid on a beach?

Just look at the Patriots' full record in the prologue of this book. It shows Bill Belichick as the only long-serving immortal coach in Patriot's history. What owner would give that up? How about the greatest QB in football history looking for a more agreeable trio than the one he is already part of and if you are a sane fan, you gotta say. "What smart, great player would give that relationship up for anything?

So, it looks like the Patriot's will be intact and ready to go in the Fall. Patriot fans are realists and they are most appreciative that in the pre-Kraft, pre-Belichick and the pre-Brady days, nothing compares with today with the "pre" removed and this trio of greats working together for the betterment of New England football. I think that is a Belichick smile on the beach above. I am happy for that for sure.

When Bill Belichick was photographed on the beach with his sweetheart, pictured on the prior page, he sure showed no signs of Foxboro or Gillette anxiety that might force him back to the stadium with an armed escort.

When asked a question about his job security with the Patriots and if he planned on being back next year Belichick said, "Absolutely." Sometimes few words are the best explanation.

Looking back in history as we do in this book, we don't find a ton of great coaches out of the 14 on the Patriot's list. Yes, the Patriots had a lot of losing seasons, but they hit win #500 before any other team that began ignominiously in the AFL.

The Pats have more than an overall big winning record. Why? Well, the excellent coaches over the years, though none comparing to Belichick, had winning percentages that were very good but not every year. The fact is that the poor and so-so coaches could not drag the Pats record downward as the better coaches kept it well above 500 percent. Take a look at the season one-liner summaries at the beginning of the book and you will see what I mean. New Englanders must be proud.

The Boston Patriots were just one of many new AFL teams merged into the NFL when the AFL chose to combine with the NFL. Most NFL teams had been around since long before 1960, when the NFL motley crew entered the realm of real football and they made their mark. It took a lot of years and a tenacious coach named Raymond Berry, well known in the past as a Baltimore Colts receiver for the great Johnny Unitas, to show this AFL set of Patriots that they could win games.

Even before the Boston Patriots existed, Raymond Berry was making pro football history. Check out this picture of one of the most famous passes in NFL history caught by none-other than former Patriots' Coach Raymond Berry. The football thrown by Hall of Fame Baltimore Colts quarterback Johnny Unitas to Hall of Fame split end Raymond Berry for a touchdown in the classic 1958 NFL championship at Yankee Stadium actually sold for \$62,140 at a Huggins & Scott Auction. Can you imagine when that night was?



The Patriots had been close to pay-dirt in the past, having had coaches get them into the playoffs. The first Super Bowl appearance of course was in 1986 and the coach that night was Raymond Berry.

After a great season and great playoffs, the Patriots could not keep up the momentum and Berry's Patriots lost their first Super Bowl encounter to the Chicago Bears in SB XX, (10–46).

The infamous great coach Bill Parcells brought the Patriots to their next Super Bowl after the 1996 season in Super Bowl XXXI. Parcells had as much luck as Raymond Berry in 1986. The Patriots showed well but lost the game after a great season and a winning playoff series. Nonetheless, the team still did not win the Super Bowl against the Packers in a 21-35 defeat.

Each of the Super Bowl losses made the team stronger and more prepared to dancing in the big dance. Pete Carroll took over the Patriots for three years and though he was a fine coach, he did not get the Pats into the dance. Then, out of nowhere came the modern beachcomber, Bill Belichick. He changed football forever for New England. He is still there making things OK after six Super Bowl Victories and just five defeats.

Nobody doubts Bill Belichick any more.

After writing about Notre Dame, Penn State, Clemson, Alabama, Florida, Syracuse, and Army, Brian Kelly, your author was moved by the Patriots' great seasons and the work of Tom Brady and Bill Belichick to take a shot at writing a book about one of his favorite pro-teams. Writing about Patriots Championships is easy because there ae so many. Kelly has been rooting for the Patriots in almost every Super Bowl from 1980. Kelly rooted for some Patriots teams that never even made the cut.

Not all New England coaches for example, are named Belichick Berry, Parcells, Carrol, or Holovak, so not all games are in the W column. However, all teams from 1960 to the present, no matter who the coach is, were Patriots tough, nonetheless. That means they all fought hard for wins for the good of the team and the fans.

This book is written for those of us who love Patriots football as played in many of the great American venues over the years. After discussing the origins of pro-football, the book first tells the story of the first New England Patriots Football Game in 1960. It then advances to the games, the victories and some losses, and onward to the great championships and Super Bowls. You'll love it. You'll love Patriots football through the eyes of immortal New England coaches of historical fame—Ray Berry, Mike Holovak, and Chuck Fairbanks.

Predicting that another future immortal great is already in our midst, the book then takes us up to the last season with Coach Bill Belichick, a present and future immortal.



Chapter 1 Introduction to the Book

The Patriots celebrate 50 years of football



Everybody loves the Patriots!

In 2019, New England will celebrate its 60th year of Patriots' football. Sixty is a special number and in November 2019, the team will celebrate the formation of the Boston Patriots, soon to be the New England Patriots. The above logo was unveiled at the 50th celebration to add a special look to the big shebang. At the time this book was being printed, the 2019 celebration had not occurred.

This book celebrates New England Patriots Football; its founding; its struggles; its greatness; and its many championship games and Super Bowl victories. In many ways it also celebrates the longlasting impact of great football games on American life. People like me, who love the team from way back when they played tough AFL football, will love this book, as we reach back to the founding and then to the 50th anniversary and now as we approach the 60th anniversary of one of the best organizations that has ever played professional football.



In defining the format of the book, we chose to use a timetable that is based on a historical chronology. Within this framework, we discuss the great championships and almost championships in New England Patriots Football History, and there are many great games in which the Patriots came out on top.

No book can claim to be able to capture all the greatness, as it would be a never-ending story, but we sure try. The great games include a lot of great people, including players and the 14 great coaches that over time would make or break the New England Patriots.

Even before we get into Patriots football seasons, we discuss some ancillary stuff about the patriots and we touch on the beginning of football, the first players paid to play, and then on to the beginning of the , the NFL, and the big merger.

To know the full story of the New England Patriots, you have to go through Boston.

Boston was always ready to welcome NFL teams. The Patriots were not the first but with their great record, New Englanders are hoping, they are the last pro football team ever needed. The first pro football team welcomed by Boston was the Boston Bulldogs. This adventure lasted only during the 1929 season, but it got the Boston juices flowing.

The next NFL pro team to play was the Boston Braves/Redskins, from 1932 to 1936. In 1933 after the inaugural season, there was a name change to the Boston Redskins. Founder George Preston Marshall named the team the Boston Braves after the city's Major League Baseball team. However, after a financially devastating and poorly attended season in 1932, Marshall abandoned the Braves name in favor of the Redskins.

The Braves / Redskins had played first at Braves Field and then they moved to Fenway Park. Unfortunately for the area, the team did not draw well, even in its final season when they reached the NFL Championship Game. They moved to Washington as the Redskins right after the 1936 season.

The Boston Yanks played from 1944 to 1948 before moving to New York to become the New York Yanks football team. The team, which as noted began as the Boston Yanks, at the time was owned by Kate Smith's manager, Ted Collins. None of the Boston NFL teams that we discussed were the precursor team to the Patriots. In other words, they are not in the ancestry of the Boston Patriots from the AFL. There is no DNA match. The old Boston Yanks folded in 1952.

The AFL formed in 1959 and the Boston Patriots played their first game in the Fall 1960. As you can see, the desire for there to be a Boston or New England presence in professional football goes back a long way. As you can see from the Boston Yanks picture below, players had little choice in those days but to go both ways—O & D.

When the AFL was being formed, unlike some other pro-football ventures of the deep past, it looked from the start that it was going to be able to sustain itself and perhaps even surpass the excitement of the NFL. Investors were lining up to become pro-football owners.

It seemed like investors had forgotten the other AFL's that had come before this AFL, and their attempts to out-NFL, the NFL. It was tough slugging. The new upstart AFL clearly operated in direct competition with the more established NFL throughout its ten-year existence.

It was much more successful than earlier rivals to the NFL with the same name, the American Football League (1926), American Football League (1936), American Football League (1940), and the later All-America Football Conference((1944-1950), played in 1946-1949). America had fallen in love with football, and there was a great business out there for a league that could make it.

The Patriots were formed when Boston businessman, William "Billy" Sullivan, an executive of Sullivan Brother Printers, owned by Joseph Sullivan, was awarded the eighth and final franchise of the developing American Football League(AFL) on November 16,

1959. In the next few weeks, locals submitted thousands of ideas for the Boston football team's official name. On February 20, 1960, Sullivan picked "Boston Patriots" from the lot.

"Patriots," of course referred to those colonists of the Thirteen Colonies who rebelled against British control during the American Revolution, and who, in in July 1776 declared the United States of America an independent nation. "Patriots" as the team nickname had been suggested by 74 fans, among them Larry Kepnes, a regular guy whose signature stood out. Immediately thereafter, artist Phil Bissell developed the "Pat Patriot" logo.

There is not much written about Larry other than his recent obituary. I learned that his full name was Lawrence Kepnes, and he was from Swampscott, Massachusetts. He passed away on Friday November 18, 2016, still a devoted Red Sox and Patriots fan. I can tell he was my kind of guy.

Every football fan alive in 1960, including Larry Kepnes loved the AFL as the folks at home got to see more great football—just like that played in the already mature NFL. The only thing they did not see was the great AFL teams playing the great NFL teams. The leagues were 100% separate and they did not share their proceeds or their secrets or their drafted players until they had to. It would take a little time before the NFL begrudgingly realized that the AFL brand

of football was here to stay. Rather than trying to beat them, eventually they joined them.

The old NFL Boston Yanks when they played in Boston, claimed Fenway Park as their home spot and got away with it. However, the Patriots' time in the AFL saw them as homeless. They had no regular home stadium. They played wherever they could find a field-Nickerson Field, Harvard Stadium, even Fenway Park sometimes, as well as Boston College's Alumni Stadium. These stadia were all in or near Boston.

The Patriots were quite happy to have these as home fields during their time in the American Football League.

With Coach Lou Saban, the first Boston Coach, and Coach Mike Holovak, the second Boston coach, the Patriots put forth a number of seasons in which the percentage wins were, or at least seemed closer to 1000 than to 500. Those were the great start-up days. Many of the player names from the Boston Patriots teams in the 1960's have slipped into oblivion but there are still some of us, who understand oblivion, and who still recall some early Patriots stars.

The great ones include defensive tackles Jim Lee "Earthquake" Hunt and Houston Antwine; quarterback Vito "Babe" Parilli; and flanker-placekicker Gino "The Duke" Cappelletti (no relationship with John from Penn State). These guys were great to watch. Hunt, Parilli and Cappelletti played every year of the existence of the AFL, with Hunt and Cappelletti spending all ten years with the Patriots.

To fans, the AFL was like a big giant never-ending intramural pickup game that would not end. Nobody wanted it to end. Having a named group of guys playing the teams in the AFL in this great pickup game was great football. Everybody loved the AFL. Everybody loved Boston's Patriots.

With all deference to the NFL, the AFL proved that little guys can make it and that's why the league captured the hearts of American football lovers. The fans still loved their Giants, their Eagles, their Steelers, etc. so it was a big gift to fans to have so many other great teams who never played their teams, who had new-name stars

gracing the sidelines each week. Football fans from 1960 to 1969 could actually get away with having two favorite pro teams.

Cappelletti was the all-time leading scorer in the AFL. Later the Patriots were joined by such stars as defensive end Larry Eisenhauer, fullback Jim Nance, and middle linebacker and future Hall of Famer Nick Buoniconti. Cappelletti and Nance were AFL Most Valuable Players, Cappelletti in 1964 and Nance in 1966. Buoniconti and Antwine were later named to the American Football League All-Time Team. Who could ask for more?

Three years into the AFL, we saw the Boston Patriots defeating the Buffalo Bills in an AFL Eastern Division playoff game in 1963, and we saw the Patriots playing in the 1963 AFL championship game. They lost to the San Diego Chargers 51–10 but as always, they took the bad with the good. Just in their third year of existence, Boston was somebody. It was good for morale and it was good for Boston Beer sales, which actually were not too bad before the Patriots.

The Patriots as potential champs would not appear again in an AFL or NFL post-season game for another 13 years, but Boston beer sales were still booming in the Fall as well as all over New England. Additionally, the games were great. Before the AFL delivered its swan-song, the Patriots would often challenge the then dominant AFL Bills for the Eastern Division title. Those of us who remember back then loved those football days.

When the NFL and AFL merged in 1970, I can remember being very disappointed as I had come to like the scrappy, less formal AFL. The Patriots were placed in the AFC East division, where they still play today. Actually, we know that they do more than play. They dominate the AFC East.

It was not long for the Patriots to find a home. They moved to a new stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts, a suburb of Boston, known as Foxboro Stadium, which would serve as their home for 30 years; the team also changed their name to the New England Patriots to reflect the location change, as well as its following throughout the region. It is the only NFL team (though both New York City teams have substantial followings in parts of Connecticut as well) in New England.

During the 1970s, the Patriots had some success, eventually earning a berth to the playoffs in 1976. It was not a free ride but a wild card-

berth. Then, in 1978, with Chuck Fairbanks as Head Coach, they made it as AFC East champions. They would lose both playoff games.

In 1985, the Patriots, unaccustomed at the time to glory, returned to the playoffs, and made it all the way to Super Bowl XX, which they lost against the Chicago Bears 46–10. Nonetheless, it was a banner year and new Englanders know how to celebrate and so beer sales finally went up again in the city and the suburbs.

Following their Super Bowl loss, the Patriots barreled back into the playoffs in 1986, but were beaten in the first round. The team kept doing its best with non-Bill-Belichicks as coaches, and they would not make the playoffs again for eight more years.

Most fans do not care about ownership changes unless the new owner messes things up. The Pats changed ownership several times in that period, being purchased from the Sullivan family first by Victor Kiam in 1988, who sold the team to James Orthwein in 1992. Orthwein's intention was to move the team to his native St. Louis. Missouri. He chose not to try to do that after visiting some Boston Pubs. OK, his reasons remain a secret.

Nonetheless, he chose to sell the franchise, i.e. the business of the Patriots team two years later to current owner, local businessman Robert Kraft in 1994. Most New Englanders who like football like Kraft because he likes to win.

Orthwein had a short period of ownership and his desire to uproot the team was well-known. Yet he did oversee some major changes to the team. Former New York Giants coach Bill Parcells, who had taken the Giants from misery to stardom was hired in 1993. Nobody could deny Bill Parcells had a unique way of getting the most from any football team he ever coached.

Parcells would bring the Patriots to two playoff appearances, including Super Bowl XXXI, which they lost to the Green Bay Packers by a score of 35–21. Pete Carroll, Parcells' successor, another top NFL coach today with the Seahawks, would also take the team to the playoffs twice. Whodathunk? Would a happy-go10

lucky, work-if-you-must kinda guy, like Bill Belichick would out-Parcells and out-Carrol these two great NFL coaches. Yet, he did. Check the record.

Everybody knows that Bill Belichick is the Patriots current head coach. He was out hunting one day and was hired in 2000. OK, he may have been doing something else, but he was hired, and it was a great day for the Patriots and for Patriot's fans.

The New England Patriots like Foxborough Mass. However, Foxboro stadium became an old story and the Pats were hoping for a newer, more modern facility. So, the powers that be created a new home field, Gillette Stadium for the Patriots and they opened it in 2002. Coach Belichick was a godsend two-years earlier to those fans in New England who not only liked football but liked to win.

Belichick's teams won five Super Bowls, including three in four years (2001-2004). As a football purist, I happen to love perfect NFL season records almost as much as Super Bowl Wins. Not kidding. For example, in 1972, I loved the perfect season of the Miami Dolphins. Nobody yet, even our famous and fabulous Patriots have outclassed this Dolphins team.

The 1972Dolphins still are the only NFL team to win the Super Bowl with a perfect season. Though the Patriots finished the 2007 regular season with a perfect 16–0 record, becoming only the fourth team in league history to go undefeated, and the only one since the league expanded its regular season schedule to 16 games; they did not eclipse the Dolphins challenge: "Be perfect!"

And, so, even after two playoff victories, the 2007 Patriots ended that season with an 18-1 record. There was this unfortunate encounter and a subsequent loss to the New York Giants in Super Bowl XLII that stole away the aura of perfection from the New England Patriots.

Looking at the greats in Patriot's history we find many names we know such as Doug Flutie, Steve Grogan, Babe Parilli, Jim Nance, Gino Cappelletti, Irving Fryar, Stanley Morgan, Wes Welker, Ben Coates, Rob Gronkowski, John Hannah, Mike Haynes, Ty Law, Tedy Bruschi, Nick Buoniconti, Richard Seymour, Houston Antwine, Jim Lee Hunt, Vince Wilfork, Stephen Gostkowski, Adam Vinatieri, and other New England greats from over the years. They all have or have had great reverence for the team for which they played the game of football. That reverence is captured in the subsequent pages of this book.

Looking at the quick snapshot of coaches and seasons at the beginning of the book, it is clear that New England has been able to survive a number of coaches who could not survive themselves. while the Patriots football program has grown both in acceptance, popularity, and sheer dominance.

Look across the Internet with your web browser and you will be reminded that the New England Patriots are runner-up world champions, having barely lost to the Philadelphia Eagles in February 2018 to win the coveted Super Bowl Trophy. The Patriots have their share of Super Bowl rings for sure. If we listed all of the Patriots' accolades individually, we would have to close this book now with no further additions for a too-many-pages violation.

The 2018 Eagles contest marked the 10th Super Bowl appearance for the New England franchise, eighth of which have come since 2001. This year, 2001, was the year in which Tom Brady led the Pats to a 20-17 win over the Rams. It was in Bill Belichick's second year as head coach.

I think as an intro I have done a fine job. I hope you think so also.

In the full book, I do my best to portray an accurate depiction of New England Patriots football history, displayed in a properly summarized format so that none of us are reading this book forever. There are almost 500 pages to this book. However, the many pages are in this book so there is more than enough to accompany you on those cold winter nights after the close of the football season.

There are a ton of great stories for sure. More importantly, none of us should need to search further than this book for the truth about many of the depictions in this book.

Let's just summarize some of the great accomplishments that the Pats have placed in their hip pockets:

The following list is for NFL teams and the last time they won their division.

AFC East Division Winner History:

Patriots have won the division title 2009-present. They actually have won it all but two years since 2001. In other words. They have won the division 10 straight years. The Dolphins last won it in 2008 (11years ago). The Jets won it in 2002 (17-years ago). The Bills won it in 1995 (24-years ago)

Accomplishments:

The Patriots are 6-5 in Super Bowls. The Patriots have won Conference titles 11 times. The Patriots have won their Division 20 times

Chapter 2 History of Patriots Football Stadiums

Boston Patriots had no stadium

In 1970, after a decade of playing at four different sites, including Boston University Field, Harvard Stadium, Fenway Park and Boston College Alumni Stadium, the Patriots selected Foxborough as the new home of the team. In March 1971, the team was renamed the New England Patriots. Let's take a look at these four sites briefly as Patriot fans of the 1960's attended home games at these fields even though the Patriots did not have a home football stadium per se. Having four stadiums to pick from gave the Patriots a better opportunity to have an available stadium for a particular home game.

Harvard Stadium (1970)

The best description of Harvard Stadium is that it looks like a football stadium from early times ought to look. In many ways it has attributes of a coliseum. It is a magnificent structure built in the traditional U-shape of many college football stadiums. It is located in the Allston neighborhood of Boston, Massachusetts.

The stadium has a lot of history, having been built in 1903 when college football was the wave of the country. There were few large stadiums at this time and so the Harvard Stadium was a pioneering execution of reinforced concrete to be used in the construction of large structures.

Harvard Stadium had a major influence on the design of later stadiums. It was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1987. The stadium is the nation's oldest permanent concrete structure dedicated to intercollegiate athletics.

Today, the stadium is owned and operated by Harvard University and is home to the Harvard Crimson football program. The seating capacity of the stadium is now, though at one time it seated up to 57,166 in the past, as permanent steel stands (completing a straight-sided oval)[7] were installed in the northeast end zone of the stadium in 1929. They were torn down after the 1951 season, due to deterioration and reduced attendance. They can always rebuild if Harvard's squad again reaches national college football prominence. After the demolition, smaller temporary steel bleachers were placed across the open end of the stadium until the building of the Murr Center, which is topped by the fancy new scoreboard, was built in 1998.

Ironically, Harvard Stadium altered the game of football permanently—at least it altered what had been planned for football. And so, it is said that this is a stadium that changed the game. Look at the close proximity of the stands to the field at the Stadium. Think

of how difficult with such a strong stadium in place to consider widening the football field. Consequently, Harvard Stadium led to one of the most successful innovations in football history. In 1906, three years after the stadium was built, debate raged about the sport's roughness and several colleges had dropped football in favor of rugby. When the football rules committee met to discuss changes, Walter Camp proposed widening the field by 40 feet. However, that idea would require considerable alterations to the Stadium. Ultimately, the committee adopted the forward pass instead. Where would football be today without the forward pass?

Harvard Stadium hosted just one Boston Patriots season in 1970. It was the Patriots' first season in the NFL after the AFL-NFL merger and their last season before briefly becoming the Bay State Patriots, and then quickly becoming the New England Patriots before the start of the 1971 season. The team moved to Schaefer Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts the following season. As we have seen, the Patriots had previously played at Boston College (1969), Fenway Park (1963–68), and Boston University Field (1960–62).

Boston U Stadium Nickerson Field (1960)

The Boston Patriots began their football legacy in 1960 playing home games at Nickerson Field, on the campus of Boston University. Nickerson is an outdoor athletic stadium in the Northeastern United States, in Boston, Massachusetts. The stadium is owned by the university. It was once the home of the Boston University Terriers football team and today is the home field for some other Boston University Terriers athletics programs, including soccer and lacrosse. Football for Boston University was discontinued following the 1997 season.

The Patriots continued to play home games at Nickerson until 1963.

The stadium has some history as it is located on the site of Braves Field, the former home ballpark of the Boston Braves, a major league baseball team in the National League. The Boston Braves baseball franchise relocated to Milwaukee in March 1953, and relocated again in 1966, to become the Atlanta Braves. Parts of

Braves Field, such as the entry gate and right field pavilion, remain as portions of the current stadium. The old Braves Field ticket office at Harry Agganis Way also remains, now and is used by the Boston University Police Department. The stadium has been the home of BU athletic teams longer (50-plus years) than it was the home of the Braves (parts of 38 seasons).

The field is named for William Emery Nickerson (1853–1930), who was a partner of King C. Gillette during the early years of the Gillette Safety Razor Company.

BU purchased the stadium on July 30, 1953, and in April 1954 renamed it Boston University Field. Lots has happened over the years to the stadium. In 1955, the Braves Field grandstand, left field pavilion, and "Jury Box" (right field bleachers) were demolished. The existing right field pavilion was squared off on the west side and filled in on the east side where a section had been removed to accommodate the Braves Field right field foul pole and bullpens. Three buildings overlooking the field coincidentally suggest the outline of the original main grandstand section.

After being renamed Boston University Field in 1955, the University brought the field back to its naming roots. In February 1956, BU was awarded \$391,000 for the Weston field, which had been taken by eminent domain or construction of Massachusetts Route 128. The University used the proceeds, in part, to renovate the former baseball park, and on September 28, 1963, renamed it Nickerson Field, inheriting the name of the prior field in Weston.

In 1968, the University brought a facelift to the stadium and some other innovative changes. The four Braves Field light towers were dismantled. Additionally, that year, BU became the second college in the United States to install Astro-Turf. The following year, not only did the BU football team practice on that field, so did the Boston College Eagles football team and our then Boston Patriots. Both used the field to prepare for away games they would play on AstroTurf fields

Boston College Alumni Stadium (1969)

Alumni Stadium was the site of Boston Patriot home games during the 1969 season. It was the Boston Patriots 10th season and their final one in the AFL.

Alumni football stadium is located on the lower campus of Boston College in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts, approximately six miles west of downtown Boston. I've been there; and it is not a pleasant drive in the rain from downtown Boston. The stadium lies within the city limits of Boston, although its postal address is Chestnut Hill. Today it is the home of the Boston College Eagles. Its present seating capacity is 44,500.



Its south façade faces Beacon Street. Keep going towards Boston and you hit Beacon Hill and you can stop for a few quaffs at Cheers. This is Boston College's first stadium and it opened its doors in 1915 and it was located just south of Gasson Quadrangle, on the site of the present Stokes Hall, a newly-built academic buildings for the humanities that opened in 2013.

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Before the building of Stokes, the area was known as The Dustbowl, a nickname that originated as a description of Alumni Field in the years when it was intensely used as a practice field, a baseball diamond, and a running track.

It was formally dedicated "as a memorial to the boys that were" on October 30, 1915. Alumni Field and its distinctive "maroon goalposts on a field of green" were hailed in that evening's edition of the Boston Saturday Evening Transcript as "one of the sights in Boston." The original grandstands, which could accommodate 2,200 spectators in 1915, were enlarged over the subsequent years to 25,000. Nonetheless Alumni Field often proved too small for BC football games which were frequently held at Fenway Park, and later Braves Field, beginning in the 1930s.

As time went by, BC knew they needed a new stadium. So, after a period of construction, on September 21, 1957, Alumni Stadium opened on Boston College's lower campus. The complex included a new stadium with a football field encircled by a regulation track. In 1957, it had a max seating capacity of 26,000.

The dedication game for the stadium was a match-up with the Midshipmen of the U.S. Naval Academy, was orchestrated with the help of BC benefactor and then-Massachusetts Senator John F. Kennedy. Kennedy, who had received his honorary degree at

Commencement Exercises in Alumni Field the previous year, would return to Alumni Stadium on a number of occasions over the course of his political career, including a 1963 Convocation Address, one of his last public appearances.

Since then, Alumni Stadium has hosted numerous intellectual and cultural luminaries, religious leaders and heads of state as the venue for Boston College's annual Commencement Exercises since its opening in 1957. In addition to being the permanent home of the Boston College football team, as noted, Alumni Stadium was the home field for the Boston Patriots of the American Football League during the 1969 season.

As the home of the Boston College Eagles, Alumni Stadium has been the site of numerous notable moments in Boston College football history. For example, on September 17, 2005, Alumni Stadium hosted BC's inaugural game as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Long after the Patriots played before 26,000 fans, the stadium underwent a major renovation before the 1994 season. The renovation eliminated the track and increased the seating capacity to 44,500. Since 1998, a 65-foot (20 m)-high bubble of inflatable vinvl has covered the stadium from December to March, cleverly permitting the field to be used as a winter practice facility.

Alumni Stadium's field surface itself was converted to FieldTurf before the 2004 season. In the summer before the 2005 football season, the \$27 million Yawkey Athletics Center opened at Alumni Stadium's north end zone, and the logo of the Atlantic Coast Conference was added to the FieldTurf. For the 2012 season. Alumni Stadium was outfitted with new FieldTurf. As we know, no stadium is ever completed.

Boston's Fenway Park (1963-1968)

The Fenway Ball Park was used for many events in its 100+ year old period serving the greater Boston area. For the purposes of this

book, we know that Fenway was the home of the Boston Patriots for six of its ten seasons of existence from 1963 to 1968.



Fenway "Baseball" Park Lined Up for Football

Fenway Park's inaugural year was simply exceptional. After extensive construction in the early months of 1912, Fenway Park hosted its first baseball game on April 9, an exhibition between the Red Sox and Harvard College. Eleven days later, the Red Sox played their first official game at Fenway Park against the New York Highlanders. The club went on to win 105 regular season games, the American League Pennant and a thrilling World Series. During the season, while the Red Sox were on the road, a few amateur baseball games were held at the park and the construction of left-field and right-field bleachers was completed in time for the World Series. In late 1912, Fenway Park hosted the National High School Football Championship Game, concluding an eventful first year in the park's history.

The Red Sox opened the 1912 season with new ownership and a new ballpark. General Charles H. Taylor and his son John I. Taylor had sold controlling interest in the team to James McAleer in September 1911, but the Taylor family stayed on as overseers of construction on the club's new ballpark. After a feverish winter of work, Fenway Park, the new home of the Boston Red Sox, was ready for an April 9 exhibition against Harvard College, a 2-0 contest the Sox won amidst snow flurries. Opening Day of the

regular season was scheduled for April 18, 1912 and not only did that day get rained out, but both Patriots Day games on the following day did as well - and the newspaper headlines focused mainly on the sinking of the steamship Titanic, which had sunk on April 15.

When the Sox finally took the field for the first official game on April 20, 1912, some 27,000 fans saw the Red Sox prevail in a 7-6, extra-innings victory over the New York Highlanders (renamed the Yankees in 1913). Boston Mayor John "Honey Fitz" Fitzgerald, a prominent member of the Royal Rooters fan club and grandfather of future President John F. Kennedy, threw out the ceremonial first pitch.

1912, a contest between the Red Sox and New York Highlanders that drew a crowd of 27,000 fans. On May 17, the formal dedication of Fenway Park took place.

Foxboro Stadium

Foxboro stadium filled the void for a great team without a home. After eleven years with no home stadium, Foxboro stadium was built beginning September 23, 1970 while the Boston Patriots were finishing their last season of play using Harvard Stadium as home. It was completed just about a year later and opened up for the 1971 season on August 15, 1971.



It was the home for the New England Patriots for more than 30 years during which the stadium had a unique reputation in the league. Foxboro Stadium, nicknamed from being located in Foxborough Massachusetts, was one of the NFL's worst stadiums for many years which we will explain. As we described earlier in this chapter, during the Patriots first 11 years of existence they played at a number of different stadiums—BU's Nickerson Field (1960-1962)). Fenway Park (1963-1968), BC's Alumni Stadium (1969) and Harvard Stadium (1970).

There were mandates set during the AFL–NFL merger negotiations in 1970 that required that all teams play home games n stadiums with at least 50,000 seats. None of the four stadiums the Patriots had used up to that point were big enough. Moreover, because Boston is one of the oldest and densely packed cities in North America, there

was little room in Boston proper for a new stadium—or even a dog coop for that matter.

Nasty rumors began to spread about the team relocating to Tampa, Florida. New England fans today rejoice knowing these rumors ultimately never came to fruition. Tampa, of course, eventually got their Buccaneers in 1976.


In 1971 the Patriots moved into a hastily and inexpensively constructed stadium in suburban Foxborough (also known as Foxboro), on land granted by the Bay State Raceway. The team was renamed the New England Patriots in March 1971, to reflect its new location roughly halfway between Providence and Boston as well as a desire to better position itself as New England's regional NFL team (this would influence the name of the New England Whalers hockey team when they began play in 1972, like the Patriots, labeling themselves a New England team).

About Foxboro: It helps a non-Bostonian to know that "Foxborough" is the official spelling of the town name, although the alternative spelling "Foxboro" is also frequently used. This alternative spelling is used by the United States Postal Service as the correct form by which to address mail to recipients in the town although both can be processed by their system. The sign on the post office reads "Foxboro.


The original choice for a name, Bay State Patriots, was rejected by the NFL. The stadium, that would be formally known as Schaefer Stadium, was built at a cost of about \$7.1 million in only 325 days. It was one of the first stadiums in the country to be named after a corporate sponsor, as the Schaefer Brewing Company paid \$150,000 for naming rights. Additionally, the town of Foxborough was one of the first in the country to assess a surtax on every ticket sold to help pay for the new stadium.

The Patriots naturally wanted a permanent place at which the team could play and "reside." Foxborough, MA was chosen as the site for this first stadium for the Patriots. As noted, having begun the building on September 23, 1970, this one-of-a-kind "rush job" was "ready" in just under a year so it could host the first 1971 NFL season home game.

There was no public funding used to construct the \$7.1 million stadium. The Stadium picked up a number of names over the years. Originally named Schaefer Stadium after the Schaefer Brewing Company in 1971, from 1983 until 1989, the stadium was rechristened Sullivan Stadium, after the family that owned the Patriots. Finally, it was renamed Foxboro Stadium in 1989 after the pseudonym for the town in which it was located.



Everything that is new looks new the first time it is used. The New England Patriots were pleased to play their first game at their sparking new stadium against the New York Giants on August 15, 1971. Over 60,000 fans filled the stadium. Foxboro Stadium consisted of one-tier grandstands that were located on both sides of the playing field. Seating areas also extended beyond the end zones. The main scoreboard was located above the seats in the south end zone. Foxboro Stadium was composed of mainly bleachers; but did have some regular seating areas.



When Robert Kraft bought the team in 1993. after twenty-two years of aging, he renovated Foxboro Stadium with \$10 million in improvements after 1993. In addition to being the home of the New England Patriots, Foxboro Stadium was also the home of the New **England** Revolution (MLS). Foxboro Stadium also hosted the 1994 World

Cup Soccer Championship. The last game at Foxboro Stadium before it was replaced with the modern Gillette Stadium was a snowcovered game vs. the Oakland Raiders on January 19, 2002. The stadium was demolished in the spring of 2002. The Patriots moved into Gillette Stadium the following year.

Gillette Stadium

The Town of Foxborough approved plans for the construction of the new home for the New England Patriots, on December 6, 1999.



The new home for the Patriots would be known as Gillette Stadium. Work began on the stadium three days into the Spring on March 24, 2000. It was to be and in fact is a magnificent structure that, when compared with Schaefer Stadium, would take substantially longer than one year to build. The new stadium cost \$350 million to build-just about \$343 million more than Schaefer Stadium.

The first official event at the new facility was a New England Revolution soccer game on May 11, 2002. The Rolling Stones came to town on September 5, 2002 and played at Gillette Stadium on the band's Licks Tour. Grand opening ceremonies were held four days later on September 9 when the Patriots unveiled their Super Bowl XXXVI championship banner before a Monday Night Football game against the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Having opened in 2002, as the replacement for the beat-up Foxboro Stadium, the seating capacity is 65,000 plus 5,876 club seats and 89 luxury suites. The stadium is owned and operated by Kraft Sports Group, a subsidiary of The Kraft Group, the company through which businessman Robert Kraft owns the Patriots and Revolution.

The new Stadium is located in Foxborough (Foxboro), Massachusetts, 28 miles (45 km) southwest of downtown Boston and 20 miles (32 km) northeast of downtown Providence. Rhode Island. It serves as the home stadium and administrative offices for both the NFL's New England Patriots football franchise and MLS's New England Revolution soccer team. In 2012, it also became the home stadium for the football program of the University of Massachusetts(UMass), while their on-campus Warren McGuirk Alumni Stadium was undergoing renovations. Gillette will continue to host higher attended home games for U-Mass.

The new Gillette Stadium was originally known as CMGI Field before the naming rights were bought by Gillette after the "dot-com" bust. Although Gillette has since been acquired by Procter & Gamble, the stadium retains the Gillette name both because P&G has continued to use the Gillette brand name and because the Gillette company was founded in the Boston area.

Gillette and the Patriots jointly announced in September 2010 that their partnership, which includes naming rights to the stadium, will extend through the 2031 season. That's a nice partnership.

You can get there from here. Gillette Stadium can be reached by rail via the Providence/Stoughton and Franklin lines at the Foxboro MBTA station, but only during Patriots games and some concerts. The Patriots are in the playoffs just about every year and they have been the reigning Super Bowl Champions for five recent years. Their popularity has resulted in the stadium being sold out for every football home game since moving to the stadium—preseason, regular season, and playoffs. This streak dates back to the 1994 season, while the team was still at Foxboro Stadium. By the end of the season 2017, this streak was 252 straight games.

Boston Patriots Early Team

The New England Patriots launched their first football team in 1960 under a different name than we know today. They were the Boston Patriots and they would keep that name until the 1971 season when they would get their own stadium and they would move 25 miles southwest to Foxboro to become the New England Patriots

Most fans understand the Patriots most recent history which includes ten great shots at the big prize --- the Super Bowl. The Patriots have been very successful in all games with the 1-2 combo of Bill Belichick and Tom Brady, putting whatever was necessary together to win five of those ten Super Bowl Outings. And, there is great news for the future beginning in the fall. After his well-deserved vacation with his significant other, Bill Belichick plans to

be back in 2018 to take New England to another Super Bowl and another set of those huge rings—making it six in all.

New England's debut in the biggest championship game came against the Chicago Bears in Super Bowl XX. The Patriots looked great all season, but Raymond Berry's Patriots were overwhelmed by Mike Ditka's Chicago Bears when game action began. From the opening kickoff at the Louisiana Superdome, led by quarterback Jim McMahon the Bears had their way that day with a 49-10 big victory.

The Patriots returned to the Super Bowl with Bill Parcells after eleven years for Super Bowl XXXI to face off against Green Bay on January 26, 1997, again at the Louisiana Superdome. It wound up being another big disappointment, but the team looked a lot better than in 1985.

In game action, Desmond Howard returned a kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown and Brett Favre passed for two touchdowns and ran for a score as the Packers won their first Super Bowl in twenty-nine years at the expense of the Patriots. Howard, en-route to garnering the MVP trophy, equaled a Super Bowl record with 244 total return yards.

The Patriots still had not won the big one with this heartbreaking 21 to 35 loss against Green Bay. Finally, after a short wait to Super Bowl XXXVI, the Patriots, with Tom Brady at the close controls and Bill Belichick coaching as he does so well from the sidelines, the New England Patriots broke into Super Bowl Pay dirt and took the gold with their 14th and best head coach ever.

The Patriots found the third time to be the charm. They had lost in their first two appearances, but they won big-time on February 2, 2002 against the stubborn St. Louis Rams, 20-17.

For the rest of the world and all the smart pundits checking on who the Patriots really were with their new second-year coach, this game left no more doubts. The Patriots would get no more disrespect—ever. The New England Patriots had become Champions of the whole world. It was a great game, and it made all the other Super Bowl Victories in the ongoing Belichick/Brady era easier to achieve.

In one of the most exciting Super Bowl finishes ever, in this 2002 encounter, the great Adam Vinatieri booted home a 48-yard field goal with no time left on the clock to give his team of no-name warriors a 20-17 Super Bowl win. This put the final touches on the most amazing season in New England sports history at that point in the Patriots' short life.

The New England Patriots would engage the best of the best in the NFL seven more times. With the mini-team of Tom Brady and Bill Belichick, they would win five more Super Bowls. And, according to Belichick and Brady, it ain't over yet!

Before the New England Patriots were the name of the team, there was already a team in New England playing football in the AFL. The AFL was formed in November 1959 with first games to be played in the fall 1960.

Coach Lou Saban is responsible for molding the players who showed up for the first camp into the Boston Patriots. In 1960 and 1961, Saban did his best to take the raw material and prove to everybody else but the team that the Patriots could win some games. Saban got five wins out of fourteen games in his first season with a bunch of AFL rookies. The NFL was not lending players to the AFL at that time.

In his second season, and the second season for the Boston Patriots, Lou Saban and Mike Holovak together stole nine games from his fellow AFL coaches and gave them back five losses and one tie in return. There was no guarantee at the time that any AFL franchise (they were all new) would be around for a second year. Lou Saban and Mike Holovak set the team up for great things to come with a spectacular two season record of 13-14-1. Actually, Holovak had seven of those wins after taking over for Saban in year two following a 2-3 Saban start.

The most critical time for a new team is in its first several seasons. The Patriots were very lucky they had the mastery of Lou Saban to guide them. By the way, there are reports that at his death Lou Saban's wife Joyce confessed that Nick and Lou Saban may have been second cousins. That explains a lot. Both are of Croation descent.

How did the AFL get its players?

It took the Patriots just two years to bring in an almost championship. We point this out in a book all about championships, super bowls, almost championships, and second places. The Pats came in 2nd place in just their 2nd season.

Just like the NFL, the AFL had to draft players for the eight teams that made up the league. Why would any player go with the AFL if they had a shot at the NFL? There are two answers to that question!

How the players would be divvied up in the AFL was just as much an issue as in the NFL. But, the NFL had already solved the how-to!

And so, it was quite legitimate before the league even began playing to conduct a draft to help stock the AFL teams with great players who could win ball-games. You may recall that when the College All Stars played the NFL champs for years during this same time period, sometimes the College All Stars actually beat the pros. They were younger and faster and just as strong. The AFL with money and marketing were a sure thing. And so, the first AFL draft came before the AFL played game # 1.

The 1960 American Football League (AFL) draft was held on November 22–23, 1959, in Minneapolis, shortly after the organization of the AFL league. The fact that there was a league meant the money and the marketing were in place. The first AFL draft lasted 33 rounds, enough to fill a team. To make sure it was enough, an additional draft of 20 rounds was held by the AFL on December 2. Considering all of the senior football players graduating from so many colleges, there would be no shortage of qualified players to be picked.

Let's take a look now at the team selected by Boston Patriots coaches did under coach Lou Saban in their first year as a united squad.

1960 Lou Saban, Coach #1

The 1960 Boston Patriots football record was 5-9-0, winning five games, losing nine, and tying none. They failed to qualify for the playoffs for the first time

Many US cities had taken a shot at pro football before 1960. Some did not make it. Buffalo, NY was one of those that had been there and done that and now were ready to do it again. They were fully excited about the AFL and a chance to have a pro-team in Buffalo again.

Ironically, this was not the first AFL and so some cities such a Buffalo had once had pro football teams in the NFL, the old AFL, as well as the All-America Football Conference. The city was excited when the Bills were part of the new AFL in 1960. Such was also the case in Buffalo when team founder Ralph Wilson, Jr. watched more than 100,000 fans gather at a rally the night before the preseason opener. The following evening 16,474 curious fans arrived at the newly renovated and renamed War Memorial Stadium.

Though it was just a pre-season game, and would not counted, it counted for Buffalo and it counted for Boston as the two teams clashed. The Patriots overcame the Bills' home field advantage and the extremely hot temperatures. The Pats defeated Buffalo 28-7. The teams featured a bunch of no-name players who played their hearts out. The star for the evening was Patriots quarterback Butch Songin who tossed two touchdowns to lead the Pats to victory. Head Coach Lou Saban was so ecstatic that it is reported that he shook hands with every member of the Patriot team and asked them to sign an official AFL ball. Ask yourself: Did this game count? You bet it did.

And so, began the long journey of the very successful America Football League that would eventually and forever change the landscape of professional football.

The AFL was as wild as the old west when it began. They were looking to survive and to eventually be wildly successful. Many of the players could not survive on their AFL salaries and so they

tended bar and served other tasks when they got a break from practice and playing. Eventually, it would all come together and like the NFL, a lot of fortunes were made.

1961 Lou Saban, Coach #1 1961 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1961 Boston Patriots football team finished with a fine record of 9-4-1 for the whole season. We include both the Saban games and the Holovak games because the team had upped the ante and brought forth a fine 9-4-1 winning season.

Vito "Babe" Parilli was one of the early best




Vito "Babe" Parilli played quarterback for the Patriots from 1961-67 and threw for more than 20,000 yards during his career. Parilli was voted to three American Football League All-Star teams and was named the AFL Comeback Player of the Year in 1966 when he threw for 3,441 yards and 31 touchdowns.

In addition to his skills as a quarterback, Parilli became known as an excellent kick holder and earned the

nickname "Gold Finger." The combination of holder/quarterback Parilli and kicker/wide receiver Gino Cappelletti came to be known as the "Grand Opera." In 1993, Parilli was inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame. In 1982, Parilli was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame for his collegiate career under Bear Bryant at the University of Kentucky. The Kentucky native lives his in home state. Inducted 1993.

Houston Antwine, DT another early Pats' great



Houston Antwine was unmatched as a sack man for the Boston Patriots. He played all of 11 seasons for the Patriots, appearing in 142 games from 1961-1971. He was the sack leader for the Patriots in three consecutive seasons from 1967-69. His 39 career sacks are tied for 10th (with Richard Seymour) on the Patriots all-time career sacks list.

Antwine was well respected, earning six consecutive American Football League (AFL) All-Star selections from 1963-68. His six all-star appearances are tied

for the fourth highest total in franchise history.

He came to the Patriots via a trade from the Houston Oilers in exchange for a fourth-round pick in the 1962 AFL Draft on April 1, 1961. He is one of the good guys, a member of the Patriots 50th Anniversary Team and a member of the 1960s All-Decade Team.

Now that we have whet your appetite with two seasons of Boston Patriots football, before we come back to the rest of the seasons, let's talk about the origins of football and how the NFL/AFL came to be.

Chapter 4 The Evolution of Modern **Football**



Lots of playing before playing became official

The official agreed upon date for the first American-style football game is November 6, 1869. It would be ninety-one years after this that the Boston Patriots would win their first game ever in the AFL against the New York Titans. It would be more than one hundred thirty-three years after the game in 1869 for the New England Patriots to beat the St. Louis Rams for their first Super Bowl win.

From the first game to the first NFL season in 1920, American football kept changing for the better. If you can find a replay of a game from the early era someplace in the heavens, you would find its replay would not look much like football as we know it. But, it was not completely soccer or rugby either.

Before the first "football" game, teams were playing a rugby style "fuszball" similar to that played in Britain in the mid-19th century. At the time in the US, a derivative known as association football was also played. In both games, a football is kicked at a goal or run over a line. These styles were based on the varieties of English public-school football games. Over time, as noted, the style of "football" play in America continued to evolve.

On November 6, 1869, the first intercollegiate formal football game in America featured Rutgers and Princeton. Before the teams were even on the field it was being plugged as the first college (intercollegiate) football game of all time. Most of the popular NFL teams of today were being formed after the turn of the century.

The first game of intercollegiate football was a sporting battle between two neighboring schools on a plot of ground where the present-day Rutgers gymnasium now stands in New Brunswick, N.J. Rutgers won that first game, 6-4. Even the scoring was different back then.

There were two teams of 25 men each and the rules were mostly rugby-like, but different enough to make it very interesting and enjoyable.

Like today's football, there were many surprises; strategies needed to be employed; determination exhibited, and of course the players required physical prowess.

NFL growth: One thing right after another

Americans, and in fact the whole world sports community, know that the National Football League today is a multi-billion-dollar enterprise. Its origins as the American Professional Football Association were much humbler than today's millionaire players and billionaire players and luxury-box stadiums with capacities of over 100,000 fans.

Pro-football lovers look back at the league's inaugural 1920 campaign, which we know featured its birth in an Ohio auto dealership. They see strange teams such as Decatur and Muncie and the crowning of a champion that was not immediate as today in the middle of the Super Bowl Field. Instead, it took four months after the last snap was taken to get it right—back in 1921.

As promising as the pro-football scenario was in 1920, even though things looked good for the future of the pro sport, just like today, College Football dominated. Pro football remained completely overshadowed by the college game. This was tough for team owners, as we discussed. Most were in it for the profits and there were few to none.

The owners were almost literally bleeding cash because of soaring player salaries and intense bidding wars as they poached players from other squads. The owners of these independent pro teams desired a strong league using the baseball model which had worked for so long. They wanted to gain more control over the sport—and their finances. A fully functional NFL was right around the corner and it would eventually provide this stability.



As we learn in exploring the early days of American football, everything was changing to comply with Camp's rules and others—even the field size. Yes, even the field size in early American football was changing regularly but by 1920, the size had stabilized. The gridiron dimensions were the same in 1920 as today. However, the game of professional football was much different. Back then, there were no Johnny Unitas's, Charley Conerly's, Norm Van Brocklin's, Bart Starr's, Joe Namath's, Tom Brady's. Carson Wentz's, or Nick Foles's.

The Quarterback slot on the offense was often a running position. Forward passes were rare. Even things we take for granted today

were prohibited. Can you imagine that coaching from the sidelines was not permitted?



When the pass was legalized in 1906, it still was not like today. It was not readily accepted by "real teams." Established coaches in the elite Eastern schools like Army, Harvard, Pennsylvania and Yale did not embrace the pass. It was also a gamble. You had to be pretty darn good to not lose more than the potential gain.

Here are some of the stipulations. Passes could not be thrown over the line on five yards to either side of the center. An incomplete pass resulted in a 15-yard penalty, and a pass that dropped without being touched meant possession went to the defensive team. According to Kent Stephens, a historian with the College Hall of Fame in South Bend, "Because of these rules and the fact coaches at that time thought the forward pass was a sissified type of play that wasn't really football, they were hesitant to adopt this new strategy."

Each athlete played on both offense and defense. The late great Chuck Bednarik was the last consistent two-way player in the NFL, Bednarik played center and linebacker for a franchise-record 14 seasons with the Patriots from 1949 to 1962. In 1920, just about

every player competed on both offense and defense. Money was so tight that the great coach of the Bears, George Halas carried equipment, wrote press releases, sold tickets, taped ankles, played and coached for the Decatur club. Having two platoons would cost twice as much.

Today the league has a standard 16-game schedule, all nice and tidy and made up by the NFL itself. Back then, in 1920, the teams scheduled their own opponents and could play nonleague and even college squads if they chose and it all counted toward their records.

There simply were no established guidelines. Everything was ad hoc—the number of games played, and the quality of opponents scheduled. The league did not even maintain official standings in its fledgling years.

By 1925, it looked like the NFL was going to make it. Late in the season, it pulled off its greatest coup in gaining national attention. The University of Illinois season ended in November, and that made All-America halfback Harold (Red) Grange eligible conflict-free to do as he wanted with his life.

Grange signed a contract to play with the Chicago Bears. On Thanksgiving Day, a crowd of 36,000, which was the largest in pro football history at the time watched Grange and the Bears play the Chicago Cardinals to a scoreless tie at Wrigley Field. At the beginning of December, the Bears hit the jackpot when they went out on the road playing all around the country in 12 days.

They actually played eight games in 12 days, in St. Louis, Philadelphia, New York City, Washington, Boston, Pittsburgh, Detroit, and Chicago. A crowd of 73,000 watched the game against the Giants at the Polo Grounds.

This helped assure the future success of the troubled NFL franchise in New York. The Bears then played nine more games in the South and West, including a game in Los Angeles, in which 75,000 fans watched them defeat the Los Angeles Tigers in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Owners, players, and coaches were ready to do anything to make sure the new league was a success.

In 1930, the league had changed its whole complexion, literally. Dayton was one of the NFL's original franchises. In 1930, it became the last of the NFL's original franchises when it was purchased by William B. Dwyer and John C. Depler, and the whole team was moved to Brooklyn, and renamed the Dodgers. They were a football team, nonetheless even with the Dodgers name. The Portsmouth, Ohio Spartans also entered the league at the same time. Things were changing rapidly

Other things were happening such as the Packers edged the Giants for the title, but the most improved team was the Bears. George Halas retired as a player and replaced himself as coach of the Bears with Ralph Jones. Jones refined the T-formation by introducing wide ends and a halfback in motion. He also brought in rookie All-America fullback-tackle, the great Bronko Nagurski.

Anybody would still play anybody. The Giants whooped a team of former Notre Dame players coached by Knute Rockne 22-0 in a successful match before 55,000 at the Polo Grounds on December 14. This was a charity game as the proceeds went to the New York Unemployment Fund to help those suffering because of the Great Depression. The easy victory helped the NFL's credibility with the press and the public. Everybody likes an act of kindness.

The NFL was so successful, it spawned the AFL

The American Football League (AFL) was formed as a major professional American football league in 1960 and it was very successful. It was a lot of fun watching all the new teams in action. The teams included the Dallas Cowboys, Houston Oilers, New York Jets, Kansas City Chiefs, Boston Patriots, and even John Madden's Oakland Raiders. It operated for ten seasons from 1960 until 1969, when it merged with the older National Football League (NFL), that had been established in the 1920-1922 period.

The first AFL-NFL World Championship Game in professional American football was dubbed retroactively as Super Bowl I. it had been referred to in some contemporaneous reports, including the game's radio broadcast, as the Super Bowl. The name stuck. It was played after the 1966 season on January 15 at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. In this game, NFL Green Bay Packers defeated the AFL champion Kansas City Chiefs by the score of 35–10.

John Madden is still a people's favorite at 84 years of age. He was hired by Al Davis when the AFL was in its prime as the linebackers' coach for the AFL's Oakland Raiders. This was in 1967 and the league would last only two more seasons. He helped the team reach Super Bowl II that season. A year later, after Raiders head coach John Rauchleft, John Madden stepped in to become the Raiders' head coach. This made Madden professional football's youngest head coach at the age of 32.

Former Raiders coach Dennis Allen in interviews noted that John Madden was arguably the best Oakland Raiders coach in the history of the team. His Raiders reached but lost five AFC Title games in seven years. This left the Raiders with the same image that the Dallas Cowboys had previously had—as a team unable to "win the big one."

Despite a 12–1–1 mark in 1969, for example the team lost 17–7 to the Kansas City Chiefs in the final American Football League championship game. The next year, the Raiders would be in the AFC Division of the NFL as the AFL lost its identity.

Was the AFL Any Good? See Super Bowl III

Super Bowl III was the third AFL-NFL Championship Game in professional American football, and the first to officially bear the name "Super Bowl". It was not AFC v NFC. It was the last interleague Super Bowl and the AFL did not win either of the first two games.

This game was played on January 12, 1969, at the Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida. Everybody over five years old at the time remembers Broadway Joe Namath, cocky as can be, making a prediction that the AFL's Jets would win the game.

This game is still regarded as one of the greatest upsets in American sports history. The heavy underdog American Football League (AFL) champion New York Jets, led by former Alabama QB Joe Namath defeated the National Football League (NFL) champion Baltimore Colts by a score of 16–7. I was a senior in College at the time. What a great football game. I watched it from pre-game through post-game.

This was the first Super Bowl victory for the AFL. Though the AFL had been in existence ten years, before the start of this game, most sports writers and fans had written off the AFL teams as being less talented than every one of the NFL clubs. There were few who expected anything less than the Colts to whoop the Jets by a wide margin.

Baltimore had posted a 13–1 record during the 1968 NFL season before defeating the Cleveland Browns, 34–0, in the 1968 NFL Championship Game. The Jets finished the 1968 AFL season at 11–3, and defeated John Madden's great Oakland Raiders, 27–23, in the 1968 AFL Championship Game. Darryl Lamonica had a poor game and Kenny, the Snake, Stabler, who took Oakland to Super XI had just joined the Raiders.

After beating the Raiders and despite the hype saying the Jets did not have a shot, Joe Namath was undaunted. This unafraid Jets quarterback made an appearance three-days before the Super Bowl at the Miami Touchdown Club and brashly guaranteed a victory. The Jets could not have been more pleased with the prediction and they backed up Broadway Joe's words by controlling most of the game. They built a 16–0 lead by the fourth quarter off of a touchdown run by Matt Snell and three field goals by Jim Turner.

Colts quarterback Earl Morrall threw three interceptions before being replaced by the great Johnny Unitas, who then led Baltimore to its only touchdown during the last few minutes of the game.

With the victory, the Jets remain the only winning Super Bowl team to only score one touchdown (either offensive, defensive, or special teams). Namath, who completed 17 out of 28 passes for 206 yards, was named as the Super Bowl's Most Valuable Player, despite not

throwing a touchdown pass in the game or any passes at all in the fourth quarter. The recap of the game is not as exciting as its reality.

And that, my friends, is how the NFL got to where it is today.

1961 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1961 Boston Patriots football team competed in their second season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They were led by Lou Saban in his last of two years as head coach. Lou Saban began the 1961 season with a 2-3 record and was fired after the fifth game of the season. He was replaced by Mike Holovak who came in with 7-1-1, helping the Patriots finish with a fine record of 9-4-1 for the whole season. We include both the Saban games and the Holovak games in Chapter 3 covering the launch of the Patriots in the AFL in the 1960 and 1961 seasons.

Though the Patriots wee not winning championships per se, they were coming awful close such as a 2nd place finish in 1962, You can see the winning seasons in the summary at the beginning of this chapter. With a 7-6 record in 1963, coach Mike Holovak brought the Pats to a 1st place East Division Finish. He won the Division playoff championship against the Bills but lost the 1963 AFL chamionship against the chargers in a rout 10-51.1 In 1964 and 1966 with 10-3-1 and 8-4-2 records respectively, Holovak brought in two almost championships with fine records and second-place finishes. fJ

1962 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

Mike Holovak was not a long-anticipated acquisition of Boston. He came in the middle of the prior season and without the benefit that most coaches get, he turned the Patriots team around on a dime by leading the Patriots on a 7-1-1 rampage in which no opposing team was safe. Holovak had a lot of great seasons with the AFL Boston Patriots and eventually he retired and took a cushy job in the front office. By the time he was done, Boston was almost New England. He was a great competitor.

He still stands as the Patriots' second winningest coach, Holovak led the Boston Patriots to the AFL League title game after the 1963 season. The team burped in the championship game in a loss to San Diego, 51-10. Mr. Holovak later became vice president of player personnel and general manager of the Houston Oilers and he stayed on when they moved to Tennessee and became the Titans.

Holovak had a 53-47-9 record as Patriots coach, including playoffs.

Only Bill Belichick had more wins, 105 at the time of Holovak's obituary.

When the Boston Patriots became part of the new AFL in 1960, Holovak was their first director of player personnel and served as offensive backfield coach. They were 5-9 that season under Lou Saban and the team missed the playoffs.

After they started the 1961 season at 2-3, Holovak was asked to replace Saban and led them to a 7-1-1 record the rest of the campaign, finishing with a 41-0 smash-mouth win at San Diego and a four-game winning streak.

In 2008, The New England Patriots reached the Super Bowl by beating the Chargers 21-12 in the AFC championship game. On Sunday, about 15,000 fans attended a departure rally for Coach Holovak at Gillette Stadium at which Kraft and several players spoke.

Another fine Boston Patriot —Gino Cappelletti

They say that Gino Calleppetti is the "original Patriot" because for many years he has been the most recognized figure in franchise history. A versatile player, Cappelletti played wide receiver and kicker for the Boston Patriots from the first season in 1960 through 1970.

Because he was talented at both the receiver position and the kicker position he was the Patriots all-time leading scorer until 2005 when he was surpassed by Adam Vinatieri, who kicked lots of field goals for New England.



When he as with the American Football League (his whole career), Cappelletti led the AFL in scoring five times and he holds two of the top five scoring seasons in league history – 147 points in 1961 and 155 points in 1964, a season in which he was also named the

AFL's Most Valuable Player.

Cappelletti was voted an AFL All-Star five times and still holds the Patriots records for career field goals made. He also remains among the top 10 receivers in Patriots history. After his playing career ended, Cappelletti moved into the broadcast booth with his longtime partner Gil Santos. For the better part of the past quarter century, Santos and Cappelletti have been the voices of the Patriots for millions of New England football fans. In 1992, Cappelletti was inducted in the Patriots Hall of Fame. The Minnesota native makes his home in Massachusetts. Inducted 1992.

To date, Cappelletti is the Patriots' third all-time leading receiver with 292 catches for 4,589 yards, and for years had the most field goal attempts (334) in team history. Stephen Gostkowski has 388.

During Cappelletti's pro career, he did more than kick field goals and receive passes. He also returned punts and kickoffs, played defensive back and even had one pass completion for a touchdown. How about that.

He was just the second AFL player to record three interceptions (of Tom Flores) in a regular-season game. He also holds the professional football record for most touchdowns in Saturday games (10). He scored 18 points or more in a game ten times and scored 20

or more points in a game eight times. He was quite a player on a team that was not known at the time for greatness.

He set the AFL single-game record by scoring 28 points in the Patriots' 42–14 rout of Houston on December 18, 1965. Cappelletti is the only player in professional football history to run for a two-point conversion, throw for a two-point conversion, catch a pass, intercept a pass, return a punt and return a kickoff in the same season.

He kicked six field goals (without a miss) in a 39–10 win at Denver on October 4, 1964 and became one of only two AFL kickers with at least four field goals per game for three consecutive games.

Cappelletti kicked the longest field goal in the AFL in consecutive seasons and led the AFL in field-goal percentage in 1965. In 1984, Cappelletti was inducted into the National Italian American Sports Hall of Fame. However, he has not been selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. In 2003, he was named to the Professional Football Researchers Association Hall of Very Good in the association's inaugural HOVG class.

About the 1962 Season

The 1962 Boston Patriots football team competed in their third season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They were led by Mike Holovak in his second of eight years as head coach. The team had a fine record of 9-4-1 and finished in second place in the AFL Eastern Division but did not make the playoffs. Today, for sure, that record would have brought a Wild Card Berth.

In the home and season opener on Sat Sep 9, at Nickerson Field on the campus of Boston University, the New York Titans edged out the New England Patriots L (20-21). This was three opening day losses in a row. Looking for a good season starter in 1963.

In the Season opener on Saturday, Sept 18 at Kansas City, The Patriots were defeated by the Chiefs L (28-42) before 32,000. On

Sunday, Sept-18, the Patriots got the best of the Tennessee Titans at home, W (34–21) before 32,276. Rolling up the steam, the Patriots put a whooping on the Denver Broncos on September-18 at home W (41–16) before 21,038. At New York, the Patriots guns were not missing on Sat October-18 with a blowout victory over the Jets W (43–14) before 14,412. Then, on Fri Oct 18 at home, the Patriots took it on the chin from Kansas City as the chiefs dominated L(7-27) before 23,874.

At home on Friday, Oct-18 the Patriots out gunned the San Diego Chargers W (24–20) before 20,888. Again at home on Fri Oct-19, the Patriots bested the Oakland Raiders W (26–16) before 12,514. Then, on Sat Nov 18 at Buffalo, the Bills tied the Boston Patriots T (28–28) before 33,247. At Denver on Sun Nov-18, the Pats again prevailed W (33–29) before 28,187. The Tennessee Titans (Houston Oilers) stopped the Patriots roll on Nov 18, L (17-21) before 35,250

On Fri Nov-23 the Patriots beat the Buffalo Bills W (21–10) before 20,021. Then on Fri November-30, the Patriots defeated the New York Titans W (24–17) before 20,015. At San Diego on Sun December-9, the Patriots beat the Chargers W (20–14) before 19,887. At Oakland on Sun December-16, the Patriots could not squeeze out the season finale and lost to the Raiders L (0-20) before just 8,000 fans

Nick Buoniconti was a great LB

Nick Buoniconti was a stalwart playing linebacker for the Boston Patriots from 1962-68. He was voted an American Football League All-Star five times, including 1966 when he was the top vote getter.

A native of Springfield, Mass., he took night classes during the season at Suffolk University to receive his law degree in 1968.



In 1970, Buoniconti was named to the All-AFL Team commemorating the best players in that league's history. Hall of Fame quarterback Len Dawson said of Buoniconti, "If you are lucky enough to knock him down, you have to lay on him or he'll get right back into the play."

In 1992, Buoniconti was inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame and in 2001, he was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Bouniconti was traded by the Patriots in 1969 to the Miami Dolphins where he

excelled as part of Miami's 1972 undefeated championship team. He still resides in South Florida. Inducted 1992.

1963 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1963 Boston Patriots football team competed in their fourth season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They were led by Mike Holovak in his third of eight years as head coach. The Patriots had a winning record again, 7-6-1 and they made the playoffs. They beat the Buffalo Bills W (26-8) in the Divisional Playoffs and they lost the AFL Championship (AFL equivalent of the Super Bowl) at the Chargers L (8-26).

After having played their first three seasons at Nickerson Field on

1963 Divisional Playoff Game

On Dec. 28, 1963, at Buffalo, the AFL divisional playoff game was contested. The Boston Patriots prevailed over Buffalo's Bills by a score of 26 to 8. On a slippery field at War Memorial Stadium in Buffalo with an inch of snow, visiting Boston led 16–0 at halftime and won 26–8. The defense stole the show as the Patriots dominated the Bills in front of a War Memorial Stadium crowd of 33,044. Boston allowed only 7 yards rushing while forcing three fumbles and making four interceptions. Quarterback Babe Parilli was "on" that day connecting with fullback Larry Garron on two touchdown passes . Gino Cappelletti kicked four field goals.

1963 AFL Championship Game

This game was like today's Super Bowl. On January 5, 1964, at San Diego, in the American Football League (AFL) Championship game, San Diego walloped the Boston Patriots 51-10 to win the AFL Championship. It was just one week after stuffing the Bills, no matter what they tried, the Patriots could not stop the Chargers' ground attack. San Diego's Keith Lincoln amassed 206 yards on 13 carries (15.8-yard average) and the Chargers put up 610 total yards. It was not pretty.

Isan Diego was idle during the week of Eastern Division playoff, and, so they were well-rested. They were just a touchdown favorite at home to win the AFL title, but they overwhelmed the Patriots. As noted, it was fullback Keith Lincoln who performed tremendously and led the Chargers to the 51–10 rout of Boston.

Named the game's outstanding player, Lincoln could do no wrong. He rushed for 206 yards on 13 carries, led the team with 123 yards in receiving, and completed a pass for 20 yards.

The league was still very new, and the game was not a sellout. The e attendance was 30,127, several thousand under Balboa Stadium's capacity.

The Chargers' championship win on this day is still noted for being the only major sports title for the city of San Diego, the longest for a major American city. The Chargers played in San Diego through 2016, then returned to Los Angeles in 2017. The Patriots' first league championship came in the 2001 season in Super Bowl XXXVI and as we all know, the Patriots are not strangers to the NFL's top games in recent years.

1964 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1964 Boston Patriots football team competed in their fifth season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They were led by Mike Holovak in his fourth of eight years as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a better record this year 10-3-1 with three additional victories. They made the playoffs but finished second in the AFL's Eastern Division.

They beat the Buffalo Bills W (26-8) in the Divisional Playoffs and they lost the AFL Championship (AFL equivalent of the Super Bowl) at the Chargers L (8-26).

In season opener Sunday Sept. 13 at Oakland, the Patriots beat the Raiders W (17-14) in a close match at Frank Youell Field before

21,126. The following week, Sept 20, at San Diego, the Patriots got by the Chargers W (33-28) at Balboa Stadium before 20,568. On Sept 27, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (26–10) at Alumni Stadium before 22,716. On Sunday, Oct 4, at Denver's Mile High Stadium, the Patriots remained unbeaten at 4-0-0 by trouncing the Broncos W (39–10) before 15,485.

After this, the Patriots got their first blemish as they played the first of three Friday games in a row on Oct 9 at home against the San Diego Chargers L (17–26) at Fenway Park before 35,096. On Friday, Oct 16, they tied the Oakland Raiders T (43–43) at Fenway Park before 23,279. Then on Fri Oct 23, the Patriots beat the Kansas City Chiefs W(24–7) at Fenway Park before 27,400. At New York On Oct 31, Boston was whipped by the Jets e L (14-35) at Shea Stadium before 45,003. At Fenway Park on Nov 6, , the Patriots squeaked by with a pine point margin over the Houston Oilers W (25–24) before 28,161. Next at Buffalo, the Patriots beat the Bills on Nov 15 W (36–28) at War Memorial Stadium before 42,308

On Nov 20, Boston neat Denver W (12–7) at Fenway Park before 24,979. On Nov 29, at Houston, the Patriots defeated the Oilers W (34-17) at Jeppesen Stadium before 17,560. At Kansas City on Dec 6, the Patriots beat the Chiefs W (31–24) at Municipal Stadium before 13,166. In the final game of the season, on Dec 20, the Buffalo Bills defeated the Boston Patriots L (14–24) at a full house at Fenway Park before 38,021.

1965 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1965 Boston Patriots football team competed in their fifth season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They were led by Mike Holovak in his fifth of eight years as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a losing record this year 4-8-2 with six less victories. They missed the playoffs, finishing third in the AFL's Eastern Division.

Merger of AFL & NFL

As much as fans loved all the football that they got with two leagues, it created some havoc for the NFL. They chose to end the issues by agreeing to a merger with the AFL in 1966. The merger among other things assured the long-term viability of the prior AFL teams. They would survive and thrive in the merged NFL.

On June 8, 1966, the two rivals—the National Football League (NFL) and the American Football League (AFL)—jointly announced that they would merge. The first "Super Bowl" between the two leagues took place at the end of the 1966 season. The Boston Patriots were in a slump at the time and during the transition, they were not Super Bowl contenders.

It took until the 1970 season for the leagues to unite their operations and integrate their regular season schedules. Meanwhile for fans it was just like the AFL still existed. But eventually, the wild days of the AFL would go away as the NFL culture dominated.

1966 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1966 Boston Patriots football team competed in their fifth season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They played most of their games in Fenway Park except when competing with the Red Sox for a ballpark. They were led by Mike Holovak in his sixth of eight years as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a great record again this year of 8-4-2 with four more victories. They missed the playoffs, however so ther was no championship but they finished second in the AFL's Eastern Division. It was another great season, but it would be Mike Holovak's last in the winner's circle as the team as you will see went down the big slide in 1967 and 1968.

Even after Holovak left, and he did at the end of 1968, things would not get better immediately for Boston. I sure wish I could bring somebody else in to tell the fine New England Patriots' but since I can't I will do the (What's the opposite of honors?). This season is one to be enjoyed in the writing and in the reading as it would be the

last winning season the Patriots posted as an AFL team. The Patriots would not have another such season until 1976, by which time the team was in the NFL as the New England Patriots. Enjoy this season summary. I know I will.

As we display the season summaries, because it is in some ways non-essential information to the games themselves, we will not always show the attendance but will again at times. Note that the attendance continues to go up as the interest in pro-football and AFL football in particular kept mounting through the 1960's until the NFL took a big notice and made an offer to the AFL that it could not refuse.

After the first game, the season opener on Saturday, Sept 10 at San Diego, in which the Chargers shut out the Patriots L (0-24) at Balboa Stadium before 29,539, Patriot fans were not at all pleased with the season prognosis. After a 4-8-2 season the year before, the fans were looking for more than miserable.

The Patriots proved they could win in the second game at Denver, beating the Broncos W (24–10) at Mile High Stadium before 25,337, At home in game 3, on Sept 25, the Patriots were soundly beaten by the Kansas City Chiefs L (24–43) at Fenway Park before 22,641. On Oct 2, the Patriots tied the NY Jets T (24–24) at Fenway Park. At Buffalo on Oct 8, the Patriots doubled the Bills score in winning the game W (20-10) at War Memorial Stadium bringing the 1966 record to 2–2. The Buffalo game was seen by 45,542 fans. After the Bye week, the Patriots came back ready to take no prisoners.

On Oct 23at home, the Patriots beat the San Diego Chargers W (35– 17) at Fenway Park before 32,371. At home again, on Oct 30, the Patriots got by the Oakland Raiders W (24-21) at Fenway Park. Again, at home on Nov 6, the Denver Broncos beat the Patriots L (10–17) before 18,154. On Nov 13, at Fenway Park, the Patriots beat the Houston Oilers W (27–21) in a close match.

At Kansas City, the Chiefs tied the Patriots T (27-27) in Municipal Stadium bringing their very positive record to 5-3-2. Before 41,475 fans. Then, against the Miami Dolphins for the first time ever on Nov 27 in a game played at the Miami Orange Bowl, the Patriots took the prize, W (20-14) before 22,754. On Dec 4, at Fenway, the Patriots squeaked by W (14-3) before 39,350. At Houston on Dec

11, the Patriots defeated the Oilers big-time W (38-14) in Rice Stadium before 17,100. Ending the season, the Patriots were looking for a win but got nothing more than a respectable showing on Dec 17, against the New York Jets L (28–38) at Shea Stadium before 58,921. And, so the Patriots finished well at 8-4-2. Now, let's move on to the dark years.

1967 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1967 Boston Patriots football team had a losing record this year of 3-10-1. They missed the playoffs, and they finished fifth in the AFL's Eastern Division. The season this year was still fourteen games but there were two byes scattered about the games.


1968 Mike Holovak, Coach #2

The 1968 Boston Patriots football team competed in their ninth season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. They played most of their games in Fenway Park except when competing with the Red Sox for a ballpark. This would be the last year for Fenway Park. The following year, the Patriots would play at Boston College's Alumni Stadium. They were led by Mike Holovak in his eighth and last year as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a losing record this year of 4-10, just a hair better than the 3-10-1 season of 1967. They missed the playoffs, and they finished fourth in the AFL's Eastern Division. Mike Holovak was finished as the head coach after this year.

Clive Rush & John Mazur, Boston Coaches

Before arriving in Boston, Clive Rush put in six good seasons (1963-1968) as the New York Jets offensive coordinator. He meticulously constructed what would become the AFL's first Super Bowl-winning offense. After experiencing such championship successes, Rush became a hot commodity as a potential head coach, and he was not about to stay an assistant coach with all the calls he was getting.

Eventually, he answered the phone and it was the Boston Patriots. After a few conversations, they offered Rush a contract that he could not refuse, and he was named as head coach of the Boston Patriots for the 1969 season. Despite the hype, the Pats did not improve their record. And finished with a 4-10 record again in 1969. This was not what was expected as there was no spark or so there seemed that could take the offense, having finished eighth of the 10 AFL teams in scoring.

Rush was a man of action and he moved quickly as Patriots head coach, trading away stars Leroy Mitchell and Nick Buoniconti almost immediately. There was no magic wand and it led to his early release in 1970. In favor of John Mazur.

Clive Rush's tenure in Boston was shorter than expected. With the 4-10 repeat performance, nobody was looking to keep Rush any longer than need be. The Pats bought his contract seven games into the 1970s season when he was sidelined by health issues. He was replaced by Coach John Mazur

When Mazur took over for Rush, he became the historical last coach of the Boston Patriots and then the following year, he would become the first head coach of the New England Patriots

He coached pro football for 19 years with the Bills, Patriots, Eagles, and Jets, and he received two AFL championship rings from his days as Buffalo's offensive coordinator. He's a tough Marine -- there are no ex-Marines. Mazur once ordered star running back Duane Thomas, participating in his first workout with the Patriots after being acquired from the Dallas Cowboys, off the team. He had the guts and the courage of his convictions. Mazur said Thomas reported to training camp in Amherst and brought attitude with him. That was that.

Mazur was once a quarterback on the Notre Dame team that won the national championship in 1949. In 1951, he was an honorable mention All-American. He coached at Tulane, Marquette, and Boston University before joining the Bills in 1962. There he successfully instituted the two-man quarterback system with Daryle Lamonica and Jack Kemp and enjoyed postseason success. Mazur wears one of the championship rings; the other he gave to his son. He will never sell it, he said.

He joined the Patriots in 1969 as offensive coordinator. In 1970 he was named interim coach when Clive Rush was fired in midseason and finished 1-6. In 1971, he was given a one-year contract before Upton Bell was named general manager. He lost 25 pounds worrying about drafting quarterback Jim Plunkett. He slept in his office at Schaefer Stadium and compiled a 6-8 record, the team's best record in five years.

At the end of the 1971 season, GM Bell, who wanted to hire his own coach, made a deal with the Patriots board of directors and owner Billy Sullivan. If Mazur lost the last game to the reigning Super Bowl champion Colts, Mazur would be fired.

However, wide receiver Randy Vataha caught an 88-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to give the Patriots a stunning 21-17 upset. News accounts said Bell looked like he was rooting against his own team.

"That's true, I heard that same story," Mazur said. "That made me feel like I wanted to punch him in the mouth, but I couldn't do it. That would've ruined me, which would have given him satisfaction, too. I didn't want to give him any." He was offered a one-year contract. His instincts told him not to take it. His wife told him that all the other coaches would get fired and they had families, too. "I led with my heart," he said.

By mid-1972, after six straight losses, Mazur resigned, his head coaching record just 9-21. Not everything happens the way it is supposed to.

Mazur liked New England even though as he said, they did not have the greatest of talent at the time, but they had a lot of great guys who gave the team their hearts.

Mazur, who today is struggling on a skimpy pension and is riddled with Parkinson's disease, is a big Bill Belichick fan. He thinks the head coach is doing a hell of a job. And he knows Belichick is a good guy, too. He knew his old man when he was coaching at the Naval Academy."

Mazur says that a lot of guys are suffering like him with small pensions from the NFL He said his is \$1,500 per month pension had not increased in more than a quarter century. He would not mind if somebody called his attention to owner today's owner, Bob Kraft. Mazur does not want to appear like a beggar, but things are tough. He is quoted as saying this about Kraft: "I understand he's a pretty nice fellow. Maybe guys like that can get together and say, 'Let this guy take his trip to Boston." Maybe he doesn't know about my situation." Mazur is a positive guy.

1969 Clive Rush, Coach #3

The 1969 Boston Patriots football team competed in their tenth and last season of Professional American Football League (AFL) football. In 1970, the NFL / AFL merger would be complete, so this was the last year of the Patriots playing in the AFL. However, the Boston Patriots team would live-on for one more season.

The Boston Patriots this year played their games in Boston College's Alumni Stadium. This would be a one year's engagement as the following year, games would be played at Harvard Stadium. The Patriots were led by Clive Rush his first of two years as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a losing record this year of 4-10, exactly the same as the prior year. They missed the playoffs, and they tied for third place in the AFL's Eastern Division.

The Merged NFL / AFL AKA, the NFL

There was a lot of disagreement in taking the sixteen NFL teams at the time of the merger and seamlessly folding in the new AFL teams. The final format agreed on included two conferences, the NFC and the AFC, and six divisions with each conference having an East, Central, and a West. The final configuration for 1970 looked like this:

- NFC East: Dallas, New York (Giants), Philadelphia, St. Louis, Washington
- NFC Central: Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Minnesota

- NFC West: Atlanta, Los Angeles, New Orleans, San Francisco
- **AFC East:** Baltimore, Buffalo, Miami, Boston, New York (Jets)
- AFC Central: Cincinnati, Cleveland, Houston, Pittsburgh
- AFC West: Denver, Kansas City, Oakland, San Diego

This final arrangement of cities / teams would keep most of the premerger NFL teams in the NFC and the AFL teams in the AFC. Pittsburgh, Cleveland, and Baltimore were placed in the AFC in order to balance it out, while the NFC equalized the competitive strength of its East and West divisions rather than sorting out teams just geographically.

Division alignment in 1970 was largely intended to preserve the premerger setups, keeping traditional rivals in the same division. Plans were also made to add two expansion teams—the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Seattle Seahawks—but this would not take place until 1976, seven years after the merger.

As you can see, Boston played the 1970 season as part of the AFC East

The 1970 Boston Patriots football team competed in their eleventh season overall and their first season of National Football League (NFL) football. They were in the EAST Division of the American Football Conference (AFC). They played their games in Harvard Stadium. The use of Harvard's stadium would be a one year's engagement. The following year, they would move into their own newly built arena known as Schaefer Stadium.

The 1970 Patriots were led by Clive Rush in his second year for the first half of the year in which they had a record of 1-6-0. Rush was replaced It was the worst Patriot's season ever. They missed the playoffs for the seventh straight season, and they finished in fifth place (last) in the AFL's Eastern Division.

This was the last season the Patriots would be called the "Boston" Patriots. The following year, they would turn in the "Boston" name and instead they would operate from then to now as the "New England" Patriots. Their final season known as Boston did not go as anybody had planned, as the Patriots would struggle all season and would finish 2-12 with two coaches--the worst record in the NFL.

After winning their first game against the Miami Dolphins, the Patriots would lose 9 in a row before beating the Buffalo Bills on the road. The season concluded with an embarrassing 45-7 loss to the Cincinnati Bengals in Cincinnati. Head coach Clive Rush would quit the season at the midpoint because of medical reasons.

His replacement, John Mazur, did not do much better of a job. Mazur would end up coaching the team next season. The Patriots would score the fewest points in the league in 1970, scoring only 149 points, while allowing 361.

1971 John Mazur, Coach #4

The 1971 former Boston Patriots football team competed in their twelfth season in professional football and their second season in the National Football League (NFL). This year the team would change its name to the New England Patriots and it would move into Shaeffer Stadium, (named after the brewery). The stadium would be renamed several times in its lifetime before being replaced in 2002 by the luxurious Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots were led by John Mazur in his second and only fullyear of three years as head coach. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a losing record this year of 6-8-0 and showed promise. They missed the playoffs, and they tied for third place in the AFL's Eastern Division

The 1971 season would be the first that the team played as the New England Patriots, having changed its name from the Boston Patriots, briefly to the Bay State Patriots before changing it again to the New England Patriots. Their idea in the New England name was to help regionalize the franchise's equal distance from Boston and Providence.

Their record of six wins and eight losses, was much better than the past several years but it was no cigar. It brought them to a thirdplace finish in the AFC East Division. The Patriots enjoyed playing in a brand new stadium known as Schaefer Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts after playing in three different stadiums the previous three seasons in Boston and four stadiums overall in their time as the **Boston Patriots**

Mazur showed who was boss in training camp, after the team with the urging of GM Upton Bell had acquired Duane Thomas from the Dallas Cowboys, where he had a label as a "disgruntled running back." To get Thomas, the Patriots had given up Carl Garrett and Halvor Hagen. Almost upon arriving, Thomas became embroiled in a conflict with coach John Mazur, prompting Patriots general manager Upton Bell to request that Commissioner Pete Rozelle to void the trade three days after it had been made. Rozelle granted Bell's request, and the traded players returned to where they had been prior to the deal.

The Patriots kept Hagen and Jackson in exchange for a second (#35-Robert Newhouse) and third round draft choices in the 1972 NFL draft. Thomas returned to the Cowboys, but decided to keep silent all season long, refusing to speak to teammates, management, and the media.

Thomas's story is interesting even though he made life unpleasant for everybody with whom he came in contact. He was not very likeable, but he was a great football player. There is no question that he helped Dallas win all the marbles including the Super Bowl (VI). His stoical demeanor and cheap shots at pundits apparently cost him Super Bowl MVP.

He was as reportedly voted as the Super Bowl Most Valuable Player by an overwhelming margin. Thomas, however, had boycotted the media throughout the season as well, and Larry Klein, editor of Sport, which presented the award, didn't know how Thomas would act at a banquet in New York. With this in mind, Klein chose to announce Dallas QB Roger Staubach as the winner.


During the 1972 offseason he became even more isolated and insubordinate, so he was traded in early August to the San Diego Chargers in exchange for Mike Montgomery and Billy Parks. Some guys never learn. Kudos to John Mazur for recognizing a sour apple.

1972 John Mazur, Coach #4 1972 Phil Bengtson Coach #5

The 1972 former Boston Patriots football team competed in their thirteenth season in professional football and their third season in the National Football League (NFL). This was the second year the team would be using the name "New England Patriots" and it was the second year in which Shaeffer Stadium was their home venue.

The Patriots were led by John Mazur in his third season. Mazur would resign before the end of the season and he was replaced by Phil Bengston for the last five games. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had a losing record this year of 3-11-0 and showed no

improvement. They missed the playoffs, and they finished in fifth (last) place in the AFC East.

Who was Coach Chuck Fairbanks

Chuck Fairbanks was a fine coach. Like most NFL coaches, he got his training by coaching college teams. After three years of molding the team, he finally got a 2nd place finish in 1976 11-3-0. The Pats finished in 3rd with a 9-5 record in 1977 and then when the league added two games to make it a 16-game season, the Patriots had a fine 11-5 record and they finished in first place in the AFC East. As you can see there were lots of almosts and a number of championships even though New England had not yet played a Super Bowl.

There are so few Heisman Trophy winners given out that a coach who helps produce a Heisman winner often shares in the accolades. Fairbanks produced a Heisman at the University of Oklahoma, Steve Owens, and he later spent six seasons as one of the better coaches of the era with New England. He passed away on April 2, 2013 in Scottsdale, Ariz. at 79.

Years of age. It was tough.

The University of Oklahoma announced his cause of death as brain cancer. As the Sooners head coach, Fairbanks was as good as it gets. He pulled off a 52-15-1 in six years with the Sooners, including an Orange Bowl victory his first season. His squad then won consecutive Sugar Bowl wins in 1971-72 before he took over the Patriots. It was no wonder that he was selected as the Patriots were looking to turn their professional program around. Fairbanks quickly got the program in gear, winning 46 games at New England in his time there, which was a Patriot record at the time.

It took a while to get the team in gear but then after a few years of Fairbanks Seasoning, they were ready to go. The Patriots made the playoffs in their fourth season under Fairbanks in 1976 and then two years later, they were on their way to their first outright AFC East title when owner Billy Sullivan, for his own reasons, pulled an ownership prerogative that affected the team negatively.

He angrily suspended Fairbanks for the final regular-season game. The Patriots did not need the game to be in the playoffs, but it was unsettling for the team. Why, you may ask, would the owner step and do something dumb like that? Nobody could fire the owner for a dumb move—even though fans would have been pleased if he were asked to go. Fairbanks had had enough of pro football so he got out of the Sullivan rat race and agreed to become the coach at the

University of Colorado. Coaches go where it suits them best all of the time.

Mr. Fairbanks was asked, and he returned for the playoffs, but with the disruption in continuity, New England lost to Houston. Fairbanks thus ended his time at 0-2 in the playoffs with New England. The unexpected suspension shook up Fairbanks.

In Fairbanks's first year coaching in 1967, the Oklahoma Sooners had a great record of 10-1 and they beat Tennessee in the Orange Bowl. His teams won 11 games each in his last two seasons with OU, beating Auburn and Penn State in the Sugar Bowl.

When queried, Fairbanks admitted that he had agreed to the suggestion of Switzer, his offensive coordinator, to install the wishbone offense at OU after Texas used it to win a national championship in 1969. A wishbone offense is a formation in which the fullback is positioned closer to the quarterback, with two halfbacks positioned farther back. It's a formation that lends itself to a strong running game.

After becoming head coach, Switzer used the wishbone to win three national titles, matching the number Bud Wilkinson won at Oklahoma from 1947 to 1963, a tenure that included a record 47game winning streak.

Fairbanks was great at what he did but everything does not always work out all the time. He moved on after football to a great career in real estate and golf-course development. He occasionally worked as a consultant for NFL teams in training camp, including with the Dallas Cowboys when Bill Parcells was coach. He was one of football's good guys.

1973 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1973 New England Patriots had a losing record this year of 5-9-0 but showed much improvement. They missed the playoffs, and they finished in third place in the AFC East.

John Hannah is a Patriot Immortal

John Hannah was a Patriot for his whole career from 1973 through the 1985 Super Bowl season. He was named as "The Greatest Offensive Lineman of All Time" by Sports Illustrated. A durable player at a physical position, Hannah played in 183 games and missed only five games due to injury.

The Patriots were not the pride of the league when they were playing out of Boston with no home field. Hannah was so good, he overcame the stigma and was one of only two Patriots voted to the NFL's 75th anniversary team. Hannah played in nine pro bowls and he earned Offensive Lineman of the Year honors for four straight years, from 1978 to 1981.



He was the anchor of the 1978 offensive line that set an NFL record with 3,165 rushing yards - a record which has not been challenged since.

In 1991, Hannah was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame and was the initial member of the Patriots Hall of Fame. In 1999, Hannah was

inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame for his outstanding career at the University of Alabama under coach Bear Bryant. Hannah is still active with the Patriots organization even while making his home in Alabama. Inducted 1991.

1974 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1974 New England Patriots football team finished at 7-7-0. They showed much improvement. They missed the playoffs, and they finished the season tied for third place in the AFC East.

New England stunned the Super Bowl Champion Miami Dolphins in Week 1 at Schaffer Stadium. The Pats went on to win their first five games on their way to a 6–1 start. However, they struggled in the second half of the season, winning only one game before finishing with a 7–7 record.

1975 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1975 New England Patriots football team fell backwards to a record of 3-11-0 this year when there were great expectations.

1976 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1976 New England Patriots football team turned around their fortunes, going 11–3. It goes down in history as their first winning season as an NFL team (their last winning season came in 1966, when the team was still in the AFL).

As we know, the team had gone just 3–11 the previous season, and was considered a "Cinderella team" in 1976. Nobody expected what a great year they would have. Coach Chuck Fairbanks was named NFL Coach of the Year, and cornerback Mike Haynes was named NFL Rookie of the Year.

The 1976 Patriots not only had a great record; they had great stats. The team rushed for a total of 2,957 yards (averaging five yards per carry) and scored 376 points, both second-best in the league. The 2,957 yards rushing were the fifth-highest total in NFL history at the time. The team's 5.0 yards per carry was the best in the NFL and remains higher than all Super Bowl champions except the 1973 Miami Dolphins whose run game was 5.0 yards per carry.

The Patriots also were great thieves on defense as they led the league in takeaways at 50. The Pats finished third in the league in turnover differential at plus-14.


The Patriots made only their second playoff appearance in their history and their first since 1963, but lost to the eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland Raiders in the first round of the playoffs. Earlier in the season, the Patriots handed the Raiders their only loss of the season with a blowout final score of 48–17. However, controversial roughing the passer penalty on Ray Hamilton on a Raiders drive late in the playoff game dimmed the Patriots' hopes of defeating the Raiders again, but they were in the game all the way.

Despite the playoff loss, the team has been considered one of the most talented in Patriots history; in 2004, Patriots head coach Bill Belichick, who was an assistant coach for the Detroit Lions in 1976, called this Patriots team "loaded", a "who's who team." Bill Belichick has earned the right like EF Hutton that "When Bill Belichick speaks, people listen!" And, how!

At Tampa Bay in the end of season match, the Patriots got the best of the Buccaneers on Dec 12 W (31–14) in Tampa Stadium before 41,517. New England proudly accepted their 11-3 regular season record and prepared for the playoffs.

Coming in #2 in the AFC East, the Patriots needed to compete in the Divisional Playoffs, hoping to be moving on to the Super Bowl. The game was on Dec 18 against the Oakland Raiders. In a game marked with controversy, the New England Patriots never gave up and almost pulled it off but did not, losing by three points L (21–24) in the Oakland Coliseum before 53,045

In the photo on the next page, on Dec. 19, 1976, the day after the Playoff defeat, Massachusetts State troopers tried to contain fans who crushed against a wire gate at Logan airport. The fans, who came to meet the Patriots' plane, were upset with the officiating in a bitter 24-21 playoff loss to the Oakland Raiders. Ken Stabler, the Raiders quarterback, dived into the end zone with the game-winning touchdown while only 10 seconds remained on the clock. There was controversial officiating in the wild final drive to the score.



What happened?

The final score tells everybody the game was close, but Patriot fans believe Oakland officiating with the thumb on the scale for the Raiders helped move the core in the Raiders' favor.

Oakland 24, New England 21 is a heartache score. The Patriots played well and for a time at the end of the game they appeared to have the game in the bag with a 21-17 lead late in the fourth quarter. Then Kenny, the Snake Stabler took control of the game. He threw a pass on third and 18 and fortunately, it fell incomplete. However, referee Ben Dreith put his thumb on the scale and made a controversial roughing-the-passer call on Ray Hamilton. That call gave the Raiders a new set of downs on the 13-yard line. The Snake eventually ran in for the go-ahead touchdown and that's all she wrote.

1977 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1977 New England Patriots football team competed in their eighteenth season in professional football and their eighth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by

Chuck Fairbanks in his fifth of six seasons. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots were a fine team this year with a record of 9-5-0 They lost two more games than in 1976 but still finished the year in a respectable third place in the AFC East. They did not make the playoffs, but they looked pretty good most of the year.

1978 Chuck Fairbanks Coach # 6

The 1978 New England Patriots football team competed in their nineteenth season in professional football and their ninth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Chuck Fairbanks in his last of six seasons. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots were a fine team this year with a better record than 1977's record of 9-5-0 This year, they hit the mark at 11-5-0 as the league chose to play sixteen instead of fourteen games per season. They won two more games than in 1977 and finished the year as the #1 ranked team in the AFC East. They made the playoffs winning the AFC East and they played in the Divisional Playoffs in which they lost. They looked pretty good for most of the year and none too shabby in the playoff game.

As noted, the Patriots finished the season with a record of eleven wins and five losses, and finished tied for first in the AFC East, winning their first division title in franchise history over Miami by a built-in tiebreaker

The 1978 Patriots were another great team. They set an NFL record for most rushing yards in a single season, with 3,165 yards on the ground. You may recall some of these names. The Pats had four different players who rushed for more than 500 yards, beginning with running back Sam "Bam" Cunningham, 768; running back Andy Johnson, 675; running back Horace Ivory, 693; and quarterback Steve Grogan, 539. The team also picked up an NFLrecord 181 rushing first-downs. This is one of those Patriot teams that had enough to win it all but just didn't win it all.

The season and home opener for New England was played on Sept 3 with the Washington Redskins prevailing L (14-16) at Schaefer Stadium before 55,037. At S St. Louis on Sept 10, the Patriots beat the Cardinals W (16-6) at Busch Memorial Stadium before 48,233. At home on Sept 19, the Baltimore Colts beat New England L (27–

34) at Schaefer Stadium before 57,284. At Oakland on Sept 24, the Patriots beat the Raiders W (21-14) at the Alameda County Coliseum before 52,904.

On Oct 1 at home, the Patriots beat the San Diego Chargers W (28–23) at Schaefer Stadium before 60,781. On Oct 8, at home, the Patriots beat the Philadelphia Eagles W (24–14) at Schaefer Stadium Before 61,016. At Cincinnati on Oct 15, the Patriots beat the Bengals W (10–3) at Riverfront Stadium before 48,699. At home, on Oct 22, the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins W (33–24) at Schaefer Stadium before 60,424

At home again, on Oct 29, the Patriots blew out the New York Jets W 55–21 at Schaefer Stadium before 60,585. At Buffalo, on Nov 5. The Patriots barely beat the Bills W (14–10) at Rich Stadium before 44,897. On Nov 12, in a close match the Houston Oilers beat the New England Patriots L (23–26) at Schaefer Stadium before 60,356. Then at New York, on Nov 19 at Shea Stadium, the Patriots slid by the Jets in a close match W (19–17) before 55,568.

At Baltimore on Nov 26, New England clobbered the Colts W (35–14) at Memorial Stadium before 42,828. At Dallas on Dec 3, the Cowboys prevailed over the Patriots L (10-17) at Texas Stadium before 63,263. At home on Dec 10, New England won in a lose match against the Buffalo Bills W (26–24) at Schaefer Stadium before 59,598. In the final regular season game on Dec 18, at Miami's Orange Bowl Stadium, the Dolphins got the best of the Patriots spoiling their season finale L (3–23) before a great crowd of 72,071

Divisional Playoffs Patriots 31, Houston 14

The final score was New England 14, Houston 31. After they beat the Dolphins in a wild card game. the Oilers were on a high. They traveled up to New England to face the Patriots at Schaefer Stadium before 61,297 chilled fans. The Oilers were not fazed by the cold. They earned their trip to Pittsburgh with a trip to the Super Bowl on the line. The Patriots had to wait until 1979 for another shot at the

top marbles. The game as all Oilers. QB Dan Pastorini threw three touchdown passes in the second quarter. That was more than enough to defeat the Patriots in their first home playoff game. Home field gave the Pats no edge on this particular day.

Ron Erhardt, a Talented Coach

One year after Ron Erhardt became an assistant coach at Williston High School in Williston, North Dakota, he began a six-year run as a head coach at two North Dakota Catholic high schools where his combined record was 45-9-2.

Erhardt's early success helped him be discovered at the collegiate level. He first served as an assistant at North Dakota State University in 1963 for three years. Then, in 1966, he was named head coach at the school. This appointment set the stage for another strong tenure, in which Erhardt amassed a 61-7-1 record in his seven

years. Erhardt also served as the Bison athletic director, winning a pair of college national championships. He was a great coach.

After missing the playoffs in 1977, the Patriots were ready to go for the Super Bowl in 1978. At the end of the last chapter we recounted their loss in the divisional playoffs. As noted, prior to the last regular season game on December 18, head coach Chuck Fairbanks announced he was leaving the team to accept a contract offer from the University of Colorado. The team ownership, to say the least was very upset.

They responded to the news by immediately suspending Fairbanks and they made Erhardt and fellow assistant Hank Bullough co-coaches for the final game of the season. The Patriots dropped that contest, then lost their opening round matchup to the Houston Oilers in the divisional playoffs.

Fairbanks was permitted to leave for Colorado, with Erhardt officially taking the reins of the team as head coach on April 6, according to Erhardt. Having had a .890 winning percentage at North Dakota State upon taking the position, Erhardt said, "I've never been a loser in football and I don't intend to start now."

He might not have been a loser but to the owners, he did not measure up. But, maybe nobody could. The Patriots "underachieved" with a 19–13 record in the 1979 (9-7) and 1980 (10-6) seasons, missing the playoffs by one game each year. Considering from whence they had come over the years, almost winning making the playoffs was not really that bad. The team was playing well in this period with 441 points scored in 1980. It was a club record not broken until 2007.

But then, inexplicably, the Patriots fell apart the third year under Erhardt to a 2–14 record in 1981. Owner Billy Sullivan, who some pundits say was responsible for all four letters in the word "gaff," used the calculatus-eliminatus method to determine that Erhardt was "just too nice a guy," to be the coach of the Patriots. Owner Billy Sullivan dismissed this coach after one terrible performance year on December 22, just two days after the conclusion of the season.

There are lots of good coaches who think Ron Erhardt is a good coach who wound up with a not-so-good owner. Ron Erhardt, the three-season head coach of the New England Patriots coach turned his football fortunes around by becoming the offensive architect of the New York Giants' two Super Bowl titles. He did this when Bill Parcells was at the helm and Parcells saw him as one of the best. On March 21, 2012, this great coach "Erhardt" passed away at 80-years of age as one of the best with a great and solid football legacy despite his 1981 experience with the Patriots.

The Giants made the press announcement that the one-time head coach of the New England Patriots and the long-time NFL offensive coordinator had passed away in retirement in Boca Raton, Fla. Accolades came in from all directions.

1979 Ron Erhardt Coach # 7

The 1979 New England Patriots football team competed in their twentieth season of professional football and their tenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Erhardt in his first of three seasons. Erhard had co-coached the Patriots in the last game of the 1978 season, but we do not count that in this book as a coached season. Billy Sullivan was still the owner of the Patriots. This year, the new overtime rule would be applied to tie games so that fewer games would end in ties.

The Patriots were an OK team this year with a better than 500 records of 9-7-0. They finished the year as the #2 ranked team in the AFC East. They were one game away from making the playoffs. They looked pretty good for most of the year but not enough to win a box of cigars.

1980 Ron Erhardt Coach # 7

The 1980 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-first season of professional football and their eleventh season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Erhardt in his second of three seasons. Billy Sullivan was still the owner. The Patriots were a fine team this year with a better record (10-6) than the 9-7-0 from 1979. They finished the year again

as the #2 ranked team in the AFC East. They were one game away from making the playoffs. They looked pretty good for most of the year but again, not quite enough to compete for the big cigar.

Running Back Sam Cunningham decided he wanted more this season from the Patriots and he held out all season. For their part, the Patriots turned to rookie Vagas Ferguson to carry the bulk of the rushing game. Ferguson responded by breaking the team's rookie rushing record. The Patriots were rolling along quite well right before the mid-season point and it looked like a good year to make the playoffs.

Unfortunately, the Pats managed to win just two of their next seven games, and they finished with a 10–6 record that saw them fall a game short of a wild card berth.

Bill Parcells, then the linebackers coach with the team, has stated that the players on this Patriots team gave him his famous "Tuna" nickname when he asked, "What do you think I am, Charlie the Tuna?" Parcells had high regards for coach Ron Erhardt.

1981 Ron Erhardt Coach # 7

The 1981 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-second season of professional football and their twelfth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Erhardt in his last of three seasons. Billy Sullivan was the feckless, petulant owner. The Patriots were a different team this year, seeming to have lost the fire that was the hallmark of Erhardt's first two years at the helm. They finished with a dismal 2-14 record, tied for fourth (last) in the AFC East. They were out of all post season contention. Two days after the season, Billy Sullivan fired coach Ron Erhardt as it was tough to take a 2-14 season at any time.

The season went as you would expect for a 2-14 year. The team lost their first four games, and then ten of their last eleven, including the last nine games of the season. They could not do anything right or, so it seemed.


The games were close, but nobody was giving trophies for almost wins. The Patriots were defeated in both the first and last games of the season by the Baltimore Colts. Ironically what became known as the Patriots' bookend losses proved to be Baltimore's only two wins of the 1981 season.

It was known that the loser of that last game would have the first pick in the 1982 NFL Draft, and so the pundits enjoyed nicknaming this last game, "The Stupor Bowl." With the Patriot loss, the team had the first pick, choosing University of Texas defensive end Kenneth Sims, an eventual draft "bust" as first overall pick in the NFL draft. Even their draft pick consolation prize did not work out in 1981.

Ron Meyer replaced Ron Erhardt as Pats head coach

Ron Meyer promised that the New England Patriots would be one of the best-conditioned teams in the NFL. He began a mini-camp to assure his goals were met. Meyer, replaced the fired Ron Erhardt as the Pats' coach after New England went 2-14.

Meyer believed that you can't lay out certain idioms or axioms on what it takes to win. He noted that he had evaluated the existing personnel on film but needed the mini-camp to give him an effective on where the players were to get an idea on weaknesses that may occur. Meyer also brought six coaches--and the team's first-ever strength coach -- with him from Southern Methodist. The best laid plans of mice and men, gang aft agley.

1982 Ron Meyer Coach #8

The 1982 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-third season of professional football and their thirteenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Meyer in his first of two and a half seasons. Billy Sullivan—yes, the same guy was the owner calling the shots. The Patriots were a better team this year, and they were able to put the prior 2-14 season behind them. This season was strike-shortened from 16 games to nine. The Patriots finished well at 5-4 and gained a spot in the payoffs. The team finished seventh in the American Football Conference. As noted, the 1982 season was shortened from 16 regular season games to 9, due to the 57-day players strike. There were no championships to be had in 1982, but the Patriots got into the bracket tournament implemented to make up for the strike shortened season. to .

Post Season Bracket Tournament (like March Madness)

If it were not for the fact that in the type of post season tournament that was conducted this year, a team might play just one tournament game, there were those who thought perhaps the whole 1982 season should be played as a tournament to make it more exciting—rather than play the nine-game season. Besides the post season tournament, the other big change was that there were no divisions in play this year. The top eight teams of the fourteen teams in each conference played a tournament to decide who would play in the Super Bowl. Almost all teams saw action

The bracket for this unusual and special post season is shown below:



The League Playoffs began on January 8, 1983. The postseason tournament concluded with the Washington Redskins defeating the Miami Dolphins in Super Bowl XVII, 27–17, on January 30, at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California.

As noted, there was a 57-day players' strike which reduced the regular season to nine games. Thus, the league used this special 16team playoff format (dubbed the "Super Bowl Tournament"), just for this year and never again. As noted, there were no Division standings. Eight teams from each conference were seeded 1-8 based on their regular season records. The Patriots were seventh in their conference.

This year marked the first time in NFL history in which a team that qualified for the playoffs had a losing record (< .500), as both Cleveland and Detroit finished with 4-5 records (.444). Both of these teams lost in the first round of the playoffs as did the Patriots who sported a 5-4 conference record.

AFC: Playoffs Dolphins 28, New England 13

The game began at 4:00 PM EST. The weather was 76 degrees at the Miami Orange Bowl in Miami Florida, the home team of the Dolphins/ 68,842 fans attended the game.

This was the Dolphins game right from the opening kickoff. The Dolphins owned most of the game with their attack which included four long touchdown drives. They intercepted Patriots quarterback Steve Grogan twice.

Miami QB David Woodley was at his peak during the game, completing 16 of 19 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns (both to tight end Bruce Hardy). The Miami QB threw no interceptions, and he rushed for 16 yards. For the game, his rating was through the roof at 153.8.

Andrea Franklin, Miami's star running back, ran 26 times for 112 yards and a touchdown. The Dolphins outgained the Patriots by a mile (448yds to 237yds) and rushing yards (214 to 77).

The Patriots had a moment of glory in the beginning of the second quarter when they grabbed a 3-0 lead on John Smith's 23-yard field goal. However, it would be just five minutes later that Woodley finished a 76-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown pass to tight end

Bruce Hardy. Then next time the Dolphins had the ball, they drove 79 yards to a 1-yard touchdown run by Franklin, giving the team a 14-3 halftime lead.

The Pats got the lead down to 14-6 on Smith's 42-yard field goal early in the third quarter. But that would be as close as New England would get. Miami scored again with touchdowns from Woody Bennett, another 2-yard catch by Hardy late in the third quarter, and in the middle of the fourth. With 5:32 left in the game, Grogan threw a perfect 22-yard touchdown strike to tight end Don Hasselbeck that added the icing to the Miami cakes and a final score of 28-13.

1983 Ron Meyer Coach # 8

The 1983 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-fourth season of professional football and their fourteenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Meyer in his second of two and a half seasons. Billy Sullivan was the owner. The Patriots had an 8-8 record this year. This season was back to normal with 16 games being scheduled and played

The Pats tied for second in the AFC East Division. The team played inconsistently all season. Nonetheless in the last game, with an 8-7 record going in, they still had a shot, at a playoff spot as long as they managed a in their final game of the season in Seattle. It did not happen. The Patriots would have problems with turnovers the whole game as rookie quarterback Tony Eason was gobbled up in a 24-6 loss to the Seahawks

1984 Ron Meyer Coach # 8 1984 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

The 1984 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-fifth season of professional football and their fifteenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ron Meyer in his third of two and a half seasons. Meyer would be replaced halfway through this season after a dispute with owners. Meyer was 5-3 at the time. Billy Sullivan was the owner. Ray Berry

took on the task of coaching the second half of the season. He was 4-4. The Patriots had an 9-7 record this year between the two coaches. The Patriots finished second in the AFC East Division. No championships and no cigars but another new coach.

As noted, head coach Ron Meyer, who had coached the Patriots for the previous two seasons, was fired halfway through this season. Meyer had angered several of his players with public criticism. After the team's 44-22 loss to Miami in Week 8, Meyer decided to fire popular defensive coordinator Rod Rust; Meyer himself was fired by Patriots management shortly thereafter.

The Patriots did not hire Meyer's replacement from within. Instead they found Raymond Berry, who had been New England's receivers coach from 1978 to 1981 under coaches Chuck Fairbanks and Ron Erhardt. Berry had been working in the private sector in Medfield. Massachusetts, when the Patriots called him to replace Meyer.

Berry's first order of business was to immediately rehire Rust. Under Berry's leadership, the Patriots won four of their last eight games. Berry's importance to the team was reflected less in his initial win-loss record than in the respect he immediately earned in the locker room – "Raymond Berry earned more respect in one day than Ron Meyer earned in three years," according to running back Tony Collins. Everybody has an opinion.

Raymond Berry: Great Person, Great Player, Great Coach

Raymond Berry was a great receiver who caught passes for the Colts from a guy who is one of the greatest NFL QB's of all time, Johnny

Unitas. Berry liked to say: "Luck is something which happens when preparation meets opportunity. One play may make the difference in winning or losing a game. I must be prepared to make my own luck."

Those who capture the Raymond Berry story find a man of determination, dedication and desire. Berry, had a little-known handicap which forced him to wear special shoes because one leg was shorter than the other. He did not become a starter on his high school football team until his senior year – even though his father was the coach.

After all is said and done Ray Berry proved his worth. He played as a split end for the Baltimore Colts from 1955 to 1967, and after several assistant coaching positions, he landed the head coach job of the New England Patriots from 1984 to 1989.

In recognition of his playing career, Berry was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973. He is a member of the NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time Team as one of the best players of the NFL's first 75 years. His number 82 jersey is retired by the Indianapolis Colts and he is a member of the Patriots' 1980s All-Decade Team. He was a fine coach but he coached at a time in Patriot's history in which it was tough to be a great coach.

1985 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

The 1985 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-sixth season of professional football and their sixteenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ray Berry in his first full season of five and a half seasons. Berry replaced Ron Meyer half way through the 1984 season (4-4). Billy Sullivan was the owner. Patrick Sullivan was the GM. The Patriots had a nice 11-5 record this year. It was good enough for third place in the AFC East Division. Their fine record got them a wild-card berth and coach Berry took them to the Super Bowl game played in 1986. After winning three playoff games, the Bears beat the Patriots in the Super Bowl for the big Cigar.

Think about this. When hired, Ray Berry was not working in the NFL at the time he was snagged mid-season in 1984 to coach the

Patriots. One year later, he had them in the Super Bowl. Let that sink in. Please. It is a tribute to New England Coach Ray Berry and the New England organization was not known at the time, at least, as the most welcoming spot for a great coach to get comfortable enough to stay the course or to be asked to stay the course.

Ray Berry sent out his Patriots on September 8 in the home and season opener at Sullivan Stadium to face the always tough Green Bay Packers. Berry's squad beat the visitors W (26–20) at Sullivan Stadium before 49,488 to jump start a great season. At Chicago on Sept 15, the bears laid a loss at the feet of coach Berry's Patriots L (7-20) at Soldier Field before 60,533. At Buffalo in game #3, the Patriots dug in to defeat the Bills at Rich Stadium before 40,334. After a long flight to Los Angeles on Sept 29, the Patriots were defeated by the Raiders L (20-35) at Sullivan Stadium before 60,686.

At Cleveland on Oct 6, St. Bruno's Feast Day, the Browns dug in and beat the Patriots L (20-24) at Cleveland Municipal Stadium before 62,139. Then, at home, New England on Oct 13, whooped the Buffalo Bills W (28–6) at Sullivan Stadium before 40,462. At home again, on oct 20, the Patriots defeated the New York Jets W (20–13) at Sullivan Stadium before 58,163. Then, at Tampa on Oct 27 the Patriots slugged out a nice win against the Buccaneers W (32–14) before 34,661.

At home on Nov 3, New England beat Miami W (17-13) at Sullivan Stadium before 58,811. This was followed by a nice win on Nov 10 at Sullivan Stadium against the Indianapolis Colts W (34–15) before 54,176. At Seattle the next week, the Patriots beat the Seahawks at the Kingdome W (20–13) before 60,345. At New York, a week later on Nov 24, the Jets edged out the Patriots at The Meadowlands before 74,100.

At Indianapolis on December 1, 1985. Ray Berry's tough Patriots nosed out the Indianapolis Colts in a slugfest W (38–31) at the Hoosier Dome before 56,740. At home on Dec 8, the Patriots whooped the Detroit Lions at Sullivan Stadium W (23-6) before 59,078. At Miami on Dec 16 the Dolphins assured a split in this year's two-game series by beating the Patriots by a field goal L (27-300 at the Miami Orange Bowl before 69,489. On Dec 22, in the

final game of the season, the New England Patriots would not take a loss for an answer and they teed off against the Cincinnati Bengals in victory W (34–23) at Sullivan Stadium before 57,953.

The Playoffs got the Pats to the big game.

You may not believe the trivia about the 1985 Patriots ascendancy to the Super Bowl Game. Maybe it is not trivia. Maybe it was vital. The 1985 Patriots became the first team in NFL history ever to advance to the Super Bowl by winning 3 playoff games on the road, defeating the New York Jets 26–14, the Los Angeles Raiders, 27–20, and then they went on to stun the football world and did the impossible as they pulled out a massive and stunning upset over the Miami Dolphins 31–14, in the AFC Championship game.

The Patriots' win in Miami was their first victory in that stadium since 1969. The win over the Dolphins in that game has gone down as one of the greatest upsets in NFL history, as the Dolphins were heavily favored. Ray Berry old his team they could win.

But despite the Patriots' success in the playoffs, they proved unable to compete with the acclaimed 17–1 Chicago Bears in Super Bowl XX, losing 46–10 in what was at the time the most lopsided defeat in Super Bowl history.

Coach Ray Berry took 100% of the blame for the Super Bowl loss. That was the kind of guy he was. "We couldn't protect the quarterback, and that was my fault. I couldn't come up with a system to handle the Bears' pass rush," head coach Raymond Berry recognized and admitted.

1986 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

The 1986 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-seventh season of professional football and their seventeenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ray Berry in his second full season of five and a half seasons. Patrick Sullivan was the GM. The Patriots had a nice 11-5 record

this year for the second season in a row. It was good enough for first place in the AFC East Division.

Their fine record got them past having to play in a wild-card game as they simply advanced to the AFC v NFC championship game. Unfortunately, they lost that game by a skosh, 22-17 to the Broncos and that was their last playoff game for 1986. The Giants would beat the Broncos 39-20 in the Super Bowl. A lot of Giants were found smoking those huge cigars and wearing those huge rings.

In the home and season opener on September 7, 1986, at Sullivan Stadium, the Patriots squashed the Indianapolis Colts W (33–3) before 55,208. At New York on Sept 2, in a game played at the Meadowlands before 72,422, the Patriots beat the Jets W (20-6). Then, on Sept 21 at home, the Seattle Seahawks beat the Patriots at Sullivan Stadium L (31-38) before 58,977. At Denver. On Sept 28, in Mile High Stadium, the Broncos beat the Pats L (20-27) before 75,804.

At home On Oct 5, at Miami, the Patriots smothered the Dolphins W (34–7) at Sullivan Stadium before 60,689. The Next week on Oct 12, the Jets came to Foxboro and beat the Patriots L (24-31) before 60,342. At Pittsburgh's Three River Stadium, on Oct 19, the Steelers shut out the Pats in a big win W (34-0) at Three Rivers Stadium before 54,743. At Buffalo the next week on Oct 26, the Bills did not fare as well, losing to the Patriots L (3-23) before 77,808.

At home on Nov 2, the Atlanta Falcons lost to the Patriots W (25-17) at Sullivan Stadium before 60,597. At Indianapolis on Nov 9, the Colts went down W (21-3) at the Hoosier Dome before 56,890. At LA at Anaheim Stadium on Nov 16, the Patriots on beat the Rams W (30–28) in a close match before 64,339. At home v Buffalo on Nov 23, the Patriots beat the Bills W (22-19) before 60,455.

At New Orleans on Nov 30, in a one-point game, the Patriots nosed out the Saints W (21-2) before 58,259. On Dec 7, at home, Cincinnati beat New England L (7-31) before 60,633. Then, on Dec 14, at Sullivan Stadium, the 49ers beat the Patriots before 60,787. At

Miami on Dec 22, the Patriots won their last game of the season at the Orange Bowl W (34-27) before 74,516.

It was a close ball game, but the Patriots did start off behind. Broncos QB John Elway ran for a touchdown and passed for another one as it was an Elway show all the way for Denver over the Patriots—but the game was darn close. Denver running back Sammy Winder put in a nice 102 yards and caught a pass for another 16 to help move the score.

The one battle won by New England was turnovers, but this was a rare game in which that was not a deciding factor. Winning turnovers by 2-0, the Pats were outgained on the ground by 441 to 271. The worst part of the Patriots game was that the O-line permitted five sacks of NE QB Tony Eason.

There were times of brilliance but none long-lasting. In the first quarter for example, Elway completed passes to Steve Sewell and Steve Watson for gains of 39 and 21 yards. This rocketed the Broncos on a drive to the Patriots 4-yard line. From there, Elway tried to run the ball for a score, but the score was saved just short of the end zone. In a major mental error, thinking he had a TD, Elway angrily spiked the ball into the ground, drawing a penalty that pushed the team back five yards and had to settle for a Rich Karlis' field goal to go up to get the scoring going the second quarter.

The Patriots got the lead when Eason completed a 19-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Stanley Morgan to cap an 87-yard drive. But, almost immediately, Denver came back with an 82-yard drive to score on Elway's 22-yard touchdown run. Later in 2Q, the NE linebacker Johnny Rembert's intercepted a John Elway pass on the Broncos 29-yard line and Tony Franklin's popped in a 38-yard field goal, tying the game at 10 by the end of the half.

Nobody was winning, and nobody was losing. In the third quarter, the Broncos caught a fire and drove 80 yards in 15 plays on a nineminute drive that ended with another Karlis' field goal (22 yds) bringing the lead to 13-10 lead. The Pats pulled off a successful trick play with a flea flicker involving fullback Mosi Tatupu taking a handoff and then pitching the ball back to Eason. Eason connected on a 45-yard touchdown pass to Morgan to retake the lead, 17–13. But it was short lived.

Elway threw a 48-yard strike to wide receiver Vance Johnson for the back-breaking score that put Denver ahead, 20-17 lead. New England had possession four times in the fourth quarter but could do nothing with the ball. The first three outings ended in punts, while Broncos defensive end Rulon Jones ended the last one by sacking Eason in the end zone for a safety with loss of two points with 1:32 left in the game. After giving up possession after the safety, that was all that was written in this game for the Patriots.

Broncos punter Mike Horan played a major role in the game as he averaged 49 yards per kick on his five punts. More importantly, he placed three of them in the 20, including the final one that set up Jones' game-clinching safety.

This would be the last trek in the playoffs for Coach Raymond Berry. He would have two more winning seasons before he would encounter a losing year in his last season with the club.

1987 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

The 1987 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-eighth season of professional football and their seventeenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were

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led by Ray Berry in his third full season of five and a half seasons. Billy Sullivan was still the owner but he was in his last year at the top spot. Patrick Sullivan was the GM. The Patriots had a winning 8-7 record in this strike-shortened season. It was good enough for a second-place tie in the AFC East Division.

Some NE 1987 Patriots Season Particulars

The 1987 NFL season featured a number of games that were predominantly played by replacement players as the National Football League Players Association (NFLPA) players were on strike from weeks four to six. The New England Patriots were 8-7 in the shortened season and the team was 2-1 using replacement players season ended with Super Bowl XXII, with the Washington Redskins defeating the Denver Broncos 42–10 at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego. The Broncos suffered their second consecutive Super Bowl defeat. At this point it had been just a few years since the broncos beat the Pats in the Super Bowl

The Replacement players were quite active and actually helpful to New England in 1987. Having Raymond Berry as coach had to help getting everything ready to play. The pundits joked about the positive impact of the "new" players on performance. For example, placement player Mike LeBlanc gave the team something it did not have in quite a while—a running game. Le Blanc was a nice addition though like all replacement players, he was unexpected at the beginning of the season.

Those who like to gobble team statistics already know that in 1986, the Patriots became the first team in 20 years to average less than 3 yards a carry. Yet, on October 11 in the second replacement game, Le Blanc accumulated 213 yards rushing as New England beat the Buffalo Bills 14-7.

The 1987 Games

On Sept 13, the Patriots, with their regular players in uniform, won their home and season opener against the Miami Dolphins W (28–21) before 54,642. At New York, with the normal players on the field at Shea Stadium, the Jets beat the Patriots L (24-43) before 70,847. The September 28 game against Washington's Redskins was

canceled due to the player's strike. On October 4, my wedding anniversary, the Cleveland Broan's replacement players defeated the New England Patriot's replacement players L (10-20) before 14,830. Notice the difference in the # of fans.

At home on Oct 11, at home, with a crisp running attack led by Replacement Mike LeBlanc, New England defeated Buffalo Bills W (14–7) before 11,878. At Houston, in the last replacement player game of 1987, the Patriots defeated the Oilers W (21-7) before 26,294. On Oct 25, at Indianapolis, the regular players were back in action after the strike, and the Colts had their way with the Patriots L (16-30) before 48,850. On Nov 1, at home, the Patriots beat the Los Angeles Raiders W (26–23) before 60,664. At New York, on Nov 8, the Giants defeated New England L (10-17) before 73,817) at Giants Stadium in the Meadowlands.

On Nov15, at home in Sullivan Stadium, the Dallas Cowboys defeated the New England Patriots L (17-23) before 60,567. At home on Nov 22, New England shut-out Indianapolis before 56,906. At home again the following week, on Nov 29, the Eagles beat the Patriots L (31-34) before 54,198. At Denver on Dec 6, the Broncos beat the Patriots L (20-31) before 75,795.

On Dec 13, the Patriots whipped the New York Jets W 42–20 before 60,617. On Dec 14, at Buffalo before 74,945, the Patriots beat the Bills W (13–7) bringing the record to 7-7. At Miami on Dec 21, the Patriots beat the Dolphins W (24–10) before 61,192 finishing the strike-shortened season at 8–7.

1988 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

The 1988 New England Patriots football team competed in their twenty-ninth season of professional football and their nineteenth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Ray Berry in his fourth full season of five and a half seasons. Victor Kiam bought the Patriots this year from 28-year owner Billy Sullivan and he assumed #1 duties this year. Patrick Sullivan remained as the GM. They went back to a sixteen-week schedule after the strike, the Patriots had a winning 9-7 record this year. It

was good enough for a tie for second place in the AFC East Division. It was another almost championship.

It would take until 1994 for the Patriots to record another winning record. As noted, for this season, the Patriots slightly improved on their 8-7 record 1987, winning one more game due to one game being cancelled the previous season. Despite the winning record, the Patriots again did not reach the postseason. They finished tied for second place in the AFC East with the arch rival Colts, but when the record books were closed for 1988, they actually finished in 3rd place because the Colts had a better record against common opponents than the Patriots did.


1989 Raymond Berry Coach # 9

1990 Rod Rust #10

The 1990 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-first season of professional football and their twenty-first season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Rod Rust in his first of one full season. Victor Kiam was the owner. Patrick Sullivan was the GM. The Patriots outdid their final Ray Berry 5-11 record with an even worst 1-15 record this year. The

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team came in dead last in the AFC East Division and last in the entire league.

This was the worst record in franchise history. When it looked like they could do no worst, they managed to do the impossible. For example, they lost a nationally televised game to the Washington Redskins in which they were down 9–0 before the Redskins even ran an offensive play. The Redskins' two first-quarter scores had come on a Kurt Gouveia fumble return for a touchdown (#1), and after the kickoff, the Patriots snapped the ball out of the end zone for a safety. The rain was coming down in buckets and so the announced crowd for the game was 22,286.

In a humiliating Week 9 blowout loss in Philadelphia, Eagles' QB Randall Cunningham scored on a long run in which the defense was split between Patriots who did not even try to tackle Cunningham and another few who completely missed him on such attempts. To make it worst, this became the most played highlight reel on all the national NFL-related TV shows (including ESPN's NFL Primetime and Monday Night Football). It unfortunately made the 1990 Patriots' incompetence both a national story and a collective joke. It was not good.

Eventually to end the pain. the Patriots' final game of the season finally came. It was against the eventual Super Bowl champion New York Giants. The game drew a sellout crowd to Foxboro, but over 40,000 fans were rooting for the visitors, as tickets to Giants home games (the Giants were having a banner year) were nearly impossible to come by for non-season-ticket holders.

The Patriots' accumulated a negative-265 point-differential (181 points scored, 446 points surrendered). It was the worst total of any team in the 1990s. Raymond Berry began to look like a miracle worker for taking this team to five wins in the prior season.

The Patriots opponents this year were almost all top teams. Compared with the previous season's Dallas Cowboys, the Patriots played only three teams with non-winning records – divisional rivals the Indianapolis Colts and New York Jets plus one game against the Phoenix Cardinals – all season.

The 1990 Patriots and 1981 Baltimore Colts are the only NFL teams since 1940 to have eleven losses during which they never led in one season. No team wants records or notable acts such as these.

The 1990 Patriots became the third team to end a season at 1-15, and were matched by the 1991 Colts the following year. They also tied the 1976 Tampa Bay Buccaneers for most consecutive losses inside one season (the Buccaneers lost all 14 games at a time when the NFL had not adopted a 16-game schedule yet). The Bucs record later was eclipsed by the 15-straight losing 2001 Carolina Panthers. It was then topped by the 0-16 2008 Detroit Lions and the most recent 0-16 2017 Cleveland Browns.

Budweiser renamed Schaefer Stadium in 1983 to Sullivan Stadium in honor of the long-term owner family. In 1990, shortly after the Sullivan's sold their majority interest in the team to Victor Kiam, the stadium was officially renamed to "Foxboro Stadium." Note that the official spelling of the town in which the stadium is built is "Foxborough," the shorter spelling is used for the stadium.

1991 Dick MacPherson #11



The 1991 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-second season of professional football and their twenty-second season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Dick MacPherson in his first of two seasons with the team. Victor Kiam was the owner. Nobody carried the GM titlee in 1991. The Patriots record was 6-10-0 and they finished in fourth place in the AFC East Division.

1992 Dick MacPherson #11

The 1992 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-third season of professional football and their twenty-third

season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Dick MacPherson in his last of two seasons with the team. James Orthwein would be an active owner of the New England Patriots during the 1992 and 1993 seasons. He sold the team in 1994. Nobody carried the GM title in 1992. The Patriots record was 2-14, and they finished in fifth (last) place in the AFC East Division.

Every Patriot season during this period had a series of sub-plots and Dick MacPherson's swan-song season (1992) was no different. The Patriots' two wins in weeks eleven and twelve of the 1992 season came after a horrendous 0–9 start, and they were followed by a five-game losing streak to end the season. They received the first overall pick in the following year's draft. Nobody would consider trading that record for a #1 draft pick.

This was the first season of the ownership bonanza as this version of the team was owned by James Orthwein. He bought the team from previous owner Victor Kiam to settle a debt. This was also the last season in which Dick MacPherson would be the head coach after a two-year tenure. It was also the last season to feature the Patriots' original colors and logo on their primary uniforms, which were overhauled for use in the following season. Things were changing. Soon the Patriots would begin to win games again.

1993 Bill Parcells #12

The 1993 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-fourth season of professional football and their twenty-fourth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots hired Bill Parcells to turn the team around after he had brought two world championship Super Bowl victories to the New York Giants in his eight years with the last one being in 1990 at a time in which the Patriots were floundering. So, the 1993 team was led by Bill Parcells in his first of four seasons with the team. James Orthwein was still the owner this year. He sold the team in 1994. Nobody carried the GM title in 1993. The Patriots record was 5-11 even with Bill Parcells running the show. They finished in fourth place in the AFC East Division

Lots was happening organizationally and preparationally in 1993. Bill Parcells was brought to New England to create a champion. Could he do it? Could he wait it out? Maybe!

Additional Information

With ownership changes, there are most often rumors of planned moves for the teams affected. They were aplenty when Orthwein from St. Louis took over the Patriots club as owner. There were natural rumors that the team would move to St. Louis and become the Stallions (even to the point of a team logo being unveiled and hats being printed). Despite the confusion, the Patriots ran through the year. It was the first at New England as head coach for Bill Parcells but as an assistant, he had familiarity with Patriot operations.

The Patriots drafted Drew Bledsoe as the #1 pick in 1993 and he was named to be the starter in his first year with the club. As noted, big changes were afoot in the organization even before the team took the field this season. Bill Parcells cleaned house.

All coaches from the 1992 season with the exception of Dante Scarnecchia and Bobby Grier were fired and replaced with new ones. Scarnecchia would become a special assistant while Grier would move to the front office. The roster had undergone substantial changes.

Before we discuss the season finale in Parcells first year, let me bring you up to date on what was happening besides the name changes of

Schaefer Stadium to Sullivan Stadium to Foxboro Stadium. The ownership of the stadium was in flux and this fact is one of the only facts that are on the side of New England Fans wanting to keep an NFL franchise in Boston and surrounds.

We know that Sullivan's financial troubles ultimately forced him to sell controlling interest of the Patriots to Victor Kiam in 1988. Fortunately, or unfortunately, the stadium itself lapsed into bankruptcy. Enter Robert Kraft, current owner.

In 1988, Kraft outbid several competitors, including Kiam, to buy the stadium out of bankruptcy court from Sullivan for \$22 million. In other words, from 1988-on, neither Sullivan, nor Kiam, nor Orthwein owned the stadium. It was the sole possession of Robert Kraft. Sullivan was ready to bail as he needed the cash and he wanted as much as he could get for the stadium built less than 20 years earlier for about \$7 million. Kraft was ready to pay a reasonable amount.

For many without alternative motives, the stadium appeared to be cheap and outdated on its opening day. For potential purchasers, the facility was considered to be outdated by reasonable standards for its day and nearly worthless. However, the purchase price for the lucky buyer included the stadium's lease to the Patriots, which ran through 2001. Kraft won the bid.

Those who examined the lease have concluded that it was ironclad enough to end Sullivan's three-decade involvement with the Patriots. And, so, when Sullivan and Kiam tried to move the team to Jacksonville, Kraft refused to let them break the lease. He, as a stadium owner was able to exert a New-England influence on the transaction. As a result, when Kiam was nearly brought down by bad investments of his own, he was forced to sell the Patriots team to somebody. That somebody happened to be James Orthwein.

Ever since Orthwein had bought the team in 1992, there had been constant rumors that he wanted to move the Patriots to St. Louis. In 1994, Orthwein offered a ton of cash to Kraft. In fact, it was \$75 million. He wanted to buy out the remainder of the team's lease at what was now Foxboro Stadium. Had Robert Kraft accepted Orthwein's offer, it would have cleared the last significant hurdle to

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moving the team to St. Louis, Podunk, or Tim-Buk-Tu. However, Kraft turned it down. New England footballers thank Robert Kraft every day of their lives...at least they should.

There are a lot of great games and great stories in the off years of the Patriots. Having a guy who bagged two Super Bowl Rings already as your head coach means for sure that your team is a contender.

This season finale itself became one of the most dramatic games in the club's history. The Patriots were hosting the Dolphins. When Starter Dan Marino went out for the year in week 5, the Dolphins fell to 9–6. The Dolphins needed a win to make the playoffs.

In the game, the Patriots led 10–7 at halftime and twice stopped the Dolphins on downs, but early in the third, a Bledsoe fumble led to a Dolphins field goal and a tie game. Then a blocked punt by the Dolphins' Darrell Malone led to a touchdown by Scott Mitchell to Mark Ingram. The game was topsy-turvy at this point as the lead had tied or had changed five times in the fourth quarter alone.

In the fourth, the Dolphins were moving and ended a drive with a Terry Kirby touchdown run, even though Andre Tippett had sacked Mitchell for a ten-yard loss – it was the 100th career sack for the future Hall of Fame linebacker.

In the final 3:40 Bledsoe took the Patriots down to a Ben Coates touchdown catch. But it was not enough as the Dolphins forced overtime on a Pete Stoyanovich field goal.

In the overtime the Dolphins punted after Chris Slade forced a fumble. Then, Drew Bledsoe threw a pick to J.B. Brown before the Dolphins lined up to punt again. The Pats got the ball. Vincent Brisby caught a ten-yard pass but fumbled and teammate Leonard Russell recovered the ball and ran 22 yards. The team was moving.

Bledsoe then absorbed a Dolphins blitz and launched a 36-yard touchdown to Michael Timpson, ending a wild 33–27 Patriots win and finishing their season at 5–11, but with four straight wins to close it out and subsequently, the Patriots had eliminated the Dolphins from the playoffs.

Several weeks later owner James Orthwein completed sale of the entire Patriots team to Robert Kraft, Rumor has it included the deeds to all New England properties. That's how much New England was willing to give up for their football team. Later the residents learned their deeds were safe as Robert Kraft promised to take care of New England and New Englanders as long as he could get a lot of wins out of the franchise. Well, maybe Kraft demanded no such thing, but he got it anyway.

For those reading that think the Patriots do not have blood and guts in their roots, think again. Just like Paul Revere and the whole notion of Patriotism, the New Englanders I know would never give up their team, the New England Patriots. Let St. Louis find a few beautiful red Cardinal flying birds to launch their spirits high into the sky.

Drew Bledsoe was a patriot from right after the draft. He was the first overall pick in the 1993 NFL Draft and then for the next eight years, Bledsoe, a fine quarterback was considered the face of the Patriots franchise

During his nine-year Patriots career, Drew Bledsoe set the records that Tom Brady would eventually eclipse. Bledsoe broke the Patriots' career passing records for attempts (4,518), completions (2,544) and yards (29,657). Keeping Brady from achievements would assure that Bledsoe would still hold the Patriots' single-season passing record for attempts (691) and completions (400) and would keep him as the only player in franchise history to pass for over 400 yards multiple times

Drew Bledsoe still holds the NFL record for attempts in a season (691 in 1994) and both attempts (70) and completions (45) in a game against Minnesota in 1994 that sparked a seven-game win streak. This propelled the Patriots to their first playoff berth in eight years. Bledsoe led the Patriots to the playoffs four times in his first six seasons, helping the team earn back-to-back division titles and three consecutive playoff berths for the first time in franchise history.

In 1996, he continued his great play by guiding the Patriots to their second AFC Championship in franchise history and a trip to Super Bowl XXXI. Bledsoe is the only quarterback in NFL history with

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four seasons of at least 600 pass attempts, including three-straight from 1994-96 with the Patriots. If he had not gotten hurt, he might still be playing for the Patriots. Well, maybe not but he would have lasted longer.

1994 Bill Parcells #12

The 1994 New England Patriots football team record was much improved at 10-6 giving them a 1st place finish (tied for first) in the AFC East Division and qualifying the team for the playoffs.

Robert Kraft as noted, purchased the team after preventing previous owner James Orthwein from moving the Patriots to St. Louis. Yes, folks, Robert Kraft kept the Patriots in New England. The team began the 1994 season with a 3–6 record before getting in gear and winning their final seven games, finishing 10–6 and qualifying the playoffs. Many see Bill Parcells as a miracle worker.

With Robert Kraft helping instead of hurting operations, it helps to remember that The Patriots were just two seasons removed from a 2-win record. They made the playoffs for the first time since 1986 and only the seventh time in the franchise history. It was also their first winning season since 1988. The winning streak started with a 26–20 overtime win over the Minnesota Vikings.

On Christmas Eve in week 17, the sixteenth game of this season at Chicago, the Patriots glided past the Bears W (13-3) before 60,178. Going into the game, Parcells knew that his team needed the win to make the playoffs. With little offense and a strong defense, the Patriots overtook the Bears 13–3, for their seventh consecutive win. They ended the regular season with a 10–6 record tied for first place in the AFC Eastern Division. It was their first playoff appearance since 1986 and their first double-digit win season since that year as well. The next game would be a repeat with Belichick's Browns

Wildcard Cleveland Browns v NE Patriots

In the AFC Wildcard playoffs, on January 1, 1995, the Browns defeated the Patriots L (13–20) before 77,452 at Cleveland. Their last

defeat had been at the hands of the Browns on Nov 6. After winning seven in a row the Patriots were flat in their 20–13 loss in their first playoff game since 1986. Drew Bledsoe had a tough time locating Patriot receivers and was picked off three times.

He did orchestrate a game-tying rally in the second quarter. Bledsoe attempted 50 passes but connected on just 22. Leroy Hoard and Earnest Byner together garnered 96 rushing yards. This total was more than the total of the entire Patriots offensive backfield (57 yards). The win was the first in a playoff game for Browns head coach Bill Belichick. A high note for The Patriots was a successfully executed onside kick. It would be almost ten years before the Patriots succeeded with another onside (2013). Coincidentally, this 2013 kick also would be against the Browns, but the next time Belichick would be on the kicking side of the ball.

1995 Bill Parcells #12

The 1995 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-sixth season of professional football and their twenty-sixth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Parcells in his third second of four years. This was the second year under new owner Robert Kraft who purchased full rights to the team in 1994. Bill Parcells in many ways served as GM. The Patriots record was not as positive and came in below 500 at 6-10 giving them a 4th place finish in the AFC East Division. This was Parcells 2nd-worst season. The Pats did not qualify for the playoffs.

1996 Bill Parcells #12

The 1996 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-seventh season of professional football and their twentyseventh season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Parcells in his last of four seasons. This was the third year under new owner Robert Kraft who purchased full rights to the team in 1994. Bill Parcells in many ways served as GM. Under Kraft in addition to being head coach.

The Patriots record was 11-5 and they finished in first place in the AFC East Division. This was Parcells best season. The Pats qualified for the playoffs and would take the challenge right to the Super Bowl. Bill Parcells would not return to the Patriots after the Super Bowl.

After a very disappointing 1995 season, Drew Bledsoe bounced back with confidence and 4,086 passing yards. He also threw 27 touchdown passes to just 15 interceptions while Curtis Martin had another outstanding Pro Bowl season. The team went the distance in the playoffs but then lost Super Bowl XXXI to the Green Bay Packers.

Team owner Robert Kraft and coach Bill Parcells had a good relationship that simply collapsed as Parcells was able to guide the team as he saw fit... until... In the NFL draft, Parcells was determined to draft a defensive lineman, but Kraft overruled him, giving head scout Bobby Grier the choice of a player. Receiver Terry Glenn was selected. Parcells stormed out of the Patriots draft war room after the choice was made and vowed to reporter Will McDonough that he was done with New England after 1996. He kept his word.

Despite this issue before the practice season even began, Parcells prepared the team for a championship as was his style. When the season got off to a poor start, the Patriots rallied from their 0–2 start to finish 11–5. They then proceeded to defeat the Pittsburgh Steelers and the upstart Jacksonville Jaguars to advance to Super Bowl XXXI. Though not a championship pr Super Bowl win per se, This was a great year. It was a Parcells year and few years are better.

The season saw the arrival of former Cleveland Browns coach Bill Belichick as an integral part of the coaching squad taking over the coaching of New England's defensive backs. This was the second time that Belichick had worked for Parcells and the two respected each other.

The date was February 16, 1996: Parcells and Belichick were accustomed to working with each other for years in the Patriots and Giants organization. It is no wonder that just one day after being fired as head coach of the Browns, Belichick was hired by Parcells as the Patriots' assistant head coach and secondary coach. We know from the record book that in the Giants organization the two brought championships when they worked together. In their only

season together with the Patriots, New England reached Super Bowl XXXI, losing to the Packers in the end. How about that?

The Rest of the story

Since a good part of the story about Bill Parcells is in this chapter and he is joined by Bill Belichick in 1996 and since Bill Belichick has such a great history with the New England Patriots, and we all know that Bill Belichick is the current highly successful New England Patriots coach... I would like to take the time now to tell you the rest of the story of Parcells and Belichick. It is far from over in 1996 and it is very interesting. It is also very germane as we go over the forthcoming great championship history of the New England Patriots.

Just five days after coaching the Patriots in the Super Bowl, on January 31, 1997, Bill Parcells stepped down as head coach. There was heavy speculation centering on Parcells, who had a reputation as a fixer, that the talented coach was on his way to New York, this time to coach the Jets.

Though Parcells had told him earlier in the year, he was finished, Patriots owner Robert Kraft did not want to have to replace the coach who had finally brought wins to the franchise. So, Kraft asked the NFL to review Parcells' contract and to step in and block him from coaching anywhere in 1997. The NFL sided with New England, and the ruling forbade Parcells from coaching anywhere else in 1997.

There is so much history in such a short period of time here that even long-time Patriots history buffs have some room for confusion. Though I knew for example that Pate Carrol would be the next coach, the conditions were perfect with Bill Belichick already on the scene for Robert Kraft to bring him in a few years earlier to be the new England Head coach. Instead, he hired Pete Carroll. Humph! These are really great, intriguing stories, don't you think?

Here's how it went down. We have been over some of this already. We know that Bill Parcells had already signed out from the Patriots after becoming frustrated with owner Robert Kraft's not permitting him to, as they say, "shop for the groceries" in compiling a roster, or at least having yes/no on names.

In early 1997 after the Super Bowl, Parcells and Robert Kraft agreed to disagree. Kraft wanted to maintain owner control of the roster but eventually agreed to a deal brokered by then-NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue, in which the New York Jets sent the Patriots four draft picks in exchange for Kraft releasing Parcells from his contract.

Parcells thus became the Jets' head coach, and Kraft was able to hire Pete Carroll to follow the legendary coach.

Rich Cimini, an ESPN staff writer offers this quote as to the value of simply having Bill Parcells become the coach of your team, even if no Super Bowl is forthcoming. Parcells had to be special when Bill Belichick kept signing up for refresher course lessons from the master. Cimini said:

"Before Bill Parcells arrived in 1997, the New York Jets provided plenty of fodder for David Letterman's Top Ten list. They were hilariously inept. Parcells changed that the minute he walked in the building. For that, the franchise's long-suffering fans should be eternally grateful."

For the record, Bill Belichick sometimes regrets his decision to bail from New England after the Super Bowl. It could have been both fun and productive (my words). It was not long ago that in an interview, Parcells told USA Today that he regretted quitting the New England Patriots after the '96 Super Bowl run. Why? "because it was a young, talented team still on the rise."

However, he was OK with his decision to leave the Jets when chances are he may have brought in another champion. He offered remorse and said he never second-guessed himself for leaving the Jets' job.

"No, I've never thought of that, I really haven't," Parcells said in a phone interview. "It's a transient business nowadays. There was new ownership, and you never know what's going to happen when that

happens. It was time where they could start again with their own philosophy and a new owner."

Going back to the original confusion in February 1997 the Jets had hired Belichick as their head coach and since Parcells was banned from coaching originally, the Jets skirted the rules and hired Parcells as a consultant. The Patriots were not happy playing against a Parcells team anyplace as they believed he should be coaching for New England.

They filed another NFL complaint asking that Parcells not be allowed to work at all for the Jets, but the negotiated Tagliabue deal eventually ended that dispute. By the time it was all over on Feb 10, 1997, Parcells was named Jets head coach and Belichick, a very loyal "friend" of Bill Parcells was named as his assistant coach.

Meanwhile back at New England, Pete Carroll was the man on the scene. The New England Fans were getting accustomed to great seasons. Carroll had just one year of NFL head coaching experience, having gone 6-10 with the Jets in 1994. Parcells had taken what might exaggeratingly be called a moribund New England franchise -one that hadn't been to the playoffs since 1986 and which had posted a meager 14-50 record in the four seasons before his arrival -- and he took the team to a Super Bowl. We begin three sections in the next chapter about the Pete Carroll New England experience

Finally, after three years of Pete Carroll, on Jan 3, 2000, New England fired Carroll and sends a fax to the Jets requesting permission to interview Belichick for its recently opened headcoaching job. However, Parcells retired as Jets head coach at the same time. "Bill's not coming back,"

Parcells said at the time. "You can write that on your chalkboard." The six-year contract Belichick signed with the Jets in 1997 called for him to be elevated to Jets head coach whenever Parcells decided to leave, preventing the Pats from speaking with him about their opening.

Belichick is a smart cookie and he did not want to be boxed into any job. So, on Jan. 4, 2000, he resigned as head coach of the New York Jets, one day after being elevated to the job. He was concerned and

said that it was questions about the Jets' future, including the team's impending sale that convinced him to leave:

"I just don't feel I can lead the Jets in the year 2000," Belichick said at the time. "I just know what I need to do. I just don't feel I can do it right now."

Knowing he was still boxed in, on Jan. 6, 2000, Bill Belichick filed a grievance with the NFL in an attempt to get out of the contract he had negotiated with the Jets. The NFL is owned by the owners not the coaches and so on Jan. 21, 2000, as expected, NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue ruled in favor of the Jets, rejecting Belichick's grievance.

Bill Belichick was not ready for slave labor encampment and so he filed suit against the Jets and the NFL looking for relief via a temporary restraining order. He wanted out of the Jets, and he wanted to be able to be free to negotiate with other teams who may have wanted him as their coach.

By January 27, 2000, it became an owner v owner and owner v NFL issue. Even before resolution, Belichick was named to be the head coach of the Patriots after New England and the Jets agreed on compensation.

The Patriots really wanted coach Belichick as they gave New York their #1 draft pick in the 2000 draft and a fourth-and seventh-rounder in 2001. The Jets gave the Patriots a # 5 in 2001 and a # 7 in 2002. Clearly the Patriots saw the same bright light of winning seasons and a winning mentality as Bill Parcells saw in Bill Belichick as Parcells mentored him in his early years.

Just like Bill Belichick is a smart man, so is owner Robert Kraft: "For a No. 1 draft choice, we can bring in a man that I feel certain can do something, rather than the uncertainty of a draft choice," Kraft said at the time. "And it wasn't even close when I thought about it that way."

The good connection continued as in Feb. 12, 2000, Scott Pioli, Parcells' son-in-law, who also served as the Jets' director of pro

personnel, was hired by Bill Belichick as the Patriots' director of pro personnel.

After having graduated several times from the Bill Parcells school of great football ideas and attitudes, and having been a major instructor, it was not a surprise that as the Patriots coach on February 3, 2002 both the newly charged Patriots and Bill Belichick would win Super Bowl XXXVI. Amen. There is no thing as luck when good strategy is employed.

Bill Parcells was not finished with his fixer career and he must have enjoyed it because he permitted himself to be hired again on Jan. 2. 2003. Enjoy the Parcells story in another book as he always helps the teams for which he works. It was the Dallas Cowboys.



On Oct 6, at Memorial Stadium in Baltimore, the Patriots beat the Ravens in a shootout W (46-38) before 63,569. At home in Foxboro Stadium on Oct 13, the Washington Redskins beat the Patriots L (22-27) in Foxboro Stadium before 59,638. On Oct 20, the Indianapolis Colts were defeated by the New England Patriots W (27-9) at the RCA Dome before 58,725. On Oct 27, the Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills W (28-25) at home in Foxboro Stadium before 58,858.

On Nov 3, the Patriots drubbed the Miami Dolphins W (42–23) at Foxboro Stadium before 58,942. In the Meadowlands, on Nov 10, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (31–27) before 61,843. On Nov 17, at home in Foxboro Stadium, the Denver Broncos overpowered the Patriots L (8–34) before 59,457. Then, on Nov 24, the Patriots beat the Indianapolis Colts W (27–13) at home in Foxboro Stadium before 58,226.

On Dec 1, the Patriots thumped the San Diego Chargers W (45–7) at Jack Murphy Stadium before 62,541. On Dec 8, the Patriots whipped the New York Jets W (34–10) at home in Foxboro Stadium before 54,621. Then, in the second-last game of the season in Texas Stadium, the Dallas Cowboys eked out a win L (6–12) against the Patriots before 64,578. In the finale, on Dec 21, the Patriots barely beat the New York Giants W (23-22) in a one-point match shown on NBC at 12:30pm in Giants Stadium before 65,387.

Nothing bad about Adam Vinatieri, K?



Adam Matthew Vinatieri was born on December 28. 1972, right after Christmas and before New Year's. He is still an active NFL placekicker for the Indianapolis Colts but for years he was a big star for the New England Patriots and he I responsible for many of their big wins and their biggest wins.

Vinatieri played in five Super Bowls: four with the New England Patriots and one with the Colts. Vinatieri won Super Bowls in 2001, 2003, and 2004 with the Patriots, as well as in 2006 with the Colts.

Among placekickers, Adam holds NFL records for most Super Bowl appearances (5) and most Super Bowl wins (4).

Additionally, he also holds NFL records, among all players, for most postseason points scored (234), and most overtime field goals made (12). He is the only player ever to score 1,000 points with two different teams. As of the 2017 season, Vinatieri, 45, is still healthy and active as the oldest player in the NFL.

As a kicker, he is almost at the top of all standings, yet he is #2. Morten Anderson has six more and so in the 2018 season. Vinatieri should become #1. Right now, he has converted the 2nd most fieldgoals in NFL history (553) as well as attempted the 3rd most fieldgoals in NFL history (655).

Vinatieri has been called "Mr. Clutch" by the media due to his reputation for success when kicking under pressure during his tenure in the NFL. His other nickname, "Automatic Adam" tells his story of unprecedented accuracy. He is also known as "Iceman" for his poise under pressure. I can't think of better nicknames for Vinatieri.

Vinatieri has converted several of the most crucial field goals in NFL history, including the game-tying and winning kicks in blizzard conditions in the famous "Tuck Rule Game", and game-winning kicks in the final seconds of two Super Bowls (XXXVI and XXXVIII)

Adam Vinatieri, or "Automatic Adam" as he became known, is probably just one of a handful of kickers who might make it into the top 15 in any franchise's history — much less the prodigious Patriots. That's a testament to just how good he was.

Vinatieri was a rookie in 1996, going to the Super Bowl with Bledsoe. He was along for the ride with Brady later on; he played the first 10 years of his career in New England and collected three Super Bowl wins — kicking game-winning field goals in two of them. Vinatieri later played for the Indianapolis Colts for 11 seasons, where he won another Super Bowl. Let's hope Adam beats the record in 2018.

How about a Patriots Stalwart named Tedy Bruschi

One of the names I cannot forget from watching the Belichick Patriots in the somewhat recent past is Tedy Bruschi. I would agree with others that he is the consummate Patriot during my time observing his expertise. It was for his entire 13 seasons in New England. It was so much for the Patriots that Coach Bill Belichick called him the "perfect player" at Bruschi's retirement press conference in 2009.

Bruschi was a nobody who was a somebody because he was never a nobody. He served as team captain seven times and his relentless work ethic, on-field intensity, and full-tilt-full-time approach set the tone for his team while making him a fan favorite in New England.

Bruschi was not born a Patriot but, like others in the franchise, he might have chosen to be so born. Bruschi was originally drafted by the Patriots in the third round of the 1996 NFL Draft. He played in his first of five Super Bowls that season and is one of a select few Patriots to own three World Championship rings. They don't give them out if you lose the game.

Bruschi as noted was a difference maker. In 13 seasons, he helped his teammates propel the Patriots to 11 winning records, nine playoff appearances, including eight as division championships, five conference crowns and those three Super Bowl titles. He hated to lose and fought to the tooth to make his team succeed.

In 211 career games (including regular-season and playoffs), the Patriots had a 144-67 (.682) record, including a 16-6 (.727) playoff mark with Tedy on the field. Bruschi earned his first Pro Bowl honor following the 2004 season after co-captaining a Patriots defense that allowed just 16.25 points per game, the third fewest in franchise history.



Bruschi loved playing for the Pats and still he had a knack for making big plays in critical situations. He is the only player in NFL history to return four consecutive interceptions for touchdowns and his career total of four picks returned for scores ranks second in Patriots history.

After Bruschi suffered a stroke in February 2005, a stroke that made all Patriots check out their vitals, he put together Tedy's Team." which is dedicated to raising funds and awareness to fight stroke along with the American Stroke Association.

The Playoffs

In the Divisional Playoffs on January 5, 1997, the Patriots defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers W 28–3 at 12:30pm at Foxboro Stadium before 60,188. In the Conference Championship on January 12, 1997, the Patriots defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars W 20-6 at 4:00pm in Foxboro Stadium before 60,190. This brought the Patriots to Bill Parcells Super Bowl XXXI game played on January 26, 1997,

against the Green Bay Packers in which they lost by two touchdowns L (21–35) at 6:00pm in the Louisiana Superdome before a crowd of 72,301

New England v Pittsburgh January 5, 1997

A SOUPER SUNDAY THE STEELERS WERE IN A FOG AGAINST THE PATRIOTS, WHO BEAT THEM AT THEIR OWN GAME By Austin Murphy

A switch had been made under cover of fog. How else to explain the New England Patriots' role-reversing 28-3 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers in Sunday's AFC divisional playoff? While the Patriots came into the game with a defense made up of competent unknowns, their Steelers counterparts arrived in Foxboro with a nickname--Blitzburgh--and a recent record of violence against quarterbacks.

In a wild-card playoff game on Dec. 29, Pittsburgh sacked Indianapolis Colts quarterback Jim Harbaugh four times, broke one of his teeth and opened a gash on his chin that required 15 stitches. But on Sunday, in a fog so dense that Foxboro Stadium resembled the inside of Hunter S. Thompson's head, the Patriots played like the Steelers while the Steelers played like the old Patsies.

Defending AFC champion Pittsburgh had the NFL's secondbest sack total (51) during the regular season, but it was the New England front seven (33 sacks in 1996) that generated the most heat on Sunday. The Steelers' quarterback combination of Mike Tomczak and Kordell (Slash) Stewart, rather than Patriots passer Drew Bledsoe, spent the afternoon serving as crash-test dummies.

Afterward, the New England defenders, an unheralded but steadily improving bunch, revealed their motivation: They were tired of hearing about, as defensive end Willie McGinest put it, "Slash this and Blitzburgh and the Bus [Steelers running back Jerome Bettis]."

Complementing their righteous indignation was a bold game plan in which the Patriots stunted and blitzed as aggressively as the Steelers usually do. New England also had luck on its side: The Bus had a bad wheel. Bettis suffered a tear in his right groin against the Colts and was listed as questionable for the Patriots game.

Last Thursday night he limped into his local Hooters restaurant to check out, among other things, the national championship game between Florida and Florida State. When a group of businessmen nearby lit cigars, Bettis, who is asthmatic, asked to be seated elsewhere. The waitress instead reseated the smokers. to whom Bettis apologized. "I would have moved," he said. "Oh, no," replied one man. "We wouldn't want you to aggravate your groin."

New England's defense was less solicitous, limiting Bettis to 43 inconsequential yards on 13 carries. Pittsburgh's quarterbacks were similarly ineffective. Tomczak completed 16 of 29 passes for 110 yards and two interceptions, and Stewart went 0 for 10, providing not his usual spark but rather a definitive answer to the question his fans have posed to Steelers coach Bill Cowher all season: Why don't you make Slash the starter?

Far more surprising than the flat performance of Pittsburgh's offense was the sight of Steelers defenders on their heels, missing tackles, wandering around in a fog in the fog. The NFL's second-ranked defense against the run was overrun. New England running back Curtis Martin's 166 rushing yards on 19 carries included a 78-yarder that put the Patriots on top 21-0 just five minutes into the second quarter. With such a comfortable lead, New England was able to stay out of predictable situations on offense, and thus out of Blitzburgh. As Steelers outside

linebacker Chad Brown said of the Patriots, "They became the dictators."

Actually, the dictators will square off in the AFC Championship Game this Sunday, when New England hosts the Jacksonville Jaguars, whose coach, the autocratic Tom Coughlin, was once an assistant under the Patriots' despotic Bill Parcells. Both men had ample opportunity to frown, scream and carry on in tyrannical fashion when their teams met in September. The Patriots won 28-25 in overtime but only after coughing up a 22-0 lead and surrendering two Hail Mary passes.

New England made effective use of the long ball against the Steelers. Mindful of Pittsburgh cornerback Rod Woodson's hyper-aggressive style, Bledsoe had suggested opening the game with a play-action bomb to speedy wideout Terry Glenn, who caught an NFL rookie-record 90 passes in the regular season. After resisting the notion at first, Parcells came around. The Patriots' first play from scrimmage, a 53-yard completion to Glenn, set up the first of Martin's three rushing touchdowns.

Odd thing about Martin: He has been a happier player this season even as his role in the offense has shrunk. Last season he rushed for 1,487 yards, was selected NFL Rookie of the Year and made the Pro Bowl. "And we won six games," he says. This season, with Bledsoe throwing so often to Glenn, Martin's rushing yardage dipped to 1,152. "And we're one game from the Super Bowl," he says. "I couldn't be happier."

After New England chose him in the third round of the 1995 draft, Martin asked for number 29, which he had worn at Pittsburgh's Allderdice High and the University of Pittsburgh. But that number belonged to cornerback Myron Guyton, so Martin took number 28. When he mentioned the switch to his pastor, Leroy Joseph of Pittsburgh's Faith Restoration Ministry, the pastor exclaimed, "Deuteronomy 28!"

Martin has marked that chapter with a yellow highlighter in his Bible, and he reads it before games. Sitting in one of the coaches' offices an hour after Sunday's victory, he read from it again, this time aloud. "The enemies who rise up against you will be

defeated before you. They will come at you in one direction but flee from you in seven."

While Martin immerses himself in the Book of Deuteronomy on Sunday, other Patriots will be concentrating on Hail Marys.

Conference Championship New England v Jacksonville January 12, 1997

Sometimes the stats are not on your side and you win the game. That's how it was for New England on January 12, 1997 in the Conference Championship against the Jacksonville Jaguars. The Patriots grabbed the 20-6 win after picking up just 234 yards compared to the Jags 289. However, they made up the difference by playing crisp defense, forcing four turnovers, including three consecutive takeaways on the last three Jacksonville possessions of the game.

The game started with some good omens for the Patriots. The Jags had to punt on their first possession. Worse than that, a high snap enabled defensive back Larry Whigham to "sack" punter Bryan Barker at the Jacksonville 4-yard line. Just a few "seconds" later, New England running back Curtis Martin scored a touchdown on a 1-yard run. After punt exchanges, New England put together a drive into Jaguars territory. However, defensive back Aaron Beasley picked off a Drew Bledsoe's pass at the 8-yard line to keep the score at 7–0 as the first quarter ended.

Jags made it a little closer in the second quarter on a Mike Hollis 32yard field goal that finished off a 13-play, 62-yard drive. The Jacksonville D then forced the Patriots to punt, but returner Chris Hudson fumbled after a big hit by Marty Moore. Mike Bartrum recovered for New England on the Jags 19-yard line. Adam Vinatieri scored a 29-yard field goal as a result of the turnover, making the score 10-3.

With 1:29 left in the half, Bledsoe led the Patriots down the field on a well-orchestrated 68-yard drive, completing a 19-yard pass to Shawn Jefferson, a 5-yard toss to tight end Ben Coates on fourth and 5, and then another completion to Jefferson. This moved the ball 38 yards to the Jacksonville 3-yard line. The Jaguars D stiffened and that was all New England could muster. So, Adam Vinatieri kicked his second field goal of the day bringing the score to 13–3 right before halftime.

Jacksonville was off after receiving the 2nd half kickoff, driving to the New England 31-yard line. But, they lost the ball when quarterback Mark Brunell was stuffed for no gain on fourth and 1. Three plays later, Bledsoe coughed up a fumble while being tackled by Kevin Hardy. LB Eddie Robinson recovered the ball for or Jacksonville on the Pats 37, which set up a 28-yard Hollis field goal. The score was then 13–6.

Half way through the fourth quarter, the Pats moved to the Jacksonville 23-yard line. They were ready to build a big lead, but Bledsoe was whacked for a 6-yard loss on third down and Vinatieri sent his 46-yard field goal attempt off to the left. Jacksonville then took the ball back and got to the New England 5-yard line. The Jags had no luck as with just under four minutes left in the game, defensive back Willie Clay picked off a Mark Brunell pass in the end zone.

NE did not move the ball and then, after the punt. Jacksonville mounted another drive for the tying touchdown with 2:36 left. They got no-place as they lost the ball on their first play. The fumble by James Stewart was costly. New England defensive back Otis Smith recovered the ball and returned it 47 yards for the game clinching touchdown, giving his team a 20–6 lead. Jacksonville got just one more possession, but it ended in a Tedy Bruschi interception.

The game went into the record books because of a number of reasons but notably because there was a power outage (due to the power use at and around the stadium due to very cold temperatures). It occurred just minutes before halftime.

It knocked out much of the lighting of the stadium, as well as most of the power in the surrounding community. (The television broadcast, however, was not affected, and it stayed on throughout the outage by using generators.) The Patriots won 20-6 and moved on to the Super Bowl in New Orleans on January 26.

Green Bay packed a punch against Patriots in XXXI

Think Deflategate was a distraction?

It's a good thing Twitter wasn't around when the Patriots were preparing for Super Bowl XXXI with coach Bill Parcells's imminent departure hovering like a thunder cloud over old Foxboro Stadium.

On Jan. 26, 1997, Parcells's 11-5 Patriots lost to Mike Holmgren's 13-3 Packers, 35-21, and five days later, the Big Tuna stepped down to become coach of the New York Jets. "It kind of clouded the run to the game, which is disappointing, because you get to that game and want to enjoy the ride," said quarterback Drew Bledsoe.

And what a ride it was.

In the first home playoff win in team history, Bledsoe and the Patriots defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers, 28-3, in a game Bledsoe remembered most for the thick fog that blanketed the stadium.

"The fog held the noise in and it was the loudest I ever heard that stadium," Bledsoe said.

The next week against the Jaguars, there was a brief power outage at the old stadium and the New England defense turned the lights out on the Jacksonville offense. Otis Smith's 47-yard

fumble return in the final minutes sealed a 20-6 AFC Championship victory.

In the Super Bowl, it was Reggie White and the Packers defense that worried Bledsoe.

After Green Bay took a 10-0 lead, Bledsoe answered with touchdowns on the next two drives, and it looked as if this would be a shootout between him and Brett Favre.

But the Packers scored the next 17 points before a Curtis Martin touchdown cut the lead to 27-21 in the third quarter.

Then Desmond Howard returned the ensuing kickoff 99 yards to bury the Patriots. New England never crossed midfield in the fourth quarter.

"That really took the wind out of our sails," Bledsoe said. "It's bittersweet. I'm still really proud of the fact we made it. The truth is I've never watched that Super Bowl. It's too painful."

1997 Pete Carroll #13

The 1997 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-eighth season of professional football and their twenty-eighth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Pete Carroll in his first of three seasons. Robert Kraft was the owner. The Patriots record was 10-6, one win less than

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Parcells' last year at the helm. The Patriots again finished in first place in the AFC East Division. They won the Wild Card game W (17-3) v the Miami Dolphins, and lost in the Division Playoffs in a tough match L (6-7) against the Pittsburgh Steelers. Pete Carrol got off to a fine start as New England's head coach

Pete Carroll replaced Parcells

It was no secret in January, when the Patriots were preparing to face the Green Bay Packers in Super Bowl XXXI, that head coach Bill Parcells was at least mentally preparing to move to another team after the game. Parcells beef was that he was not given enough control over personnel matters.

We have already discussed that in the 1996 NFL Draft, the fiery talented coach's relationship with owner Robert Kraft soured when Kraft selected wide receiver Terry Glenn against Parcells' wishes. When the Patriots lost to Green Bay in Super Bowl XXXI, Parcells resigned from the Patriots, using the phrase "If they want you to cook the dinner, at least they ought to let you shop for some of the groceries."

Pete Carroll took Parcells' place with the Patriots. Ironically, Carroll had been the Jets' head coach in 1994 and now, Parcells was the Jets' coach. Carroll's Patriots began the season 5–1 but featured a 6–5 record later in the season. The Patriots came back and finished 10–6 and sewed up first in the AFC East for the second straight season. With the third seed in the AFC playoffs, the Patriots defeated the Miami Dolphins17-3 in the Wild Card Game but, were defeated by the Pittsburgh Steelers, 7–6, on the road the next week. Again, let me say, it was a great start for Pete Carroll.

Games: In the season and home opener for Pete Carroll's Patriots on August 31, 1997 in Foxboro Stadium, the Patriots hammered the San Diego Chargers W (41–7) before 60,190. On Sept 7, at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis the Patriots beat the Colts W (31–6) before 53,632

At home on Sept 14, in Foxboro Stadium, the Patriots defeated the New York Jets W (27–24) in (OT) before 60,072. At home in

Foxboro on Sept 21, the Patriots whooped the Chicago Bears W (31–3) before 59,873. On Sept 28, the Patriots drew a bye week.

At Mile High Stadium in Denver on Oct 6, the Broncos defeated the Patriots L (13–34) before 75,821. Then, on Oct 12, at home in Foxboro Stadium, New England pummeled the Buffalo Bills W (33–6) before 59,802. At New York, on Oct 19 in The Meadowlands, the Jets won in a close match over the Patriots L (19–24) before 71,061. Then, on Oct 27, at home in Foxboro Stadium, Green Bay got the best of New England L (10–28) before 59,972

On Nov 2, at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minnesota, the Vikings triumphed L (18–23) before 62,917. Then at Buffalo's Rich Stadium on Nov 9, the Patriots at beat the Bills W (31–10) before 65,783. At Houlihan Stadium in Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers dominated L (7–27) before 70,479. At home again in Foxboro Stadium on Nov 23, the Patriots defeated the Miami Dolphins W (27–24) before 59,002.

On Nov 30, in Foxboro Stadium, the Patriots beat the Indianapolis Colts W (20–17) before 58,507. On Dec 7 at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium, the Patriots beat the Jaguars W (26–20) before 73,446. Back again at home in Foxboro Stadium on Dec 13, the Pittsburgh Steelers edged out the Patriots L (21–24) in (OT) before 60,013. In the final game of the 1979 season on Dec 22, at Joe Robbie Stadium in at Miami, the Patriots beat the Dolphins W (14–12) before 74,379.

AFC Wild Card Playoff Game Dec. 28, 1997.

Played at home in Foxboro Stadium, the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins W (17–3) before 60,041.

Checking out the regular season, it seemed like less than a week ago, the Patriots had narrowly slugged out a 14-12 defeated of the Dolphins in a tough defensive struggle. It was the last Monday night game of the regular season, and now six days later the two teams were at it again in the Wildcard playoffs.

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The Patriots' prevailed with a defense that held Miami to 162 total yards of offense, 42 rushing yards and forced three Dolphins turnovers. Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino completed only 17 of 43 passes for 141 yards and he was intercepted twice. He also fumbled the ball twice, coughing up the ball on one of them.

This was the first time in Marino's 15-year career (including 14 postseason games) that he did not throw a touchdown pass in a playoff game. The Patriots played without star running back Curtis Martin, and though they pulled out a win, the squad could only generate 228 offensive yards. Key to the win for the Patriots was their ball security. They avoided losing any turnovers for the entire game.

The first quarter was scoreless. Near the end of the quarter, Miami threatened a score with a drive to the Patriots 39, but they lost the ball when Karim Abdul-Jabbar (no relationship to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar) was tackled by Todd Collins and Lawyer Milloy for no gain on fourth and 1. The Pats then drove to the Dolphins 31-yard line, but also failed to score when Adam Vinatieri missed a 48-yard field goal attempt.

As the game progressed, Marino threw his first interception, which was returned 22 yards to the Dolphins 29-yard line by New England linebacker Chris Slade off a pass deflected by safety Larry Whigham, setting up quarterback Drew Bledsoe's 24-yard touchdown pass to receiver Troy Brown. New led at halftime, 7-0.

On the second play of the third quarter after the kickoff, Collins returned Marino's other interception 40 yards for a touchdown, making him the first Patriot to ever score on a postseason interception return. This was a big deal for after a punt, New England mounted the first long sustained scoring drive of the game. They pushed the ball down 67 yards in 15 plays.

Derrick Cullors carried the ball seven times for 42 yards on the drive. Drew Bledsoe added a 20-yard completion to Terry Glenn and Adam Vinatieri finished the scoring with a 22-yard field goal as there was 1:58 left in the third quarter.

Corey Harris returned the kickoff 40 yards and when Vinatieri tried the kick he suffered a late hit. Miami finally managed to score on their following drive, moving the ball 23 yards to the Patriots 20-yard line where Olindo Mare made a 38-yard field goal on the second play of the fourth quarter.

After Mare's field goal, Miami recovered an onside kick. However, cornerback Chris Canty sacked Marino, causing a fumble. Slade recovered the ball. Miami's last three drives of the game would result in a punt and two turnovers on downs. It was over.

Cullors, who only rushed for 102 yards during the season, was the sole offensive star of the game, with 86 yards on 22 carries and a kick return for 17 yards. New England would move on to the Divisional Playoffs.

AFC Divisional Playoff Game January 3, 1998.

Played at Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh, the Steelers managed to win a close game against the Patriots L (6–7) before 61,228

The Patriots suffered a devastating late-season home loss to the Steelers which meant the playoff rematch, if it were earned, would be played in Pittsburgh. Three plays into this game, Steelers cornerback Chad Scott intercepted Drew Bledsoe at the Steelers 11 and returned it to his own 38. Eight plays later, Pittsburgh faced a second-and-10 from the Patriots 40. Steelers mobile quarterback Kordell Stewart avoided a heavy pass rush and broke around the left end and up the sideline where it appeared he'd run out of bounds. On the play, Pats linebacker Todd Collins had a chance to knock him out but pulled up to avoid a penalty. No good deed goes unpunished.

Stewart had never stepped out, and so he raced down the sideline for the game's only touchdown. It was just 7-3 at halftime and it stayed 7-3 going into the fourth quarter. A well-placed 46-yard Adam Vinatieri field goal with 12:16 left in the game made it 7-6, but that is all the Patriots could muster.

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Late in the fourth, Pittsburgh drove to the Patriots 1-yard line and faced a fourth-and-goal situation. Rather than kick a field goal for a four-point lead, Pittsburgh elected to go for it and called on Stewart, who was stopped short of the goal line by Tedy Bruschi. The Patriots got the ball back on their own 1 with 3:24 left. They quickly moved the ball out of harm's way to the 42 with 1:50 to go. That's when the game was ended. A future Patriot, Mike Vrabel seemed to be unblocked and he came right in and sacked Drew Bledsoe, forcing a fumble. Steelers linebacker Jason Gilden recovered the loose ball to basically end the game.

1998 Pete Carroll #13

The 1998 New England Patriots football team competed in their thirty-ninth season of professional football and their twenty-ninth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Pete Carroll in his second of three seasons. Robert Kraft was the owner. The Patriots record was 9-7, one win less than the prior year. The Patriots finished in fourth place in the AFC East Division. They made the playoffs and lost the Wildcard game against the Jaguars, L (10-25). That ended the 1998 season for the Patriots.

1998 Playoff Games – Wildcard

It was Jacksonville v New England again and this time it was Jacksonville taking the honors. Nothing worth having is easy. Making it to the playoffs in fourth place with a 9-7 record is a good thing for any team. But, when good fortune comes your way, you need to back it with good performance. That was the missing ingredient.

And, so, Jaguars Running back Fred Taylor ran for 162 yards and a touchdown as the Jags won their first home playoff game in team history. Jacksonville kicker Mike Hollis popped in four field goals while the opposite luck befell the Patriots. E.G. running back Robert Edwards, who rushed for 1,115 yards and nine touchdowns during the season, was held to 28 yards on 17 carries.

Bad luck came at the start also as The Patriots had a star QB, Drew Bledsoe, and a great receiver, Terry Glenn as well as a linebacker, Ted Johnson who could not suit up and thus could not score any points. The Jaguar's Hollis opened up the scoring with two field goals. The second one was set up by a 46-yard run by Taylor and followed two overthrown passes by quarterback Mark Brunell to receiver Keenan McCardell and running back George Jones, who were both wide open in the end zone.

Brunell did struggle throughout most of the game, finishing with just 14 of 34 completions for 161 yards but his team won the game. In the second quarter, Taylor took off on a 21-yard run giving his team a first down on the Patriots 34-yard line. Four plays later, he scored on a 13-yard touchdown run. The Jaguars had a 12–0 lead after a failed 2-point conversion attempt.

Jacksonville got another chance to score when cornerback Aaron Beasley recovered a fumble from Edwards on the Jags 49-yard line. New England's defense tightened up and forced a turnover on downs at the Patriots 23-yard line, and the score would stay at 12-0 going into halftime.

In the third quarter, Patriots substitute quarterback Scott Zolak got a rally going. First, he led New England 85 yards, including a 21-yard completion to Troy Brown on third and 9, on a drive that consumed 8:48 off the clock and ended with a 1-yard touchdown run from Edwards.

There was a quick punt, and Brown returned it 17 yards to the Patriots 46-yard line, where the team proceeded to drive to the Jacksonville 9. Following a dropped pass by tight end Lovett Purnell on third down, Adam Vinatieri's 27-yard field goal cut the lead to 12–10.

However, on Jacksonville's next possession, Brunell threw a pass to receiver Jimmy Smith, who managed to break past defensive back Ty Law and make a 37-yard touchdown catch in the back of the end zone. After a punt from each team, Jacksonville lineman Joel Smeenge forced a fumble while sacking Zolak that defensive end Tony Brackens recovered on the Patriots 25-yard line. This set up

Hollis' third field goal. The expert licker added a fourth field goal to close out the scoring after the Patriots turned the ball over on downs deep in their own territory on their next possession. Then on New England's final play, to add insult to injury. Zolak was intercepted by safety Chris Hudson.

As of 2017, this was the only time the Jaguars had defeated New England, regular or postseason. It would also be the Patriots' last playoff loss until 2005.

1999 Pete Carroll #13

The 1999 New England Patriots football team competed in their fortieth season of professional football and their thirtieth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Pete Carroll in his last of three seasons. Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 8-8—again it was one win less than the prior year. The Patriots finished tied for fourth place in the AFC East Division.

He's won for New England six Super Bowl Championships and has been awarded the coach of the year title 3 times. Belichick has created a culture of winning in New England, one that demands perfection from every member of the team. He's established the Patriots as a true dynasty and placed them near the top of best franchises in the NFL. In many ways, Belichick should be the model for coaching methodologies for any coach of any sport.


2000 Bill Belichick #14

The 2000 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-first season of professional football and their thirty-first season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his first of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 5-11—three wins less than Pate Carroll's last year. The Patriots finished in fifth place (last) in the AFC East Division. The Patriots did not qualify for the playoffs this year. Bill Belichick would move the Patriots way out of the cellar in future years.

Tell us about Tom Brady, QB

His full name is Thomas Edward Patrick Brady Jr. He was born on August 3, 1977). His occupation is a National Football League football quarterback for the New England Patriots. Tom Brady is the

best active football player in the game and there are those what might say he is the best all time football player ever.



He is the only player to win six Super Bowls (the closest at five was defensive player Charles Haley) and he is the only player to win them all playing for one team, the indescribable New England Patriots.

He played college ball at the University of Michigan. Afterwards, he was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2000 NFL Draft. Because he was drafted so late, Tom Brady is looked upon today as being the biggest "steal" in the history of the NFL Draft.

Drew Bledsoe, a great NE QB in his own right was leading the Patriots when Brady became available and so he did not start right away. During the second game of the 2001 season, Bledsoe was hit by New York Jets linebacker Mo Lewis and suffered a sheared blood vessel in his chest - which almost resulted in his death. Replacing Bledsoe, backup Tom Brady took the starting position and led New England to the playoffs and he's been leading New England ever since

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It took Drew Bledsoe 51 days to be cleared to play again but by that time Tom Brady had developed a rhythm with the team that any coach would not look to disrupt. The great news for the team and for Bledsoe was that for the first time in 51 days, he was cleared to play football. Because of team dynamics, the only question that seemed to remain was when, though some who were fully tuned into Brady's excellent performance in relief might also have added the question, "If?"



In the "51-day" press conference Bledsoe let it be known how he felt: "I'm itching to get back in there," Bledsoe said. "I feel healthy, I'm putting weight back on – I'm about 10 pounds from where I was when I got hit – I feel strong and I've been working out for the last couple of weeks and I feel great." Bledsoe had also been seen by five specialists, who all agreed with the current plan of care. Drew Bledsoe was ready to take over if that's what the coach was to decide. Bledsoe felt for sure that he deserved a chance to recapture his starting job, but he also understood that in pro-football, there were no guarantees.

Bledsoe said: "" have to prove it again. I have to prove that I'm the best guy to go out and win football games... "The team's done great and Brady's played excellent football and I'm ecstatic about that. At the same time, it's been bittersweet because I'm not out there. But I

have to make it difficult for Brady to stay on the field by playing better."

It would not be easy for coach Belichick. The Head Coach said that he expected Brady to take the majority of the snaps the first week in practice and start Sunday's game. The most likely scenario for Bledsoe would be for him to regain his form in practice this week and slowly work his way back into the picture. So, what happened back in 2001 that shaped the future that we see today? Well, oneweek later Bill Belichick announced that Tom Brady was his man for the rest of the year. That ended that—or so it seemed. The pundits were second guessing all over the place.

Jonathan Cohn of slate.com offered this poignant summary of Bledsoe's choices after hearing the coach's verdict. "If Bledsoe really wants to stay with the Patriots—and, to his credit, he's been the epitome of a loyal, club-friendly athlete for his entire stay in Foxboro—he's welcome to take a pay cut. Otherwise, he should go. Harsh? Perhaps. But that's the new reality of the NFL. Someday, the Tom Brady decision will turn out to be an object lesson too. There was no guarantee that Tom Brady was not a flash in the pan, but he was surely filling the bill for the time being.

There was a big plus for the Patriots by letting Bledsoe go. M-O-N-E-Y. No Bledsoe would take \$7.5 million per year contract off the books. In 2001, Brady was making only \$300,000 per year. This savings from the salary cap would be able to free up money for a desperately needed offensive lineman or two, plus a playmaker at wide receiver.

Technically, because of the complicated rules of the cap, the Patriots could get rid of Bledsoe next year or the year after without taking a debilitating hit, though it depends in part on how they would pass him off. In other words, when you are trading proven greatness at quarterback for four or five starters, there is a lot to gain.

Even if Brady turned out to be mediocre, all the new extra quality players would more than likely make the transaction a net winner for the Patriots, and the best and surest way to turn this year's squad—which is performing far beyond its talents into a real

dynasty...into a real serious Super Bowl contender. Well, we know what happened don't we.

By the way, Drew Bledsoe did all right for himself, just not in a Patriot's uniform. He spent three years with Buffalo and two years with Bill Parcells, his old coach at Dallas. He did great at QB for his former division rival Buffalo. He was rejuvenated in 2002. He had one of his best seasons ever, passing for 4,359 yards and 24 touchdowns and making his fourth trip to the Pro Bowl. Drew Bledsoe was a fine QB.

In Tom Brady's 20 seasons as a starter, (anticipating 2019), he quarterbacked the Patriots to eleven Super Bowl appearances, the most for any player in the history of football. He has been honored with four Super Bowl MVP awards (Super Bowl XXXVI, XXXVIII, XLIX, and LI), the most ever by a single player, has won three league MVP awards (2007, 2010, 2017), has been selected to 14 Pro Bowls, has been all-pro 3 times, and has led his team to more division titles (16) than any other quarterback in NFL history. Bill Belichick had a tough personal decision re Bledsoe but he had a great football decision to make. Two great talents.

Now at the end of the 2018 regular season, Brady is fourth all-time in total career passing yards, tied for third (with Drew Brees) in career touchdown passes, and third in career passer rating. His career postseason record is 27–10, winning more playoff games than any other quarterback, and he has appeared in more playoff games than any player at any position. Brady has never had a losing season as a starting quarterback in the NFL. His combined regular-season and postseason wins are also the most of any quarterback in NFL history. Because of his accomplishments and accolades, many analysts and sportswriters consider Brady to be among the greatest quarterbacks of all time.

A cursory of Tom Brady's superlative football statistics cannot be cursory because the list goes on and on and on and on. Let me just give you a peak at what I am talking about and I ask you to consider that these are just a few career highlights. There are a ton of them and there are also huge lists of season highlights, and game highlights. Many books can be written about Tom Brady for sure and they would all be exciting.

As the late, gret Yul Brynner would say, Etc. Etc. Etc.

2001 Bill Belichick #14

The 2001 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-second season of professional football and their thirty-second season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his second of nineteen seasons (sofar). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 11-5. They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, advanced to the Super Bowl and won the World Championship in Bill Belichick's second year at the helm. Things would never be the same

What an amazing year. A Super Bowl XXXVI victory after a 5-11 fifth (last) place finish. In the span of one season, the New England Patriots under Bill Belichick went from the last to the first—from the worst in the league to the best in the league

If expectations were realized, the Patriots would still be waiting for this Super Bowl Victory as nobody expected such great things after the 2000 season. But, it came nonetheless.

Things began with bad news on August 6, when QB coach, Dick Rehbein, died of cardiomyopathy at the young age of age of 45. In the second game of the regular season, nine-year starting QB, Drew Bledsoe, who had received a 10-year contract extension in March, was injured after a big hit by New York Jets linebacker Mo Lewis. To replace Bledsoe, backup Tom Brady, who was a sixth-round draft pick in 2000, got the call to finish the game.

The Patriots did not come back and found their record at 0–2, after the second game. Tom Brady was spot on and he was durable and able to start the final 14 games of the season. His record as a starter was 11–3. He surely answered the call. His great play and Belichick's tenacious coaching combined to propel the Patriots to a clinch of the 2nd seed in the AFC playoffs and a first round bye. It was one for the record books as the Patriots became only the 2nd

team in NFL history to win the Super Bowl after starting the season 2–3, behind the 1980 Oakland Raiders.

With a great push in the AFC playoffs, the Patriots faced-off against the Oakland Raiders at home in Foxboro Stadium after a first-round bye in the final game at Foxboro Stadium. It was in a snowstorm, when a Patriots drive late in the fourth quarter was kept alive in an application of the now-famous tuck rule.

This rule was used in overturning a Brady fumble into an incomplete pass. Shortly after the ruling, Adam Vinatieri pounded in a 45-yard field goal through the snow. This went down as one of the most clutch field goals in NFL history, and it sent the game into OT. In OT, another Vinatieri field goal won the game.

After defeating the top-seeded Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Championship Game, the Patriots faced the heavily favored St. Louis Rams. The game became known as "The Greatest Show on Turf", aka Super Bowl XXXVI. Guess how it ended? Once again, Vinatieri kicked a game-winning field goal. This 48-yarder sailed through the uprights as time hit all zeroes. Exciting!

This kick and all the play beforehand, gave the Patriots their first ever Super Bowl victory in what has been considered by many to be a "Cinderella" season. This of course means that the situation in which New England engaged enabled them to achieve far greater success than would reasonably have been expected.

Though Bill Belichick was respected by the many coaches in the league, he was an unknown to most fans across the US and the globe. He had always been the man behind Bill Parcells but this accomplishment this year was all-Belichick. Tom Brady, a 6th round draft pick from Michigan at QB was another unknown. He was expected to be groomed and be able to take over some time over the next ten years as Drew Bledsoe played as many of his ten contract years as he could.

As it would turn out the 2001 season served as a launching pad for the team, the once unknown coach, and the once unknown star quarterback. In the next 16 seasons, this combination would win their division 14 times, win the AFC Championship 7 more times,

win 4 additional Super Bowl titles, and achieve an undefeated regular season (followed by a 2–1 playoff record) in 2007. How's them apples?

In the season opener at Paul Brown Stadium in Cincinnati, on Sept 9, the Bengals defeated the Patriots L (17–23) before a crowd of 51,521. In the home opener at Foxboro Stadium, in the last year the Stadium would be used for Patriot games, on Sept 23, the New York Jets defeated the NE Patriots L (3-10) before 60,292. At home in Foxboro Stadium on Sept 30, in Tom Brady's first start, the Patriots clobbered the Indianapolis Colts W 44–13 before 60,292, Then, at Miami on Oct 7, the Dolphins thumped the Patriots L (10–30) at Pro Player Stadium before 72,713.

At home in Foxboro Stadium on Oct 14, the Patriots defeated the San Diego Chargers W (29–26) in (OT) before 60,292. At Indianapolis on Oct 21, the Patriots scorched the Indianapolis Colts W (38–17) before a crowd of 56,022. At Denver, on Oct 28, the Broncos defeated the Patriots L (20–31) at Invesco Field at Mile High Stadium before 74,750. At Atlanta's Georgia Dome, on Nov 4, the Patriots beat the Falcons W (24–10) before 44,229.

On Veterans day, Nov 11, 2001 the Patriots beat the Buffalo Bills W (21–11) at home in Foxboro Stadium before 60,292. At home, on Nov 18, the St. Louis Rams defeated the Patriots L (17–24) in Foxboro Stadium before 60,292. At home on Nov 25, the Patriots neutralized the New Orleans Saints W (34–17) in Foxboro Stadium before 60,292. At New York, on Dec 2, the Patriots nosed out the Jets W (17–16) in Giants Stadium before 78,712.

At home on Dec 9, New England belted Cleveland W (27–16) at Foxboro Stadium before 60,292. At Buffalo on Dec 16, the Pats beat the Bills in OT W (12–9) at Ralph Wilson Stadium before 45,527. On Dec 22 at home, New England defeated Miami W (20–13) at Foxboro Stadium before 60,292. In week 16, on Dec 29, the Patriots drew a bye. In week 17. The season finale on January 6, 2002 at Carolina, the Patriots slammed the Panthers W (38–6) before 71,907. Because the Patriots won the AFC East Championship, they drew a bye in the Wild Card Playoffs.

End of Season Playoff Game Summaries

East v West

In the East v West contest at 8:00 pm on EST January 19, 2002, the Patriots defeated the Oakland Raiders in OT W (16–13) at Foxboro Stadium in a packed house of 60,292.

The Boston Globe always sees things on the side of New England or we would stop buying the paper. Here is their crisp summary of this great game:

"Because it was a beautiful sendoff for Foxboro Stadium. Because it was a football game played in a snow globe. Because the Tuck Rule was the correct interpretation of a silly rule. Because East Boston's Jermaine Wiggins caught 10 passes in the snow, as if he'd played in the stuff his entire childhood. Because J.R. Redmond was everything Kevin Faulk would eventually be, Tom Brady earned his first postseason pelt, and Adam Vinatieri was good, so good, from 45 to tie and 23 to win. Because it's when a decade of greatness officially began."

Conference AFC v NFC

In the Conference Championship, at 12:30 pm on EST January 27, 2002 at Pittsburgh, the NE Patriots beat the Steelers W 24–17 at Heinz Field before 64,704.

PITTSBURGH - Quarterback Drew Bledsoe hoisted the AFC Championship trophy and pumped it three times on the podium as teammates, owner Robert Kraft, and coach Bill Belichick waved,

pumped their fists, and soaked in an improbable moment in an improbable season.

Players were hollering and screaming with joy and happiness. Feelings of accomplishment, and some of revenge, flowed like the champagne that was tactfully absent as the Patriots celebrated a 24-17 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers yesterday at Heinz Field, putting them into Super Bowl XXXVI in New Orleans.

In the end safety Lawyer Milloy, one of several players who want to complete unfinished business from the Super Bowl in New Orleans after the 1996 season, got his respect from the perhaps-overconfident Steelers.

Belichick got to the Super Bowl with the Patriots again, this time as the head coach, not a Bill Parcells underling.

Bledsoe, who entered the game in the second quarter in relief of Tom Brady (injured ankle) and led the Patriots to a quick score and eventually a victory, just stood crying. The tears were flowing freely, and when he caught a glimpse of his father, Mac, he lost it completely. Tom Brady exited the game after suffering an injury in the first half. From Bledsoe nearly dying on a hit by the Jets' Mo Lewis, to losing his job to Brady when he was ready to play, to returning after four months of inactivity to direct the Patriots in the AFC Championship game?

Quite a fairy tale, folks.

"You never disrespect anybody," said Milloy, who chastised the Steelers at a press conference Friday for talking about Super Bowl plans and overlooking the Patriots.

"You just make it hard on yourself. I'm just surprised the veterans on that team didn't shut the younger guys' mouths on that team. It was a momentum-builder for us. We rallied around that, and in the end, we were the AFC champions."

Kraft said he congratulated his team on a great season.

"This is the true meaning of team," said Kraft. "We never talk about individuals here."

He did say of Belichick, "[He] was worth everything we gave up to get him two years ago."

The message was sent early - at the coin toss, in fact - when the Steelers' Jerome Bettis started to talk trash. Bryan Cox, a Patriots defensive cocaptain, got in his face immediately.

"I just wanted to make a point that we were not backing down," Cox said. "He started talking about how he was ready and all this and that, and I said, 'Jerome, this ain't what you're gonna be looking for today.'

When Josh Miller banged a 47-yard punt late in the first quarter, the Patriots' Troy Brown fielded it and raced up the middle, going 55 yards for a touchdown. Adam Vinatieri's extra point made it 7-0 with 3:42 remaining in the first.

"It was supposed to be a left return, but the guys overplayed it to the outside, and I saw the seam up the middle and we just hit it," said Brown, who knew he had to make a big play and got a nice block by Tedy Bruschi. "It was just a great play by the punt-return team."

Just before the punt return, Brown's third for a touchdown this season, Miller had lofted a 64-yarder that Brown opted not to field and allowed to scoot past him to the 23. But Steelers special-teamer Troy Edwards was called for running out of bounds, and the officials forced another punt.

Terrell Buckley had chased Edwards down the sideline, perhaps causing him to step out of bounds.

"It's not something I did by design, but if I can crowd him and make him go out, that's a legitimate call," said Buckley. "We got the repunt and Troy did the rest."

The Steelers began their drive after Brown's punt return at the 24. On their second play, Kordell Stewart got loose for a 34-yard gain after hurdling Milloy in the backfield. That got the ball to the New England 38. Four plays later, he had the Steelers first and 10 at the Patriots 13. But New England's tough red zone defense stiffened, as Anthony Pleasant sacked Stewart for a 2-yard loss and then good coverage by Otis Smith on Plaxico Burress for an incompletion forced the Steelers to settle for a 30-yard field goal by Kris Brown.

Brady completed 12 of 18 passes for 115 yards before leaving the game. He faced constant pressure from linebacker Jason Gildon, who was all over the field. Late in the first half, Brady sprained his ankle when Lee Flowers crawled over a body and rolled into the back of his legs. No penalty was called.

Bledsoe entered with 1:40 remaining in the first half and hit David Patten on a 15-yard pass to the Steelers 25 for a first down. He was forced to run for 4 yards, and Chad Scott's big sideline hit, knocking Bledsoe way out of bounds, looked eerily like the Lewis blast in the second game of the season. The officials did not throw a flag, because even though Scott left his feet, Bledsoe was not yet out of bounds when he was crunched.

Bledsoe, who cut his chin on the play, got right back up, and appeared fired-up. He found Patten for 10 yards to the 11, and then threw a beauty of a TD pass to Patten in the right corner of the end zone with 58 seconds remaining. His play after all that time off was nothing short of extraordinary. "He gets very few reps," said offensive coordinator Charlie Weis. "I'd say he should be proud. That's a pretty hard thing we asked him to do."

It was 14-3 at the half, and who could have scripted it? Belichick was asked if Brady could have continued.

"He could have gone back out and played, but I just felt like the way things were going we were better at that point in time [with Bledsoe]," the coach said. "We were better with a healthy Drew Bledsoe with not knowing where Tom was with his injury."

Stewart drove the Steelers to the Patriots 16 in the third quarter but had to settle for a field goal attempt. Kris Brown, who has been shaky this season, had a 34-yard attempt, but Brandon Mitchell fought through his blocks and came in with his hands up, blocking the ball. Troy Brown, the epitome of Belichick's "Be Alert" mantra during the week, picked up the loose ball and ran 11 yards before lateraling to safety Antwan Harris. He went the remaining 49 yards for the score, giving the Patriots a 21-3 lead.

Troy Brown scooped up the bouncing ball after Kris Brown's field goal attempt was blocked. The Patriots scored a touchdown on the play.

"I saw Antwan coming, over my shoulder, and he was screaming my name," said Brown. "From there, I just wanted to make sure it was a lateral, and he did a great job. It worked out great for us." Mitchell was screaming and laughing all the way down the field. "I had so much fun out there," the lineman said. But the game was far from over.

With Bettis ineffective (8 yards on 9 carries), Stewart took to the air. He found The Bus on an 11-yard hookup, then connected with Hines Ward for 24. What turned into an eight-play, 79-yard drive was capped by Bettis's 1-yard run with 5:11 remaining in the third quarter, making it 21-10.

A momentum shift was in progress. On the next series, the Pittsburgh defense toughened. J.R. Redmond dropped a pass and Bledsoe was sacked by Gildon during a three-and-out series.

The Steelers got a 28-yard return on a 38-yard punt by Ken Walter to the New England 32. It took five plays and an 11-yard run by Amos Zereoue to make this a too-close 21-17 game late in the third. Vinatieri nailed a 44-yard field goal early in the fourth, creating a 7-point advantage. Linebacker Joey Porter missed a Bledsoe pass thrown right to him, which he could have walked in for a touchdown, midway through the fourth.

A huge Tebucky Jones interception of Stewart foiled another Steelers attempt late. Vinatieri missed a 50-yarder to the left with 2:21 left, but the Patriots held on, compiling the first eight-game win streak in team history.

"We did it, we did it, Mr. Kraft," screamed Otis Smith as the game ended and the field became a sea of Patriots.

"We're going back again," yelled Willie McGinest. "And this time, we're gonna win it."

Super Bowl XXXVI

*** This goes down as one of the best games in Patriot Football – Game Winning Field Goal ***

The Game Winning Field Goal in this Super Bowl (36) (XXXVI) against the Rams in 2002 was historical. This game had a huge impact on the Patriots as a franchise. From the top, it was the beginning of a Tom Brady we're all now accustomed to watching.

You may recall that the Rams had just tied the game at 17 - 17 with a little over a minute left in the fourth quarter. Despite being young and out of timeouts, Brady knew what was at stake and he methodically drove his team down the field to set up the gamewinning field goal. So much more importantly, this victory marked the beginning of what today is the Patriots dynasty. This group of can-do players transformed from simply a good team, to the team to beat, a role that they've now held for basically an entire decade.

The SB XXXVI kickoff was at 5:30 pm CST February 3, 2002. Led by first-year starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichick-led NE Patriots defeated. the St. Louis Rams in the Louisiana Superdome before 72,922. Smiles were reported being observed on all of the Patriot Players, even the coaches, even Bill Belichick! Owner Bob Kraft like many, had a difficult time containing his pleasure after working so hard for such a result. Please enjoy this game recount from the Boston Globe's Nick Cafardo. Patriots shock NFL, defeat Rams to win Super Bowl

Final-second field goal caps historic upset

Tom Brady led the Patriots to a win in Super Bowl XXXVI. NEW ORLEANS - "The Impossible Dream" has a new meaning in Boston sports lore.

Maligned, disrespected, and disbelieved, the New England Patriots won Super Bowl XXXVI last night, 20-17, over the highly favored St. Louis Rams at the Superdome. And, not surprisingly, they did it on the final play of the game.

Adam Vinatieri settled the score with a 48-yard field goal as time expired, sealing one of the biggest upsets in NFL history and completing one of the all-time worst-to-first stories.

"We shocked the world," summed up veteran cornerback Otis Smith.

It was the latest in a succession of games that cast the Patriots as the underdog, but once again they outcoached, outsmashed, and outwilled the opposition. It did not matter that they were playing a team with the fastest players in football and one of the greatest offenses in NFL history. The Rams were unable to use their speed because they found themselves on the turf, face-down, so often.

And in terms of intangibles such as will, desire, and heart, the Patriots were through the roof.

The players hugged and kissed in jubilation on the Superdome turf, celebrating the first league championship since the organization's inception in 1960. It took Bill Belichick just two years to win the

championship, which comes a year after his team finished in last place in the AFC East with a 5-11 record.

Young Tom Brady (16 of 27, 145 yards, one TD, no interceptions) calmly directed the Patriots to the winning score after the Rams had tied the game, 17-17, with 1:30 remaining. With short passes of 5, 8, and 11 yards to J.R Redmond, plus key completions to Troy Brown and Jermaine Wiggins, Brady directed the no-huddle offense with no timeouts. He took the Patriots from their 17-yard line to the Rams' 30, setting up Vinatieri with 7 seconds left.

"It's just an overwhelming feeling," said Brady, the Super Bowl MVP in his first year as a starter. "I can't describe it. It's everybody just playing together like we have all season, overcoming the odds."

A clutch kick was nothing new for Vinatieri, who nailed a 45-yarder in a snowstorm to set up an overtime victory over the Oakland Raiders in these playoffs. He won three games - including the one against Oakland - with overtime field goals this season.

"They blocked great up front, the snap and the hold were great," said Vinatieri. "Once I kicked it, I knew it was good. I looked up and it was time to celebrate."

"We thought before the game he had 55-yard range," said Patriots offensive coordinator Charlie Weis. "That guy has been unbelievable."

Vinatieri's heroics came after the Rams rallied behind league MVP Kurt Warner to tie the game with two fourth-quarter touchdowns after falling behind, 17-3. All of the Patriots' scoring to that point was set up by turnovers. New England picked off two passes - one of which was returned 47 yards for a touchdown by Ty Law - and recovered one of the Rams' two fumbles.

The Rams had no takeaways.

The first line of Weis's play chart for the game read, "Take Care of the Ball. No Turnovers."

He said, "How many did we have? That's right. None."

When the Patriots got the ball back with 1:21 left, Weis and Belichick had a short conversation and decided to go for the win rather than take their chances in overtime.

"They had the momentum and we had to stop their momentum and win the game," said Weis. "We needed to play to win."

After the Patriots built a 14-3 halftime lead - on Law's return and an 8-yard TD pass to David Patten - the Rams appeared to be getting into a rhythm midway through the third quarter. But Otis Smith picked off a Warner pass after Torry Holt fell down, setting up a 37-yard field goal by Vinatieri that made it 17-3.

On their first drive of the fourth quarter, the Rams moved to a fourth-and-goal from the 3, when Warner made a dash for the end zone himself. A jarring hit by Roman Phifer knocked the ball loose at the 2, and Tebucky Jones grabbed it and bolted all the way for an apparent touchdown return.

But Willie McGinest was called for holding Marshall Faulk, and the Rams were given the ball on the 1, first and goal. Two plays later, Warner took it in for his team's first touchdown.

"I'm not the referee, so I don't know if it was holding or not," said McGinest. "I played him the same way all game. It was disappointing at the time, but my teammates told me to forget about it and go to the next play."

The Patriots went from having a 24-3 lead to having a 17-10 lead.

The Rams appeared fired up. Their defense smothered the Patriots on the next series. Defensive end Leonard Little, who hadn't been heard from often, hurried Brady into a bad throw on third and 2. Brady, who had played mistake-free and looked poised for much of the game, looked frazzled on that series.

After a Ken Walter punt pinned the Rams deep in their own territory, McGinest soon redeemed himself with about 4 minutes to go when he sacked Warner for a 16-yard loss after the Rams had driven to the Patriots' 39. Warner threw incomplete to Holt on third down, and the Rams chose to punt instead of going for it with less than four minutes to go.

"It felt good because it took them out of field goal range," said McGinest.

But the Rams defense held again, and Warner got the ball back with 1:51 to go. It took him just three plays to tie it, hitting Proehl with a 26-yard scoring pass.

But St. Louis left enough time for Brady and Vinatieri to work their magic.

The Patriots' stunning 14-3 lead at halftime came despite a sluggish offensive performance.

The Rams scored the only points of the first quarter - a 50-yard Jeff Wilkins field goal - as the Patriots looked for a big play or a big mistake. They got both in the second quarter, courtesy of their defense.

Warner dropped back to throw with 8:49 remaining in the half, but all he saw was linebacker Mike Vrabel closing in. Vrabel had faked substitute right tackle Rod Jones, who was playing with a strained right groin, and managed to hit Warner as he released the ball. The pass, intended for Isaac Bruce, went instead to Law, who ran unimpeded 47 yards to give the Patriots a 7-3 lead.

"I never saw Vrabel," said Law, "but I knew we were going to pressure him. I was just out there waiting for the play to unfold, so to speak, and the ball just came my way and I took it in."

With less than two minutes left, Warner completed a slant to Proehl, but Antwan Harris knocked the ball loose with a nice hit as Proehl was falling to the turf. Terrell Buckley chased the ball down and returned it to the Rams 40.

The Patriots offense clicked just in time.

Brady hit Brown on an inside route for 16 yards to the 24, connected with Wiggins for 8, and pitched to Kevin Faulk for 8 more down the left sideline. On first and goal from the 8, Brady tossed a soft pass over Dexter McCleon's reach into the hands of Patten, who made a circus catch as he tumbled in the corner of the end zone.

The Patriots walked off with the shocking 14-3 halftime lead, and the Rams never really recovered.

"That's a hell of a football team we just played," said Smith. "But we're No. 1 in the world and in the NFL."

And that is why they now have dibs on the "Impossible Dream" label.

Maybe forever!

2002 Bill Belichick #14

The 2002 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-third season of professional football and their thirty-third season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his third of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 9-7 after their Super Bowl victory. They finished in second place in the AFC East Division and did not make the playoffs.

After stoking away their victory in Super Bowl XXXVI just seven months earlier, the Patriots had to face the reality of again being a competitive football team, not a bunch of championship players ready to tip their hats for applause. Baptism of fire was when they played their first game in their new Gillette Stadium in the NFL's prime-time Monday Night Football opener against the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Patriots ate the fire and were ready for more.

They soon had won two more to begin the season, including a 44–7 road womping against the division rival New York Jets. Life does not always stay good. The Patriots went forward and lost five of its next seven games, allowing an average of 137 rushing yards a game during that span. Temporarily, they forgot their roots and Bill Belichick was well aware of what he needed to do.

In the final week of the season, the Patriots defeated the Miami Dolphins on an overtime FG by Adam Vinatieri to give both teams a 9–7 record. Ironically, it was just a few hours later when the Jets, who had defeated the Patriots the week prior, also finished with a 9–7 record with a win over the Green Bay Packers.

Due to their record against common opponents, the Jets won the tiebreaker for the division title, which unfortunately eliminated the Patriots and Dolphins from the playoffs. As of 2017 this was the last season the Patriots failed to win at least 10 games. That is how good the Belichick / Brady combination was, is and still is.

2003 Bill Belichick #14

The 2003 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-fourth season of professional football and their thirty-fourth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his fourth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner.

The Patriots record was 14-2. They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, advanced to the Super Bowl and won the World Championship in Bill Belichick's fourth year at the helm. Bill Belichick, like his mentor, Bill Parcells had learned to make a habit of winning the big ones. The 14-2 record was the best record ever at the time for a Patriot's squad under any coach.

In rapid fire succession, Bill Belichick brought his charges and fans another Super Bowl this season, just two seasons after winning Super Bowl XXXVI. In 2002, the team had a bit of a letdown, but the Patriots rolled into 2003 ready for game after missing the playoffs in 2002.

Thirty-one to zip became the bookend score for the beginning game and ending game of the season. Losing 0-31 in the first game, and then winning 0-31 against the Bills in both games, the fans were looking to Rod Serling for an explanation, but he had passed away in 1975. The last win gave the Patriots a perfect 8–0 record at home in the regular season as noted, the 14–2 season was a club record. In fact, it was the first time the Patriots ever won more than 11 games in a season.

After a first-round bye in the AFC playoffs, the Patriots faced the Tennessee Titans at home in one of the coldest games in NFL history and won, setting up an AFC Championship Game matchup with the Indianapolis Colts. The top-seeded Patriots intercepted Colts quarterback Peyton Manning, the league's co-MVP, four times, winning 24–14 and advancing to Super Bowl XXXVIII against the Carolina Panthers.

With a tied game late in the fourth quarter, Adam Vinatieri kicked the game-winning field goal with seconds remaining, giving the Patriots their second Super Bowl victory in three seasons. Vinatieri was one heck of a big weapon for the Patriots throughout the years.

In the season opener on Sept 7, 2003 at Buffalo, the Bills pounded the Patriots L (0–31) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. At Philadelphia on Sept 14, the Patriots beat the Eagles W (31–10) at Lincoln Financial Field. On Sept 21, the Patriots defeated the New York Jets W (23–16) at home in Gillette Stadium. Then, at Washington, on Sept 28, the Redskins edged out the Patriots L (17–20) in FedEx Field. With a 2-2 record, New England had gotten all their bumbles out for the season. The next twelve games would be all wins.

5 On Oct 5, New England defeated Tennessee W (38–30) at home in Gillette Stadium. At home on Oct 12, the Patriots beat the New York Giants in Gillette Stadium. At Miami on Oct 19, the Patriots

beat the Dolphins W (19–13) in OT at Pro Player Stadium. At home on Oct 26, New England defeated the Cleveland Browns W (9–3) in Gillette Stadium.

At Denver on Nov 3, the Patriots defeated the Broncos W (30–26) in Invesco Field at Mile High Stadium. On Nov 10, the team drew a bye. On Nov 16, the Patriots shut out the Dallas Cowboys W (12–0) at home in Gillette Stadium. At Houston, on Nov 23, the Patriots beat the Texans in OT at Reliant Stadium W (9-2). At Indianapolis on Nov 30, the Patriots defeated the Colts W (38–34) at the RCA Dome.

On Dec 7, New England defeated Miami at home W (12-0), in Gillette Stadium. On Dec 14, at home, the Patriots beat the Jacksonville Jaguars W (27–13) at Gillette Stadium. At New York on Dec 20, the Pats beat the Jets W 21–16 at Giants Stadium. In the season finale, on Dec 27, in the second Buffalo bookend game, the Patriots whooped the Bills W (31–0) at home in Gillette Stadium, thereby finishing a great regulars season of 14-2. The Patriots then went on to the playoffs

This game began at 8:00 PM on January 10, 2004 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 4 °F, and it was clear and very cold. There was a packed house at the new stadium of 68,436.

This playoff round goes down in pro football history as one of the coldest games in NFL history. Nonetheless, it was a home game and the Patriots did what had to be done to win the game. Steve McNair of the losing Titans put on quite a show and was named co-MVP.

He was more difficult for the Patriots than the bitter cold. In the end, the Patriots had to count on yet another clutch field goal from kicker Adam Vinatieri late in the fourth quarter, coupled with a stiff defensive stand.

Tom Brady started like a ball of fire with a 19-yard completion to Kevin Faulk with his first pass attempt. A few plays later, the Titans defensive forced him to burn a well-spent timeout. On the very next play, Brady tossed a 41-yard TD pass to Bethel Johnson. McNair wasted no time moving the Titans.

It began with a 15-yard completion to Derrick Mason, followed by a 24-yard pass to RB Eddie George, taking the ball to the Patriots 22-yard line. The Patriots' Roman Phifer almost ended the drive by intercepting a pass from McNair, but it was called back. Lineman Richard Seymour was penalized for roughing the passer and the Titans got the ball back with a first down on the New England 9-yard line. Two plays later, Chris Brown took it in on a crisp 5-yard touchdown run to tie the game.

After the kickoff for the TD, Tom Brady completed two passes to Dedric Ward for 30 yards. It was part of a 38-yard drive to the Titans 26-yard line. The drive ended with no points when Adam Vinatieri missed a 44-yard field goal attempt. On the very next play, safety Rodney Harrison intercepted McNair and returned the ball 7 yards to the Patriots 43-yard line. Brady clicked on four of six passes for 49 yards and rushed for 3 more on the way to a 1-yard touchdown scamper by Antowain Smith. This gave the Patriots back the lead. less than two minutes into the second quarter.

Later in the 2nd period, the Titans drove 51 yards in nine plays to the Patriots 13-yard line. This drive featured a 29-yard completion from McNair to Mason. But New England's defense stiffened to keep the Titans out of the end zone. They then blocked Gary Anderson's 31-yard field goal attempt.

After the 2nd half kickoff, early in 3Q, McNair moved the Titans on a 70-yard scoring drive with 5 straight completions for 59 yards, followed by an 11-yard touchdown pass to Mason. The rest of the third quarter was scoreless.

Half way through the fourth quarter, Troy Brown's brought a punt back 10-yards, giving the Patriots great field position at the Titans 40-yard line. They did not move the ball well and the drive stalled. Vinatieri then popped in a 46-yard field goal, giving New England a 17–14 lead with 4:02 left in regulation.

The Titans were not done. They took the ensuing kickoff and drove to the Patriots 33-yard line. After two penalties, including a 10-yard intentional grounding call and a holding penalty, pushed them back 20 yards. McNair threw an 11-yard completion, but after that, Drew Bennett dropped a potential first down catch on fourth down and 12, and the Titans turned the ball over on downs with 1:38 left. The Patriots left the field as victors ready to move to the Conference Championship game.

*** This goes down as one of the great moments in Patriots football ***

The event is known as the "Snow Kick" against the Raiders in the 2002 AFC Divisional Round.

This game is infamous and has many implications. On the final drive of regulation, Charles Woodson strip sacked Tom Brady, which ultimately led to a Raiders recovery. However, the call was overturned under the notorious tuck rule. But, tuck rule aside, this was a great game of football. Adam Vinatieri hit two clutch field goals in the snow!

The first one, which occurred shortly after the tuck rule, was from 45 yards out! A kick from that distance isn't even easy to hit in clear weather conditions, but to do it in the pouring snow, that's something. Vinatieri's second kick came in OT and sealed the Patriots victory, a victory that went on to become a Super Bowl Championship. These kicks cemented Vinatieri as a top placekicker, with ice in his veins (that must explain why he kicks so well in the snow).

Sunday January 18, 2004

AFC Championship: New England Patriots 24, Indianapolis Colts 14

This game began at 3:00 PM on January 18, 2004 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 32 °F, and it was cloudy with occasional snow. There was a packed house at the new stadium of 68,436.

New England's offense did not have to show for most of the game but they did anyway. The defense was compelling, allowing only 14 points, intercepting four passes, recording four sacks, and forcing a safety. That is a major mission accomplished.

Although New England's offense was not much better, they did outscore the Colts 24-14. Yet, they were only able to put up one touchdown. It was steady eddy ice-man Adam Vinatieri's five field goals that made up for the difference as the Patriots won, 24–14, to advance to their second Super Bowl appearance in just three seasons.

After the opening kickoff, the Patriots scored on their first try, driving the ball 65 yards in 13 plays. Tom Brady was hot, completing four passes to receiver David Givens for 40 yards on the drive, including a 7-yard touchdown pass. The Pats also converted a fourth down on their own 44-yard line with a Brady authored 2-yard run.

Peyton Manning seemed immediately prepared to counter. He advanced the team 68 yards to the New England 5-yard line, but he did not close the deal and on third down and 3, he was intercepted

by Rodney Harrison in the end zone. After the interception, the Patriots moved 67 yards to the Colts 13-yard line. Vinatieri put in a 31-yard field goal to increase the Pats lead to 10–0.

New England's defense continued to dominate the Colts in the second quarter. On the first play after the ensuing kickoff, Law intercepted a pass from Manning and took it six yards to the 41-yard line. The Patriots then began another drive. This was 52 yards and when it stalled, they increased their lead to 13–0 with a second Vinatieri field goal.

Brady completed three passes for 42 yards on the drive, including a 17-yarder to Givens and a 16-yard completion to Troy Brown on fourth down and 8. For the first time in the entire postseason, the Colts were forced to punt on their next drive. Not being good at punting for lack of practice, the snap from center Justin Snow sailed over the head of punter Hunter Smith. The ball went into the end zone, and Smith was forced to knock it out of bounds for a safety, thus making the score 15–0. The Colts had to kick off to the Patriots.

They got the ball back quickly. The Colts had a great chance to score when defensive back David Macklin recovered a fumble from receiver Bethel Johnson three plays after the free kick, giving Indianapolis a first down on the Patriots 41-yard line. Five plays later, Harrison forced a fumble while tackling Marvin Harrison, and cornerback Tyrone Poole recovered it.

Down 15–0 at halftime, the Colts finally began to get some stuff done in the third quarter. First, Dominic Rhodes returned the second half kickoff 35 yards to the 49-yard line. After this, running back Edgerrin James was the major instrument in a 52-yard scoring drive, carrying the ball on seven of 12 plays for 32 yards and capping it off with a 2-yard touchdown run. This cut the score to 15–7. The Patriots were in charge the rest of the quarter.

After Patrick Pass brought the ball back on the kickoff 21 yards to the 43-yard line, Tom Brady got in gear, completing passes to Larry Centers for 28 yards, Brown for 17, and Kevin Faulk for 8. This action set up Vinatieri's third field goal making the score 18–7.

Indianapolis was three and out after the kickoff and forced to punt. The Patriots Antowain Smith then rushed four times for 53 yards on New England's next chance with the ball bringing the pigskin to the Colts 3-yard line. Adam Vinatieri then kicked his fourth field goal.

Two plays after the next kickoff, Law grabbed his second interception from Manning on the Colts 31-yard line. But this time, the Patriots failed to score any points as defensive back Walt Harris picked off a Brady pass in the end zone.

After the turnover, the Colts took off on a 57-yard drive to the New England 31-yard line. But then Peyton Manning uncorked his third interception to Law with half of the fourth quarter remaining. After the Colts forced a punt, Manning took over and brought the Colts back, completing eight of nine passes for 64 yards and capping the drive with a 7-yard touchdown pass to Marcus Pollard. There were now just 2:22 left in regulation.

The Colts failed to recover their attempted onside kick attempt but forced a Patriots punt with 2:01 left. At this point the Patriots defense stopped Manning, forcing four consecutive incompletions, forcing the Colts to turn the ball over on downs.

After making Indianapolis use up all of their timeouts, Vinatieri's fifth field goal increased the Patriots lead to 24–14. The Colts attempted one last desperation drive, but it too failed as they turned the ball over on downs again with seven seconds left in the game.

Brady was on the mark for 22 of 37 passes for 237 yards, a touchdown, and an interception. Smith rushed for 100 yards. Pollard caught six passes for 90 yards and a touchdown. Rhodes returned five kickoffs for 121 yards, rushed for 16 yards, and caught two passes for 17 yards.

Colts players would later publicly complain that the game officials did not properly call illegal contact, pass interference, and defensive holding penalties on the Patriots' defensive backs. This, and similar complaints made by other NFL teams, would prompt the NFL during the 2004 offseason to instruct all of the league's officials to strictly enforce these types of fouls.

The games against the Colts marked one of the greatest rivalries ever in any professional sport. It was classic Peyton Manning versus Tom Brady. Two of the best quarterbacks to ever play the game competing against one another time after time throughout the primes of their careers.

But this game wasn't about Brady, it was about Ty Law. Manning was coming into his own this season, proving to the league he had an arm to be reckoned with. However, after Law's amazing one-handed interception, Manning appeared rattled. Three picks later (2 more going to Law), and a final score of 24 – 14 Patriots, proved Manning wasn't ready for the big stage yet. But, he would be soon.

Super Bowl XXXVIII

The SB XXXVIII kickoff was at 6:25 EST February 1, 2004. Led by first-year starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichick-led NE Patriots defeated. the Reliant Stadium, Houston, TX. before a packed house of 71,525.

HOUSTON -- And that, ladies and gentlemen, is why a couple of billion people around the globe are hooked on sport. Hype doesn't matter. Prognostications don't matter. Talk doesn't matter. When the game starts, performance is all that matters, and the two teams playing in Super Bowl XXXVIII gave everything they could possibly summon, sometimes from who-knows-where, to produce what may very well go down in history as the greatest of all Super Bowls.

Even Bill Belichick took note. "That was a terrific football game to watch," said the coach whose team gave him a 32-29 victory that makes him a two-time Super Bowl championship mentor. "But it was not a terrific game to coach. I was having a heart attack out there."



These teams sure gave us a decent bang for the buck. For a game that remained scoreless longer than any previous Super Bowl, it turned into a wild west shootout with 61 points over the last 33 minutes, with the subplot being the greatest quarterback duel the title game has ever seen. Game MVP Tom Brady played the game we've come to expect (32 of 48, 354 yards, 3 touchdown passes, and 1 near-disastrous interception), but he had to be an MVP-type because Panthers counterpart Jake Delhomme made the most improbable personal in-game turnaround ever.

After starting out 1 for 9 with huge negative yardage, he connected on 15 of his final 24 passes, good for 323 yards and three TDs. He accomplished what neither Steve McNair nor Peyton Manning could, eating up huge chunks of real estate against a suddenly baffled Patriots defense that was helpless to stop him.

Like, what happened?

"They made some nice adjustments," acknowledged defensive coordinator Romeo Crennel. "We played a little bit more conservative in the second half, but they made adjustments and found some soft spots in our zone."

"We just started moving around, hitting seams," said Carolina veteran wideout Ricky Proehl, who caught the tying touchdown with 1:08 remaining. "We started getting into a rhythm, and they got a little tired."

Once the offenses got rolling, the defenses had no answer. "It was supposed to be defense vs. defense," said Patriots offensive coordinator Charlie Weis, "but it turned out to be offense vs. offense." It meant the coordinators did what they had to do, which, in the Patriots' case, meant utilizing linebacker Mike Vrabel as a pass receiver in the red zone. Vrabel drifted out of the line of scrimmage to catch a 1-yard touchdown with 2:51 remaining.

"136 X-cross Z-flag," explained Vrabel. "The play was put in, and I knew on that one I'd have a chance."

The defenses simply lost control of the game, which suddenly turned into an Indianapolis-Kansas City shootout, completely unlike anything the Patriots had engaged in all year. Sure, they had to hold off the Colts in that famous 38-34 game Nov. 30, but they had been ahead, 31-10, before they got careless and Manning got hot. Once this one got rolling, it was a matter of "Can you top this?"

"Two good, tough football teams," said Vrabel. "It was Ali-Frazier. We hit them. They hit us. We hit them. They hit us. But I'll take my chances with Tom Brady, Troy Brown, David Givens, and Adam Vinatieri any day of the week."

It was, frankly, a humbling experience for both defenses.

"It was a horrifying game," acknowledged Ty Law, who found himself on the field with the likes of Asante Samuel and Shawn Mayer after regulars Rodney Harrison (broken arm) and Eugene Wilson (hip flexor) were forced out of the game. "Both defenses were tired. We knew it would come down to the end and we knew we'd have the advantage because we have Adam Vinatieri."

Oh, him. After missing a 31-yard try and having another one blocked, Vinatieri was summoned to the field in a virtual instant replay of the proceedings in New Orleans two years ago. He, of course, knocked the Super Bowl-winning field goal right down Broadway, or whatever happens to be the main drag in Rapid City, S.D. And in another deja-vu-all-over-again scenario, Proehl was once again a member of the victimized team.

"I will have nightmares about Adam Vinatieri for a long time," Proehl acknowledged.

There really is no way for the participants to have grasped just what they were a part of. It just doesn't work that way, because it's just too hard doing it, let alone analyzing it. The one thing the Patriots know is that they have some key people to trust when things get sticky, like, say, with 1:08 remaining and the score tied at 29.

"Tom's a winner," acknowledged Belichick. "The quarterback's job is to do what he needs to do to help his team win, and that's what Tom does."

And Troy Brown. He is the most flat-out reliable Patriot receiver ever. He's not the most talented, but he is the most reliable.

"I want the ball in the big situations," Brown said. "A lot of people depend on me, and I don't want to let them down." He came through when he had to, as did David Givens, as did Tom Brady, as did Adam Vinatieri.

"We made one more play than they did," said Law with a smile.

What they all did, Patriots and Panthers alike, was elevate sport into something noble. Lawdy, Lawdy, was this a football game, or what?

2004 Bill Belichick #14

The 2004 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-fifth season of professional football and their thirty-fifth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his fifth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 14-2.

They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, advanced to the Super Bowl and won the World Championship in Bill Belichick's fourth year at the helm. Bill Belichick, like his mentor, Bill Parcells had learned to make a habit of winning the big ones. The 14-2 record tied the best record ever (2002) at the time for a Patriot's squad under any coach. This was the Patriots second straight 14–2 record before advancing to and winning Super Bowl XXXIX, their third Super Bowl victory in four years.

There is always room for improvement and with players getting a year older every year, eventually, positions need to be refreshed. After the 2003 Super Bowl win, the Patriots looked to improve their running game in the offseason. Replacing Antowain Smith with longtime but disgruntled Cincinnati Bengals running back Corey Dillon was their major option. He was acquired in a trade days before the 2004 NFL Draft. It was a good move. Dillon would rush for a career-high 1,635 yards in 2004.

The Pats won their first six games of the season. With this, they set an NFL record for consecutive regular season victories (18), which was later broken by the 2006–2008 Patriots (21), and consecutive regular season and playoff victories before losing to the Pittsburgh Steelers on October 31. In that game, Pro Bowl cornerback Ty Law injured hos foot and was lost for the season.

Just two weeks earlier, the team had lost the services of the other starting cornerback Tyrone Poole. And, so, the Patriots were forced to complete the regular season and playoffs by using second-year cornerback Asante Samuel, undrafted free agent Randall Gay, and longtime Patriots wide receiver Troy Brown at cornerback, among others.

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Their 14–2 record was excellent, and they gained second seed in the AFC playoffs. And, so, New England defeated the Indianapolis Colts at home in the playoffs for the second-straight year. They held the Colts' top offense to three points. The Patriots kept it rolling by then defeating the top-seeded Pittsburgh Steelers on the road, 41–27, in the AFC Championship Game.

Prior to the Patriots' matchup with the Philadelphia Eagles in Super Bowl XXXIX, Eagles wide receiver Freddie Mitchell was heard saying that he did not know the names of the Patriots' defensive backs. This was taken as a sign of disrespect by the Patriots' "replacement" secondary. The Patriots would go on to defeat the Eagles 24–21 in their second straight Super Bowl victory and third championship in four seasons, leading to some labeling the Patriots of the era a sports dynasty. Of course; they were!

Games of the 2004 season

In the home and season opener on September 9, 2004, the New England Patriots defeated the Indianapolis Colts W (27–24) in Gillette Stadium. At Arizona on Sept 19, the Patriots defeated the Cardinals W (23–12) in Sun Devil Stadium. Sept 24 was a bye. At Buffalo on Oct 3, the Patriots beat the Bills W (31–17) in Ralph Wilson Stadium. At home on Oct 10, the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins W (24–10) at Gillette Stadium.

At home on Oct 17, New England defeated Seattle W (30–20) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct 24 at home, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (13–7) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct 31, the Patriots suffered their first loss after 18 wins in a row at the hands of the Pittsburgh Steelers L (20–34) at Heinz Field. At St. Louis, on Nov 7, the St. Louis Rams were thumped by the Patriots W (40–22) at the Edward Jones Dome.

On Nov 14, the Patriots whipped the Buffalo Bills W (29–6) at home in Gillette Stadium. At KC, on Nov 22, 2004, the Pats beat the Chiefs W (27–19) at Arrowhead Stadium. At home, on Nov 28, the Patriots hammered the Baltimore Rayens W (24–3) in Gillette

Stadium. Then, on Dec 5, 2004 at Cleveland, the Patriots smashed the Browns W (42–15) at Cleveland Browns Stadium.

At home on Dec 12, in a one TD match, the Patriots defeated the Cincinnati Bengals W (35–28) in Gillette Stadium. At Miami on Dec 20, in a one-point match, the Dolphins nosed out the Patriots L (28–29) at Pro Player Stadium. At New York on Dec 26, the Pats beat the Jets W (23–7) at Giants Stadium. Then, in the final game of the 2004 season, on Jan 2, the Patriots finished the season with a 14-2 record, their second in a row, by beating the San Francisco 49ers W (21–7) at home in Gillette Stadium.

This game began at 4:30 PM on January 16, 2005 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 25 °F, and it was cloudy and snowing. There was a packed house at the new stadium of 68,756.at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts.

There was a New England snowstorm going on at Foxborough on January 16 that day and early evening when Bill Belichick and the Patriots set their mind on dismantling the league's highest scoring team. The Patriots forced three turnovers and held the Indianapolis Colts to just 276 yards and 3 points. It was the Colts lowest point production since their opening game of the 2003 season.

Peyton Manning, who is a tough player with bad luck in the playoffs, suffered his seventh loss in Foxborough, even though he had more yards passing than Tom Brady did in the game. The Patriots limited Manning to 238 passing yards with 1 interception and no touchdowns, and Edgerrin James, the Colts star runner, to just 39 rushing yards.

Though the score could have been higher for the Patriots, they also achieved an "A" for ball control. They held possession of the ball for 37:43, including 21:26 in the second half. Additionally, they orchestrated three long scoring drives. Each drive took over 7 minutes off the clock. New England running back Corey Dillon, was called upon for major duty in his first career playoff game. He had suffered through 7 losing seasons as a member of the Cincinnati Bengals. In the playoff game, Dillon was nothing less than spectacular, rushing for 144 yards and catching 5 passes for 17 yards.

Both teams depended on their defenses to dominate early, as the first five possessions of the game ended in punts. After that, the Patriots put together a 16-play, 78 yards scoring drive that took 9:07 off the clock. They should have scored but they lost a touchdown when Dillon's 1-yard score was overturned by a penalty and they brought out the kicking team. Adam Vinatieri came through with a 24-yard field goal to give the Patriots a 3–0 lead.

When New England got the ball next, a 42-yard run by Dillon set up another Vinatieri field goal, bringing the Patriots lead to 6–0. The Colts were not crying uncle and instead responded with a drive to New England's 39-yard line. However, linebacker Tedy Bruschi ended their opportunity by forcing a fumble and then recovering it from Dominic Rhodes, who had coughed it up.

After a Patriots punt, Peyton Manning got in gear and led the Colts 67 yards to a Mike Vanderjagt field goal, cutting the score to 6–3 going into halftime.

After a Bill Belichick half-time pep-talk, the Patriots dominated the second half. The team held the ball for nearly all the available regulation time during two long drives. After a highly criticized Indianapolis punt on 4th and 1 from the New England side of the field, the Patriots were not about to give up the ball. Instead the team drove 87 yards in 15 plays, consuming 8:16 of clock time. The drive ended with a Tom Brady 5-yard touchdown pass to David Givens.

After the kickoff, the Colts began another drive, but it fizzled. Hunter Smith then took the game in his hands and feet with a well hit 54-yard punt that pinned New England back on their own 6-yard line. But the Patriots were ready to march and so they shrugged off their starting field position to begin their advance.

They stormed down the field on a 14-play, 94-yard drive that ate up another 7:24 of precious clock time. Dillon rushed for 35 yards and caught a pass for 9 on the drive. This included a 27-yard run on third down and 8, while Tom Brady finished it all off with a 1-yard touchdown run. And, so the Patriots had a 20–3 lead with just over 7 minutes left in the game.

Two plays after the next kickoff to the Colts, safety Rodney Harrison stripped the ball from Reggie Wayne and Bruschi recovered it. The Patriots were then able to take a lot more precious time off the clock. Indianapolis responded with a drive to the Patriots 20-yard line, but Harrison intercepted Manning's pass in the end zone with 10 seconds left to wrap up the contest.

This game is another classic Manning versus Brady battle! Although truthfully, the game was underwhelming considering the final score, it did speak volumes for the respective quarterbacks' careers. Manning had great regular season stats and went on to win the MVP that year. Unfortunately, in another playoff battle with his rival Brady, he fell short. He had yet to win the big time.

The difference in the two quarterbacks became a matter of poise. Brady methodically ran the offense on numerous possessions, ate up large chunks of the clock, and didn't cause any turnovers. Inversely, Manning was unable to get any rhythm going and threw off target passes throughout the game.

One could argue the Patriots' defense played a major role in Manning's performance, and certainly, it did, but this game was greater than that. The pundits saw this game as representing a career trajectory of success for Brady over Manning.

AFC Championship: New England Patriots 41, Pittsburgh Steelers 27

This game began at 6:30 PM on January 23, 2005 at Heinz Field in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The weather was 11 °F, and it was cold and fair. There was a packed house of 65,242 at Heinz.

Even for football, the temperatures in Pittsburgh during this game were raw, hovering around 11 °F (–12 °C). As far as record cold goes, this was the second-coldest game ever in Pittsburgh and the coldest ever in Steel City playoff annals. Despite the cold being owned by Pittsburgh, the Patriots delivered rookie Ben Roethlisberger his first loss as a starter after a 14-game winning streak. This was the longest win streak by a rookie QB in NFL history.

The Patriots helped Pittsburgh score a big record this year. The Steelers became just the second NFL team ever to record a 15–1 record and fail to reach the Super Bowl. The Patriots converted four Pittsburgh turnovers into 24 points, while committing no turnovers themselves. The Patriots' win also prevented an all-Pennsylvania Super Bowl from being played.

The Steelers were set back on their heels in the first quarter and they never fully recovered from their poor 1Q performance. The Patriots were on their game with defensive back Eugene Wilson intercepting Roethlisberger's first pass of the game on his own 48-yard line. This set up Vinatieri's 48-yard field goal giving the Pats a 3–0 lead.

Pitt responded by taking the ball to the Patriots 39-yard line. But then the "Bus" lost a fumble while being tackled by Roosevelt Colvin. Mike Vrabel recovered the loose ball. On the next play, Tom Brady threw a 60-yard touchdown pass to receiver Deion Branch and there was still time left in 1Q.

With 1:28 left, the Steelers cut their deficit to 10–3 with Jeff Reed's 23-yard field goal. But after an exchange of punts in the second quarter, Branch caught a 45-yard reception on Pittsburgh's 14-yard line. Two plays later, Tom Brady tossed a 9-yard touchdown pass to David Givens. When the Steelers got going again, safety Rodney Harrison picked off a Roethlisberger pass and took it back 87 yards for a touchdown. This gave Patriots a 24–3 lead at halftime.

Bam, Bim, Boom! The scoring did not stop almost right when the second half began until three consecutive touchdowns were on the books. New England was forced to punt on the opening drive of the third quarter, and Antwaan Randle El returned the ball 9 yards to the Steelers 44-yard line. The Steelers receiver caught two passes for 46 yards as they drove 56 yards in five plays. Jerome Bettis finished the drive with a 5-yard touchdown run, cutting their deficit to 24–10.

New England answered back by moving the ball 69 yards in seven plays and scoring with Corey Dillon's 25-yard touchdown run. But Pittsburgh responded, driving 60 yards in ten plays and scoring with Roethlisberger's 30-yard touchdown pass to Hines Ward.

After forcing a punt, Randle El returned the ball 22 yards to the Steelers 49-yard line. On the drive, Ward's 26-yard reception on the last play of the third quarter set up Reed's second field goal, making the score 31–20. Now there was 13:32 left on the clock.

On cue. the Patriots took over the rest of the quarter. They came back with a 49-yard drive that used 5:26 and ended with a Vinatieri

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31-yard field goal. Two plays after the kickoff, Wilson intercepted another pass from Roethlisberger at New England's 45-yard line.

The Patriots subsequently advanced down the field on another long scoring drive. This forge took 5:06 off the clock. Branch capped it off with a 23-yard TD run on a reverse play. This action put the Patriots ahead 41–20 lead. The Steelers came back with a Roethlisberger 7-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress on their next drive, but by then there was only 1:31 left in the game.

Brady was the field general for the whole game completing passes when needed for 14 of 21 for 207 yards and directing the team the whole while. Dillon was on the money again rushing for 73 yards and a touchdown. Branch caught 4 passes for 116 yards, rushed for 37 yards, and scored two touchdowns. Roethlisberger threw well for 226 yards and 2 touchdowns, and he even rushed for 45 yards. However, his three interceptions were very costly. Heinz Ward caught 5 passes for 109 yards and a touchdown. New England would advance to the Super Bowl after this fine victory.

Super Bowl XXXVIII

The SB XXXIX kickoff was at 6:38 EST February 6, 2005. Led by Tom Brady, the Bill Belichick NE Patriots defeated the Philadelphia Eagles in Alltel Stadium in Jacksonville Florida before a packed house of 78,125.

This fine write-up from the Boston Globe again gave New England fans enough of the Super Bowl that they felt they were there. Nice job Nick Cafardo. He titled his article:

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — The red, white, and blue confetti floated in the sky and dropped ever so gently on their latest field of dreams. There were hugs, pats on the backs, and family moments with children hugging their hero dads, and wives kissing their hero husbands.

There was Bill Belichick, Romeo Crennel, and Charlie Weis, the brain trust of the Super Bowl XXXIX champions embracing for the final time, with Weis off to Notre Dame and Crennel off to Cleveland.

The Vince Lombardi Trophy was touched, kissed, and embraced like a loved one.

The New England Patriots, draped in blood, sweat, and tears, won the Super Bowl for the 3rd time in four years, beating the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-21, last night before 78,125 at Alltel Stadium.

Dynasty?

"We're champions now," said Patriots safety Rodney Harrison. "I don't know about dynasty right now."

Football historians will look back upon the current run by the Patriots and decide if it is indeed a dynasty. But for now, it's clear that no football team in the world is better.

The Patriots broke a 14-14 tie and took control with two fourthquarter scores against the Eagles, who couldn't stop Tom Brady and Co. when it counted most.

Brady, who played with a heavy heart with his 94-year-old grandmother passing away Wednesday, completed 23 of 33 passes for 236 yards and two touchdowns for a 110.2 quarterback rating.

He was the calm, cool quarterback who had been there and done that. His Eagles counterpart, Donovan McNabb (30 of 51 for 357 yards, three touchdowns, and three interceptions), looked jittery at times in his Super Bowl debut.

Brady's favorite target was Deion Branch, who tied a Super Bowl record with 11 catches for 133 yards and was named the game's most valuable player.

"It doesn't make a difference who gets what," said Branch. "Our plan was to come in here and win the game. We had a lot of doubters and we showed them that we are a big team and we came out and won tonight."

The Patriots boosted their lead to 24-14 in the fourth quarter courtesy of Adam Vinatieri's 22-yard field goal, which capped an eight-play, 43-yard drive.

McNabb, who has a history of overthrowing receivers at crucial times, got the ball with 5:40 remaining and tried to rally the Eagles.

The Patriots played another stout defensive game, showing McNabb looks — including lining up two linemen and five linebackers — he may have never seen on film. They had to adapt after losing free safety Eugene Wilson for more than half the game with what was thought to be a broken arm.

The Eagles pulled within 24-21 with 1:48 remaining when McNabb found Greg Lewis for a 30-yard touchdown pass over rookie safety Dexter Reid — Wilson's replacement. That capped a 13-play, 79-yard drive that consumed 3 minutes 52 seconds.

The Eagles attempted an onside kick, but it was recovered by Christian Fauria at the Eagles' 41. While the Eagles forced a Patriots punt, McNabb couldn't pull off the heroics, with Harrison icing the game with his second interception.

While the Eagles received a strong performance from Terrell Owens (nine catches, 122 yards), the flamboyant receiver never found the end zone.

"Obviously we had a lot of turnovers," said Owens. "My hat goes off to the New England Patriots. They're a good team. It was a hard-fought ballgame. We just gave it away."

"I think we had everyone on the edge of their seats when we went back out there with 50 seconds left. We possibly could have won that game," McNabb said.

But it wasn't to be.

Belichick's troops were ready to take the field and carry on the momentum

Offensive coordinator Weis said the 25-minute halftime allowed him time to figure out how to beat the Philadelphia blitz. He did it with short passes and screen passes.

The Eagles were still intent on blitzing, and the Patriots were happy to see it.

"They were blitzing up the middle with [Jeremiah Trotter] in an attempt to make Brady get out of the pocket and so we had to do something to combat it. We used the screens and the shorter passing game, and it really opened things up for us," Weis said.

Brady was picking it up very nicely, spotting Branch for gains of 27 and 21, the latter giving the Patriots a first down at the Philadelphia 2-yard line. From there, Brady went to designated short-yardage tight end Mike Vrabel, who gathered a tipped pass for his second touchdown reception in as many Super Bowls, giving the champs a 14-7 lead with 11:09 left in the third.

A fired-up Brady returned to the sideline and screamed to his teammates, "Let's keep it going! Let's keep it going!"

Yet the Eagles answered quickly, evening things at 14 with 3:35 remaining in the third. It was turning into a heavyweight title fight, and McNabb appeared poised for the challenge.

The Eagles targeted rookie corner Randall Gay, throwing at him often during the drive. McNabb completed passes of 15, 4, and 10 to Brian Westbrook, the last catch good for 6 points. He also found Lewis and Owens twice each on the drive. His favorite first-half target, Todd Pinkston, was cramping up and was in the locker room receiving intravenous fluids.

The chains kept moving and even with a blitzing Willie McGinest coming at him, McNabb managed to drill a pass to Westbrook between two Patriots for the tying score.

With the score even after three quarters (a Super Bowl first), the Patriots started a well-orchestrated drive to regain the lead. Brady was very methodical in leading the Patriots 66 yards, using Kevin Faulk as a key component.

Faulk caught passes of 13 and 14 yards (both beating Eagle blitzes) and ran twice for 20 yards in picking up three first downs on the drive. Corey Dillon capped it with a 2-yard touchdown run off left tackle with 13:44 remaining, giving the Patriots a 21-14 lead.

"We were 0 for 4 on first downs in the first quarter and we really couldn't get into any rhythm offensively," said Brady. "We just didn't move the ball. We tried to run it and didn't gain a whole lot of yards. We made a few more plays in the second half."

At one point in the first quarter, the Eagles led the battle of first downs, 9-1. The Patriots committed costly penalties early and Pinkston made two beautiful catches on the first scoring drive, which culminated in McNabb hitting L.J. Smith in the end zone with 9:55 remaining in the first quarter.

On their next possession, the Patriots tried to answer but Brady fumbled when his hand hit Faulk's hip at the Eagles' 5-yard line (New England's first turnover of the postseason).

New England finally scored when Brady hit David Givens for 4-yard score to make it 7-7 with 1:10 left before intermission.

That was not respectable for the three-time Super Bowl champions. In the end, they adjusted, they executed, and they conquered.

2005 Bill Belichick #14

The 2005 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-sixth season of professional football and their thirty-sixth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his sixth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 14-2. They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, son the Wild Card playoffs against the Jaguars W (28-3) but lost the Divisional Playoffs to the Broncos L (13-27).

Life is not always good even for good people. It was widely reported that popular and talented linebacker Tedy Bruschi suffered a stroke just ten days after the Patriots victory in Super Bowl XXXIX. He initially planned to miss the entire season. However, a determined and well-cared for Bruschi returned to the field against the Buffalo Bills on October 30.

Cornerback Ty Law was released in the offseason, and injuries at the cornerback position, as well as a season-ending injury to safety Rodney Harrison in Week 3, forced the Patriots to break-in a number of players in the secondary very early in the season. Overall, injuries caused the Patriots to start 45 different players at one point or another during the season. This was an NFL record for a division champion (breaking the record of 42 set by the Patriots in 2003).

And, so things did not begin as well as they could have for the Patriots after a Super Bowl victory. They got off to a slow 4–4 start. Among other things, the Pats lost their first game at home since 2002 against the San Diego Chargers in Week 4. They did make a fine comeback by ending the season on a 6-2 run for an overall 10–6 record. This was not at all shabby as it gave them their third straight AFC East title. In another one for the record books, (The Patriots

were the first team in NFL history to alternate wins and losses in each of their first nine games.

They were announced as fourth seed in the AFC playoffs. In the Wild Card Playoffs, the Patriots defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars, but they could not keep up the playoff streak and they lost to the Denver Broncos on the road in the Divisional Playoffs, after having committed five turnovers in the game.

Games of the 2005 Season

In the home and season opener on September 8, 2005, the New England Patriots defeated the Oakland Raiders W (30–20) at Gillette Stadium. At Carolina on Sept 18, the Panthers beat the Patriots L (17–27) in Bank of America Stadium. At Pittsburgh on Sept 25, the Patriots beat the Steelers W (23–20) at Heinz Field. Then, at home, on Oct 2, the San Diego Chargers whipped the Patriots L (17–41) at Gillette Stadium.

At Atlanta on Oct 9, the Patriots beat the Falcons W (31–28) at the Georgia Dome. At Denver, on Oct 16, the Broncos beat the Patriots L (20–28) at Invesco Field at Mile High Stadium. In week 7, Oct 23, the Pats drew a bye. At home on Oct 30, New England defeated Buffalo W (21–16) at Gillette Stadium. On Nov 7, at home, the Indianapolis Colts pounded the New England Patriots L (21–40) in Gillette Stadium.

At Miami on Nov 13, the Patriots beat the Dolphins W (23–16) at Dolphins Stadium. At home, on November 20, the Patriots beat the New Orleans Saints W (24–17) at Gillette Stadium. At Kansas City, on Nov 27, the Chiefs beat the Patriots L (16–26) at Arrowhead Stadium. At home, on Dec 4, New England defeated the New York Jets W (16–3) at Gillette Stadium.

At Buffalo, on Dec 11, the Patriots scorched the Bills W (35–7) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. At home, on Dec 17, the Patriots skunked the Tampa Bay Buccaneers W (28–0) at Gillette Stadium. At New York on Dec 26, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (31–21) at

Giants Stadium. In the Season finale on New Years Day, Jan 1, 2006 the Miami Dolphins edged out the Patriots at Gillette Stadium. The Pats finished with a 10-6 record and went on to win the Wildcard playoffs and then they lost in the Divisional round.

Wild Card Playoffs

In the Wild Card playoffs at 8:00 PM EST, on January 7, 2006 the New England Patriots defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars W 28–3 at Gillette Stadium

The three-time Super Bowl champion Patriots, this time would have to win three games to advance to the Super Bowl, defeated the Jaguars 28–3 in the wild card match. Linebacker Willie McGinest set NFL playoff records for sacks in a game (4.5, 1 sack ahead of the old record held by Richard Dent and Rich Milot) and career postseason sacks (16, two ahead of the old record held by Bruce Smith). Meanwhile Tom Brady threw for 201 yards and three touchdown passes.

This game also marked three career playoff records: Brady and Patriots head coach Bill Belichick set records for 10 straight postseason victories, beating Vince Lombardi's run in the 1960s.

Divisional Playoffs

In the AFC Divisional Playoffs at 8:00 PM EST on Jan 14, 2006 at Denver, the Broncos beat the Pats L (13–27) at Mile High Stadium

The Patriots turned the ball over five times in this poor showing in mid-January. The Broncos were on the ball and they converted four out of the five turnovers into 24 points as they eliminated the two-time defending Super Bowl champion Patriots, 27–13. The turnovers were the game. The Broncos won their first playoff game since defeating the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl XXXIII. This game also ended New England's league-record ten-game postseason winning streak and gave quarterback Tom Brady his first ever postseason loss.

The Patriots were trailing most of the game. With 8:33 left, Tom Brady tried to get it going for the victory. He completed a 73-yard pass to Deion Branch and then he fired a 4-yard touchdown pass to David Givens. This brought the game to 24–13. But he Broncos were not finished. Plummer got a 42-yard completion to Smith set up another Elam field goal. Then the Broncos all but clinched the game when safety John Lynch intercepted a Brady pass with less than 3 minutes remaining.

Tom Brady did not play a bad game, but it was not enough. He finished the game completing 20 out of 36 passes for 341 yards, one touchdown, and two interceptions, but he suffered his first NFL postseason game loss. Also, Patriots head coach Bill Belichick lost his first postseason game since taking over the team in 2000. Both the coach and his QB had amassed 10 straight playoff wins before this (with three 3–0 runs of the playoffs plus the Super Bowl titles and the previous win over Jacksonville).

In this game, Branch caught 8 passes for 153 yards, while Rod Smith caught 6 passes for 96 yards and a touchdown. This would become the Patriots' first postseason loss since 1998 when the team lost to the Jaguars in the Wild Card Round. Each time any team loses and does not win the Super Bowl, there is disappointment. In 2005 after this game, it was no consolation to the Patriots or their fans that they would be in seven more Super Bowls and they would win two more of these Super games before the 2018 season.

2006 Bill Belichick #14

The 2006 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-seventh season of professional football and their thirty-seventh season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his seventh of nineteen seasons (sofar). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 12-4. They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, won the Wild Card playoffs against the Jets W (37-16; won the Divisional playoffs against the Chargers W (24-21) & then the Patriots lost the Conference Championship to the Colts L (34-38).

The Patriots were short from the beginning of the season without their two starting wide receivers from 2005; David Givens, who left in free agency and Deion Branch, who held out for a new contract before being traded in early September. No player shifts are easy. Replacing them eventually were Reche Caldwell and Jabar Gaffney. They signed as free agents in October.

In the home and season opener at 1:00 pm EDT September 10, 2006, in a two-point match, the New England Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills W (19–17) in Gillette Stadium to get the ball rolling for the season ahead. At New York, on Sept 17, the Patriots overcame the Jets at Giants Stadium. At home on Sept 24, the Denver Broncos beat the Patriots L (7–17) at Gillette Stadium. On Oct 1, in Paul Brown Stadium, at Cincinnati, Ohio, the Patriots smothered the Bengals W (38–13).

On Oct 8 at home, the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins W (20–10) at Gillette Stadium. On Oct 15, the team drew a bye. Then, at Buffalo, after a week's "rest," on Oct 22, the Patriots belted the Bills W (28–6) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. At Minnesota on October 30, the Patriots clobbered the Vikings W (31–7) at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. At home on Nov 5, the Indianapolis Colts defeated the Patriots L (20–27) at Gillette Stadium.

At home on Nov 12, the New York Jets edged out the Patriots L (14–17) at Gillette Stadium. At Green Bay on Nov 19, the Patriots skunked the Packers W (35–0) at Lambeau Field. At home on Nov 26, the Patriots beat the Chicago Bears W (17–13) at Gillette

Stadium. At home again on Dec 3, the Patriots defeated the Detroit Lions W (28–21) at Gillette Stadium.

At Miami on Dec 10, the Dolphins shut out the Patriots L (0–21) at Dolphin Stadium. At home on Dec 17, New England thumped the Houston Texans W (40-7) at Gillette Stadium. At Jacksonville, on Dec 24, the Patriots defeated the Jaguars W (24–21) at ALLTEL Stadium. At Tennessee on Dec 31, the Patriots defeated the Titans in a shootout W (40–23) at LP Field. The Patriots finished the season with a 12-4 regular season record and moved on to the playoffs.

Post Season

In the playoffs, the Patriots won the Wild Card Playoffs against the New York Jets. 37–16. They also won the Divisional Playoffs against the San Diego Chargers, 24-21. And in the Conference Championship, Peyton Manning's good fortune in winning his first Conference Championship was bad luck for the Patriots, who lost the conference L (34–38). As an aside, this year, Peyton Manning who prior to this season had a playoff jinx, bagged his first Super Bowl XLI v the Chicago Bears 29-17.

Wild Card Sunday, January 7, 2007

This Wild Card playoff game began at 1:00 PM on January 7, 2006 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was excellent at 50 °F, and sunny. There was a packed house of 68,756.at this Patriot home game.

Tom Brady had a fine game completing 22 out of 34 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns. Patriots running backs Corey Dillon, Laurence Maroney, and Kevin Faulk combined for 145 rushing yards in the win over the New York Jets. Receiver Jabar Gaffney was a star. He caught only 11 passes during the season, finished his first career playoff game with eight catches for 104 yards.

The Patriots took the opening kickoff and though the game was close, they controlled the flow of the game from that point on. They drove down the field, with Gaffney catching three passes for 34 yards on the 65 yard-drive that ended with Corey Dillon's 11-yard touchdown run.

Later in the quarter, Dillon coughed up the football and it was recovered by defensive back Hank Poteat on the Patriots 15-yard line. This set up Mike Nugent's 28-yard field goal and it brought the lead to four points (7–3). In the second quarter, the Jets took a 10–7 lead on a Jerricho Cotchery touchdown. Cotchery was a nemesis all day, finishing the game with 100 receiving yards and 19 rushing yards. On this TD, he took a pass from Chad Pennington 77 yards for a touchdown.

Not long afterwards, New England knotted it up with a Stephen Gostkowski's 20-yard field goal on their next drive. After forcing the Jets to punt, the Patriots advanced to New York's 1-yard line. On third down with 11 seconds remaining in the half and no timeouts left, Brady took the snap, faked a handoff to Dillon, and then hit tight end Daniel Graham in the back of the end zone for a TD giving the Pats a nice 17–10 halftime lead.

The Jets were down but not lying down. Nugent kicked a field goal on the Jets' first drive of the second half, but New England came right back with another field goal from Gostkowski to retake their 7-point lead. When the Jets got the ball, linebacker Roosevelt Colvin got a paw on a lateral from Pennington behind the line of scrimmage. Mostly everybody in the stadium including the players on both teams (including Colvin) thought the lateral was an incomplete forward pass and that the play was over. However, New

England's Vince Wilfork was extra observant and he realized the play was still ongoing and he recovered the fumble. He picked the ball up and ran 31 vards to the Jets 15-vard line before being tackled by Cotchery. This gave Gostkowski a third field goal, making the score 23-13.



In the beginning of the fourth quarter, Nugent kicked his third field goal to cut New York's deficit back to within a TD, 23-16. Immediately, the Patriots began a long drive of 13-plays. This 63yard drive took 6:23 off the clock and ended with Tom Brady throwing a 7-yard touchdown pass to Faulk. Then on the first play of the Jets' next drive, New England defensive back Asante Samuel put the game away when he intercepted Pennington's pass and returned it 36 yards for a touchdown.

Divisional Playoff Sunday, January 14, 2007

AFC: New England Patriots 24, San Diego Chargers 21

This divisional playoff game began at 4:30 PM on January 14, 2007 at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego, California. The weather was unusually excellent at 53 °F, and clear. There was a packed house of 68,810.at this Chargers home game.

The other three divisional playoff games had already finished (two on Saturday and one at 1:00 on Sunday).

So, this was the final game of the divisional playoffs. In this game, the New England Patriots faced the San Diego Chargers at San Diego. The Chargers had previously been unbeaten at home in the regular season, and so this was a big test for the Patriots.

The Chargers' had some big-name players including league MVP running back LaDainian Tomlinson. This year, he had broken a number of league records. The Chargers also had nine Pro Bowlers, and five All-Pro players. Nothing helps gain a victory more than good field play. The records are all left at the gate once the teams hit the gridiron.

And, so, the four Chargers turnovers, three of which were converted into Patriots scoring drives, helped the Patriots assure a Chargers loss. San Diego lost on turnovers despite outgaining the Patriots in rushing yards, 148–51 and total yards, 352–327, while also intercepting three passes from Tom Brady. The Patriots were able to overcome their own miscues as they took advantage of the Chargers.

In the first quarter, San Diego coach Marty Schottenheimer opted to go for it on fourth and 11. He chose this option rather than attempting a 47-yard field goal. It could not have gone worse.

QB Philip Rivers lost a fumble while being sacked by Mike Vrabel. This set up Stephen Gostkowski's 51-yard field goal with 40 seconds left in the quarter.

In Q2. Chargers receiver Eric Parker back a punt 13-yards and this ignited San Diego onto a 48-yard scoring drive that ended with Tomlinson's 2-yard touchdown run. At this point, the Chargers had a 7–3 lead.

Then, when the Pats got the ball, linebacker Donnie Edwards intercepted a pass from Brady and returned it to the 41-vard line. But the Chargers ended up punting after the Patriots' Artrell Hawkins sacked Rivers on third down. Later in the quarter, Tomlinson took off twice for 13 yards and then snagged a screen pass and scooted 58 yards to the Patriots' 6-yard line. This action set up a 6-yard touchdown run by Michael Turner with 2:04 left in the half.

New England came right back with a 72-yard scoring drive in which receiver Jabar Gaffney caught four passes for 46 yards, including a 7yard touchdown reception with six seconds left in the half. This cut the Charger lead to 14-10.

In the second half, Brady missed a target and was intercepted for the second time. The Patriots held, and the Chargers again were forced to punt after the Patriots sacked Rivers on third down. Mike Scifres' kicked a perfect 36-yard punt that pinned New England back at their own 2-vard line. NE advanced the ball and San Diego subsequently forced a punt. However, Parker muffed the kick and New England's David Thomas recovered the fumble at the Chargers' 31-yard line.

This New England drive seemed to stall after Brady fumbled on third and 13. But, Patriots' tackle Matt Light recovered it and Chargers defensive back Drayton Florence drew a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty for taunting Patriots tight end Daniel Graham.

The Pats drive continued, and Gostkowski eventually kicked a 34yard field goal to cut the deficit to 14-13. When San Diego's mounted its next drive, linebacker Roosevelt Colvin intercepted a pass from Rivers at the New England 36-yard line. The Patriots then drove to the Chargers 41-yard line but were stopped and had to punt.

After the punt, Rivers clicked on two passes to tight end Antonio Gates for 31 yards and another 31-yard pass to Vincent Jackson. This set up Tomlinson's second rushing touchdown to give the Chargers an 8-point lead, 21–13.

New England came back ready to win the game by driving to San Diego's 41-yard line. On a fourth-down conversion attempt,

however, Brady's pass was intercepted by Marlon McCree, but no harm was done as Troy Brown stripped the ball, and receiver Reche Caldwell recovered it. It was so complicated a happening that Coach Schottenheimer unsuccessfully challenged the play but was overruled and the Chargers lost a timeout.

Four plays later, Brady reached back and completed a 4-yard touchdown pass to Caldwell. On the next play, running back Kevin Faulk took a direct snap and scored the two-point conversion, tying the game. The Patriots were ready.

After the D forced a punt, Brady completed a 19-yard pass to Graham. Two plays later, Caldwell caught a 49-yard strike down the right sideline to set up Gostkowski's third field goal to give the Patriots a 24–21 lead with only 1:10 left in the fourth quarter. With no timeouts left, San Diego drove to the Patriots 36-yard line on their final possession, but Nate Kaeding's 54-yard field goal attempt fell short with three seconds remaining in the game.

One month later, after one of San Diego's best records ever, Marty Schottenheimer was fired as San Diego's coach thereby ending his 21-year coaching career. His 14–2 season with the Chargers was his best regular season record ever, and he is the only coach in NFL history to be fired after racking up 14 wins. It says something about football but there were few that could figure out that move. Nonetheless, it was Brady's pass with 1:10 seconds left in the game that caused it. It is the way it had to be.

AFC Championship Jan. 21, 2007

In the precursor to the Super Bowl, this game, played at Indianapolis found the Colts delivering Peyton Manning a Conference Championship that enabled the team to compete and win the Super Bowl. This was a major comeback win for the Colts and a major heartbreaker for the Patriots who at one point had the game in the bag.

The Patriots were up 21-3 in the second quarter, but mid-way through the third the Colts had pulled even with a renewed

determination. From there it was a see-saw battle until the end of the fourth quarter when the Patriots were driving. Marlin Jackson intercepted a Tom Brady pass, and this sealed the win for Indianapolis.

We can't take anything away from the Colts or the Patriots in this game. The Colts piled up a combined 455 yards of offense to the Patriots 325 yards. In the end some may say it was a roughing-thepasser penalty in the fourth quarter, one of eight for the Patriots on the day, that set up Joseph Addai for a 3-yard game-winning touchdown. Despite all the roughing Peyton Manning stood in and orchestrated the big win.

2007 Bill Belichick #14

The 2007 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-eighth season of professional football and their thirty-eighth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his eighth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 16-0-0. They finished in first place in the AFC East Division, and they won the Championship for the sixth of the past seven years. They won the Wild Divisional Playoffs against the Jaguars W (31-20); won the Conference Playoffs against the Chargers W (21-12); & then the Patriots lost Super Bowl XLII to the New York Giants by three points L (17-14).

The Patriots became only the fourth team in NFL history to finish a regular season undefeated, and first to do so since the 1972 Miami Dolphins. The Patriots were also the first team with a perfect regular season since the NFL expanded its schedule to sixteen games in 1978.

At New York, in the season opener 1:00 EDT on September 9, 2007, the Patriots scorched the New York Jets W (38-14) at Giants Stadium. In the home opener at Gillette Stadium, on Sept 16, the Patriots scorched the San Diego Chargers by the same score as last week's game W (38-14. At home on Sept 23, 2007 the Patriots

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whipped the Buffalo Bills W (38–7) in Gillette Stadium. Then at Cincinnati on Oct 1, the Patriots whooped the Bengals W (34-13).

The twelve games below are all recorded as victories for the New England Patriots in this perfect 16-0 season. Therefore, we will not repeat the New England Patriots name in the following games 5 through 16 season summaries:

On Oct 1, the Cincinnati Bengals lost W (34–13) at Paul Brown Stadium. At home on Oct 7, the Cleveland Browns lost W (34–17) in Gillette Stadium. At Dallas, on Oct 14, 2007 the Cowboys lost W (48–27) at Texas Stadium. At Miami, on Oct 21, the Dolphins lost W (49–28) at Dolphin Stadium. At home, on Oct 28, the Washington Redskins were walloped W (52–7) in Gillette Stadium

At Indianapolis on Nov 4, the Colts lost W (24–20) at the RCA Dome. On week 10, Nov 11, the Patriots drew a bye. At Buffalo on Nov 18, the Bills were hammered W (56–10) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. On Nov 25 at home, the Philadelphia Eagles were edged out W (31–28) in Gillette Stadium. At Baltimore, on Dec 3, the Ravens lost W (27–24) at M&T Bank Stadium.

At home on Dec 9, the Pittsburgh Steelers lost W (34–13) at Gillette Stadium. At home, on Dec 16, the New York Jets lost W (20–10) in Gillette Stadium. At home on Dec 23, the Miami Dolphins lost W (28–7) at Gillette Stadium. In the season finale, at New York, on Dec 29, the New York Giants lost in a three-point match W (38–35) at Giants Stadium. The Patriots finished at a fantastic 16-0 and played in the playoff games as well as the super Bowl.


Wes Welker is a top Patriot

When Wes Welker was 25 years of age, he had already developed into an effective slot receiver for the Miami Dolphins. For their own reasons, Miami traded Welker to the New England Patriots for second- and seventh-round draft picks.

At new England, he became one of the best in the game. Welker immediately was in synch with Tom Brady, leading the league in

receptions in three of his six seasons in New England and going over 100 catches in five of his six years. Welker was a Pro Bowler five times and is #1 on the Patriots' all-time receptions list.

After he joined the Patriots in 2007, Welker caught more passes than any player in the league, and still ranks in the top five in yardage. Welker reached 500 receptions with the Patriots in just 70 games, an



NFL record. He holds the franchise record for consecutive games with receptions, having caught a pass in every game (regular season and postseason) he has played as a Patriot.

As of Week 2 of the 2012 regular season, Welker also holds the all-time Patriots franchise record for receptions, breaking in just 79 games the record of Troy Brown who played more than twice as many games as a Patriot (192 regular-season games). Welker ranks third in receiving yards behind Brown and Stanley Morgan.

The Playoffs Overview

In the postseason, the Patriots won the Divisional Playoffs v the Jaguars, W (31–20). Tom Brady was named Offensive player of the year. The Patriots won the Conference Championship against the Chargers—W (21-12). Bill Belichick was named NFL Coach of the Year. The Patriots wrapped up the season with a very close match in the Super Bowl against the New York Giants, in a losing effort L (14-17).

Randy Moss remembers getting the call to be a Patriot: "I got a phone call and it was Bill Belichick. I thought it was a friend or somebody playing with my phone. I actually cussed him out. When he kept saying it was Bill Belichick, I knew he was serious. I started being apologetic because I had cussed the man. Then he told me the Raiders were thinking about trading me. I had to be in Foxborough by 10 p.m. Eastern, or the trade would void. So, I just did everything that I could possibly do to get up there by 10 p.m."

Randy Moss also remembers playing in this, his first playoff game as a Patriot. He had led the NFL in receiving yards, had one reception in this important game. Patriots quarterback Tom Brady set the NFL record for completion percentage in a single game (92.9%) with an almost perfect 26 of 28 completions for 263 yards and 3 touchdowns, while running back Laurence Maroney added 162 total yards (122 on the ground).

Overall, New England was outstanding offensively, gaining 401 yards and the team did not punt the ball until 31 seconds was left in the fourth quarter.

Jacksonville gave the fans a scare at the start when they took the opening kickoff and went 80 yards in 9 plays, featuring two receptions by Marcedes Lewis for 57 yards, on the way to David Garrard's 9-yard touchdown pass to Matt Jones. The Patriots then tore out on a 74-yard drive, scoring on Tom Brady's 3-yard TD toss to Benjamin Watson. On the Jags next possession, New England lineman Ty Warren sacked Garrard and forced a fumble. Linebacker Mike Vrabel recovered the loose ball at the Jacksonville 29-yard line. Shortly after, Maroney scampered in on a 1-yard touchdown run, giving the Patriots a 14–7 lead.

Maurice Jones-Drew muffed kickoff and was downed at his own 5-yard line. The Jaguars were undaunted and moved the ball 95 yards in 11 plays without facing a third down. They scored on Garrard's 6-yard TD pass to Ernest Wilford. New England then, for the third time in a row, drove deep into Jags territory. This time, they were stopped at the 17-yard line and got no points for all that effort. Stephen Gostkowski missed a 35-yard field goal with 53 seconds left in the first half.

In the second half, Brady opened up by completing 7 of 8 passes for 54 yards on an 82-yard drive. On the last play, in shotgun formation, with Kevin Faulk to his right, he took a snap and jumped in the air with his arms raised to make it look like a play used by the Patriots before where Faulk took the direct snap. The Jags were fooled and followed Faulk, leaving Wes Welker open in the end zone. Brady, got the ball to him for a TD, giving the Pats a 21–14 lead.

Jacksonville came back with a drive to the New England 21-yard line, but receiver Dennis Northcutt dropped a pass on third down, forcing the Jags to settle for a Josh Scobee 39-yard field goal. This cut the lead to 21–17. On the Patriots next possession, Jacksonville's Derek Landri was guilty of a roughing-the-passer penalty, turning a Welker 6-yard catch into a 21-yard gain. Maroney gained 40 yards with his next two carries, and following two more Welker receptions, Brady threw a perfect 9-yard TD strike to Watson giving New England a 28–17 lead.

There was an unnecessary roughness penalty and a 25-yard reception by Reggie Williams on the Jacksonville's next drive that set up a 25-yard field goal by Scobee. The Jags cut the deficit to one score, 28–20. On the second play after the ensuing kickoff, Brady completed a 52-yard strike to Donté Stallworth, setting up Gostkowski's second field goal attempt. This put the Pats up by two scores, 31–20.

With just 3:46 left in the game, Patriots safety Rodney Harrison, intercepted a pass from Garrard at the Patriots' 31-yard line, ending any hope of a Jacksonville comeback. This was Harrison's 7th career postseason pick, which was a Patriots record. This was also his fourth consecutive postseason game with an interception, tying an NFL record held by Aeneas Williams.

With this victory, the Pats moved on to the AFC title game for the second year in a row and extended their perfect record to 17–0. This matched the final record of the 1972 Miami Dolphins.

This divisional playoff game began at 3:00 PM on January 20, 2008 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 23 °F, partly cloudy, windy, and cold. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game.

Tom Brady had a good day, but he threw 3 interceptions while leading the Patriots to defeat San Diego. Besides Brady's work, the D held the Chargers to four field goals. Laurence Maroney rushed for 122 yards and a touchdown for the second game in a row. With this win, the Patriots season record became 18-0 and they became the first NFL team ever to start with an 18–0 record. After this game, Bill Belichick's talented Patriots then moved on to their fourth Super Bowl appearance in seven years.

There were ups and downs on both sides of the ball and the first gaffe came from the Patriots when with just about 5 minutes left in the first quarter, the Chargers stole interception #1 from Tom Brady. Defensive back Quentin Jammer grabbed the errant pass from Brady on the Patriots 40-yard line, and this set up a 26-yard field goal by Nate Keding. New England were motivated to come right back. They drove 65 yards and scored on a 1-yard Maroney touchdown run, pulling ahead with a 7–3 lead.

Before the second half, Kaeding kicked a 23-yard field goal in the to cut the score to 7–6, but after a punt, Patriots defensive back Asante Samuel was in the right place at the right time and he intercepted a pass from Philip Rivers, returning it ten yards to the Chargers 24. Just one play later and Tom Brady connected on a 12-yard TD pass to Jabar Gaffney bringing the lead to 14–6.

Later, a 26-yard run by Darren Sproles brought the ball to the New England 34-yard line. But once again, the Patriots "D" held and kept San Diego from the end zone on 3rd and 1 and forcing them to settle for another Kaeding field goal. At halftime, the score was 14–9 in the Pats favor.

Opening the second half, Tom Brady threw his second pick of the game—this was snagged by Drayton Florence at the New England 49-yard line. San Diego then moved the ball to the 4-yard line, and it looked like the pick would be very costly. But, the D came through again. On 3rd and 1, linebacker Junior Seau brought down Michael Turner for a 2-yard loss and the Chargers settled again for Kaeding's fourth field goal.

New England came back with a drive to the San Diego 2-yard line, with Maroney gaining 39 yards on four running plays. Chargers cornerback Antonio Cromartie ended the drive by intercepting Brady in the end zone. It was the third interception.

After getting the ball in the fourth quarter, New England moved 67 yards and scored with a perfect Brady 6-yard touchdown pass to Wes Welker, making the score 21–12. The Chargers were forced to punt and then the Patriots ended the game with a 15-play drive that took the remaining 9:13 off the game clock. The Patriots' overall

record then improved to 18–0 on their way to their appearance in Super Bowl LXII (42) and becoming the 2007 AFC Champions.

Super Bowl XLII

The SB XLII kickoff was at 6:39 EST February 3, 2008. Led by starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichick-led NE Patriots were defeated. At the University of Phoenix Stadium, Glendale AZ before a packed house of 71,101.

I go to the Boston Paper to get the scoop the way it actually happened in 2008. This fine write-up from the Boston Globe at the time it was written gave New England fans enough of the Super Bowl that they felt they were there. Nice job Christopher L. Gasper He titled his article:

Patriots' bid for perfect season ends in Giants' upset

By Christopher L. Gasper GLOBE STAFF FEBRUARY 04, 2008

GLENDALE, Ariz. - The team that had been deified proved mortal when it mattered most.

In one of the biggest upsets in NFL history, the New York Giants shocked the previously perfect Patriots, 17-14, last night in Super Bowl XLII in front of 71,101 fans at University of Phoenix Stadium. New England (18-1) picked an awful time for its first loss of the season. Now the records, the 16-0 regular season, the individual awards, the All-Pro recognition, all ring hollow without a Super Bowl ring.

Giants quarterback Eli Manning hit Plaxico Burress in the left corner of the end zone from 13 yards out with 35 seconds left to cap an 83yard drive and keep the 1972 Miami Dolphins as the only NFL team to complete a perfect season. Burress, who had predicted a Giants

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victory and had been ridiculed, proved prescient when he beat Ellis Hobbs for the decisive score.

"We set high expectations, now we go down as 18-1, and that is one big zit," said Hobbs. "It is one big blemish. We choked. We choked at the end."



The Patriots appeared primed to make history when Tom Brady hit Randy Moss for a 6vard touchdown on third and goal with 2:42 remaining to make it 14-10, New England. Trailing, 10-7, and getting the ball at his 20 with 7:54 to go, Brady was at his brilliant best.

Shaking off a pass rush that sacked him

a season-high five times and a right ankle that hobbled and hindered him, Brady (29 of 48 for 266 yards and a touchdown) went 8 of 11 for 71 yards on the drive to put the Patriots back in the lead.

He began the march with a 5-yard pass to Wes Welker, who tied the Super Bowl record for receptions with 11 for 103 yards and ended it with the pass to Moss.

On the sideline veteran linebackers Tedy Bruschi and Junior Seau hugged after Moss scored, but the joy was short-lived, like the Patriots' lead

Manning (19 of 34 for 255 yards, 2 TDs, and 1 interception, Super Bowl MVP) more than matched the heroics of Brady on the winning drive, and he had company. On third and 5 from the Giants' 44, after an incredible Manning scramble, David Tyree made a huge leaping grab over Rodney Harrison for a 32-yard gain to put the Giants in New England territory.

Few saw the imperfect ending to the perfect season coming. The Patriots had beaten the Giants, 38-35, during the teams' regular-season meeting to improve to 16-0, and few thought this game would be any different.

"The biggest thing is to win the championship at the end of the year," said Moss. "All that we did, that undefeated regular season, it didn't mean nothing because we didn't close it at the end."

After each team had scored on its first possession of the game, there was a paucity of points until Manning hit Tyree for a 5-yard touchdown pass with 11:05 remaining, giving New York a 10-7 lead.

The 33-minute, 52-second scoreless stretch was the longest in Super Bowl history.

"Their front four really set the tone for four quarters," said Moss. "I think their secondary was ordinary, not taking anything from them. They don't have Pro Bowlers, but they do play good together. They had a good game plan."

In the first half the Patriots hardly played like one of the greatest teams in NFL history, leading, 7-3, at intermission.

Brady was constantly harassed by the rush and was sacked three times, the last of which, by Justin Tuck, resulted in a fumble that gave the Giants the ball back at the New England 49 with 10 seconds left in the half and prevented the Patriots from adding to their lead.

Brady's ankle appeared to prevent him from avoiding the rush, although he said the injury wasn't a factor. Moss said he couldn't tell if Brady was affected.

"I couldn't really tell, all I know was I heard the fans screaming and when I looked back he was down," said Moss.

The Giants, who outgained the Patriots, 139 yards to 81, in the half, were equally unimpressive in their execution. New York was inside the New England 30 three times, but only had 3 points to show for it.

The Giants took the opening kickoff, played keep-away for 9 minutes 59 seconds, then settled for a 3-0 lead on a 32-yard field goal by Lawrence Tynes, capping a 16-play, 63-yard drive that was the longest time-wise in Super Bowl history.

But the lead didn't last long. The Patriots went up, 7-3, on the first play of the second quarter, as Laurence Maroney, who had given the Patriots excellent field position with a 43-yard kick return, ducked in from the 1 on second and goal.

One of the hallmarks of the Giants' playoff run had been ball security. New York had not turned the ball over on offense during the postseason and had gone 34 possessions, dating to its regularseason loss to the Patriots, without an offensive turnover. In that game, Hobbs intercepted Manning in the fourth quarter.

Hobbs did the honors again in the second quarter last night. On third and 5 from the New England 14, Hobbs scooped up a Manning pass that Steve Smith let slip through his hands at the 10, and he returned it to the 33.

However, the Patriots couldn't capitalize, as Maroney was stopped for a 2-yard loss on third and 1 from the New England 42. At 9:22 of the second, at the Giants' 30, Ahmad Bradshaw fumbled a handoff and the Patriots' Pierre Woods appeared to recover the ball. But Bradshaw flipped Woods over and somehow came up with the ball, costing New England a great chance.

The most bizarre play of the half happened after the Giants, behind the hard running of Brandon Jacobs and Bradshaw, moved to the New England 25 with 2:31 left. Adalius Thomas strip-sacked Manning on third and 4 and Bradshaw batted the loose ball forward, with Smith recovering for a first down. But Bradshaw's bat was illegal, and the penalty took the Giants out of field goal range.

In the third quarter, after an illegal substitution penalty against the Giants, the Patriots moved the ball to the New York 25, but following a sack they came up empty, and coach Bill Belichick

elected to go for it on fourth and 13 from the New York 31. Brady pumped twice before throwing the ball out of the end zone.

After Burress backed up his prediction with a play that will live on NFL Films highlight reels for eternity, the Patriots had one final chance to write a perfect ending, getting the ball at their 26 with 35 seconds left. But on fourth and 20 from their 16, Brady couldn't connect with Moss (five catches for 62 yards and the score) on one last deep ball and the Giants had a historic victory of their own.

Belichick shook hands with his Giants counterpart, Tom Coughlin, but Belichick wasn't on the sideline when the Giants took a knee to secure the upset.

"I don't rank them. It's disappointing," said Belichick.

"I think a lot of people didn't really even want us to win this game," said Moss. "We'll come back. Don't worry about that. It hurts that there is not a next week. The season's over. We'll look forward to minicamp."

Look at the record. The Patriots came back but this was tough to lose.

2008 Bill Belichick #14

The 2008 New England Patriots football team competed in their forty-ninth season of professional football and their thirty-ninth eighth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his ninth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 11-5-0. They finished second in the AFC East Division, and they did not qualify for the playoffs.

The Patriots were the defending AFC champions. They had a fine record in 2008 but not good enough. At 11-5, they did not qualify even for a Wild Card berth. For this they set a record as the first 11-win team since the expansion to a 12-team playoff in 1990 to not make the playoffs.

2009 Bill Belichick #14

The 2009 New England Patriots football team competed in their fiftieth season of professional football and their fortieth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his tenth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 10-6. They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they qualified for the playoffs. The Wild Card game was played on January 10, 2010, against the Baltimore Ravens. The Patriots won the game L (14-33).

This year, the Patriots finished with their fourth perfect regular season record at home in seven years. They are still a great team and were a great team in 2008. With their third seed in the AFC playoffs, the Patriots faced the Baltimore Ravens at home in the Wild Card Playoffs. The Ravens opened a 24–0 lead in the first quarter and the Patriots could not recover, ending their season.

Games of the 2008 season

In the season and home opener for the Patriots' 50th anniversary game played at 7:00 pm EDT, on September 14, 2009, the Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills† W (25-24) at Gillette Stadium. At New York, on Sept 20, the Jets beat the Patriots L (9–16) at Giants Stadium. At home, on Sept 27, the Patriots defeated the Atlanta Falcons W (26–10) in Gillette Stadium. Then, at home again, on Oct 4, my wedding anniversary, the Patriots beat the Baltimore Ravens W (27–21) in Gillette Stadium.

At Denver on October 11, the Broncos beat the Patriots in OT L (17–20) in Invesco Field at Mile High Stadium.

*** This goes down as one of the top games in Patriot History ***

At home on Oct 18, New England squashed the Tennessee Titans† W (59–0) in Gillette Stadium.

Tom Brady threw 5 Touchdowns in a Quarter against the Titans in this game in 2009. You may know that recently, Madden Football released a "G.O.A.T" edition of their storied video game franchise. On the cover is none other than Tom Brady.

His performance against the Titans in 2009 exemplifies this title. Brady was simply unstoppable in this game. In the second quarter, Brady threw a barrage of perfect passes to set the record for most TD passes in a quarter. His first was a 41-yard bomb to Randy Moss, which then became the recipient for Brady's second TD on a 28-yard pass. After his third score, Brady managed to sneak in his final two touchdowns to Wes Welker in the final 2 minutes of the game, the fifth score came with only 16 seconds left on the clock!

This was an incredible game, even if you hate Brady, no fan of football can deny his incredible passing prowess, one that has dubbed him as the greatest of all time!

On Oct 25, 2009 at a game against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Patriots whipped the Bucs W (35–7) in Wembley Stadium—London, England. On Nov 1, the team drew a bye. Then, at home, on Nov 8, the Patriots defeated the Miami Dolphins W (27–17) in Gillette Stadium.

Then at Indianapolis, on Nov 15, the Colts picked up a one-point-match victory against the Patriots L (34–35) in Lucas Oil Stadium. At home on Nov 22, the New York Jets were smothered by the New England Patriots W (31–14) at Gillette Stadium. At New Orleans on Nov 30, the Saints hammered the Patriots L (17–38) at the Louisiana Superdome.

At Miami on Dec 6, the Dolphins picked up a one-point victory over New England L (21–22) in Land Shark Stadium. At home on Dec 13, the Patriots beat the Carolina Panthers W (20–10) in Gillette Stadium. Then, at Buffalo, on Dec 20, the Patriots got the win against the Bills W (17–10) in the Ralph Wilson Stadium. At home on Dec 27, 2009 New England pummeled Jacksonville W (35–7) in Gillette Stadium. Then, in the season ender, at Houston, the Texans got the best of the Patriots L (27–34) at Reliant Stadium. And, so the next game for the Patriots would be the Wild Card playoffs.

The Wild Card Playoffs 2009 January 10, 2010

The Wild Card playoffs commenced with a 1:00 pm EST kickoff on January 10, 2010. The New England Patriots prepared to take on the Baltimore Ravens but the gods of New England were someplace else that day as the Patriots lost L (14-33) at Gillette Stadium before a packed house of 68, 756. The temperature was 20 °F (-7 °C), sunny and cold.

The Ravens got it going good in the 1st quarter thanks to typically perfect NE QB Tom Brady having some accuracy issues. The Ravens were very fortunate as they converted three first-quarter turnovers into 17 points, putting up a 24-0 lead from which New England could not recover. Someone like me would say that it was bad luck and a few errant spins of the ball. Every NE fan agreed that it was terribly unfortunate d from.

It was the Pats first home loss of the season and their first home loss in the playoffs in more than 30 years. It was a bad deal from the deck of potential outcomes. On top of that, it was the Ravens' first ever win against the Patriots after five consecutive losses. Tom Brady surely would like even to this day to have a few of those throws back.

Baltimore raced to a 7–0 lead on the first play of the game with Ray Rice's 83-vard touchdown run. Some might call that a bad omen if one believes in such things. It was the second longest run in NFL playoff history. When that was over and done with, linebacker Terrell Suggs forced and recovered a fumble from Tom Brady on the Patriots 17-yard line, and the Ravens chalked up another score with a 1-yard run by Le'Ron McClain.

After some regular field play and an exchange of punts, cornerback Chris Carr picked off a Brady pass and brought it back to the New

England 25-yard line. The "D" did not hold and this set up Rice's second touchdown on a 1-yard run. Just two plays after the next kickoff, there was more bad news for the Patriots caused by the Rayens.

Safety Ed Reed snagged a deep pass from Brady and returned it 25 yards. He stretched it for more by lateraling the ball to safety Dawan Landry. Landry raced another 25 yards to the Patriots 9-yard line, daring the Patriots to stop him.

The Ravens got nothing on three plays, but Billy Cundiff kicked a short field goal to make the score 24–0 in favor of the Ravens. I might say that's all she wrote as that was all that mattered for this game to be determined. New England did not mount an explosive comeback. Instead the Pats were forced to punt on their next drive.

Some good luck ensued as Baltimore returner Tom Zbikowski muffed the kick and Kyle Arrington recovered the ball for the Patriots at the Ravens 16-yard line. Five plays later, Brady threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to Julian Edelman making it 24-7. There is always hope until there is no more hope.

Midway through the second half, Brady threw his third interception of the game. This pick was to Landry, who returned it 42 yards to the New England 22, to set up another Cundiff field goal. On the kickoff, Darius Butler went off for a 42-yard kickoff return landing in the Patriots 47-yard line. The Patriots decided they were the Patriots and drove 53-yards for another score. Tom Brady finished it with his second touchdown pass to Edelman to cut their deficit to 27–14. The game was within reach.

Former Penn State great, Tom Zbikowski returned the ensuing kickoff 30 yards to his own 48-yard line, much to the Patriot's chagrin. Worse than that, the boost from the kickoff return sparked a 52-yard drive for a TD. It came on a 3-yard touchdown run from Willis McGahee, making the score 33–14 after the two-point conversion failed. It was looking less likely for a Patriot comeback.

Nonetheless, New England responded with a drive deep into Baltimore territory, but the drive stalled. Then, looking for three points. The Patriots got zero as Stephen Gostkowski missed a 44yard field goal attempt. There was only 7:19 left in the game, and to many this ended any chance of a miracle comeback.

Rice rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns, while McGahee added 62 yards and a score. Neither quarterback had much success, as Brady was held to 154 yards and intercepted three times, while Baltimore's Joe Flacco completed only 4 of 10 passes for 34 yards. Turnovers won the game for the Ravens. New England had to wait another year for some good luck.

2010 Bill Belichick #14

The 2010 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-first season of professional football and their forty-first season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his eleventh of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 14-2. They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they qualified for the playoffs.

Luck, the invisible marker in all football games appeared on the opposite side of the preferable Patriots fate. The New England Patriots lost their only playoff game this year in the Divisional Playoffs to the New York Jets, L (21-28). It would take another year for the Patriots to have another go at a few more of those huge, and meaningful, Super Bowl Rings. This year was one of those rebuilding years for a team that never dropped too far from the very top.

Tom Brady was at his best this year. He finished the regular season with an NFL-record 335 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Additionally, Brady broke his own 2007 TD to INT ratio record with 9:1 and was named NFL MVP.

The Patriots held on to the ball this year, committing NFL-record low 10 turnovers on the season. They also snagged another NFL record with seven consecutive games without a single turnover.

In the home and season opener at 1:00 pm EDT September 12, 2010, the New England Patriots defeated the Cincinnati Bengals W (3824) at Gillette Stadium before a packed house of 68,756. At New York on Sept 19, the Jets beat the Patriots L (14–28) in Meadowlands Stadium before 78,535. At home on Sept 26, the Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills W (38–30) at Gillette Stadium before 68, 756. At Miami on Oct 4, my wedding anniversary, the Patriots thumped the Dolphins W (41–14) in Sun Life Stadium before 69,090. In week 5, Oct 11, the team drew a bye.

At home on Oct 17, New England beat Baltimore Ravens in OT W (23–20) in Gillette Stadium. At San Diego on October 24, the Patriots repeated the prior week's score of W (23-20) and beat the chargers in Qualcomm Stadium before 68, 836. At home on Oct 31, the Patriots beat the Minnesota Vikings W (28–18) in Gillette Stadium. At Cleveland, on Nov 7, the Cleveland Browns beat the Patriots L (14–34) in Cleveland Browns Stadium.

At Pittsburgh, on November 14, the Patriots defeated the Steelers W (39–26) in Heinz Field. before 64,359. At home, on Nov 21, the Patriots beat the Indianapolis Colts W (31–28) in Gillette Stadium. At Detroit on Nov 25, 2010, the Patriots pounded the Lions W (45–24) at Ford Field before 60,065. On Dec 6, at home, the Patriots pummeled the New York Jets W (45–3) in Gillette Stadium.

At Chicago, on Dec 12, the Patriots smothered the Bears W (36–7) at Soldier Field before 62,347. At home on Dec 19, the Patriots beat the Green Bay Packers W 31–27 in Gillette Stadium. At Buffalo, on Dec 26m the Patriots slammed the Bills W (34–3) at Ralph Wilson Stadium before 68,281. At home on January 2, 2011 in the season finale, the Patriots walloped the Miami Dolphins W (38–7) in Gillette Stadium, finishing with the best record in the NFL at 14-2.

This divisional playoff game began at 4:30 PM on January 16, 2010 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 30 °F, clear and cold. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 14-2 regular season record, the Patriots were tripped up by the New York Jets L (21-28.

Mark Sanchez was the Jets QB and he had a nice day with 16 of 25 completions for 194 yards and three touchdowns. Sanchez led the Jets to victory, thereby avenging a 45–3 loss to New England in December.

The first time the Pats got the ball, Tom Brady threw his first interception since week five of the regular season. Linebacker David Harris picked it off and advanced it 58 yards before tight end Alge Crumpler made a TD-saving tackle at the 12-yard line. The Jets got no points off this turnover. They were unable to get a first down and Nick Folk missed a chip-shot 30-vard field goal attempt.

A few plays into New England's next drive, Brady completed a nice 28-yard pass to Crumpler at the Jets 12-yard line and this was followed by a 5-yard run by Danny Woodhead. Then, Crumpler dropped a pass in the end zone and on the next play Brady was sacked by Shaun Ellis, forcing the Patriots to settle for Shayne Graham's 34-yard field goal, giving New England a 3–0 lead.

In the second quarter, Tom Brady was sacked on third down by Drew Coleman forcing a New England punt from their own 16. Jerricho Cotchery got 5 yards on the return to the Patriots 49-yard line. A few plays later, Sanchez' uncorked a 37-yard completion to Braylon Edwards, which set up his first TD pass of the day -- a 7yarder to LaDainian Tomlinson.

Later in the quarter, New England attempted a fake punt with a direct snap to safety Patrick Chung on fourth down and four. However, Chung fumbled the snap and was tackled on the NE 25yard line. The Jets did not waste this one and quickly converted the turnover with a well-placed Sanchez 15-yard touchdown pass to Edwards with 33 seconds left in the half. This back-breaking score brought the tally to 14–3 in the Jets favor.

As the third quarter moved on with few events, as time was waning, Brady drove 80 yards in 11 plays, while completing a 37-yard pass to Rob Gronkowski and two passes to Deion Branch for 28 yards on the way to a 2-yard touchdown pass to Crumpler. Then Sammy Morris scored a 2-point conversion run, cutting their deficit to 14–11. The game was now a field goal away from a tie.

But the Jets came right back with Sanchez feeding a short pass to Cotchery, who took it 58 yards to the Partriots' 13-yard line. Just two plays later, Sanchez threw a high pass for Santonio Holmes, who managed to catch the ball and land his two feet in the end zone while falling out of bounds. This gave the Jets a 10-point lead two minutes into the fourth quarter.

After the next kickoff, New England moved to the Jets 34-yard line with an 8-minute drive, but then faced fourth down and 13. Rather than risk a 52-yard field goal attempt, they attempted to get the first down, but Branch dropped a pass from Brady and the Patriots turned the ball over.

New England's defense then made a great defensive stand, forcing a quick three-and-out. Julian Edelman returned Steve Weatherford's punt 41 yards to the New York 43-yard line before being tackled by Weatherford himself. Brady then led New England to the 17-yard line where Graham made his second field goal to cut their deficit to 7 points.

Looking to get back in the game quickly, the Patriots tried an onside kick which was snagged by Jets defensive back Antonio Cromartie recovered Graham's onside kick attempt and returned it 23 yards to the Patriots 20-yard line. Then Shonn Greene scored with a 20-yard run on the next play, making the score 28–14 with 1:12 left in the game. It did not look good.

Brandon Tate took the kickoff 23 yards to the 41-yard line, sparking a 59-yard scoring drive that ended with Brady's 13-yard touchdown pass to Branch with 24 seconds left. Graham's second attempt at an onside kick also failed, ending any chance of a miracle comeback. The Patriots never gave up but could not pull it out.

Brady had a nice passing day, finishing the game 29 of 45 for 299 yards and two touchdowns, with 1 interception. Cotchery had 5 receptions for 96 yards Harris had 9 tackles, 3 assists, and an interception, while Ellis added 5 tackles and two sacks. With this win, the Jets advanced to their second consecutive AFC championship game in Sanchez' first two years as a starter. The Patriots would be back at it the following year as they came close to another Super Bowl victory.

2011 Bill Belichick #14

The 2011 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-second season of professional football and their forty-second season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his twelfth of nineteen seasons (sofar). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 13-3. They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they qualified for the playoffs and went on to play in the Super Bowl, where they lost by just four points L (17-21) to the Giants. It was the seventh Super Bowl trip in franchise history, and the fifth for head coach Bill Belichick and quarterback Tom Brady.

The Patriots continued superiority came through again this season as they were the only 2011 division winner that had won their division the previous season. As noted, in a heartbreaking defeat, The Patriots lost in the Super Bowl to the New York Giants by a score of 21-17.

Without a victory this year, the Patriots tied what was then an NFL record for most losses in a Super Bowl. This record had been set by the Minnesota Vikings and tied by the Denver Broncos and Buffalo Bills, each of whom had lost four.

With the loss, along with losses in 1985, 1996, and 2007, the Patriots tied with the Denver Broncos, Buffalo Bills and Minnesota Vikings for most Super Bowl losses at four (although the Broncos would lose their fifth against the Seattle Seahawks two years later).

At Miami in the season opener on September 12, the Patriots defeated the Dolphins W (38–24) at Sun Life Stadium. At home on Sept 18, the Patriots beat the San Diego Chargers W (35–21) in Gillette Stadium. At Buffalo on Sept 25, the Bills defeated the Patriots L (31–34) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. At Oakland, on Oct 2, the Patriots defeated the Raiders W (31–19) at the Coliseum.

At home on Oct 9, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (30–21) in Gillette Stadium. At home on Oct 16, the Patriots defeated the Dallas Cowboys W (20–16) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct23, there was a bye. Then, after the rest, on at Pittsburgh on October 30 the Steelers beat the Patriots L (17–25) at Heinz Field. At home on Nov 6, the New York Giants beat the New England Patriots L (20–24) in Gillette Stadium.

At New York on Nov 13, the Patriots beat the Jets W (37–16) at MetLife Stadium. At home on Nov 21 the Patriots shellacked the Kansas City Chiefs W (34–3) in Gillette Stadium. At Philadelphia, on Nov 27, the Patriots beat the Eagles W (38–20) at Lincoln Financial Field. At home on Dec 4, the Patriots beat the Indianapolis Colts W (31–24) in Gillette Stadium.

At Washington, on Dec 11, the Patriots defeated the Redskins W (34–27) at FedEx Field. At Denver on Dec 18, the Patriots shipped the Broncos W (41–23) in Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium. At home, on Dec 24, the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins W (27–24) in Gillette Stadium. At home on Jan 1 in the final game of the season, the Patriots scorched the Buffalo Bills W (49–21) in Gillette Stadium. The Patriots finished with a 13-3 record and 1st in the AFC East.

This divisional playoff game began at 8:00 PM on January 14, 2012 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 24 °F, partly cloudy and cold. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 13-3 regular season record, the Patriots walloped the Denver Broncos W (45-10).

Clearly this game could have been subtitled as The Tom Brady Show as this All-Pro-QB really put on a show for America. He tied an NFL playoff record by throwing six touchdown passes in a playoff game. He tied a number of all-time greats in this great showing—such as Daryle Lamonica's six scores in the Oakland Raiders' 1969 Divisional round victory over the Houston Oilers and Steve Young's six scores in Super Bowl XXIX over San Diego.

Brady's five touchdowns in the first half tied an NFL playoff record with Sid Luckman, Lamonica, Joe Montana, Kurt Warner, Kerry Collins, and Peyton Manning. Brady also showed position versatility as he punted the ball on third down late in the fourth quarter. pinning the Broncos inside their own 10-yard line. There was a controversy after the punt as a brief brawl erupted between the two teams.

A week after his dramatic Wild Card overtime victory over the Steelers, Tim Tebow was sacked five times and limited to 136 passing yards and 13 rushing yards; at halftime, Tebow had fewer completions (three) than Brady had touchdowns (six).

With the win, the Patriots improved to 14–3 for the 19-game season including playoffs. In addition to Brady's record-tying six touchdowns. Rob Gronkowski set a club record with three touchdown catches in a playoff game, breaking the 1986 record of two by Stanley Morgan. Gronkowski became only the second tight end with three touchdowns in an NFL postseason game. The win was also the first Patriots playoff win (in three tries) over the Broncos and the first two-game sweep of Denver by the Patriots since their 1964 AFL season.

This AFC Championship game began at 3:00 PM on January 22, 2012 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 29 °F, cloudy and cold. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 13-3 regular season record, the Patriots played a close match with the Baltimore Ravens, winning the contest W (23-20).

Compared to the Division Championship, there was not a lot of action, but the results were good for the Patriots, nonetheless. As the game got underway, following two Ravens punts and a Patriots punt the Patriots mounted a drive by grinding out a 13-play 50-yard drive. It ended with a Stephen Gostkowski field goal.

The Ravens tied the game after a Ladarius Webb interception followed by Billy Cundiff's 20-yard field goal. Then, there was a BenJarvus Green-Ellis rushing score, a six-yard Joe Flacco touchdown to Dennis Pitta, and another Gostkowski field goal left which overall put the Pats ahead 13–10 at the half.

Following a third Gostkowski field goal, the Ravens grabbed the lead at 17–16 lead on a 29-yard Torrey Smith touchdown catch and run straddling the right sideline without stepping out. Danny Woodhead fumbled the next kickoff, and this prompted another Cundiff field goal. Nothing big was happening but inches of scores were going up on the board.

Then, New England clawed their way back to the lead on a 10-play 67-yard drive ending with Tom Brady leaping in from the one-yard line. Brandon Spikes intercepted Flacco at midfield but the Pats coughed up the ball as Brady was intercepted in the Ravens end zone just one play later by Jimmy Smith.

The Ravens missed a chance to score on 4th and 6 at the Patriots 33yard line, but did not get it in. Then, they got the ball back with 1:44 to go in the game. Lee Evans nearly caught a TD, but Sterling Moore swatted the ball right out of his hands in the end zone. The Ravens got another chance at Pay dirt 11 seconds to go. Cundiff took another shot at a field goal of 32-yards and his attempt sailed wide left, effectively ending the game.

During the second half Rob Gronkowski suffered an ankle injury on a tackle by Bernard Pollard of the Ravens. Pollard had a record of putting Patriots on the disabled list. He injured Brady in his 2008 season in Kansas City, and also had injured Wes Welker during week 17 of the 2009 season with the Houston Texans. Later in an interview with KILT radio in Houston. Pollard said he was "fine and dandy" with being called a "Patriots killer."

This win was Brady's fifth success in six AFC Championship Games and the first Patriots playoff win that was decided on a missed FGA since the club's 2006 Divisional playoff win against San Diego.



New York claims second Super Bowl win in five seasons





Tom Brady left the field after losing Super Bowl XLVI.

INDIANAPOLIS - The Giants did it again.

There was no perfect season on the line this time, but the Giants still ended the Patriots' season in heartbreak for the second time in as many Super Bowl meetings, winning Super Bowl XLVI, 21-17, for the fourth NFL championship in franchise history.

A spectacular 38-yard Eli Manning-to-Mario Manningham sideline pass with three and a half minutes to play set New York on its way to the game-winning score. A short time later, the Patriots' defense let running back Ahmad Bradshaw score the game-winning touchdown with their eyes on giving Tom Brady as much time as possible to lead the team to a miracle finish.

That finish never came. A last-gasp end zone heave for Aaron Hernandez bounced around and then fell to the Navy-painted turf, setting the Giants sprinting toward one another in celebration and a hail of confetti swirling into the air at Lucas Oil Stadium.

"We just came up a little bit short there," Patriots coach Bill Belichick said. "That's all there is to say."



Said Giants coach Tom Coughlin, "All of the people really did a tremendous job. We had a couple penalties that I thought took points off the board. We got into halftime and I said, 'We can play better than this.' They agreed."

Manning was able to claim his second title and second Super Bowl MVP award in the house that his older brother, Peyton, built as the quarterback of the Indianapolis Colts.

Brady fell to 3-2 in Super Bowls.

"I said after the game that I'll keep coming to this game and keep trying," Brady said. "Hopefully we'll be back."

But the night belonged to Eli and a Giants team that began training camp with one motto: finish.

New York pulled off six must-win games – its final two games of the regular season, which got them into the playoffs as the NFC East champion and the number-four seed in the conference – plus four postseason victories to do just what they set out to do when camp kicked off in late July.

After allowing Bradshaw to score, Brady got the ball at his own 20-yard line with 57 seconds to play, and the Patriots had one timeout. His intended receivers – Deion Branch and Hernandez – had their hands on his first two passes but couldn't pull them in, and Brady was sacked on third down.

He linked up with Branch for a 19-yard gain on fourth down, keeping hope alive. An 11-yard completion to Hernandez followed, then a spike to kill the clock. Brady and Branch missed on a pass on third down, and then came the failed Hail Mary.

Things got off to a less than auspicious start for New England, at least offensively: after three straight tackles for loss, including two Eli Manning sacks, to force the Giants to punt, Tom Brady found his unit pinned just six yards from the goal line.

"We got into halftime and I said, 'We can play better than this.'

They agreed." Tom Coughlin, on his halftime message to his players

On their first snap, with Nate Solder on the field as an extra blocker, Brady was pressured through the middle and launched the ball down

the center of the field. No one – not any Patriots and not any Giants - was close to being on the receiving end of the throw.

Flag. Intentional grounding. Safety. 2-0 Giants lead.

It was the sixth safety in Super Bowl history, and the first time since Super Bowl IX that the game's opening points came on a safety.

The Giants got the ball back and upped their lead, with one error by the New England defense inside the red zone helping their cause: Victor Cruz was stripped on a 4-yard reception by Sterling Moore and Brandon Spikes pounced on the loose ball.

But a "12 men on the field" flag negated the turnover and gave New York a fresh set of downs—11 yards from the end zone.

On second down, Manning zipped the ball in to Cruz for the touchdown and a 9-0 advantage for the Giants 12 minutes into the game.

At that point, the Giants had run 20 offensive plays to just one for the Patriots.

Unlike some weeks toward the end of the regular season, when New England dug itself sizable holes before successfully climbing out, the nine-point hole was as deep as it would get.

On the team's second possession, Brady found the reliable Branch for a 15-yard gain on third-and-4, which was followed by a 19-yard catch-and-run by Wes Welker. The Patriots got inside the red zone, but on third down, defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul got the first of his two batted balls in the first half, and they had to settle for a 29yard field goal from Stephen Gostkowski to cut it to 9-3.

The Giants punted on their third and fourth drives, though New England went three-and-out on their possession in between. Steve Weatherford's second punt of the night was a gem, bouncing at the 4-yard line and then flying out of bounds.

No matter for Brady, who engineered a scoring drive even though he was forced back even further when left guard Logan Mankins was called for a false start on the first play. But then gains of five and three yards by Welker and BenJarvus Green-Ellis got them out of danger, and then Brady hit Rob Gronkowski for a 20-yard gain. The tight end was backpedaling as he made his catch and was taken down by two Giants.

But he got up and showed no ill effects of his ankle sprain suffered against the Ravens two weeks earlier.

Another penalty on the offensive line, a hold by Brian Waters, took a nice pickup on a screen to Danny Woodhead off the board. Brady relied on Woodhead and Hernandez during the drive, and Woodhead finished it with a four-yard touchdown reception.

Brady had good protection on the scoring pass, moved to his right and then back to his left before he found a pretty open Woodhead to give New England a 10-9 lead heading into halftime.

By virtue of deferring after winning the coin toss to start the game, the Patriots increased their lead from one point to eight quickly in the opening minutes of the third quarter.

Receiver Chad Ochocinco, who was one of four Patriots with 10 or more years in the NFL who were playing in the Super Bowl for the first time, got his moment on the first pass of the half, when he and Branch were the only receivers on the field and Brady found him on the left sideline for a 21-yard gain.

A long run from Green-Ellis put them well into Giants' territory, and Green-Ellis picked up four yards on third-and-1 a few plays later, giving the Patriots first down from the 20. On second-and-short, Brady found Hernandez, who took the ball into the end zone.

The Giants posted field goals on their next two drives while New England was unable to score, pulling to within two points.

Manningham made the difference: With 3:46 left and the Giants on their 12-yard line, Manning targeted Manningham at the 50. He

needed to get New York away from its end zone, to get the team closer to a score.

Patrick Chung and Sterling Moore were on the coverage, but Manning snuck the ball in where Manningham could catch it and stay in bounds.

By that point, Manningham was ready, was waiting, to be the one to make the play. The Giants trailed, 17-15, with time dwindling. So, he and Cruz discussed the fact that someone had to do something.

"One of us is going to have to make a big play," Manningham said. "We didn't know when, though. So, you bite your tongue, be patient, and know the ball is going to come to you."

He felt no pressure. And then it happened. The ball came to him, and he made the play, he got his feet down. And though the play was challenged by the Patriots, it stood up on replay.

"Eli just threw a perfect ball," Manningham said. "I knew I had my feet in. But I just didn't know if the refs were going to try some funny stuff."

And Manningham downplayed any similarity to the Tyree situation. His catch wasn't as difficult, he said, wasn't as important, wasn't as big. His catch wasn't the one from four years ago.

"It was just a catch. I didn't catch it like this," Manningham said, mimicking Tyree's reception. "We work on that all the time, man, the sideline catch, a fade. We work on our footwork all the time."

The Giants picked up on the fact that that pass might be open to them throughout the game. And so, at that point, they went for it. They thought it might just work against the Cover-2 that the Patriots were playing.

"It took great concentration because it was over the shoulder, and to be able to know that he had to keep his feet in because it was right along the sideline," offensive coordinator Kevin Gilbride said. "He not only had to catch the ball, keep his feet in bounds, he was going

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to hold onto the ball right after he got hit. So, it was a tremendous play by him."

He had been waiting for that, knowing he was capable of such a catch. He had been listening to his mother's message all season. And he came through.

"You've just got to be patience, got to find it deep in yourself," Manningham said. "Just look at something positive, be patient. You don't know when the ball is going to come to you."

When two teams play in a winner-takes all match, unfortunately it is true that somebody also loses.

2012 Bill Belichick #14

The 2012 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-third season of professional football and their forty-third season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his thirteenth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 12-4. They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they qualified for the playoffs. They first won the AFC Divisional Playoffs against the Texans 41–28, and then in the AFC Championship, they lost to the Ravens 13–28, and again, the Patriots missed the big dance, the rings, and the sweet cigars. But soon again!

The Patriots broke the record for first downs in a season, with 444, and they finished third all-time in scoring, with 557 points, finishing only behind the 2011 Green Bay Packers and their previous 2007 record setting season. Additionally, this was the third consecutive season that the Patriots exceeded 500 points scored, which tied the record set by the 1999–2001 St. Louis Rams.

In the season opener at Tennessee on September 9, the Patriots womped the Titans W (34–13) at LP Field. At home on Sept 16, the Arizona Cardinals beat the Patriots by two points L (18–20) in Gillette Stadium. At Baltimore on Sept 23, in a one-point contest, the Ravens beat the Patriots L (30–31) at M&T Bank Stadium. Then, at Buffalo, on Sept 30, the Patriots delivered a big wallop to the Bills W (52–28) in a shootout at Ralph Wilson Stadium.

At home, the Patriots defeated the Denver Broncos W (31–21) at Gillette Stadium. At Seattle, on Oct 14, the Seahawks beat the Patriots in a one-point match L (23–24) at CenturyLink Field. Then, at home, on Oct 21. In OT, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (29–26) in Gillette Stadium. Then, in Wembley Stadium in London England, on Oct 28, the Patriots smashed the St. Louis Rams W (45–7) In Week 9 on Nov4, the team drew a bye.

At home on Nov 11, New England beat Buffalo W (37–31) in Gillette Stadium. At home again on Nov 18, the Patriots thumped the Indianapolis Colts W (59–24) in Gillette Stadium. At New York on Nov 22, the Patriots lambasted the Jets W (49–19) at MetLife

Stadium. Then, on Dec 2 at Miami, the Patriots beat the Dolphins W (23–16) at Sun Life Stadium.

At home on Dec 10, New England hammered Houston W (42–14) in Gillette Stadium. On Dec 16, the San Francisco 49ers beat the Patriots L (34–41) in Gillette Stadium. On Dec 23 at Jacksonville, the Patriots defeated the Jaguars W (23–16) at EverBank Field. Then in the season-ender at home, on Dec 30, the Patriots shut-out the Miami Dolphins W (28–0) in Gillette Stadium. The Patriots record was 12-4 and they would win the Divisional Championship playoffs and then compete in the Conference Championship.

This divisional playoff game began at 4:30 PM on January 13, 2012 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 51 °F, cloudy and mild. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the Patriots overwhelmed the Texans in this game W (41-28.

Daniel Manning took off like a bullet and returned the game's opening kickoff 94 yards to the Patriots 12. The Texans could not get it in the end-zone after a 3-yard run by Foster, and back-to-back incompletions forced. So, they settled for a 27-yard field goal by Shayne Graham. This gave them their early 3-0 lead. After a Patriots three-and-out, the Texans drove to the Patriots 45, but were stopped cold and forced to punt.

It was three possessions later that the Patriots finally got to work and their work got them on the board. They marched 65 yards in 6 plays, scoring on Vereen's 1-yard touchdown run. The Texans then drove

deep into their own territory on their next drive but were forced to punt. The Patriots responded by driving all the way to the Texans 19, and took a 10-3 lead on Gostkowski's 37-yard field goal.

With the Patriots up 10-3, the Texans drove to the Patriots 43, but got stuck and punted. The Patriots made them pay for the punt by mounting a drive that put up 80 yards in 7 plays. The Pats scored on an 8-yard TD catch by Vereen, increasing their lead to 17-3. On that drive, the highlight was a 47-yard catch by Welker, which gave him a new franchise record for postseason catches (59). On the play, he eclipsed the legend Troy Brown.

Manning returned the following kickoff 35 yards to the Texans 38. A highly aggressive horse-collar tackle gave the Texans a first down on the Patriots 47. The Texans did not muff this opportunity. Instead, they spent just 5 plays to strike on Foster's 1-yard touchdown run, bringing the deficit to 17-10 with just over a minute left in the first half. After forcing the Patriots to a quick three-and-out, the Texans again were threatening—this time at the Patriots 37. Graham nailed a 55-yard field goal, bringing the score to 17-13 at halftime.

New England regretted how the first half had ended and they took over in the second half. Slater took the 2nd half kickoff 19 yards to the Patriots 31. From there the Patriots fully engaged in a 69-yard march in 7 plays, which ended with an 8-yard touchdown run by Ridley. This put the Patriots up by 11, 24-13.

The Texans threatened as soon as they got the ball back driving deep into Patriots territory, to the 37. It was for naught as Schaub was intercepted by Ninkovich at the 31. It took the Patriots under three minutes to go the 63 yards, scoring on Lloyd's 5-yard touchdown catch, making the lead 31-13.

This toss was Brady's 40th career TD pass in the postseason, making him only the third pro player to reach such a milestone in the postseason. The Texans got to their own 23 on the next drive. However, on 4th-and-1, Schaub through a long but incomplete pass.

The Pats took over and then Brady hit Vereen on a 33-yard touchdown pass. It was Vereen's third touchdown of the game, putting the game away with a 38-13 score. That's all she wrote.

This was the 5th 300-yard postseason game for Brady and Vereen tied Curtis Martin and Gronkowski with three touchdowns in a playoff game. Manning continued his great returning with a 69-yard return to the Patriots 37. Five plays later, Schaub hit DeVier Posey on a 25-yard touchdown pass, trimming the deficit to 38-20, but it was already too late; but nobody had told the Texans.

After a Patriots punt, the Texans marched 73 yards in 11 plays, scoring on Schaub's 1-yard touchdown pass to Foster on 4th-and-Goal. They followed this with a successful two-point conversion. Now the difference was just 38-28 with 5:11 left and the Patriots had gone flat. Texas now had a chance, but Ninkovich recovered the ensuing onside kick and New England sucked the clock dry all the way down to 1:14, when Gostkowski kicked a 38-yard field goal, lifting the score to 41-28.

The Texans still thought they could pull the game out. They drove to the Patriots 41, but the clock ran out right after Schaub hit Daniels for a 9-yard gain. They put up a good fight.

Tom Brady was outstanding as usual and he became the winningest quarterback in NFL playoff history with his 17th postseason win. This win broke a tie with legendary Joe Montana. Besides that, record, it was also the 450th victory (regular season and playoffs) in franchise history.

This Conference Championship Game began at 6:30 PM on January 20, 2010 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The

weather was 41 °F, clear and windy. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the New England Patriots were overpowered by the Baltimore Ravens in this game L (13-28).

The win against the Texans in the Division Championship moved the Patriots into the AFL-AFC Title Game for the tenth time in franchise history. It would be the ninth under the AFC banner and a rematch of the 2011 title game (as well as a rematch of the week 3 encounter with the Baltimore Rayens.

Just as they had the previous season, the Patriots faced the Ravens at home for the right to represent the AFC in the Super Bowl. The Patriots lead 13–7 in the first half; but were shut out for the second half by the Ravens. With the loss, the Patriots concluded their season with a record of 13–5 overall and dropped to 1–2 against the Ravens during the postseason (all 3 playoff meetings have occurred at Gillette Stadium). This would also be the first time Tom Brady would lose a home game after leading at halftime.

2013 Bill Belichick #14

The 2013 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-fourth season of professional football and their forty-fourth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his fourteenth of nineteen seasons (sofar). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 12-4 for the second year in a row and the team grabbed the #2 seed for the 2nd year in a row along with a first round playoff bye for the fourth year in a row.

They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they qualified for the playoffs. They first won the AFC Divisional Playoffs against the Colts W (43–22), and then in the AFC Championship, they lost to the Broncos L (16-26), and again, the Patriots missed the big dance, the rings, and the sweet cigars. But soon again! How about the next year?

In the season opener at Buffalo on September 8, 2013, the Patriots squeezed out a W 23–21 win against the Bills at Ralph Wilson Stadium. On September 12 in the home opener, the Patriots beat the

New York Jets W (13–10) at Gillette Stadium. At home again on Sept 22, the Patriots defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers W (23–3) in Gillette Stadium. At Atlanta on Sept 29 for the fourth win in a row with no losses, the Patriots beat the Falcons W (30–23) at the Georgia Dome.

At Cincinnati on Oct 6, the Bengals defeated the Patriots L (6–13) at Paul Brown Stadium. On Oct 13, in OT, the New Orleans Saints were taken down by the New England Patriots W (30–27) in Gillette Stadium. At New York, on Oct 20, in OT, the Jets beat the Pats L (27–30) at MetLife Stadium. At home on October 27, New England's Patriots defeated Miami's Dolphins W (27–17) in Gillette Stadium.

On Nov 3, in a shootout at home, the Patriots defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers W (55–31) in Gillette Stadium. On Nov 10, there was a bye week. Then, at Carolina on Nov 18, the Panthers beat the Patriots L (20–24) in Bank of America Stadium. At home on Nov 24 in OT, the Patriots beat the Denver Broncos W (34–31(in Gillette Stadium. At Houston on Dec 1, the Patriots defeated the Texans W (34–31) in Reliant Stadium.

At home on Dec 8, in a one-point match, the Patriots got the best of the Cleveland Browns W (27–26) in Gillette Stadium. At Miami on Dec 15, the Dolphins beat the Patriots L (20–24) at Sun Life Stadium. At Baltimore, on Dec 22, the Patriots smashed the Ravens W (41–7) at M&T Bank Stadium. At home for the season finale at Gillette Stadium, on Dec 29 the Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills W (34–20).

The Patriots record was a healthy 12-4 and they would make the playoffs and they would win the Divisional Championship playoffs. Ten, they would compete in the Conference Championship.

At Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts

This divisional playoff game began at 8:15 PM on January 11, 2014 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 57 °F, rainy and windy. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the Patriots overwhelmed the Colts in this game W (43-22).

The Patriots are such a phenomenal team even though they may not register number one in the NFL each year, they get their share of #1 finishes. If there were no playoffs, it would be difficult declare a number one other than the Patriots once you see them play. I have watched the Boston Patriots and now the New England Patriots play in the archives and the recent record books from the 1960 Boston Patriots. I admit that I am impressed. Anybody who is honest with themselves feels the same. The Patriots are impressive and with Bill Belichick and Tom Brady teaming up on the unsuspecting teams in the NFL, it is not a fair game.

Starting in the next season about which I report in this book, you will find a team that recovers from two Conference Playoff losses in a row, and undaunted, goes ahead and wins two out of the next three Super Bowls, and then qualifies for a third Super Bowl in 2017, only to be beaten in a miracle game in favor of the Philadelphia Eagles. Who knows what is going to happen in 2018? I am expecting that it will be very exciting and that any team facing a Patriot team had better watch out on every play as the Patriots are about as good as it gets in football.

Some pundits have reported that in these games in 2014, the Patriots punched their own ticket through excellence to their 3rd straight AFC Championship game in a 43–22 dominating victory over the rival Colts.

The Patriots are always ready to play even if the result of the play does not reflect the coach's planning and the intended execution. You may know that in the week leading up to the AFC Division round matchup, the Patriots made their game-plan crystal clear. Their mission was to take advantage of the Colt's questionable run defense by using a healthy dose of their three threats out of the backfield: Legarrette Blount, Stevan Ridley and Shane Vereen.

This game-plan was in two words, "extremely effective," as New England scored six touchdowns on the ground in this game. Blount set a franchise postseason record by scoring four of the six TD's. Having played a little football myself, and never wanting to fully (100%) sacrifice myself to make the play, (Sorry, I am a writer!), I can appreciate why there is nobody on any team that enjoys going after the construction-size-machine and being bulldozed by Legarrette Blount. What a machine! What a gift to have such a player on the Patriots squad.

The three backs combined for 235 yards rushing, 166 coming from Blount alone, also a franchise postseason record. The Patriot defense was exemplary, picking off Andrew Luck four times, sacking him three times and relatively shutting down star wide receiver T.Y. Hilton for the majority of the game, although he did finish with 103 yards on four receptions. Checking the final tally folks, the Patriots had the higher score.

Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium

This Conference Championship Game began at 3:00 PM on January 19, 2014 at Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium in Denver Colorado. The weather was 63 °F, sunny There was a packed house of 77,110 at this Denver home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the New England Patriots were overpowered by the Denver Broncos in this game L (16-26).

The Patriots had been doing so well since Belichick and Brady had combined to become the torment of the rest of the NFL, this year was the first since 2006, in which the Patriots regular season record caused them to play on the road in the playoffs. Incidentally, this was also the last time they faced Peyton Manning when he was with the Indianapolis Colts.

The story was all about Denver in this playoff game as their offense racked up 507 yards without turning the ball over or giving up any sacks. The Broncos forgot that they were playing what I have become to think of as the invincible Patriots. The Broncos took no prisoners and advanced to their seventh Super Bowl in franchise history. They were annoyed about a week 12 defeat to New England in which the Patriots rallied from a 24–0 halftime deficit to come up with the "W."

Peyton Manning loved to win every game as much as the Patriots loved to win every game. Peyton set a conference championship record with 32 completions for 400 yards and two touchdowns. The team also got a standout performance from receiver Demaryius Thomas. He plugged into Manning for seven passes accounting for 134 yards and a touchdown.

Kicker Matt Prater had done more than just suited up for the game. He pumped in four field goals. The win was not at all satisfying for Bill Belichick. However, it was especially satisfying for Denver head coach John Fox, who lost to Tom Brady and Bill Belichick in Super Bowl XXXVIII 10 years earlier when he was with the Carolina Panthers. Sores in the mind do not heal well even as time passes.

Midway through the first quarter, the older Manning, Peyton got the Broncos ready to score with an 18-yard completion to Knowshon Moreno, a 29-yard pass to Thomas, and a 19-yarder to Eric Decker.

Prater finished the drive with a 27-yard field goal to put the team up 3–0.

The next time that the Broncos had the ball, they moved 93 yards in 15 plays on a drive that took up nearly half the second quarter. It was not easy as when they faced third and 10 from the Patriots' 39-yard line, they worked to get yardage such as making the conversion with a 28-yard draw play by Moreno. In this series, Manning eventually got the team into the end zone with a 1-yard pass to tight end Jacob Tamme, making the score 10–0.

Having two future legends in this game made it especially interesting for the fans. Some consider both Brady and Manning current-day legends with no more record additions necessary. In this game, however, New England managed to respond. Brady completed a 27-yard pass to receiver Aaron Dobson on the first play of the next drive. This 27-yarder was Brady's longest completion of the game.

The Patriots pursuit of the goal line eventually got them to the Broncos' 18-yard line. However, Denver lineman Robert Ayers sacked Brady for an 11-yard loss on third down, forcing the Pats to settle for a perfect Stephen Gostkowski's 47-yard field goal. A TD would have been nice.

Denver then took the ball back and drove for more Bronco points, as Peyton Manning hooked up with Thomas for a pair of completions that moved the chains 53 yards. Prater was ready and when he came in, he finished things off with a 35-yard field goal. This gave Denver a 13–3 lead with 25 seconds left in the half. The whistle blew, and everybody got a half-time rest.

Denver got its aces together and scored on a long touchdown drive that took up over seven minutes. They were not about to give up the ball as they advanced the pigskin 80 yards in 13 plays. Peyton Manning enjoyed completing seven of his eight passes for 59 yards of gained yardage on the drive. He found the Broncos on the three-yard line. So, his last TD toss to Thomas that increased Denver's lead to 20–3 was just 3-yards into pay dirt.

New England was not ready to hand in the towel. They responded with a drive to the Broncos' 29-yard line. However, when there was a fourth down and 2-yards, conversion attempt, despite the desire of the Patriots O-line. Tom Brady took a sack for a 10-yard loss. The Broncos cheered defensive tackle Terrance Knighton. Denver then took over and set up a drive for more points that no Patriot fan was interested in seeing.

Manning would not quit and so he got his accuracy gun out and completed two passes to tight end Julius Thomas for 28 yards and he also tossed a completion to Demaryius Thomas for 30. New England was pleased at the time to manage to halt the drive at their own 1, but Prater kicked his third field goal to rub some more salt into an already festering would as Denver went up 23–3.

New England was not out of the game, and so they finally scored a touchdown with just over nine minutes left in the fourth quarter. Starting the drive with an 18-yard pass to tight end Michael Hoomanawanui, Brady followed it up with completions to Austin Collie and Julian Edelman for gains of 20 and 16 yards.

He eventually completed the drive with a 7-yard touchdown pass to Edelman, cutting the score to 23–10. However, Denver scored again with their next possession, with Manning's 37-yard completion to Julius Thomas setting up Prater's fourth field goal, this one from 54 yards.

New England went on to face a 26–10 deficit with seven minutes left in regulation. Tom Brady took charge of this swan-song 2014 game and completed five of seven passes for 54 yards on their next drive, and then Tom Brady took the ball into the end zone himself on a 5-yard run.

However, their two-point conversion attempt failed. And, so, the score stayed 26–16. Then after Decker recovered New England's onside kick, Denver managed to run the final 3:07 off the clock with their last drive. The Pats could not get the ball back and thus this lost was assured.

Tom Brady finished his day 24-for-38 for 277 yards and a touchdown. He also had two carries for seven yards and a score on

the ground. Edelman was on the mark for the day, catching 10 passes for 89 yards and a touchdown. Thomas had eight receptions for 85 yards for Denver, while Decker had five catches for 73.

No matter how well every Patriot played, the element of luck was missing, and there was more than a regular performance needed to suck this game out of the coffers of the Denver Broncos. Looking through hindsight, I bet that no matter who lines up as an opponent of the Patriots during the playoffs in the next year, nobody will beat the fantastabulous New England Patriots for the Super Bowl trophy package. No way! No how! See if I am right by reading about the next season under Bill Belichick.

The 2014 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-fifth season of professional football and their forty-fifth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his fifteenth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 12-4 for the third year in a row and the team grabbed the #1 seed for the 2nd year in a row along with a first round playoff bye for the fifth year in a row. The bye for five years in a row, was the first such occurrence for any team since the league switched to a 12-team playoff format in 1990. They finished fourth overall in the NFL in scoring (468 points) and eighth in points allowed (313), and first in point differential (with an average margin of victory of 9.7 points).

This was a year of firsts and bests. They finished first in the AFC East Division, and they naturally qualified for the playoffs. They first won their sixth straight AFC Divisional Title in the playoffs against the Colts W (35-31), and then in the AFC Championship, they pounded the Indianapolis Colts W (45-7), and this time, the Patriots were invited to the big dance, The Super Bowl, with the rings, and the sweet cigars. In Super Bowl XLIX, the Patriots won a hard-fought battle against former Pats coach Pete Carrol's Seattle Seahawks, W (28-24) This great win gave New England their fourth championship in franchise history.

We present a newspaper article from the Boston Globe depicting just how the Patriots won the Super Bowl. To whet your appetite, it helps to remember that after tying the game 14–14 at halftime and falling behind ten points in the third quarter, the Patriots rallied in the final quarter of the game to secure a 28–24 lead. For you avid writers out there, in this season and this Super Bowl Victory, that is all she wrote.

In the season opener at Miami on September 7, 2014, the Dolphins defeated the Patriots L (20–33) at Sun Life Stadium. At Minnesota on Sept 14, the Patriots squashed the Vikings W (30–7) at TCF Bank Stadium. In the home opener on Sept 21, the New England Patriots defeated the Oakland Raiders W (16–9) in Gillette Stadium. Then, on Sept 29 at Kansas City, the Chiefs slammed the Patriots L (14–41) at Arrowhead Stadium.

On Oct 5, at home, New England pounded Cincinnati W (43–17) in Gillette Stadium. At Buffalo on Oct 12, the Patriots beat the Bills W (37–22) at Ralph Wilson Stadium. On Oct 16, at home, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (27–25) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct 26, at home, the Patriots overpowered the Chicago Bears W (51–23) in Gillette Stadium. Then on Nov 2 at home, New England thumped Denver W (43–21) in Gillette Stadium. On Nov 9, week 10, the team drew a bye.

At Indianapolis on Nov 16, the Patriots whipped the Colts W (42–20) in Lucas Oil Stadium. On Nov 23, at home, the Patriots whooped the Detroit Lions W (34–9) in Gillette Stadium. At Green Bay on Nov 30, the Packers beat the Patriots L 21–26 in (Lambeau Field). On Dec 7 at San Diego, New England defeated the Chargers W (23–14) at Qualcomm Stadium.

On Dec 14, at home, the Patriots scorched the Miami Dolphins W (41–13) in Gillette Stadium. At New York, in a one-point match, on Dec 21, the Pats nosed out the Jets W (17–16) in MetLife Stadium. In the final game of a successful season, the Patriots ended with a loss at home on Dec 28 against the Buffalo Bills L (9–17) in Gillette Stadium.

At Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts

This divisional playoff game began at 4:35 PM on January 10, 2015 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 20 °F, clear, windy, and cold. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriots home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the Patriots squeaked by the Ravens in this game W (35-21).

Nothing in life worth having is easy. And, so it was not easy for the Patriots in this first playoff game on the way to another destiny season. Never fully in control but never fully out of control of this flip-flop game, the Patriots could have seen this encounter go either way, but the Patriots finally came through and simply outplayed the Ravens and grabbed the win.

The Pats became just the third NFL team to wipe-out two 14-point deficits to win a game (the last to do it was the 2003 Chiefs) and the first to pull off the feat in a playoff game, rallying from down 14–0 and 28–14 to win 35–31. Tom Brady lived up to his billing again as he threw for three touchdowns and ran in a fourth.

After the opening kickoff, the Ravens zipped 71 yards in under three minutes to take a 7–0 lead. Joe Flacco was on target hitting rookie wide receiver Kamar Aiken on a 19-yard TD pass. After a Patriots three-and-out, Flacco took the Ravens down the field once again. This time, the drive covered 79 yards in exactly six minutes. Flacco capped it off with a 9-yard touchdown pass to Steve Smith. Out of nowhere, Baltimore surprisingly had a 14-0 lead.

The Patriots came right back on their next drive. They were assisted by a 46-yard pass to Gronkowski. The Patriots drove 78 yards culminating in 8 plays with Brady tucking and running in for a 4yard TD. During this TD run, Tom Brady tied Curtis Martin's club record for rushing touchdowns in the playoffs with less than a minute remaining in the first quarter.

Midway through the second quarter, New England took off on a 67yard drive that consumed just three-and-a half minutes to tie the game at 14-14. It was a 15-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Danny Amendola. A 23-yard completion to Gronkowski earlier on the drive gave Brady 6,595 career passing yards in the postseason, a new NFL record. The touchdown pass gave him 44 touchdown passes in the playoffs, tying him with Brett Favre with second behind only Montana (who has 45).

After the Ravens clocked in and out with a three-and-out, there was just over a minute remaining in the first half. The Pats got the ball back and Brady was intercepted by Ravens linebacker Daryl Smith at the Ravens 43. On 2nd-and-10 from the Patriots 44, Flacco threw incomplete for Steve Smith, but Revis was flagged for illegal contact. This action gave the Ravens a first at the Patriots 24. Three plays later, Flacco hit tight end Owen Daniels for a touchdown putting the Ravens on top 21–14 with 10 seconds left in the half. Brady took a knee to end the half.

Amendola got the 2nd half kick-off and took it 28 yards to the Patriots 26, but the Pats were forced to punt after a Brady to Gronkowski incompletion. Sometimes what does not happen is significant. On this play there was a controversial pass interference no-call on Ravens rookie linebacker C. J. Mosley. The Ravens took advantage of the no-call and drove 70 yards with Flacco throwing a 16-yard touchdown pass to Ravens running back Justin Forsett out of the backfield. It was Flacco's fourth TD pass of the game and the Ravens again were ahead by 14, 28–14. This quieted the formerly raucus Patriots home crowd.

The Patriots were driven to come back. They took the ball to the Ravens 24 on their next drive. A 14-yard catch by Michael Hoomanawanui gave the Patriots a first down at the Ravens 10. Then, an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on the Ravens bench

moved the ball to the 5. Two plays later, Brady found Gronkowski for the touchdown, reducing the lead to 7 points. and tying Brady with Joe Montana for the most postseason touchdown passes.

After the kickoff, the ravens were out quickly, three-and-out, and the Patriots needed just three plays to tie the game at 28-all. On the quick drive, Brady had completions to Edelman and Vereen for 9 and 10 yards, respectively. Then, Brady he threw a lateral pass to Edelman, who then proceeded to throw a 51-yard touchdown strike to a wide-open Danny Amendola. This was Edelman's first career passing touchdown, tying the game at 28-28.

On the second play of the Ravens next drive, the Patriots snagged a turnover when McCourty intercepted Flacco at the Ravens 37. The Pats could not move the ball, and they chose to punt rather than attempt a 55-yard field goal.

The Ravens took off like inspiration incarnated. They zipped down the field with just over three minutes remaining in the third quarter, to the Patriots 7, in 16 plays. On third down, Daniels dropped a pass in the end zone from Flacco, thanks to excellent coverage by Patrick Chung, who was having a great comeback season, and the Ravens settled for a 25-yard field goal from Justin Tucker, taking a 31-28 lead fairly early in the fourth quarter.

On the next drive, Brady led the Patriots down the field, with the drive finishing with a 23-yard pass to LaFell with 5:21, giving the Patriots their first lead of the game, 35-31. With the pass, Brady set a new NFL record with 46 career postseason touchdown passes. He also set franchise single-game postseason records in passing yards (367) and completions (33).

On the next drive after the kickoff, the Ravens moved to the Patriots' 36-yard line. On 2nd-and-5, with 1:47 to go, Duron Harmon stepped in front of a Joe Flacco deep toss and took it in for the Patriots. New England took a knew three times and each time the Ravens called time-out. After the third knee and time-out, there were 14 seconds on the clock. The Patriots had to punt.

The Ravens were close enough for a Hail Mary and so it was. On the final play of the game Flacco's desperation heave was batted out of the end zone and was batted down to the ground at about the 5yard line. This confirmed the Patriots' victory and sent them to their fourth consecutive AFC Championship Game.

The game was very intense as both teams were travelling on the road to the Super Bowl. Each team was trying to place big detours in front of the other. Tempers were seen and several skirmishes between Patriot and Raven players occurred. A highly noted controversy was quite visible when Ravens coach John Harbaugh accused the Patriots of using a formation that made unclear which receivers were eligible or ineligible, thereby causing confusion on the field.

The Patriots used this "strange" formation to gain a total of over 40 yards on their game-winning drive. Brady dismissed Harbaugh's comments in his postgame press conference. The NFL sided with the Patriots and agreed that the substitutions and plays by the Patriots were legal. There were similar formations were used by the Jaguars, the Lions, and the Bengals during the season. This was a great start to the playoffs for the Patriots.

This Conference Championship Game began at 6:50 PM on January 18, 2015 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough Massachusetts. The weather was 51 °F, rain. There was a packed house of 68,756 at this Patriot home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, and the victory in the Division Playoffs, the New England Patriots soundly defeated the Indianapolis Colts in this game W (45-7).

Going into this game, the Colts were underdogs. The two teams had been like old shoes or a pair of shoes as they played so often. This would be the fourth time in just three seasons (the second time in the playoffs). The Patriots of course were looking to claim their sixth AFC Championship crown. The game conditions were not ideal with a downpour going on at Gillette. The weather gave nobody an advantage as both teams played in the same conditions.

The two teams started slowly with three-and-outs on their first drives of the game. As the Pats punted on their first drive, Josh Cribbs, the Colts return-man, muffed the punt. The ball bounced off his helmet and the Patriots' Darius Fleming recovered at the Colts 26. Five plays later, LeGarrette Montez Blount appeared to score on a 4-yard touchdown run. However, he was short. The official review showed that he was not in the end-zone. Knowing Blount as a key Pats weapon, most fans would expect, and they would get another try from Blount and this time, he did score from 1-yard out.

The Colts then put on a drive of 47 yards to the Patriots 34, but ex-Patriots Adam Vinatieri missed wide-right on his 52-yard field goal attempt. This gave the Patriots excellent field position at the Colts 47. They capitalized when Brady hit fullback James Develin for a 1 yd TD after a 30-yard catch by Vereen. The Pats had themselves a 14-0 lead after this late 10 action.

The Colts punted after the kickoff and the Patriots began another gallop. This one was 44 yards to the Colts 26. This would not be a score as D'Qwell Jackson intercepted Brady's pass at the 1-yard line and returned it six yards. This time the Colts scored after a 93-yard 10-play drive assisted by a 36-yard catch by T. Y. Hilton. The Colts got in the end zone on a 1-yard scamper by Zurlon Tipton, making the deficit 7 points at 14-7.

The Patriots began their own drive, which went on for 65 yards to the Colts 3 but were stopped and they chose to settle for a 21-yard field goal by Gostkowski. This gave the Patriots a 17-7 lead. Andrew Luck took a knee and the game went to halftime.

It had been a fairly even ballgame during the first half, but the Patriots let it loose in the second half. After the kickoff, for example, they raced 87 yards in just 9 plays, with Brady hitting left tackle Nate Solder. He set up as an eligible receiver for the play, and they snagged a 16-yard touchdown out of the action thereby increasing their lead to 24–7. It was Solder's first career reception and touchdown.

The Patriots defense shut down Colt quarterback Andrew Luck for the entire half while Tom Brady and the Patriots offense continued to roll and roll up the scoring. After a Colts three-and-out, for example, the Patriots marched 62 yards in 8 plays. Brady hit Gronkowski with a 5-yard TD pass to make the lead 31–7. After four plays. Luck was intercepted by Darrelle Revis. It was Revis' third career playoff interception, and he returned it 30 yards to the Colts 13. On the very next play, Blount smashed through for 13 yards to the end-zone, his 2nd touchdown of the night. This laid the fate of the game in cement at 38–7.

When the Colts punted again, Edelman returned it 45 yards to the Colts 45. After a penalty added 5 more yards, the ball was on the colts' 40. It took 11 plays and over six minutes for the next touchdown from such a close distance. later, Blount literally burrowed through for his third touchdown of the night. This gave him 148 rushing yards for the game, second most in franchise history. On the next drive, Jamie Collins intercepted Luck. The next three drives were all three-and-outs before the Colts ran out the final 1:51 of clock tome.

Tom Brady made a record every play, or so it seemed. He extended his NFL record of playoff starts to 28, finished 23 of 35 for 226 yards three touchdowns and 1 interception. This was Brady's 7th career playoff game with 3 touchdowns, second only to Joe Montana's 9. Blount was once again the star for the Pats against the Colts, carrying the ball 30 times, a Patriots postseason record, for 148 yard and three touchdowns.

Continuing a trend of poor play versus the Patriots, Luck completed a bottomless 12 of 33 passes for 126 yards, with no touchdowns and 2 interceptions. For his career, Andrew Luck fell to 0–4 against the Patriots, including two playoff losses. They would lose 34-27 in the

2015 season. In those four games, the Patriots outscored the Colts 189–73. Andrew Luck had little luck on Gillette Stadium, throwing 9 career interceptions in three games played at Gillette Stadium.


The Super Bowl XLIX kickoff was at 6:30 EST February 5, 2012. The weather was 66 degrees and the retractable roof was open. Led by starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichick-led NE Patriots overcame the Seattle Seahawks in a tight match 28-24 at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale Arizona. before a packed house of 70,288. After a 12-4 regular season record, the Patriots played a great match with the New York Giants, winning the contest W (28-24) in a comeback effort.

The Patriots faced the defending-Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks in Super Bowl XLIX (49) 49. For the second year in a row the Seahawks boasted the #1 ranked defense (1st against the pass, 3rd against the run). This was the Patriots' first Super Bowl appearance since 2011, when they lost to the NY Giants. This was the stadium where the 18-0 Patriots lost to the Giants in Super Bowl XLII.

Patriots rally to beat Seahawks in Super Bowl

GLENDALE, Ariz. — The last time the New England Patriots played a Super Bowl in the Arizona desert, it was a most unlikely hero who made the play of the game, a play that broke the Patriots' backs.

This time the Patriots returned to the desert for Super Bowl XLIX, and it was again a most unlikely hero who made the play of the game, this time the play that delivered Lombardi Trophy No. 4 to New England.

The Patriots beat the Seattle Seahawks, 28-24, to reclaim the title of NFL champions thanks to an end-zone interception by undrafted rookie cornerback Malcolm Butler.

The interception capped an impressive second-half comeback by the Patriots, who seemed to be in control in the first half, only to rather quickly fall behind by 10 points in the third quarter.

But the improved defense, the one lauded all season as the best New England has fielded in a decade, once again shut out the opponent in the fourth quarter and the offense regrouped from some miscues to string together two fourth-quarter touchdowns.



Improbable comeback gives Patriots 4th title

Super Bowl MVP Tom Brady set multiple records in a thrilling finish.

"I couldn't be prouder of this team," said Bill Belichick, just the second coach in NFL history to lead his team to four Super Bowl victories, joining Chuck Noll. "These guys have been counted out many times through the course of the year by a lot of people, but they always believed in themselves and just kept fighting.

"This is a great team — a great group of competitors who never gave in, never lost their will. Mentally and physically, as tough of a group as I've been around, and I've been around some. These guys are really special."

Over the final nine games of their season, dating to their Nov. 23 win over Detroit, the Patriots' defense allowed just 12 fourth-quarter points, including final-frame shutouts of the Colts in the AFC title game and the Seahawks.

Conversely, Seattle hadn't surrendered more than 7 fourthquarter points in a game since its Week 5 loss to Dallas.

"We knew it was going to be tough and we knew it was going to come down to minutes or even seconds in the ballgame because they are a great football team," defensive lineman Vince Wilfork said. "I'm a defensive guy — to win on a defensive note, that is the most amazing feeling you can have.

"I am so proud of this team, what we have done, the things we have been through, the ups and the downs, and we just stuck together."

Facing second and goal from the 1, the Seahawks made the stunning decision to pass the ball rather than hand it off to power back Marshawn Lynch. Russell Wilson (12 for 21 for 247 yards, two touchdowns, interception) threw the ball into traffic, and Butler, who a little more than a year ago was playing for West Alabama, stepped in front of the intended receiver, Ricardo Lockette, for the play of his young career.

Seattle coach Pete Carroll, whose team was trying to become the first back-to-back champion since the Patriots in 2003-04, took responsibility for the call to pass on second down, figuring they would run on third or fourth down.

Butler, who said the Patriots were the only team to offer him a contract, knew a pass was coming, crediting defensive coordinator Matt Patricia with getting his players ready.

"[Wilson] kept looking [toward the receivers], he kept his head still and just looked over there, so that gave me a clue," Butler said. "I just knew they were going to throw. My instincts, I just went with it, just went with my mind and made the play."

Butler has impressed the coaching staff and his teammates since the spring, and all of the New England defensive backs were singing his praises, saying the Mississippi native has been making plays in practice and in games since the day he arrived in Foxborough.

Butler's play came just moments after it seemed like the Patriots' championship dreams would be crushed by another miracle catch, as they were years earlier in this same building by the Giants' David Tyree.

Jermaine Kearse and Butler both rose for Wilson's sideline pass, and as both fell to the grass, the ball came down, hitting Kearse between the legs. It popped up, Kearse batted it up, and he was amazingly able to secure the ball. It never touched the ground, making it a legal reception.

"I felt like the game was on me if we lost," Butler said of Kearse's catch. "But we had another play."

Now with first and goal at the 5, Wilson handed off to Lynch, who picked up 4 yards. But on second down and just feet to the goal line, rather than give their Pro Bowl back the ball again, Seattle opted to have Wilson pass.

And there was Butler.

New England became the sixth franchise in NFL history to win at least four Super Bowls, joining the Steelers, Cowboys, Giants, Packers, and 49ers.

The Patriots also are the first team to come back from a 10-point second-half Super Bowl deficit and win.

The winning touchdown came with 2:02 to play, a 3-yard Tom Brady-to-Julian Edelman pass, Brady looking to his most trusted receiver when it mattered most. Edelman finished the game with nine receptions for 109 yards and the score.

Brady, the first quarterback to start six Super Bowls and who was chosen as the game's Most Valuable Player, set a slew of records in the win: his 37 completions (he was 37 for 50 for 328 yards, four touchdowns, and two interceptions) were a Super Bowl record; his 13 Super Bowl touchdown passes put him past his childhood idol, Joe Montana, who had 11; and he became the first quarterback in league history with 50 touchdowns in the postseason.

He is the sixth QB to throw four or more touchdowns in the Super Bowl but the first to have them go to four different receivers. Edelman, Rob Gronkowski, Danny Amendola, and Brandon LaFell were the lucky quartet.

"He's going to go down as the best quarterback to ever play this game," cornerback Darrelle Revis said of Brady. "He's clutch. He's clutch."

But Brady, who fought a cold and continued to hear questions about the team's alleged deflated footballs in the AFC Championship game all week and seemed more relieved than exhilarated when at his postgame news conference, gave the credit to every one of his teammates.

"It's just a lot of mental toughness. I think the whole team had it," he said. "Coach [Belichick] always says, 'Ignore the noise and control what you can control.' We had two great weeks of

practice; that's what it took, and every situation that came up was important.

"Every third down that we made, every short-yardage, every redarea possession. That's what we were focused on, that's who we needed to be focused on, and that's how we got the victory."

Malcolm Butler's Interception in Super Bowl XLIX against the Seahawks in 2014 goes down as one of the greatest moments in Super Bowl history.

The Seahawks and Patriots are no strangers to big games. Both teams have been contenders for the past few years and know what it takes to win.

Naturally, when they met in Super Bowl XLIX, fans expected a gridiron battle. And boy, the Patriots and Seahawks did not disappoint! In the final seconds of the game, trailing 28 – 24, Russell Wilson attempted to throw the game winning TD, only to be intercepted on the goal line by Malcolm Butler.

Regardless of the controversy surrounding the play call, Butler made an outstanding read and willed his way to yet another Patriots Super Bowl victory.

They entered the season as the defending Super Bowl Champions.

This year looked like it might be another 16-0 season. However, after going 10–0 to begin the season, the Patriots' first loss of the

season came against the Denver Broncos in overtime in Week 12 (counting the bye week). The loss seemed to have an effect on the team's production after this. The Patriots would go on to lose four of their last six games, ultimately finishing the regular season with a 12–4 record for the fourth straight year.

In Week 14, the Patriots clinched their seventh straight AFC East division title. By way of this, they tied the 1979 Los Angeles Rams for most consecutive division titles. As the second seeded team in the AFC, they did secure a first-round bye for the playoffs and home-field advantage for their first playoff game.

In the divisional round of the playoffs, the Patriots beat the Kansas City Chiefs 27–20 to advance to the AFC Championship for the fifth straight year. However, they fell on the road to the eventual Super Bowl 50 champion Denver Broncos by just two points, 20–18.

In the season and home opener on September 10, the Patriots defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers W (28–21) in Gillette Stadium. At Buffalo on Sept 20, the Patriots beat the Bills W (40–32) in Ralph Wilson Stadium. At home on Sept 27, the Patriots pummeled the Jacksonville Jaguars W (51–17) in Gillette Stadium. In week 4, there was a bye. In week 5, on Oct 11 at Dallas, the Patriots shipped the Cowboys W (30–6) at AT&T Stadium.

On Oct 18 at Indianapolis, New England defeated the Colts W (34–27) in Lucas Oil Stadium. On Oct 25 at home, the Patriots beat the New York Jets W (30–23) in Gillette Stadium. At home again on Oct 29, the Patriots thumped the Miami Dolphins W (36–7) in Gillette Stadium. Then, at home on Nov 8, the Patriots whipped the Washington Redskins W (27–10) in Gillette Stadium.

At New York, on Nov 15, the Patriots beat the Giants in a one-point match W (27–26) at MetLife Stadium. At home on Nov 23, the Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills W (20–13) in Gillette Stadium. On Nov 29 at Denver, the Broncos beat the Patriots in OT L (24–30) in the Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium. On Dec 6, at

home, the Philadelphia Eagles beat the Patriots L (28–35) in Gillette Stadium.

On Dec 13 at Houston, the Patriots broke their two-game losing streak and beat the Texans W (27–6) at NRG Stadium. On Dec 20, at home, New England beat Tennessee W (33–16) in Gillette Stadium. On Dec 27 at New York, the Jets beat the Pats in OT, L (20–26) in MetLife Stadium Recap. To wrap up the season at Miami on Jan 3, the Dolphins got the win on the Patriots L 10–20 in Sun Life Stadium. The next 2015-2016 Patriots game would be in the Divisional Playoffs.

At Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts

This divisional playoff game began at 4:35 PM on January 16, 2016 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 38 °F, partly cloudy. There was a reasonably packed house of 66,829 at this Patriots home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, the Patriots squeaked by the Chiefs in this game W (27-20).

The Patriots would upset the Chiefs, who came into this game having won 10 in a row to end the regular season, and a playoff game at Houston the previous week. Ironically, the Patriots had won ten in a row at the top of the season. The game was a shootout, as both quarterbacks played well. The Patriots would lead for most of the game. The Chiefs mounted a brief come back later in the game to try to tie it, but the Patriots held them off and won 27-20. With the win, New England advanced to its 6th straight AFC Championship game, and it prepared to face Denver in the Conference Championship for the second time in 3 seasons.

This Conference Championship Game began at 3:05 PM on January 24, 2016 at Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium in Denver, Colorado. The weather was 46 °F, mostly sunny. There was a packed house of 77,112 at this Broncos home game. After a 12-4 regular season record, and the victory in the Division Playoffs, the New England Patriots were defeated by the Denver Broncos in this game W (20-18). The Broncos advanced to the Super Bowl and became the Super Bowl Champions.

Denver had taken it on the chin in prior years in this game from the Patriots and this year, they stepped up to the challenge. They would lead the entire game, as their number 1 ranked defense outlasted Tom Brady and New England's number 1 ranked offense 20-18.

Towards the end of the game in a well-orchestrated last-minute comeback, the Patriots would score with 18 seconds left. Needing just two more points for the tie, they gave it their best shot. For the game. However, not all good happens without the best of luck.

Unfortunately, on this last play, Tom Brady's 2-point pass was intercepted, and the Patriots missed out on that necessary 2-point conversion. In extra point terminology, the point was no good. The Patriots would try an onside kick as a final attempt to salvage the game, but it wouldn't hold up, and the Broncos won.

They advanced to Super Bowl L (50). This would be the last time that Tom Brady and Peyton Manning would play each other, as Manning would retire the following season. Manning would

ultimately end his career 3-1 against Brady in the AFC Championship game. Both are great talents and great competitors. With the loss, the Patriots ended their season with an overall record of 13-5. But, they would be back with a vengeance the next season to win all the marbles.

2016 Bill Belichick #14

The 2016 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-seventh season of professional football and their forty-seventh season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his seventeenth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 14-2, gaining two-more wins than in 2015. They earned the #1 seed along with a first round playoff bye for the sixth year in a row. They also gained home field advantage through the playoffs. The Patriots were not defending Super Bowl Champions when the 2016 season began but they were when it was over.

There was a lot happening in the 2016 season. The New England Patriots are a winning machine. They became the first team that originated from the American Football League to reach 500 franchise wins—regular season and playoffs. It happened in Week 12 with the win over the New York Jets.

In Week 15, the Patriots clinched their eighth straight AFC East division title, and in doing so surpassed the 1979 Los Angeles Rams for the most consecutive division titles. They were not finished.

In Week 17, the last win of the season over the Miami Dolphins, gave the Patriots home field advantage throughout the entire AFC playoffs and they ended the regular season with a league-best record of 14–2. As the Patriots had learned well in prior years, the home field advantage no longer offers an advantage when a team loses. SO, they kept winning.

With their win over the Houston Texans in the Divisional Round, the Patriots advanced to the AFC Championship Game for the sixth consecutive year, surpassing the 1977 Oakland Raiders for most consecutive appearances in conference championship games.

After their win over the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Championship Game, the Patriots became the first organization to clinch a ninth Super Bowl berth. They surpassed the Pittsburgh Steelers, Dallas Cowboys, and Denver Broncos who are all tied at 8. IMHO, the Patriots with Bill Belichick and Tom Brady are amazing.

Furthermore, Bill Belichick broke the record for a head coach by coaching his seventh Super Bowl, breaking a tie with Don Shula. You may recall the "Deflategate" which cost Patriots starting quarterback Tom Brady a suspension for the first four games of the season due to his alleged role in the "Deflategate" scandal.

Under backup quarterbacks Jimmy Garoppolo and Jacoby Brissett, the team managed a nice 3–1 record during Brady's suspension. During the season, Bill Belichick moved into fourth place on the list for most wins as a head coach, and Tom Brady set the record for most wins by a starting quarterback (208 following the 2016-2017 Super Bowl win).

This year, the Patriots were 8–0 on the road, matching a feat they first accomplished in the 2007 season. They became the seventh NFL team to accomplish this feat.

The Patriots also set a record for the most pass attempts by a team without an interception to start a season, and, collectively, Garoppolo, Brissett, and Brady combined to set a single season record for fewest interceptions thrown by a team, with just 2. Considering three cooks in the mix, that is especially good.

Tom Brady also set the record for the best touchdown–interception ratio in a single season, with 28 touchdowns and 2 interceptions (a 14:1 ratio), breaking Nick Foles' mark of 27 touchdowns to 2 interceptions (13.5:1), set in 2013 while he was with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Meanwhile, the defense led the league for fewest points allowed (250) for the first time since the 2003 season. The Patriots were not only ready; they came through.

In Super Bowl LI, the team rallied from a 28–3 deficit – with 2:12 left in the third quarter – to win in overtime, with a score of 34–28. Many of us stared at the TV in wonderment after it appeared that Atlanta had the game sewed up. This was the franchise's fifth Super Bowl title.

Super Bowl LI was the first Super Bowl that was decided in overtime and it was the first time the winner erased a deficit higher than ten points. I am still in awe of a guy who first sat out four games and then was solely responsible for their Super Bowl game victory.

This would also be a record fifth Super Bowl victory for the Brady–Belichick quarterback-head coach combo. For Tom Brady, this would be his fifth. With the Super Bowl win, he broke his tie with hall of fame quarterbacks Joe Montana and Terry Bradshaw who both have four Super Bowl wins each. Additionally, head coach Bill Belichick's fifth Super Bowl in 2016-2017 meant that he surpassed Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll from Pittsburgh, for most wins in the Super Bowl by a head coach. Congratulations, Mr. Belichick. You are outstanding the old-fashioned way. You earn it! Please continue.

Games of the 2016 Season

In the season opener on September 11, 2016 at Arizona, the Patriots defeated the Cardinals W (23–21) in the University of Phoenix Stadium. Then, the following week in the home opener on Sept 18, New England defeated Miami W (31–24) in Gillette Stadium. At home again on Sept 22, the Patriots skunked the Houston Texans W (27–0) in Gillette Stadium. Then, on Oct 2, the Patriots lost their first game of the season after 3 straight wins L (0-16) against the Buffalo Bills at home in Gillette Stadium.

On Oct 9 at Cleveland, the Patriots whooped the Browns W (33–13) at FirstEnergy Stadium. Then at home on Oct 16 New England defeated Cincinnati W (35–17) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct 23 at

Pittsburgh, the Patriots beat the Steelers W (27–16) at Heinz Field. In the Conference playoffs these two teams would again battle it out. On October 30 at Buffalo, the Patriots beat the Bills W (41–25) at New Era Field bringing the record to 7–1. On Nov 6, in week 9, the Patriots drew a bye.

On Nov 13 at home, the Seattle Seahawks beat the New England Patriots L (24–31) in Gillette Stadium. At San Francisco on Nov 20, the Patriots beat the 49ers W (30–17) in Levi's Stadium. At New York, on Nov 27, the Pats beat the Jets W (22–17) in MetLife Stadium. At home on Dec 4, the Patriots defeated the Los Angeles Rams W (26–10) in Gillette Stadium.

On Dec 12, at home, the Patriots defeated the Baltimore Ravens W (30–23) in Gillette Stadium. At Denver, on Dec 18, the Patriots beat the Broncos W (16–3) in Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium in Denver Colorado. At home, on Dec 24, New England pasted the New York Jets W (41–3) in Gillette Stadium. In the season finale on Jan 1 at Miami, the Patriots squashed the Dolphins W (35–14) in Hard Rock Stadium.

At Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts

This divisional playoff game began at 8:15 PM on January 14, 2017 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 28 °F, cloudy. There was a reasonably packed house of 66,829 at this Patriots home game. After a 14-2 regular season record, the Patriots solidly defeated the Texans in this game W (34-16).

On the way to a nice victory over the Texans, the New England Defense had a lot to say. First of all, they intercepted Houston three times. Meanwhile, the offense got its two cents in also as running back Dion Lewis scored three touchdowns – one rushing, one receiving and one kickoff return. The Patriots took this game and used it to advance first to the AFC Championship Game and second to the Super Bowl for the ninth time.

There was nothing small about the Pats offense on January 14 as big plays made the difference when New England took a 14–3 lead after just 6 offensive plays. Following a three-and-out from both teams, the Texans helped out the NE offense when defensive back A. J. Bouye committed a 30-yard pass interference infraction when trying to cover Chris Hogan. Up 14-3 at the time, this gave the Patriots a first down on Houston's 35-yard line.

QB Tom Brady got right in gear and completed two consecutive passes—the first to Hogan for 22 yards and the second to Lewis for a 13-yard touchdown completion. Houston was awakened and responded with a 62-yard drive in 14 plays. They did not reach paydirt but did score on Nick Novak's 33-yard field goal. On the kickoff, Lewis took the ball 98 yards right through all the defenders for a touchdown. This was the 1st kickoff return touchdown ever for the Patriots in postseason history.

Houston had trouble moving the ball and were forced to punt after just three plays. However, on the first play of the second quarter, Tom Brady helped them a bit too much by throwing a pass that went off the hands of Michael Floyd and was intercepted by Houston's Bouye. He returned the ball 7 yards to the Patriots' 27. Again, the Texans failed to get the ball into the end zone, but Novak kicked another field goal to make the score 14–6.

On the kickoff, Texans linebacker Akeem Dent forced and recovered a fumble from Lewis on the kickoff, giving Houston the ball back on the New England 12-yard line. This time, Houston had better luck and took it all the way, scoring on Brock Osweiler's 10-yard touchdown pass to tight end C. J. Fiedorowicz. This brought the score to 14–13.

After three series with a punt as the final outcome, Brady reached back and completed a 48-yarder to Julian Edelman giving New England a first down on the Houston 16. After a few plays it was first and goal from the 3-yard line, but the Pats got stopped and could not score a touchdown. Stephen Gostkowski came through with a chip shot field goal giving the Patriots a 17–13 lead at halftime.

After a series of punts which got the second half going, Brady seemed ready to take command. The All-Pro QB completed two passes to Edelman for 40 yards and one to Hogan for 22 yards before finding running back James White in the end zone for a 19-yard catch. This put New England up 24–13. Later in the third quarter, Devin McCourty's intercepted an Osweiler pass and New England had the ball on their own 44-yard line. They could not convert this into points.

After a few more punts, Brady threw an interception, snagged by Andre Hal. He took it just 6 yards to the Patriots' 34-yard line. However, Houston capitalized on the INT with Novak's third field goal on the second play of the fourth quarter, making it 24–16.

New England punted on their next drive. Osweiler's first pass after the punt was intercepted and returned 23 yards by Logan Ryan, providing the Patriots an opportunity with the ball on the Texans' 6-yard line. After a 5-yard run, Lewis took it in the extra yard on the next play giving the Patriots a 31–16 lead.

The Texans could not get a first down on their next try and when the Patriots got the ball back, they were off.43 yards in 10 plays for a Gostkowski field goal making the lead 34–16 with under 7 minutes left. Osweiler was intercepted again on Houston's final drive. Duron Harmon got the pick for New England.

Brady racked up 18 of 38 passes for 287 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. Lewis rushed for 41 yards, caught two passes for 23 yards and returned three kickoffs for 124 yards, and became the first player in NFL postseason history to score touchdowns by rushing, receiving and kick return.

Edelman added eight passes for 137 yards to his total and he also returned four punts for 24 yards. Hogan contributed four catches for 95 yards.

Osweiler threw 23 completions out of 40 passes for 198 yards and a touchdown, but he also had three interceptions. After their one-week bye prior to this game, the Patriots were pleased to advance to the AFC Championship Game for the sixth consecutive year, eclipsing the Oakland Raiders of 1973 to 1977 for most consecutive appearances in conference championship games. The record so far for the Pats was 15-2.

This Conference Championship Game began at 6:40 PM on January 24, 2016 at Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium in Denver, Colorado. The weather was 41 °F, cloudy. There was a packed house of 66,829,112 at this Patriots home game. After a 14-2 regular season record, and the victory in the Division Playoffs, the New England Patriots defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers in this game W (36-17). The Patriots advanced to the Super Bowl and became the Super Bowl Champions.

The New England Patriots used this game to advance to familiar territory as their victory over Pittsburgh would give them their seventh Super Bowl game in the last 16 seasons under quarterback Tom Brady and coach Bill Belichick. They made the most of both games. In this Conference Championship, they piled up 431 yards and 26 first downs. Pittsburgh's offense was also firing on all cylinders but not getting the ball past the goal posts too often. Pitt

amassed 368 yards, but their final score was just 17 points, eight of them on a single touchdown late in the game when the outcome had already been decided.

Meanwhile, the Steelers' rushing attack, that had been so critical to their earlier playoff wins, was set back on its heels because of an early injury to running back Le'Veon Bell. Bell finished the game with just 54 total yards on the ground.

When the game began, Brady got right into gear. On the game's opening drive, his 41-yard completion to Julian Edelman set up Stephen Gostkowski's first field goal (31-yards), giving New England a 3–0 lead less than two minutes into the game.

Following several punts, the Patriots went on an 80-yard, 11-play drive, the longest gain being a 26-yard catch by receiver Chris Hogan. Brady finished it off with a 16-yard TD pass to Hogan, for a 10–0 lead.

On the second play of Pittsburgh's next drive, Bell suffered his gameending groin injury. His replacement DeAngelo Williams did his best but was clearly not the same talent as Bell. He caught two passes for nine yards and rushed four times for 25 yards, the last carry was a nice five-yard touchdown run to complete the 13-play, 84-yard drive early in the second quarter. Chris Boswell missed the extra point. The score then was 10–6.

New England fired right back with an 82-yard drive taking nine plays. The Pats scored on a Brady 34-yard TD pass to Hogan on a flea flicker play. Pittsburgh quickly moved the ball to the Patriots' 19-yard line, where Big Ben threw a TD pass to tight end Jesse James. Well, it was initially ruled a touchdown, but a replay determined that James was down on the 1-yard line.

It was a costly verdict for Pittsburgh. When play resumed, Williams was dropped for a one-yard loss by Dont'a Hightower and Patrick Chung. On second down, Williams was tackled for a three-yard loss by nose tackle Vincent Valentine. Pittsburgh was going backwards. On third down, Roethlisberger's pass was incomplete, so the team settled for Boswell's field goal, making the score 17–9.

In the second half, New England dominated. They buried the Steelers with four unanswered scores. After forcing Pitt to punt, New England drove 55 yards in nine plays, 24 of them coming on a catch by Hogan. Gostkowski finished the drive with a 47-yard field goal that put the Patriots up 20–9.

After another Pittsburgh punt, Brady uncorked a 39-yard completion to Hogan, which led to a one-yard touchdown by the bull, LeGarrette Blount, giving the team a 27–9 lead with 2:44 left in the third quarter.

On the first play after the kickoff, Pittsburgh coughed up the ball when Kyle Van Noy forced a fumble from Eli Rogers. It was recovered by linebacker Rob Ninkovich on the Steelers' 28-yard line. Brady took over and completed an 18-yard pass to Edelman on the next play, and eventually connected with him in the end zone for a 10-yard touchdown pass. Gostkowski missed the extra point, but the Patriots had already effectively put the game away, carrying a 33–9 lead going into the fourth quarter.

In the final period, the Steelers were able to get a drive going down to the New England 2-yard line. But, misfortune was the name of their game and the Steelers turned the ball over on downs.

Then after a Pats punt, Eric Rowe intercepted a pass from Roethlisberger and returned it 37 yards to the Steelers' 32-yard line, leading to another Gostkowski field goal that increased New England's lead to 36–9.

All that remained from this point on was an inconsequential Roethlisberger 30-yard touchdown pass to Cobi Hamilton and the subsequent 2-point conversion pass to Williams that made the final score 36–17.

Brady had a nice day passing. He completed 32 of his 42 passing attempts for 384 yards and three touchdowns. Hogan caught nine passes for 180 yards and two touchdowns, while Edelman had eight receptions for 118 yards and a touchdown. Roethlisberger threw for 314 yards, with a touchdown and an interception. The Patriots were

smiling knowing they were on their way to the Super Bowl as a team for the ninth time.

*** This historic Super Bowl LI Comeback v Matt Ryan and the Falcons goes down as the top moment of all time in Patriot football.*** Any Patriot fan who was alive in February 2017, saw the greatest comeback game of all time.

I have been watching football since even before my older brother Ed, ignored my pleas when I was five years old at Meyers Stadium in Wilkes-Barre, PA at the annual Thanksgiving Day Game of Meyers v GAR on a blustery day in November. My feet were freezing and nonetheless I had no choice but to stay until the end of that game. That's how important football games are. Never in my life of watching football on TV or in a live stadium before or since then have I ever seen a game like the one on February 2017 -- Super Bowl LI. I don't think I'll ever see anything top that game in any sport.

I would suspect that Falcon supporters and Patriot haters would disagree, but Super Bowl LI is arguably the best game of the century. Considering the Patriots have played pro football for just 58 years as Boston and Now New England, that is a major statement.

The initial shock, the acceptance of a probable defeat, the denial of the impossible, and the comeback to top all comebacks—what more could a football fan ask for? What more could a football game offer?

After the first half, viewers in NRG Stadium and across the nation were simply stunned. The disciplined and dynamic Patriots were falling woefully short of stopping MVP Matt Ryan's offense. Matt

Ryan in the first half was performing like Tom Brady always performed.

Early into the third, the Falcons commanded a 28 - 3 lead, and they were unfaltering. I can recall the shocked pundits not believe they were actually saying that it was all but official in that the Falcons would earn their first title win. The Falcons were about to blow-out the Patriots, Tom Brady, and Bill Belichick too.

However, Tom Brady and the Patriots' defense found the grit to continue. They were not ready to quietly walk off the field without another Lombardi trophy. With an utter shutout and a record breaking performance (416 passing yards, most in a championship game), the Patriots forced the first ever overtime in a Super Bowl, and subsequently capped off their victory surge in the opening drive. It was truly an incredible game. To top off this recap, we use a great report by the Boston Globe. Thank them when you have a chance.

The Super Bowl XLIX kickoff was at 6:30 EST February 5, 2017. The weather did not matter as the game was played with the retractable roof closed. Led by starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichickled NE Patriots overcame the Atlanta Falcons in a tight match 34-28 at NRG Stadium in Houston Texas. before a packed house of 70,807. After a 14-2 regular season record, having won the Division and Conference, the Patriots played one of the greatest comeback matches in NFL history with the Atlanta Falcons, winning the contest W (34-28), gaining their fifth Super Bowl Conquest as a franchise.

Super Bowl LI: New England Patriots 34, Atlanta Falcons 28 (OT)

Despite the Falcons taking a 28–3 lead midway through the third quarter, the Patriots scored 25 unanswered points to tie the game at 28 with less than a minute left in regulation and take the game to the first overtime period in Super Bowl history. On the first possession of overtime, Patriots running back James White punched in the game-winning score to give his team a 34–28 comeback victory.

Each time the Patriots have been in a Super Bowl, I looked for the excellent Boston Globe's coverage of the game. I enjoyed

researching the Boston Papers to get the scoop the way it actually happened in 2017. This fine write-up from the Boston Globe at the time it was written gave New England fans enough of the Super Bowl that they felt they were there. Nice job Jim McBride. He titled his article:

In a Comeback for the Ages, Patriots Beat Falcons in Heart-Pounding Super Bowl.

HOUSTON — Case closed.

Tom Brady cemented his legacy as the greatest quarterback in history Sunday night and he did it in the most dramatic fashion.

The Patriots quarterback earned his fifth Super Bowl title and collected his fourth Super Bowl MVP as the Patriots staged the most incredible and improbable comeback in history of America's game, beating the Falcons, 34-28, in overtime at NRG Stadium.



Danny Amendola scored a two-point conversion to tie the score at 28-28.

Erasing a 25-point second-half deficit, the Patriots scored 31 unanswered points against a Falcons team that played the fourth quarter as though they were waiting to be fitted for their rings rather than finishing their business on the field.

James White's 2-yard run in OT — the first in Super Bowl history — was the difference as the Patriots pulled off their second stunning Super Bowl victory in three seasons.

"This is unequivocally the sweetest," said team owner Robert Kraft after that long-awaited, awkward moment when commissioner Roger Goodell handed him the Vince Lombardi Trophy.

Brady was astoundingly brilliant in the second half, and put on a fourth-quarter performance that was incredible, even by his lofty standards.

For the record, Brady finished 43 of 62 for 466 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He hit White and Danny Amendola with fourth-quarter TD passes and they each converted 2-point conversions on the other's TD to tie the score at 28-28.

The Patriots won the toss in overtime and Brady carved up the gassed Falcons, driving 75 yards, capped by White's run.

"Yeah, they're all sweet," said Brady, when asked if this was the best, considering the Deflategate saga of the past two seasons.

"They're all different and this was just an incredible team and I'm just happy to be a part of it. It's just a great group of coaches and teammates and we overcame a lot of different things and it's all worth it."

It is the fifth Super Bowl title for the Patriots, who are now tied with the 49ers and Cowboys for the second most in NFL history (the Steelers have six).

All of New England's titles have come under the stewardship of the Kraft family, Bill Belichick, and, of course, Brady,

For two weeks, Belichick extolled the virtues of the Falcons' speed to anyone who would listen. Sunday night the 70,807 on hand and millions across the world found out just what the New England coach was talking about.

Atlanta blitzed the Patriots with 21 straight points, displaying tremendous speed and feverish quickness that left the favorites defenseless and helpless.

It felt over. Well, almost over.

The Falcons gave a preview of things to come on their first offensive play from scrimmage when Devonta Freeman gashed them for 37 yards.

The Patriots were able to put the clamps on the Falcons for the rest of the opening 15 minutes. Problem was, Brady and the offense couldn't sustain any momentum.

The one drive the Patriots showed life came at the end of the quarter, when a pair of passes to Julian Edelman — the second one for 27 yards on the first play of the second quarter — gave them a first down at the Atlanta 33. LeGarrette Blount, however, fumbled on the next play and the Falcons took advantage.

Matt Ryan led a surgical five-play, 71-yard drive that ended with Freeman's 5-yard zip around left end. He went in untouched. Ryan, the former Boston College star, hit Julio Jones for 19 and 29 yards before Freeman went the final 29 yards on three carries.

It marked the first time the Patriots had trailed in a game since Week 11 against the Jets.

After another three-and-out by the Patriots, the Falcons set up shop at their 38 after a 38-yard punt from Ryan Allen.

Ryan, looking every bit the league MVP that he had been voted the prior Saturday night, went back to shredding the Patriots defense.

He hit Taylor Gabriel for 24 yards and Jones for a toe-tapping 18-yarder. Two plays later, Ryan dropped a beautiful 19-yard pass into tight end Austin Hooper's hands in the end zone to double the lead to 14-0.

The Patriots appeared poised to finally stop the hemorrhaging on the ensuing possession but again a turnover proved to be a killer.

After methodically marching from their 25 to the Atlanta 23 — aided by three defensive holding penalties — it appeared New England could still make a game of it.

That's when Robert Alford stepped in. Literally.

The cornerback cut in front a Brady pass intended for Danny Amendola and was off to the races for an 82-yard Pick-6 — with only a helpless and airborne Brady in his way.

It was a waste of an 11-play drive for New England.

The Patriots did mount an 11-play, 52-yard drive on their next possession, but it stalled when Martellus Bennett was called for holding, negating a White catch and run that would have put the ball inside the Atlanta 5.

Though Stephen Gostkowski would finally put the Patriots on the board with a 41-yard field goal, it was without a doubt the hollowest 3 points of the 2016 season.

Ryan was superb over the first 30 minutes, hitting on 7 of 8 passes for 115 yards. Brady was 16 of 26 for 184 yards and took two sacks. It was Brady's first multiple-sack game since Week 8 against Buffalo.

"We were down, some had some doubts [at halftime], we're only human," said Patriots defensive end Chris Long. "But we had enough guys pulling us along. Duron Harmon walked in and said, 'This is going to be the best comeback of all time.' And we completely believed that. And it was."

Nate Solder was a little blunter:

"I felt like I played like total poop," he said.

After trading three-and-outs to start the second half, the Falcons extended their lead to 28-3 when Ryan hit Tevin Coleman with a 6-yard swing pass touchdown. Gabriel was the star of the drive, hauling in catches of 17 and 35 yards.

Brady, who set a Super Bowl record with his 43 completions, rallied the Patriots when he got the ball back, driving 75 yards in 13 plays, capped by a 5-yard strike to White. Gostkowski doinked the extra point off the right upright and it was 28-9.

Gostkowski drilled a 33-yard field goal to pull the Patriots closer at 28-12 on the team's first possession of the fourth quarter, and two plays later, Dont'a Hightower got the ball back when he strip-sacked Ryan to hand the Patriots the ball at the Atlanta 25.

"Biggest play of the game," said Long.

Brady fired a 6-yard TD pass to Amendola and White scored on a 1-yard run to make it 28-20.

The tying drive — Edelman's incredible 23-yard catch the key — went 91 yards, matching New England's longest drive of the season. White finished it with a 1-yard run and Amendola caught the 2-point conversion. It was 28-28.

Ryan got the ball back and for the first time all night, he looked frazzled and overwhelmed, woefully misfiring on a third-down pass.

Once the Patriots won the OT coin toss, it was over.

2017 Bill Belichick #14

The 2017 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-eighth season of professional football and their forty-eighth season in the National Football League (NFL). The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his eighteenth of nineteen seasons (so-far). Robert Kraft was the happy defending Super Bowl Patriot's owner. The Patriots record was 13-3, gaining one less win than in 2016. They earned the #1 AFC seed along with a first round playoff bye for the seventh year in a row.

They also gained home field advantage through the playoffs. The Patriots were the defending Super Bowl Champions when the 2017 season began but, after a great season with fifteen total wins, they were not the champs when the season was over.

The defending Super Bowl champion New England Patriots entered the season feeling pretty invincible, having had a great 2016 season winning the Cigar, the rings, and all the marbles. They almost matched their excellent 14-2 showing with a fine 13-3 record in 2017. It was a Week 14 loss to Miami that set them back. Nonetheless, the Patriots again won the AFC Title. This was their 9th consecutive AFC East title, and it was their 15th of the last 17 seasons with Tom Belichick.

On top of all the other good things happening for the Patriots, this was also the second time they advanced to the Super Bowl two consecutive seasons since 2004. They faced the Philadelphia Eagles in a rematch of Super Bowl XXXIX.

This game—SB LII, also made the Patriots the only team in NFL history to appear in ten Super Bowls, and it gave the Patriots a chance to repeat as Super Bowl Champions for the second time in franchise history, and for the first time since 2004. In addition, they had the chance to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers for the record of most Super Bowl wins by a team in NFL history with 6. Unfortunately, the win did not happen. Pointing to one cause, we would have to say it was because of a late strip-sack of Brady by Brandon Graham and a failed Hail Mary pass. The Eagles were playing at the top of their game with a substitute QB who had once been an Eagles star.

In the home and season opener on September 7, Andy Reid's revitalized Kansas City Chiefs spoiled the party for New England by claiming a L (27–42) victory in Gillette Stadium. On Sept 17 at New Orleans, the Saints took it on the chin W (36–20) at the renamed Mercedes-Benz Superdome. At home again on Sept 24, the Patriots squeezed out a win in a tight game against the Houston Texans W (36–33) in Gillette Stadium. On Oct 1 at home the Carolina Panthers edged out the Patriots L (30–33) in Gillette Stadium.

At Tampa Bay, on Oct 5, the Patriots got by the Buccaneers W (19–14) in Raymond James Stadium. Then, on Oct 15 at New York, the Patriots grabbed the win v the Jets W (24–17) in MetLife Stadium. At home on Oct 22, the Patriots again beat the Atlanta Falcons W 23–7, but in a more convincing fashion than in Super Bowl LI—in Gillette Stadium. At home on Oct 29, New England defeated Los Angeles W (21–13) in Gillette Stadium. On Nov 4, NE gained a bye week.

At Denver, on Nov 12, the Patriots thumped the Broncos W (41–16) in the Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium. At Oakland on Nov 19, the Patriots whooped the Raiders W (33–8) in Estadio Azteca (Mexico City). At home, on Nov 26 Miami took it on the chin from New England W (35–17) in Gillette Stadium. At Buffalo

on December 3, the Patriots smashed the Bills W (23–3) in New Era Field

At Miami on Dec 11, the Dolphins beat the Patriots L (20–27) in Hard Rock Stadium. At Pittsburgh, on December 17, in a close game, the Patriots beat the Steelers W (27–24) in Heinz Field. On Dec 24, at home, the Patriots hammered the Buffalo Bills W (37–16) in Gillette Stadium. At home, on Dec 31 in the final game of the season, the Patriots slammed the New York Jets W (26–6) in Gillette Stadium, giving New England a first place 13-3 record for the season. The Patriots did not have to compete in the Wild Card and so they had a rest week before the Divisional Championship playoffs began.

At Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts

This divisional playoff game began at 8:15 PM on January 13, 2018 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 24 °F, clear & cold. There was a reasonably packed house of 65,878 at this Patriots home game. After a 13-3 regular season record, the Patriots solidly defeated the Titans in this playoff game W (35-14).

The Patriots reset their own club playoff record by sacking Marcus Mariota eight times for their second win in three career playoff matches against the Titans franchise. The Patriots held Titans RB Derrick Henry to only 28 yards on 12 carries the week after he went all-out for 156 yds against the Chiefs.

This was the third playoff game between the two teams, the first since 2003, with the Patriots in this meeting, holding a 2–1

advantage. They split the first two games, both in the Divisional round, including the first game against the Titans' predecessor, the Houston Oilers. Everybody in the stands and in the national audience knew this would be a good game.

New England racked up eight sacks, 438 yards, and 31 first downs as they advanced to their seventh consecutive AFC Championship game.

No game is decided by just a few plays. Midway through the first quarter, Tennessee put on a show by driving almost unimpeded 95 yards in 11 plays. In the end, it featured a 36-yard completion from Marcus Mariotato tight end Delanie Walker. Mariota got his arm back and tossed a 15-yard TD pass to Corey Davis, who made a great one-handed catch while scouting the back corner of the end zone. This put the up 7–0. The Patriots were undaunted, but they knew they were not leading.

New England came right back, with the master, Tom Brady completing five consecutive passes for 67 yards, the longest a 32-yard completion to Dion Lewis and the last pass at five-yards in shovel form to James White. This was a TD that tied the score.

After a Titans punt, Brady whipped off three consecutive passes for 28 yards as the team drove 48 yards in six plays to go up 14–7 on White's six-yard touchdown run with 9:20 left in the half.

When New England got the ball the next time, they were forced to punt after three plays. However, a neutral zone infraction penalty on Titans defensive back Brynden Trawick gave the Pats a 1st down. The Patriots were ready to sting the Titans on this second chance and they did.

They drove 91 yards in 16 plays to take a 21–7 lead on Brady's six-yard touchdown pass to Chris Hogan. Tennessee had not thrown in the towel and they then drove to the Patriots' 46-yard line; and on fourth-and-1, Derrick Henry tried to run for a first down, but defensive backs Malcolm Butler and Stephon Gilmore tackled him for no gain.

With 17 seconds left, the Pats were able to move the ball to the Titans' 35-yard line with time remaining, but Stephen Gostkowski, normally accurate, missed a 53-yard field goal attempt as time expired. In the first half alone, Brady completed 21 of 31 passes for 206 yards and two touchdowns. The Patriots were on the run to a victory.

In 3Q, the Titans Brett Kern's 40-yard punt from his own 16-yard line gave the Patriots good field position on their 44-yard line. On the next play, Brady completed a 27-yard pass to tight end Rob Gronkowski, and the team went on to increase their lead to 28–7 with Brandon Bolden's two-yard touchdown run.

The Titans got nothing done with the ball. The next time New England took over, they drove 90-yards in 15 plays. During the drive, the Pats faced only two third downs. Brady completed seven passes for 78 yards on the drive, the longest a 25-yard throw to Danny Amendola, and he finished it off with a four-yard touchdown toss to Gronkowski, making the score 35–7 with 10:22 left.

Before the end of 3Q, the Titans were able to make it 35–14 with Mariota's 11-yard touchdown pass to Davis on fourth down at the end of an 80-yard, 16-play drive.

Don't tell Tom Brady we know just how old he is; but he still operates like a kid on the field. At 40 years, 163 days, Brady became the oldest quarterback—this game.

He led his team to victory in a record-making postseason game, finishing the day 35-of-53 for 337 yards and three touchdowns.

Amendola caught 11 passes for 112 yards, while also returning three punts for 18 yards. Lewis rushed for 62 yards, caught nine passes for 79 yards, and returned a kickoff for 27 yards.[10]Linebacker Geneo Grissom and defensive tackle Deatrich Wise Jr. each had two sacks for New England.[10] Mariota completed 22 of 37 passes for 225 yards and two touchdowns.

This game set the NFL postseason record for the largest age difference between opposing quarterbacks: Brady was 40 and Mariota was just 24. Which of these QB's would you bet on?

This Conference Championship Game began at 3:05 PM on January 21, 2016 at Gillette Stadium, Foxborough, Massachusetts. The weather was 48 °F, clear & cool. There was a packed house of 65, 878 at this Patriots home game. After a 13-3 regular season record, and the victory in the Division Playoffs, the New England Patriots defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars in this game W (24-20). The Patriots advanced to the Super Bowl and lost the Super Bowl Championship to the Philadelphia Eagles in a tight match.

On the opening drive of the Conference Championship game, Tom Brady fired off a 31-yard pass to Brandin Cooks and then a 20-yard pass to wide receiver Danny Amendola on fourth-and-1 as the team drove 62 yards in 10 plays to score an FG when Stephen Gostkowski connected on a 31-yard field goal.

Following a pair of punts, Jacksonville QB, Blake Bortles completed two passes to running back Corey Grant, collecting 44 total yards as the team drove 76 yards in seven plays to take a 7–3 lead on a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Marcedes Lewis on the second play of the second quarter. Nothing happens without defense and offense.

The next time they got the ball, Bortles completed all four pass attempts for 47 yards. One of the passes was a 27-yard completion to Allen Hurns, as the Jaguars team drove 77 yards in 10 plays to score on Leonard Fournette's four-yard touchdown run, increasing their lead to 14–3.

The Patriots were not about to let some good fortune cost them the game. On the Jaguars' next drive, the Jags moved the ball to a third-

and-7 on the Patriots' 47-yard line. Bortles then completed a 12-yard pass to Lewis that would have picked up a first down. The team was stuck for a delay of game and Bortles was then sacked by Adam Butler on the next play.

New England finally got the ball on their own 15-yard line with 2:02 left in the half, and they got their game going. They made it 85 yards in six plays – 47 yards of the total came from Jaguars penalties – to score on James White's 1-yard touchdown run. This cut the edge to 14–10.

You never know what will happen next in football. The next intercession came from Jacksonville safety Barry Church, who trying to do his best put a his helmet on a Patriots helmet in a hit on Patriots tight end Rob Gronkowski. Church got his team a 15-yard penalty, and Gronkowski was escorted off for medical testing that determined that he had suffered a concussion and could not return.

After the second half kickoff, later in the period, the Jaguars advanced 66 yards in 11 plays. They got 18 yards on a completion from Bortles to Marqise Lee on third-and-3. On the second play of 4Q, Lambo scored with a 43-yard field goal, lifting the margin to a two-score differential at 20–10.

New England was not coming back, and it seemed like it might be all over for the Patriots. The game seemed to be slipping away from New England, particularly on their ensuing drive when linebacker Myles Jack forced and recovered a fumble from Dion Lewis on a trick play in which Amendola completed a forward pass to Lewis on the Jacksonville 33-yard line.

Thankfully for New England, their defense rose to the occasion and forced a three-and-out. They took the ball back on the Patriots' 15-yard line. Tom Brady was not giving up. He started the drive with an 18-yard pass to Cooks, and then he converted a third-and-18 with a 21-yard completion to Amendola on the 46-yard line.

From there, Mr. Brady completed passes to Phillip Dorsett for 31 yards and Amendola for 14 yards before finishing the drive with a

nine-yard touchdown pass to Amendola. This brought the Pats to within three, 20–17.

As the game progressed, there was a pair of punts, including Ryan Allen's 35-yard kick, which pinned the Jaguars back at their own 10-yard line. The Jaguars lost one yard over their next three plays, and then Amendola returned Brad Nortman's 41-yard punt 20 yards to the Jacksonville 30-yard line with 4:58 left.

From there, New England put on a drive of 30 yards in five plays, culminating on Brady's four-yard touchdown pass to Amendola to take a 24–20 lead with 2:48 left.

After taking the ball back, Bortles' 29-yard completion to Dede Westbrook gave the Jaguars a first down on the Patriots' 38-yard line. But over the next two plays, Bortles threw an incompletion and then he fumbled the ball while being sacked by linebacker Kyle Van Noy.

Not everything looked good at first as Jacksonville tackle Cam Robinson recovered the fumble. However, the team lost nine yards on the play, bringing up third-and-19. After a four-yard pass to James O'Shaughnessy, Bortles' next pass was swatted away by Stephon Gilmore, causing a turnover on downs with 1:47 left. New England then got a key first down on third-and-10 with an 18-yard run by Lewis that let them run out the clock. Nobody had expected it at that point to go so well for the Pats.

Brady completed 26 of 38 passes for 290 yards and two touchdowns. He threw to whomever was open and Cooks was the top receiver of the game with six receptions for 100 yards, while Danny Amendola caught seven passes for 84 yards and two touchdowns. Amendola also returned two punts for 24 yards.

Van Noy had nine tackles – including five solo tackles – a sack and a forced fumble. Bortles completed 23 of 36 passes for 293 yards and a touchdown, while Fournette was the leading rusher of the game with 76 yards and a touchdown and Hurns was the Jaguars' leading receiver with six receptions for 80 yards.

The Patriots moved on to the Super Bowl v Philadelphia after playing this superb game, winning 24-20.

At U.S. Bank Stadium, Minneapolis, Minnesota

The Super Bowl LII kickoff was at 6:30 EST February 4, 2018. The weather did not matter as the game was played indoors with the retractable roof closed. Led by starter Tom Brady, the Bill Belichickled NE Patriots had the Eagles on the ropes at times but lost at the end of the game L (33-41) to the Eagles in a tight match at US Bank Stadium, Minneapolis, Minnesota before a packed house of 67,212. After a 13-2 regular season record, having won the Division and the Conference championships, the Patriots played tough but could not come back despite a valiant Hail Mary attempt. The Eagles won their first Super Bowl Contest ever this year.

I enjoyed researching the Boston Papers to get the scoop the way it actually happened in 2018. This fine write-up from the Boston Globe at the time it was written gave New England fans enough of the Super Bowl that they felt they were there. Nice job Rachel G. Bowers. She titled her article:

Eagles stun Patriots in a Super Bowl LII thriller Picture by JIM DAVIS/GLOBE STAFF

It was an offensive battle that set the record for most combined yards in an NFL playoff game — over 1,000 — as Tom Brady and Bill Belichick came up short of winning their sixth Lombardi Trophy.

"It's disappointing, but proud of the way we competed," Belichick said.

"We just came up a little bit short tonight. Tough way to end a lot of really good things that have happened this season. But that's what this game is about."



Eagles defeated the Patriots, 41-33, in Super Bowl LII on Sunday in Minneapolis.

"Today we had our opportunities. Never really got control of the game. Never really played on our terms. Just didn't make enough plays when needed to," Brady said.

"The Eagles played a better game today, they deserved to win. That's why they're the champs."

For the Eagles, it is their first Super Bowl win and first NFL championship since 1906 — and it came with backup quarterback Nick Foles—playing the game of his life, earning him MVP honors.

"I have the best players in the world," Eagles coach Doug Pederson said. "This is a resilient group."

Foles, playing in place of the injured Carson Wentz, completed 28 of 43 passes for 373 yards, three touchdowns, and an interception.

"I felt calm, we have such a great group of guys, such a great coaching staff, we felt confident going in," Foles said.

The play of the contest came at a time when Brady seemed poised to put together another game-winning drive. Trailing, 38-33, with just more than 2 minutes remaining, Brady and his offense took the field with 75 yards and the Philadelphia defense standing between them and a come-from-behind victory.

On the second play of the possession, defensive end Brandon Graham recorded the only sack of the game — and it was a stripsack of Brady recovered by rookie Derek Barnett. The Eagles turned that into a field goal and an eight-point lead.

"Just kept going," Graham said on the field after. "We said we needed a play. We got one more opportunity; we were going to give it everything we got and I just so happened to get there. I'm just thankful because we got a team that's resilient. We going to stick around for a long time. We world champs, baby, and it feels so good.

"I'm just happy because we are world champs and we worked our butt off and everybody that doubted us, we world champs, baby, that's all I got to say."

"They made one good play at the right time," Brady said.

The Eagles' go-ahead touchdown with 2:21 remaining came on an 11-yard pass from Foles to tight end Zach Ertz that officials reviewed before ultimately upholding the call on the field.

"If they had overturned that [touchdown], I don't know what would have happened to the city of Philadelphia," said Ertz, who finished with seven catches for 67 yards and the touchdown.

Coin toss

The Eagles called tails and the coin came up heads. The Patriots chose to defer to the second half. Philadelphia will receive the opening kickoff.

Here is a look at the coin that was used for the coin toss:



1st quarter: Patriots 3, Eagles 3

The team that scores first in the Super Bowl is 34-17.

New England answered Philadelphia's opening possession with a 67-yard drive of its own, but it ended in much the same fashion: A field goal. Stephen Gostkowski made a 26-yarder to tie it up. Quarterback Tom Brady and the offense utilized their up-tempo attack and even caught the Eagles with too many men on the field. The Patriots covered the 67 yards in nine plays, two of which went for more than 15 yards. Brady targeted tight end Rob Gronkowski on third and goal from the 8-yard line, but cornerback Jalen Mills broke up the pass.

Running back James White and receiver Chris Hogan were the primary weapons on the possession with White getting three touches for 21 yards and Hogan getting two touches for 32 yards.

Rowe was in coverage on both of the drive's third-down conversions. Of note: Rowe started over cornerback Malcolm Butler, who arrived late to Minneapolis as he was dealing with an illness.

1st quarter: Eagles 9, Patriots 3

It did not take long for Philadelphia to regain the lead. In fact, just three plays.

Quarterback Nick Foles found Alshon Jeffery for a 34-yard touchdown, but kicker Jake Elliott missed the extra point wide right. Cornerback Eric Rowe was in coverage on Jeffery.

The drive opened with Foles and Nelson Agholor connecting for 7 yards. Then LeGarrette Blount's 36-yard run set up the touchdown. So far, the Eagles have gained 149 yards, which is the fifth most ever in the Super Bowl. The 1994 49ers (193 yards) hold the record.

2nd quarter: Eagles 9, Patriots 3

Stephen Gostkowski's 26-yard field goal attempt hit the left upright and was no good. It would have capped a 74-yard drive and trimmed the Philadelphia lead.

On third and 2 from the 9-yard line, the Patriots ran a jet sweep to Brandin Cooks to the right end. But Cooks tried to hurdle safety Rodney McLeod, who corralled Cooks in the air and brought him to the ground for just a 1-yard gain.

Gostkowski, in his 12th season, has missed three other field goals in his postseason career: a 53-yarder against the Titans in this season's divisional round, a 44-yarder against the Ravens in the 2010 wild card, and a 35-yarder against the Jaguars in the 2007 divisional round. The Patriots went 2-1 in those contests.

2nd quarter: Eagles 15, Patriots 3

LeGarrette Blount scampered 21 yards for a touchdown to cap a sixplay, 65-yard drive and extend the Eagles' lead. Philadelphia attempted a two-point conversion, but Nick Foles and Alshon Jeffrey could not connect.

Three of the Eagles' six plays on the drive went for 19 or more yards: A 19-yard completion to Zach Ertz, a 22-yard completion to Jeffrey, and Blount's touchdown run. For the game, Philadelphia has notched eight plays of 15-plus yards, four plays of 20-plus yards, and two of 30-plus yards.

Blount so far has 58 rushing yards, a Super Bowl career-high, and the Eagles have 73 yards on the ground. The Eagles rushed for 100-plus yards 13 times in the regular season and went 12-1 in those games. They went 3-2 when held below 100 yards rushing. Cooks ruled out

Patriots receiver Brandin Cooks was ruled out with a head injury after absorbing a big hit from Eagles safety Malcolm Jenkins early in the second quarter. Cooks, who has one catch for 23 yards, was slow to get up but walked off the field under his own power and went straight to the locker room.

2nd quarter: Eagles 15, Patriots 6

Stephen Gostkowski made a 45-yard field goal to cap a five-play, 48-yard drive by the Patriots.

The drive opened with a 46-yard catch-and-run by Rex Burkhead, but the Patriots could not sustain the momentum. Quarterback Tom Brady missed on two of his subsequent three pass attempts. So far, Brady is 9-of-16 passing for 191 yards, the most of his career in a first half of a Super Bowl and the 10th most in Super Bowl history.

2nd quarter: Eagles 15, Patriots 12

Running back James White got loose for a 26-yard touchdown run, capping a seven-play, 90-yard drive and capitalizing on Duron Harmon's interception.

Stephen Gostkowski's extra point was wide left, his second miscue of the game.

White's touchdown was set up by a beautiful 43-yard throw from Tom Brady to Chris Hogan, their second-longest connection of the season.

The game's first turnover

Patriots safety Duron Harmon came up with a bobbled Nick Foles pass intended for Alson Jeffrey. The Patriots took over at their own 10-yard line

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On first and 10 at the New England 43-yard line, Foles targeted Jeffrey inside the 5-yard line. But Jeffrey, who was covered on the play by his college roommate, Stephon Gilmore, could not come up with it and essentially batted it into Harmon's hands. 2nd quarter: Eagles 22, Patriots 12

Coach Doug Pederson and the Eagles gambled on fourth and goal from the 1-yard line and won.

On a trick play, running Corey Clement took a direct snap, handed off to tight end Trey Burton, who then tossed a 1-yard touchdown pass to Nick Foles. It came with just 34 seconds left in the second quarter. It was the sixth time in Super Bowl history that a team scored a touchdown when going for it on fourth down, and first since Emmitt Smith in Super Bowl XXVIII.

The touchdown capped a seven-play, 70-yard drive that included a 55-yard catch-and-run by Clement on third down.

3rd quarter: Eagles 22, Patriots 19

When in an offensive rut, go to Rob Gronkowski. The Patriots opened the second half with an eight-play, 75-yard drive that ended on a 5-yard touchdown throw from Tom Brady to the big All-Pro tight end.

After making just one catch for 9 yards on five targets in the first half, Gronkowski was targeted five times on the drive, reeling in four catches for 68 yards and the touchdown.

Brady now has 344 passing yards, the eighth most in Super Bowl history. The record he set last year — 466 yards — is within reach.

Patriots safety Patrick Chung was injured on the possession but returned on the next defensive series.

3rd quarter: Eagles 29, Patriots 19

Quarterback Nick Foles threw a 22-yard pass to running back Corey Clement in double coverage to make it a two-score game. Clement's catch was reviewed by officials, who ruled the call on the field stands.

The touchdown capped an 11-play, 85-yard drive.

3rd quarter: Eagles 29, Patriots 26

Quarterback Tom Brady found receiver Chris Hogan for a 26-yard touchdown to again trim Philadelphia's lead. The touchdown finished off a seven-play, 75-yard drive.

Brady now has 404 yards passing and has connected with seven different receivers. For Hogan, who now has five catches for 125 yards, this is his first 100-yard game in the playoffs.

4th quarter: Eagles 32, Patriots 26

Jake Elliott connected on a 42-yard field goal to extend the Eagles' lead.

Elliott's attempt came after Marquis Flowers dropped Nelson Agholor for an 8-yard loss on third and 3.

The Eagles and Patriots have combined for more than 1,000 yards of offense, breaking the record for most yards in a Super Bowl. For Brady and Gronkowski, it was the 12th time they have connected for a touchdown in the postseason, tying Joe Montana and Jerry Rice for most by a quarterback/receiver.



The field goal capped an eight-play, 51-yard drive.

4th quarter: Patriots 33, Eagles 32 4th quarter: Eagles 38, Patriots 33

New England has its first lead in Super Bowl LII. It came on a 4-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Rob Gronkowski, their second touchdown connection of the game.

It was a 10-play, 75-yard drive for the Patriots, who have found the end zone on all three of their second-half possessions.

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Tight end Zach Ertz scored on an 11-yard touchdown pass from Nick Foles for the Eagles to retake the lead with just more than 2 minutes left in the game. Philadelphia's two-point attempt failed. Patriots safety Patrick Chung has been ruled out with a head injury.

4th quarter: Eagles 38, Patriots 33 4th quarter: Eagles 41, Patriots 33

The first sack of Super Bowl LII came at an inopportune time for New England.

Defensive end Brandon Graham came up with a strip-sack of Tom Brady with 2:21 left in the game. Rookie Derek Barnett recovered the fumble.

With 2:16 to play. When the Patriots had the ball, Brandon Graham drew cheers from Eagles fans as he sacked Tom Brady, who fumbled the ball. The ball was recovered by Eagles' Derek Barnett at the Patriots 31-yard line.

Philadelphia would then increase its lead after Elliott's 46-yard field goal, making the game score 41–33.

With seconds left, the Patriots were able to move the ball down to midfield. With just under 10 seconds remaining, Tom Brady gave it his best shot with a huge Hail Mary pass that would have sent the game into OT with a touchdown plus 2. However, the Eagles swarmed Gronkowski and the human blanket in the end zone caused a pass with a chance, to fall incomplete. This sealed the game and prompted a lot of happy sounds from Eagles and Eagles fans in the stadium and across the world. It was a heartbreaking experience for the Patriots who had come so close.

The 5-time Super Bowl champions were defeated by a score of 41–33. Nick Foles, a story unto himself this fall as The Little Engine That Could, was named Super Bowl MVP after the game. With this win, the Eagles finally won their first Super Bowl, and their first NFL title since 1960. The Patriots put up the good fight all year long.

Chapter 19 Coach Bill Belichick Part IV 2018, 2019



2018 Bill Belichick #14

The 2018 New England Patriots football team competed in their fifty-ninth season of professional football and their forty-ninth season in the National Football League (NFL). They were Super Bowl Champs this year and they sure deserved it. The Patriots were led by Coach Bill Belichick in his nineteenth of nineteen seasons (so-far).

The Patriots almost got top seed this year but after a slow start, they were able to claim the second seed. The Chiefs got the top seed honors this year. What needed to happen for the Patriots to be top seed is first the win over the Jets which they got, but that was not enough on its own. Attaining the top seed, and the home-field advantage that comes with it, depended on two other teams losing. The Patriots thus did not have control over their own destiny for the playoffs.

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The Kansas City Chiefs needed to fall to the Oakland Raiders and the Los Angeles Chargers need to lose in Denver to the Broncos. The Chiefs and Chargers had better records going in the final week of the season. Both had 11-4 records, while the Raiders and Broncos both had losing records.

Second year Kansas City Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes, who spent the prior year backing up Alex Smith had a whirlwind season for the Chiefs this year. He completed his 50th touchdown of the season during the Sunday December 30, 2018 season finale win against the Oakland Raiders at Arrowhead Stadium, W (35-3.) The Chargers also won, beating the Broncos 23-9.

The Chiefs thus beat out the Pats for 1st seed in the AFC playoffs. It was Andy Reid's third time in club history, and the Chiefs immediately began to focus on accomplishing something that did not happen during the first two occasions. They looked for a few wins and they got them, one after another until Super Bowl Sunday when they met the big BB guns of Belichick and Brady.

There'll be lots more on the playoffs after we discuss the Patriots regular season

Looking back, all the New England Patriots had to do to secure a bye for the first playoff game was to beat the visiting New York Jets on December 30. This is exactly what happened. The Patriots whooped the Jets with a final score of 38-3 to finish the regular season with an 11-5 record and the #2 seed in the AFC.

Even with six of the AFC's top eight teams having not yet finished their games, the pundits knew early that the second seed in the conference belonged to the Patriots. Despite the Texans also winning their week 17 game — the team defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars 20-3 — New England stayed on top due to the head-to-head tiebreaker: The Patriots had beaten Houston 27-20 all the way back on opening day.

With its win in the last game v the Jets, and a first-round bye locked up, as noted, the Patriots were still in contention for the number one seed and the homefield advantage throughout the playoffs. However, it needed like we explained, that path required Oakland to

beat the chiefs and Denver to beat LA's Chargers but neither of the two did happen.

Th Superbowl from a year ago. SB LII had made the Patriots the only team in NFL history to appear in ten Super Bowls, and it gave the Patriots a chance to repeat as Super Bowl Champions for the second time in franchise history, and for the first time since 2004. In addition, they had the chance to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers for the record of most Super Bowl wins by a team in NFL history with 6.

Unfortunately, the Pats did not get the win in 2017 but it was close. The Eagles' loss was devastating to the Patriots as it prevented New England from repeating their three-in-four Super Bowl run that they managed from 2001–2004. Also, with the loss, the Patriots tied the NFL record for most Super Bowl losses with five. Considering that the Patriots also have five big wins, that is not a bad record.

The Patriots were mostly in tact in 2018 though the team got off to a slow start. I announced in 2017 that I expected a Belichick/Brady combo to be right up there ready to bring home all the marbles again. And, look folks, they did even after losing to their future SB opponent, Kansas City in game one of the 2018 season. Before we get into the 2018 season, let's take a quick review of the 2017 season so we set the stage well for this fine comeback season.

2018 Season Highlights

The Patriots entered the 2018 season as two-time defending AFC champions. The Patriots' losses to the Jacksonville Jaguars in Week 2 and the Detroit Lions in Week 3 marked the franchise's first back-to-back double-digit losses since 2002. After this slow start, the Patriots improved to 7–3 leading into their bye in Week 11. Following a notable Week 14 loss to the Dolphins, the Patriots could not match their 13–3 record from the previous year. A defeat to the Pittsburgh Steelers in Week 15 meant the Patriots had lost five games for the first time since 2009. After a victory over the Buffalo Bills in Week 16, the Patriots clinched the AFC East for the tenth consecutive season. New England went undefeated at home with a

Week 17 win over the New York Jets in which they claimed a first-round bye and wrapped up the regular season with an 11–5 record that gave them the AFC's 2nd seed in the postseason.

The 2018 Patriots are just the second team ever in an American major sports league to win at least 10 straight division titles, joining Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves (set during 1991–2005, excluding the strike-shortened 1994 season). The Patriots also secured their 16th-straight 10-win season, tying the San Francisco 49ers' league record streak, set between 1983 and 1998. Notable records set during the season include Tom Brady achieving the record for most career passing touchdowns (including playoffs).[2]

In the 2018–19 playoffs, the Patriots defeated the Los Angeles Chargers in the Divisional round 41–28, and advanced to the AFC Championship game for a record eighth-straight time. The Patriots defeated the Chiefs 37–31 in overtime to go to the Super Bowl for the third straight year, becoming only the third team in NFL history to appear in three consecutive Super Bowls (after the 1990–93 Buffalo Bills and the 1971–73 Miami Dolphins).

In Super Bowl LIII, they faced the Los Angeles Rams at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in a rematch of Super Bowl XXXVI, in which the Patriots defeated the then-St. Louis Rams in a shocking upset 20–17. The Patriots won on this occasion by a score of 13–3 to win their sixth Super Bowl, tying the Pittsburgh Steelers for most Super Bowl championships at six each.[3] They joined the 1971 Dallas Cowboys and the 1972 Miami Dolphins as the only teams to win a Super Bowl the year after losing the game.

The 2018 Season

The Patriots opened their 2018 season On Sept 9 at home in Gillette Stadium, Foxborough Mass. They defeated the Houston Texans W (27–20). It was good winning the first game of the season after the Super Bowl loss to Philadelphia. With a 1-0 record, on Sept 16, at Jacksonville, the Patriots took one on the chin at TIAA Bank Field. They went down to defeat at the hands of the Jaguars. In game three with a 1-1 record, New England fell to its second defeat of the

season L (10-26). It is not often the Pats have a losing record. This loss was at the hands of the Detroit Lions at Ford Field in Detroit. On Sept 30, the Patriots evened their record at 2-2 with a nice win against the Miami Dolphins W (38-7) at home. The Miami win got the team's winning engine moving and they picked up five more wins in a row.

On Oct 4, which happens to be my wedding Anniversary, at home in Gillette Stadium, New England prevailed in a tight game over the Indianapolis Colts W (38–24). Back at Gillette Stadium for a Thursday Night game, their third home game in a row, on Oct 14, the Patriots barely defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, their 2018 major nemesis, W 43–40. Sporting 4–2 record heading into Soldier Field, on Oct 21, the Pats squeaked out a win in a nail-biter against the Chicago Bears W (38–31). Picking up the offensive pace on Oct 29 at New Era Field in Buffalo, the Patriots manhandled the Bills W (25–6). Back home on Nov 4, at Gillette, the Patriots defeated the Green Bay Packers W 31–17 ending their win streak at 6, bringing them a mid-season record of 7-3.

At the Tennessee Titans in Nissan Stadium on Nov 11, the Patriots were defeated in a big loss L (10–34) Following the Bye week of Nov 18, the Patriots came right back to its winning ways against the New York Jets on Nov 25 in Met Life Stadium, picking up a solid win W (27-13) On Dec2, back at home in Gillette, New England whooped the Minnesota Vikings W (24-10).

After having pounded Miami on Sept 30, the Patriots did not fare as well on Dec 9 at Hard Rock Stadium as the Dolphins nosed out New England L (33–34). On Dec 16, sporting a 9–4 record, the Patriots lost again at Pittsburgh's Heinz Field to the Steelers in a close match L (10-17). At 9-5 the next two home games to finish the season were important for standing and for the playoffs. New England beat the Buffalo Bills on Dec 23, W (24-12) and then came right back with a great won against the New York Jets W (38-3), winning their division and setting the stage for a great playoff season and another run at the Super Bowl.

2018 Season Playoff Game # 1 The 2018 Divisional Championship Game January 13 Pats 41 Chargers 28

The pundits suggested this game between the Chargers and the Patriots was like an irresistible force meeting an immovable object. New England had not lost a game at Gillette Stadium one time during calendar year 2018, and you can throw in last season's playoffs to book.

Meanwhile, the Division Playoff opponent the Los Angeles Chargers were victorious in all, but one game played away from their home stadium this past regular season – and that one loss was to cross-town rivals, the L.A. Rams, who as we all know was the eventual No. 2 seed in the NFC. They will appear in next week's NFC Championship Game.

Not everybody can win but when nothing wants to budge something must give way. When these powerful teams met Sunday afternoon in the Divisional Playoff, somebody was going to have to cede ground. Recent history said that the outcome might be a tossup. After all, New England was just the 13th team over the past decade to go undefeated at home during a regular season. Six of the previous 12 went on to lose their first game of the playoffs that same year so that did not help in determining who would win.

New England hoped not to become the seventh by doing something they rarely do (lose). So, with everybody in the middle of the field for the big coin toss, the teams were contemplating their next decisions. After winning the coin toss, the Patriots chose to receive, rather than defer their choice to the second half. Perhaps this was head coach Bill Belichick's way of sending a message to his troops.

"I think it is," center/co-captain David Andrews stated. "We went out there and started fast. That's what we wanted to do, and we were able to do it today. Those first few drives we played really well, exactly how we wanted to. When things are clicking like that, it's a hard thing to stop."

"As an offense, you get excited about that," running back Rex Burkhead admitted later.

"When Coach puts the ball in your hand, you feel like you've got to go out there and execute. Gives you a little extra energy when usually the preferred call is to defer. We just wanted to come out and start fast."

"It was just like, 'All right, we're taking the ball. Let's go offense!" remarked cornerback Jason McCourty. "We just tried to feed of each other and play balanced football."

QB Tom Brady and the offense then put together an efficient, 14-play scoring drive that chewed up half of the first quarter. It ended with rookie RB Sony Michel punching in his first postseason touchdown from a yard out.

Weather was a top talking point all week. While a winter storm blanketed the Midwest on Saturday, which affected the Colts-Chiefs game in Kansas City, the front moved just south of New England, hitting the Mid-Atlantic region, leaving Foxborough frigid, but sunny and dry.

High temperatures in the 20s didn't seem to affect QB Philip Rivers and the L.A. offense, however, when they got the ball for their first possession. Rivers topped off a six-play drive in less than three minutes by throwing a 43-yard TD to a wide-open Keenan Allen to help knot the score at 7 apiece.

Michel and the Patriots Offensive unit responded on the very next drive, and the rookie quickly doubled his short postseason TD tally with a 14-yard scamper at the end of a seven-play possession. Much of the yardage came from WR Julian Edelman, who found numerous openings in the Chargers' secondary, but it was WR Phillip Dorsett who got open behind the defense to haul in the third Patriots TD of the first half. New England suddenly had a 21-7 lead with 12 minutes to play in the second quarter.

For the first time in Patriots playoff history, New England scored touchdowns on its first three possessions. It wasn't the weather as much as New England's near-flawless execution in the first half that doomed the Chargers Sunday. And the Chargers are no slouches.

"We just kept telling each other, 'Keep the pedal down, keep moving forward, don't let up." Burkhead continued. "Just because you know in the playoffs how games can go. Happens all the time where another team comes back, so, we really tried to focus on executing still."

"Let's keep this thing going. Let's confuse him, let's get on these guys. Let's make it tough on them to get anything. That was our mentality going in," added McCourty. "Let's go out there and be aggressive, go play our game and see where it puts us. We were able to make some plays early. We did a good job of stopping the run and making them one-dimensional. Our offense as well – whenever we got a stop, they were able to put points on the board."

Throughout the week, some analysts had asserted that the running game would be crucial to New England being able to control the game. That appeared to be the case in the first half. A 40-yard run by Michel, his longest of the season, followed by a pair of Burkhead

carries upped the score to 28-7. New England was playing tough, smart, and strong.

When L.A. finally forced a punt defensively, the Chargers returner muffed the ball and LB Albert McClellan – he had two blocked punts earlier this season – recovered along the Patriots' sideline. It was originally ruled L.A.'s ball, but an opportune replay review overturned the call on the field.

It was that kind of half for the Chargers. The god of momentum had abandoned them. Michel soon barreled his way into the end zone from five yards out for his third scoring run of the half. He had more than 100 yards rushing before intermission. Edelman, meantime, eclipsed the century mark with 107 receiving yards on seven catches by halftime. It was like the Chargers did not know what had hit them.

Although the Chargers finally put some points up in the second half, the outcome was essentially decided by the pounding they took in the first half. Stephon Gilmore intercepted Rivers with just over four minutes to play. This was like the candle of hope being snuffed out along with any fading hopes the Chargers may have had.

"We understood we had to... not let [Rivers] be comfortable in the pocket, not allow him to step up [and throw], because he's a great quarterback," observed defensive end Trey Flowers. "We had to pressure him, and I think we executed that well today. We had to bring our A-game and I think we did."

The Patriots made their final home game of the 2018 season, their only home game in the post-season, a joyous occasion. More importantly, they survived the Chargers without any obvious, significant health concerns. They were prepared for the following week even before the Divisional playoff final whistle.

Now, the Patriots were rightly thinking that they were ready to advance to yet another Super Bowl, which would be their third straight appearance. They had one more game to go which had to go into the W column which meant that they had to do something they

had not done very well this year: They had to win a game on the road.

"Excited for the challenge," declared Burkhead. "The Chiefs are a great team and we know that. We know [Arrowhead Stadium] is a tough place to play. They're talented across the board, offensively and defensively, special teams-wise. We're going to have to have a great week."

"This is what you play for," McCourty pointed out, "the opportunity to continue to play this time of year. Personally, teamwise, it's a great accomplishment. For me, just trying to take it moment-by-moment. My wife texted me before the game and said, 'However this thing shakes, just enjoy the moment.' I'm very thankful for the guys in this locker room just to be able to be a part of this.

"Right now, it's just a blessing to be able to come into work and prepare for it. We know we're going against one of the best teams in our league, a [Chiefs] team that had the best record in the AFC. We know it's going to be a very, very tough challenge on the road for us."

"We're happy to win. It's hard to win in this league, especially in the playoffs against a team that hasn't really lost on the road all year long," special teams co-captain Matthew Slater told reporters at his locker. "We'll enjoy it tonight – go with our wives, girlfriends, and kids – then we'll be back in the lab tomorrow.

"It'll be a tough game for us [at Kansas City], but we've got a lot of guys with a lot of character in this locker room. We have a lot of belief, so, we'll see where that gets us."

Playoff Game #2 The 2018 Season AFC Championship Game

AFC Conference Game Jan 20, Pats 37 v KC 31 $\,$

The 2019 AFC Championship Game was set to be contested between the New England Patriots and Kansas City Chiefs. This matchup, which was about to take place at Arrowhead Stadium, was set to feature the top two teams in the conference. They were going to put on their respective helmets and go head-to-head with a berth in Super Bowl LIII on the line.

These teams had met earlier in the 2018 NFL season in a game that New England ultimately won, 43-40. Nobody on either team after that game had any finger nails left to brag about. The game was a nail-biter. That was week six. Now, over ten weeks had passed, and much had changed since Week 6 for both squads. So, not everything would be the same. The same results were hoped for if your team was New England. The opposite was hoped for if your team was KC. That and other factors made this rematch all the more intriguing.

Oddsmakers may not like the Patriots all the time especially when they lost their shirts on the Eagles victory over the Pats just a year earlier. So, they favored Kansas City this time around, giving the chiefs a three-point favorite advantage. The line of betting once established did not shift much as no new information had come in. The facts were the same. The #1 and #2 seeds would be battling it out in the AFC Championship, even though a good majority of the public at the home field at least, was backing the Chiefs to cover the spread.

Kansas City before the game was generating 59% of total bets and an even larger percentage of the total money was on the team at 61%. The total of this game was not expected to reach anywhere near the 83 points that were scored at Foxborough back in October, with the over/under originally set at 56 points. That's down slightly from the initial mark of 57 points, as 55% of bettors backing the under at this juncture.

Before the game, the question was will Patrick Mahomes, Andy Reid and the rest of the dynamic Chiefs find a way to avenge their shortcomings from three months ago and punch the Patriots in the nose by punching a ticket to the Super Bowl for the first time in 50 years. If not, then it would be Tom Brady and Bill Belichick who would be finding a way to guide the steady Pats to a season sweep of this foe and get back to the big super game for the third consecutive year?

Everybody had an opinion before what might have been the second biggest game of the year Vegas expert Jon Price of SportsInformationTraders.com—who had gone 6-1 on his picks for readers across the first two rounds of the 2019 NFL Playoffs—provided his take on the outcome, which originally could be found at the end of a lot of articles written on the subject.

Eventually game day came and since they were home, in more ways than one, Kansas City embraced this latest AFC Championship as a home game for the Chiefs. Well, it was a home game, but it was also because the game would be played at Arrowhead Stadium. All week long, this area and its football team reveled in the fact that the Lamar Hunt Trophy – named for the Chiefs' late founding owner – had finally come home. They were all excited when kickoff finally came. The Chiefs were ready as were their fans.

There is a historical context. New England and Kansas City were founding members of the old American Football League in 1960. The Boston Patriots had an even more patriotic name than today. At the time, the Patriots went by Boston, not New England, while the Chiefs were located in Dallas and known as the Texans. They wouldn't move to Kansas City and become the Chiefs until 1963.

The Chiefs were immediately a great team in the AFL. In January of 1967, the Chiefs appeared in the first-ever Super Bowl, falling to Green Bay 35-10. Three years later, K.C. defeated Minnesota 23-7 to claim the Chiefs' first NFL title.

That win represented the last time the Chiefs appeared in a Super Bowl. There wasn't an AFC Championship Game that year because, although the AFL and NFL officially announced plans to merge in 1966, the deal wouldn't be finalized until the 1970 season. So, Kansas City advanced to Super Bowl IV simply as champions of the AFL following the 1969 season. Richard Nixon was president.

The next year, in 1970, the merger became complete and, since 1984, the trophy given to the team who wins the AFC Championship has been known as the Lamar Hunt Trophy, named for the longtime majority owner of the Chiefs and one of the founding fathers of the AFL.

Entering the big game at Arrowhead, the Patriots had captured the Lamar Hunt ten times, but Kansas City hadn't ever done so. They had one chance in January 1994 but lost at Buffalo.

Kansas City had never hosted an AFC title contest before game day. In fact, when the Chiefs conducted their first press conference of the week before the game, they were able to display the traditional helmets of the participating teams alongside the Lamar Hunt Trophy for the first time ever. The Chiefs felt as if this was, at long last, their opportunity not only to show off "their" trophy, but keep it in town as well.

For the Patriots to pull off an upset in hostile Arrowhead, they would need to control both sides of the line of scrimmage, drain the clock as much as possible by running the ball effectively, and put the Chiefs in an unfamiliar position of having to play from behind at Arrowhead, thus take the loud home crowd out of the game.

"We knew it was going to be a tough, physical game," center/cocaptain David Andrews said afterward. "We wanted to start fast, and we were able to do that."

After losing the opening coin toss, the Patriots ended up winning it because the Chiefs elected to defer, giving New England the first crack at the ball. Looking as calm as though they were strolling a tropical beach, the offense replicated its opening drive from a week prior. Offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels dialed up mostly rushing plays as the Patriots marched 80 yards in 15 plays, with rookie RB Sony Michel punching in the final yard for the first score of the night. It was as they say, déjà vu all over again but not for the Chiefs.

New England's defense then did its job, pinning K.C. deep in its own end and sacking the new guy, QB Patrick Mahomes on 3rd-and-10 after a possession of less than two minutes.

Working with a short field, the Patriots confidently, yet patiently got down again to the Chiefs' 1-yard line, moving the game clock into the early second quarter in the process.

Just when it looked like the Patriots were going to up the score to 14-0, QB Tom Brady threw a play-action pass into the end zone that was picked off by Kansas City LB Reggie Ragland. Mahomes and K.C. took over at their own 20 following the touchback. Again, though, New England's Defense came up with a huge run-stuff on 3rd-and-1, forcing the Chiefs to punt. Almost but not a cigar and not even a cigarette butt.

New England could not capitalize, though, as the Chiefs held the Patriots on a 3rd-and-1 run. Then, facing a 3rd-and-9 from just outside the Patriots' red zone, Mahomes dropped back to pass and could not find an open receiver. He was dropped for a 14-yard loss by DE Trey Flowers. Rather than risk missing a long field goal, Kansas City chose to punt the ball back to New England. Before that, Mahomes had missed a wide-open Damien Williams in the end zone on a throw that likely would have tied the game. The god of momentum was still working on the Patriots' sidelines and on the field.

Flowers' sack proved consequential, as Brady and the Pats Offense, aided by a spectacular 3rd-down grab by RB James White, drove nearly the length of the field. Brady atoned for his earlier misfire with what the pundits called *a wonderful pump-fake throw* to WR Phillip Dorsett, who, despite being blatantly interfered with in the end zone, managed to come down with the ball and double the New England's score.

Kyle Van Noy then strip-sacked Mahomes, which nearly found its way into LB Dont'a Hightower's hands. This had all the makings of a scoop-and-score, but Mahomes alertly fell on the ball to end the first half – a half the Patriots thoroughly dominated. New England held the ball for 21 of the first 30 minutes and shut the Chiefs' offense out at home at halftime for the first time under head coach Andy Reid. Reid had halftime to conjure up a solution for the game situation he had encountered.

"We talk about faith all the time in our locker room," special teams co-captain Matthew Slater told reporters inside a congested visitor' locker room less than an hour after the final play. "It's easy to have faith when things are going well, when it's tangible, when you can

see it in front of you, but faith is when you can't see what's in front of you and how things are going to work out, you still have to trust your process.

"You have to believe in the man next to you. That's when it really matters. You can't say you have faith till you've been in the fire, and we certainly have been in the fire this year -3-5 on the road, too old, not athletic enough, but hey, that's all right. That's all right."

K.C. wasted little time in the third quarter, taking the opening drive of the second half all the way to cut New England's lead in half, thanks in large part to a 54-yard pass surrendered by CB Stephon Gilmore on 3rd-and-2. TE Travis Kelce caught Mahomes' next pass for a 12-yard TD.

Gilmore's teammates bailed him out on Kansas City's next drive, however.

The Patriots' defensive front continued to pressure Mahomes and forced him into off-target throws. CB Jason McCourty then made a tremendous pass-defense on 3rd-and-long from deep in Chiefs territory and K.C. had to punt. Another short field gave Brady and the Pats O-squad another scoring opportunity, but they had to settle for a field goal from Stephen Gostkowski to make it 17-7 with four minutes left in the third quarter.

That score remained as the fourth quarter started and the Chiefs took over like they were ready to do something. They moved the ball to New England's 14-yard line. The next two plays were a Pass Interference penalty against rookie CB J.C. Jackson in the end zone and a 1-yard TD toss by Mahomes to his running back Williams.

"That's been our journey, I think, throughout this entire season," cornerback Jason McCourty observed. "Our struggles on the road, starting off 1-2, there's always been something for us to overcome, something to bind us together.

"Throughout the adversity, between our young guys, our old guys, there's always somebody to pick you up, and always knowing there was time left on the clock, we always felt like we were fine."

The key sequence of regulation came with New England's offense facing a 4th-and-less-than-a-yard at the K.C. 25. Rather than kick a field goal, the Patriots ran Rex Burkhead, who got smothered at the line for no gain. The Chiefs took over down by only three points and there was 9:33 still left in the game. It was anybody's game, but the Chiefs were down.

The Patriots' defense held once again, but on the ensuing Chiefs punt, return man Julian Edelman appeared to touch the bouncing ball and a K.C. player recovered. What was the truth on the play? Edelman protested immediately to the officials. He claimed that he had never touched the ball. Replay review confirmed Edelman's assertion and the Patriots maintained possession at their own 26-yard line. Pundits said the call may have been an even closer shave than the catch Edelman made in Super Bowl LI two years ago.

Two plays later, a Brady pass definitely touched Edelman's hands as the ball ricocheted off them and into a Chiefs defenders' grasp. Mahomes and K.C. then had the ball deep in Patriots territory with about eight minutes left, but they only needed 10 seconds to score and take their first lead of the night game.

Brady and the Pats Offense were ready, and they responded, but it was not an easy trek. They once more faced 4th-and-less-than-a-yard at the Chiefs' 10. They chose to go for the TD. This time, a gaping hole emerged for Michel and he raced through it untouched to the end zone. With 3:32 to go, the Patriots clawed back on top 24-21.

An almost-interception of Mahomes in the end zone by Jonathan Jones wound up on the grass, and on the next play, Mahomes completed a long pass inside the 5. The Chiefs ran it in on the next play to pay dirt to regain their lead just before the 2-minute warning.

New England still had time and all its time-outs, but they were down. A good kickoff return by Cordarrelle Patterson set up their final possession. A pass reception reviewed and overturned and an offside by the Chiefs negating a game-sealing interception were just two of the crucial plays that ensued. But it was Burkhead's final run, barreling into the end zone from four yards out, that looked like it

decided the outcome, but with under a minute to go, K.C. was able to tie the knotted game with a field goal.

Championship Game Overtime.

Slater correctly called "Head" to give the Patriots the ball. He revealed his reason, which he credited to his father, Pro Football Hall of Fame offensive lineman Jackie Slater.

"God is the head of our life. So, we call heads. Simple as that," Slater smiled.

God may indeed be the head of their lives, but Brady at the time was in control of the Pats offense, and Slater, among others, certainly, took comfort in that fact.

"I felt pretty good about our chances. Because we have Tom Brady as a teammate," he admitted. "I always feel good about my chances."

New England won the coin toss and, essentially, the game. The offense found its rhythm again and Burkhead, one more time, snowplowed his way into the end zone.

Game over... finally.

"I was thinking, 'Hopefully I can get this thing in,'" Burkhead chuckled as he recalled hearing his number called in the huddle right before the final play. "When it happened, it's a feeling you can't really explain... Yeah, it's fun. You get in, you hear everyone screaming – not the fans, in this case, but your teammates. It's a great feeling. I'm just happy to be part of this team."

"I think back at being a kid, playing Pop Warner football alongside my twin brother, [Devin]," McCourty mused later, "and I never could have imagined being here, in this moment, getting an opportunity to go to the Super Bowl. You just look up and say, 'Man, God is good, man.' It's just such a blessing to get to this point in our professional careers and do something special."

"No, it hasn't sunk in yet," rookie running back Sony Michel confessed with a shy smile when asked about the Super Bowl. "It's a

surreal feeling, amazing feeling right now. I'm sure, sooner or later, it's going to sink in."

For so many years, the Lamar Hunt Trophy has resided in Foxborough, and that's where it will return. Kansas City had it back "home" for only one night, and only on loan, as it turns out.

"I mean, it's pretty unbelievable," remarked wide receiver Chris Hogan. "All I can say is that this locker room and all the guys, I'm so proud of how we worked throughout the season. There's been a lot of ups and downs. A lot of people counted us out in the beginning, didn't think we could come and win on the road. We just stayed with each other.

We believed in each other. We believed in our abilities. We knew if we prepared then we could get to where we wanted and needed to be. We did and now we've got a little bit more work to do."

Indeed, it was two more weeks, to be precise, when the Patriots were scheduled to face the Los Angeles Rams in Super Bowl LIII.

Super Bowl LIII



Feb 3, Pats 13 v LA Rams 3

The Patriots won their sixth Super Bowl title in 18 years on a Sunday night in a defensive battle over the Rams. The pundits got their reports published on February 3, 2019 and the updates came in on February 4, 2019.

Since they, almost all of the pundits, wrote about the game the following day, they began by saying "Super Bowl LIII took place last night inside Mercedes-Benz Stadium down in Atlanta, GA, where the football world saw the New England Patriots defeat the Los Angeles Rams 13-3." That's what they wrote and for the Rems, that's all she wrote though the Rams have nothing for which to apologize.

After the Patriots field goal, the Rams still weren't able to make any dent into the scoreboard, as they punted on all three of their second quarter drives.. Everybody tried but nobody got nothing!

While the Patriots first drive led to points, the remainder of their second quarter drives resulted in a punt and a turnover on downs at the Rams 32 on a 4th & 1. Once the halftime performance by Maroon 5, Travis Scott, and Big Boi wrapped up, the fans were ready for what they hoped would be a better played second half.

The Rams received the second half kickoff after deferring at the coin toss. With a 3-0 lead, New England was ready to defend. L As was still unable to move the football down the field. They got just yards on their first two possessions, both ending in punts.

After quickly stopping the Patriots on their first two possessions of the second half, the Rams were finally able to help their cause with a 10-play 42-yard drive that ended with a Greg Zuerlein 53-yard field goal.

Now, tied at 3 entering the fourth quarter, everybody was wondering if there would be a first touchdown and possibly a game-winning score. The prayers were answered seven minutes into the final quarter.

Rookie Running Back Sony Michel, a hero of the playoff games, powered his way into the end zone from 2 yards out, following a Brady-Gronkowski 20-yard connection. Los Angeles pushed back again after falling behind 10-3, with a 7-play 48-yard drive that looked like it could be a game changer, but it resulted in Jared Goff's pass being intercepted by Stephon Gilmore as the Patriots brought an all-out blitz.



After the interception, the Patriots sealed their victory with Gostkowski's second successful field goal, this time from 41 yards

away. With little time left in the game, the Rams were able to move the ball into field goal range, where Zuerlein missed a 48-yard field goal attempt, and the game ended with a Brady kneel with five seconds remaining.

There was a "cigar tree," that's what it looked like in early fall with these huge stinky leaves overhanging the sidewalk. The kids and I almost in unison founded a new word, blittin. New England's win marked Tom Brady and Bill Belichick's sixth Super Bowl Championship, improving on their record for most coach/player championships in the NFL. Along with improving their record, Brady and Belichick broke individual records with this Super Bowl win, with Belichick becoming the oldest coach to win the Super Bowl and Brady becoming the sole leader in most Super Bowl championships, passing Charles Haley.

Overall, this Super Bowl was a complete disappointment from my perspective as a fan, but also neither coach can or should be happy with their teams' performance. Yes, New England can celebrate with the win but knowing how they played, they should feel grateful to come up with the win.
