Meyers person. Anyway, Frosini wouldn't have it any other way. Instead of using this big frame of mine to carry things all my life, he helped me understand that I had a big mind that could actually carry me through life. Hey, he is my hero!


THANKS TO BUSINESS AND TYPING STAFFS



As the Seniors spend their last few days in the halls and classrooms of Meyers High School, they have an irresistable desire to reflect on the various activities and accomplishments of the year.




For us, the seniors of 1940, ten years seems a long era, however, to an insti-

tution such as Meyers, ten years is a short period.



Letter from Joan Cole

Those of us who read Joan's letter are still amazed at all she remembers about Meyers. Unlike Clem's "one page" letter, however, Joan's is four pages and much more serious in its tone. We present it to you in its entirety because it is a work that recounts much history – some from MHS and some more recent, and it is cast with a number of strong opinions, many of which we may all share.

Here is the text of Joan's letter. Thank you Joan for the submission and congratulations on the award:



Letter from Joan Cole Translated from OCR

You are going to think I am making this up.

Once upon a time there was a student who loved school-it was the one stable force in her life. No matter what was happening at home there would be school tomorrow. Miss Obici would be there and she would have her Minimum Requirements close at hand. (Those of you fortunate enough to draw Mr. Stahl as your history teacher will never know what we went through.). Her booming voice and this-is-no-picnic demeanor let us know we were really in for it. If that combination did not pull its own weight one quick look at her would cause any seventh grader to quake.

She reminded us regularly that "7-3 is better than 7-1." We 7-1's did not take well to that news; but it may have spurred us all to crave #3 status. When some kids stood to recite they would pee on the floor. In this classroom the janitor knew almost as much about the Minimum Requirements as we did... (Are YOU still carrying around bits of baggage such as "The main reason for the discovery of America was pepper"?)

Later on we advanced to Pennsylvania History with the basketball coach. We spent an entire period learning how to spell the word "chamois" and listening to Yogi trying to pronounce "Monongahela." On St. Patrick's Day Mr. Basketball Coach insisted that we learn the true background of Pat. He carefully skirted the issue throwing hints at us until Tony Yanora shouted out-"".-as only Tony could-"He was a wop!"

Miss Trethaway guided us into gerunds and participles. Apparently money was short and resources had to be conserved. Why did she start the lesson, the review and the reinforcement with the same list of sentences? "Counting my money, 50 cents fell to the floor," was the first sentence we had to dissect. WHY does this litter cling to my brain cells? Maybe it was the memorization we did; I got to be pretty good at it. How aboutyou?

Mr. Cooney introduced us to writing; suddenly we had all turned very lucky. Then, we went on to Mrs. Weivel and Word Wealth. Bring on the SATs; we were primed and ready.

Tenth grade health class revealed more miracles than just First Aid Training. Miss Rosenthal had to use the side board-never the front board_to draw the diagram of the uterus. Whatever would happen if the boys across the hall in Mr. Nagle's health class caught a glimpse of the fallopian tubes glaring up from the front board???

Gym and swim classes fostered their own brand of memory-not all fond. Bathing suits issued at the pool office-bathing caps, hair dryers that never worked and the horror of taking a shower and having to prance out into the open-naked--to show the teacher that you had cleansed yourself. . . .back then some of us were not yet wondering why the teacher needed to see us in our skin. Maybe it was innocent; now I wonder.

What we may not have known at the time was that we needed no Character Education program to engage us in conduct befitting a human. We pretty much knew when to talk and when to listen. We did not need a slogan-"There are NO cheating teens in 316"-but slogans are always nice; they give us something to recite when we need to be distracted from terrorist attacks.

I write this from my very own classroom. (SOME of us are still in school.) As I sit here waiting for my first period Information Systems class to trickle in all my thoughts of Meyers High School are soft and mushy. I loved it when I was a student; I love it even more now. Most days it is those reminders of Elmprint, and Dress-up Day, and Wyoming Valley Conference Champs and Thanksgiving Day games with gold mums and ribbons, along with the kind of professionalism I mistakenly thought came bundled with this teaching career that keep me on track here. If you could sit in my classroom you'd think you had exited to another realm; and you wouldn't be pleased.

Who knew that the day we heard of the death of our President would be etched in the coldest crevice our memory? Who could have dreamed that one day 38 years later I would be in a classroom with 30 of my own students, some of whom had parents working at the Pentagon, and I would be desperate for wisdom to sooth them-and myself.

In November 1963 Miss Murray had a tough job-a Shorthand class full of girls, bawling their eyes out. Miss Murray may have revealed more of her

politics than we realized; she was focused on what this event would do to the Stock Market. On September 11, my daughter was continents away in Italy; I wondered whether I'd ever see her again. My son later reported that while working in Alexandria he paused to hear what he would later learn was a jet slamming into the Pentagon.

So life is different for all of us now. But we still need the rock-solid foundation we learned may have been unique in our lifetime. Thank God for it. I never expected to quit my career so early in life (insert laugh track here).

I started teaching in 1970- Typing, Shorthand and a very intense lesson on the operation of the Ditto and mimeograph machines. Had I been given the chance to refine and perfect those lessons I'd be an ace at this now. Meanwhile, I have stumbled and bumped through changes in my curriculum that boggle the mind: Computer Programming, Word Processing, Information Systems, Microsoft Office applications, and Web Page Development. This year they handed me a gem: Information Technology in a Global Society.


